


To the Editor:

### **BUDDY'S WORKSHOP**

### **Location of Thermostat** Is Very Important

My wife and I are building a new home. We are in perfect agreement, except for one little detail-the location of the thermostat which will control the heating system. Is there one, single best location?

If there is one thermostat to control the entire heating system, it should be located where it is sure to give an accurate reading of the average temperature throughout the house. This means that it should not be located where subjected to cold drafts from doors or windows. The wall of an entry hall facing a door which will be frequently opened is a poor choice. Drafts from the door will call for more heat than is needed and some rooms will be overheated. By the same token, a thermostat located near a lamp, television set or other source of heat will reflect the heat with a higher reading and not send enough heat to other rooms.

Are paint stripping chemicals effective, and safe to

Stripping compounds can be hazardous if carelessly used. Read the manufacturer's directions carefully and follow them carefully. It is important to use these compounds in a well-ventilated area so that toxic and flammable vapors will not be allowed to accumulate. Always wear rubber gloves when working with chemical removers. Pour a small amount of remover into a coffee can or some small container and strip only small sections. Always apply the stripping compound on a horizontal plane.





' We don't have to carry the little story any further for its sheer absurdity to become quite evident: it has probably never happened in your church and it is never likely to do so. For one thing, it would seem that people don't have that kind of experience any more, for another, if they do, they know better than to tell of them in church.

In A Vision

Yet, none of us think it particularly surprising that Genesis 15 begins with this declaration: "the Lord came to Abram in a vision..." In fact, the whole story of Abram/Abraham is the direct result of his mystical revela-

tions from God. Although Abram was at an age—the retirement years-when most people have settled into a definite pattern (read "rut," if you like), the visionary messages which Abram received from God changed both his name and the whole course of his life, not to mention the world.

Most of us have been raised in a culture which, despite our religion or because of it, has managed to indoctrinate us into rejecting anything visionary or mystical. We are dutifully respectful of the role visions played in the Bible, but we assume that both the growth of intellect and reason have made the mystical obsolete at the very least.

It is interesting and ironic, therefore, that today various scientists and others are telling us that our minds comprise two very different faculties: reason and intuition. The left side of the brain is the reasoning faculty, whereas the right side of the brain is much more intuitive ("mystical" some would say). We have too much relied upon the left side of our brain. The well-balanced person will use both kinds of faculties.

"But Abram Said..." In Genesis 15 we find A-

bram doing just that. Seeing and hearing God in a vision, he attempts to deal with it in a reasonable way: "But Abram said, 'O Lord God, what wilt thou give me, for I continue you childless...!"" Abram's life was transformed because in responding to God he used both his reason and his intuitive faculties. If you would hear God's voice, you must do no

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

Weekly Agricultural Update

By Herb Brevard Either dormant oil or superior oil can be used this time of year for controlling scale insects on fruit trees. The material should be applied as soon as possible and no later than the first of March. Dormant oils should be applied when the temperatures are expected to be in the 60 degree range and no freeze is expected for a day or two.

Adding an insecticide such as Lorsban, diazinon or other approved materials will increase effectiveness against such pests as pecan phylloxera and scale in-

Apply dormant oils to aged trees that have a scale problem. One or two year old peach trees do not need dormant oils and pecan trees should be old enough to be producing.

Most soil insects in gardens can be controlled. Diazinon is the most common insecticide used, but are available to control wireworms, white grubs. cutworms, rootworms, etc. The insecticide can be applied broadcast, either granular or liquid, or can be used as a drench for transplants. Apply the insecticide at least two weeks prior to planting. Follow label directions.

grubs migrating to the backs of cattle. If present, this indicates that the insecticide was applied at the wrong time, the wrong material was used or no insecticide was applied. There is no control of the grub at this stage. Research has shown grubs cause loss of daily gain in feeder cattle and loss of vigor in adult cattle, plus, slaughter cattle have less value.
