

By their actions, those in authority in Deport don't want your business and have caused many deterrents to the cotton farmers. I have always thought to build a town was to get new business, not to drive off what you already have in a common, uncourteous way.

My reward for maintaining you a convenient marketing place for 65 years, is to be kicked out and in so doing, costing you time and money in selling your crop.

You can buy insurance in every crossroad in Texas. You can sell cotton in only one place in Lamar and Red River County and that was Deport.

Deport has had something for the last several years that none of the surrounding towns have had, a cotton market, but not now.

Perhaps a profit for a few is worth more than the loss to many. Think about it.

You boys stay with me and we will try to keep a 100 ear tradition from being destroyed.


