

# Patriot Girls Capture Bi-District, Lose Area

In area competition Tuesday night, the Lady Patriots lost their bid to continue down the road to state in what can only be termed a Heartbreaker. Fourth ranked Groesbeck, who met the Patriots girls at Forester fieldhouse in Garland, came away with a 57-50 victory, and a feeling of surprise at the stiff competition they faced.

The first quarter of the game was fast paced as both teams decided to use a pressing defense. Both teams broke the press well but Prairiland trailed after one quarter of play, 11 to 10.

In the second quarter, both teams played well as both teams quit pressing. The difference in the quarter was Groesbeck's six foot one inch post girl, who seemed to score at will. After the first half of play, Prairiland trailed 29 to 24.

The third quarter was all Groesbeck as they took advantage of Patriot turnovers. Kim House collected her fourth foul and Donna Vaughn committed her third foul during the quarter as the referees called a tight game. After three quarters, Groesbeck held a 43 to 33 lead over the Lady Patriots.

Prairiland staged another comeback the fourth quarter to get back into the game. Tonya Burdine was especially sharp this quarter as she scored all of her six points during it. With 1:12 left in the game, Tiffany Morgan scored a layup as Prairiland trailed 51 to 50. That would end the scoring for Prairiland as they went on to lose a very close game 57 to 50. High point scorers for Prairiland were Donna Vaughn with 11 points and Kim House with nine points.

Friday night the Prairiland Patriots will play second ranked New Boston at Mt. Pleasant at 7:30. Coach Dan Harris says, "We have to play awfully well to win. New Boston has tremendous talent." He concluded, "We will be ready to play and are looking forward to it." Senior forward Todd Davis said, "I think that we can beat New Boston if we can block out and get rebounds."

The Patriot fems had gotten to the area playoffs with their hardnosed style last Thursday night, as they upset number eight Paul Pewitt 56-48 in a bi-district win in Mt. Pleasant.

The opening quarter of the game was a slow one for

Prairiland as they soon fell behind 6 to 0. Prairiland finally put two points on the board on a long jump shot by Kim House with five minutes remaining in the quarter. Prairiland hung close during the quarter, but trailed 20 to 14 after one quarter of play.

Prairiland came to life the second quarter as Donna Vaughn sparked a comeback by scoring six of

the twelve points scored by the Patriots.

Nita Jaynes finally put the Patriots ahead for the first time in the game with 1:32 remaining as she made a jumper to make the score Prairiland 26, Paul Pewitt 25. Paul Pewitt answered with a basket as time ran out in the first half as they held a 27-26 advantage. During the first half, Prairiland shot an anemic

total of zero free shots.

Paul Pewitt edged away from Prairiland the third quarter as Prairiland was once again tight. Paul Pewitt took advantage of the situation and jumped ahead to a 42-36 lead after three quarters.

Prairiland came alive the fourth quarter, using their deft quickness and hot shooting to get back into the game. Lee Ann Ballard shot

with 6:11 on the clock tied the game at 44 all. Donna Vaughn then gave Prairiland the lead which they never relinquished on a lay up with 4:23 remaining. Prairiland shot their first free shots with 3:48 on the clock and missed, but Donna Vaughn got the ball back with 3:44 on the clock as she sank the first free shot of the game. The blow that ended the

chance of a Paul Pewitt comeback came with 1:32 left as Donna Vaughn surprised them by driving in for an uncontested layup while Prairiland was in their delayed offense to make the score Prairiland 52, Paul Pewitt 47.

Donna Vaughn ended the scoring with six seconds remaining to give Prairiland the eventual winning score. Coach Ronnie Baker said

"The key to our game was keeping pressure on Paul Pewitt defensively". Coach Baker added "I think that outscoring Paul Pewitt 20 to 6 in the fourth quarter

confirms that." High point scorers in the game were Donna Vaughn with 14 points and Kim House with 11 points.

students at the annual ceremony Sunday, Feb. 12.

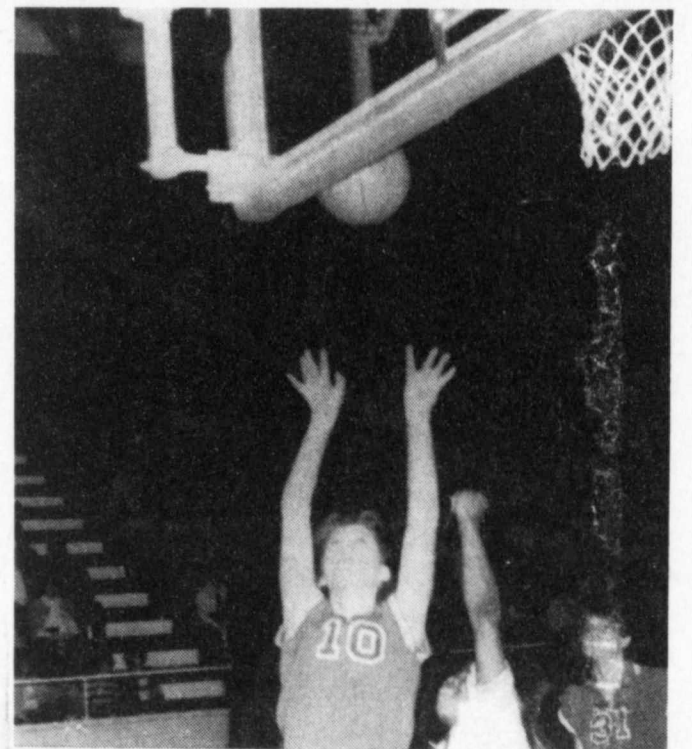
Eighty-two students joined the chapter during the event held in the First Christian

## Footprints From The Past

 This is the time of year to start to get ready for the coming spring work, as I remember. There was the plows to get ready and to patch the harness that we used on the mules and horses and then there was the home garden to break and plant before you got too busy in the field.  
 We always had to plant the potatoes on the 14th of February without fail, as Dad was a firm believer that they had to be planted then. Then there was cabbage and onions to set out and we always set out about fifty or seventy-five cabbage plants and around two hundred onion plants.  
 To get the fields ready to plant, we would hook four mules together and then we would hook them up to what we called a bedder, which was a plow that would make a bed so we could plant the cotton or corn, which was about all that was planted in those days. After we had the fields bedded, we would let them lay for two to four weeks then we would get our seed ready. Having the planter ready, we would hook two mules to the planter to plant the cotton. If you have never seen an old time planter, it worked just like the modern ones, except that it was pulled by mules or horses instead of a tractor. When the cotton was planted, we would hook up one mule to what we called a cotton roller, which was a long log that we cut out of some tree and got all the bark off it, then we would drive a steel peg in each end so we could put a couple of chains on then we would hook the animal to the roller and roll two rows of cotton at one time.  
 Before we planted our cotton, we would plant our corn and the way we planted corn was we had a walking planter that worked by going in the middle or in the low part and not on the top of the bed. The corn planter had only one wheel and it only took one mule to pull it. When the corn was tall enough, we would go in the field and burst open the bed and that was the way we got the corn to be on top of the bed and not down in the middle and the reason for this was that you got more soil around the corn and it was not likely to fall over as it got higher.  
 When the cotton came up and was big enough we would plow it with a cultivator, then we would chop the cotton or in other words we would thin it out and after we had chopped it so we would have some dirt up around it. After a while we would have to go back and hoe all the weeds and grass out of the cotton and corn as we did not have any poison to kill the weeds and sometimes you had to hoe the cotton two or three times.  
 That is just some of the things that we did to get our crops planted and started to grow and it was all done by horse or mule power and not a tractor.

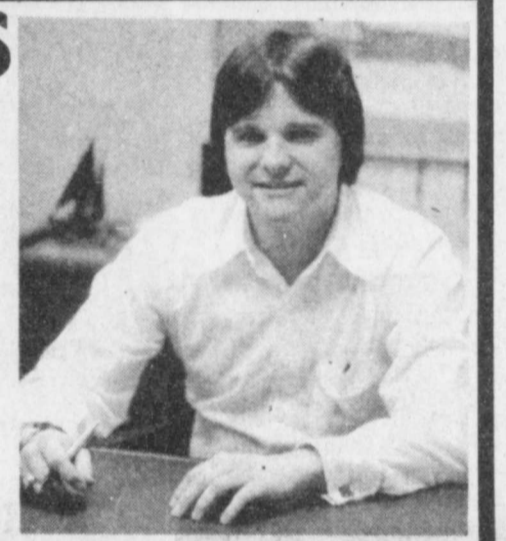

## Spring Fever Hits Area

 Oh Hum! And, so it's another day. Have you noticed people this past weekend moving along very, very slowly--almost sluggishly or sitting slumped in a chair staring with glazed eyes through winter-grayed windows.  
 It's that disease that occurs every spring, usually after a long hard winter with a few warm balmy days and zip, spring fever strikes. Sometimes spring fever will strike masses of people and occasionally a few victims at a time will succumb to the fever.  
 Symptoms to check for: the individual cannot hear you as you speak to him or her. The individual sits paralyzed before an open window staring at the green grass growing or the tree buds budding.  
 There are two treatments for spring fever. According to Moody's Home Receipts, a large spoonful of sulphur and black strap molasses around the first of March to thin one's blood, is one remedy.  
 The second treatment plan is called work. Fresh air, sunshine, wind and work are super for spring fever victims.  
 Why not allow the spring fever victim to clear last year's vegetation from your garden plot and turn the soil over with a shovel or a tiller.  
 Whatever size garden you have, you need three additional basic requirements besides a plot: sunlight, water and plants. All vegetables need some sun and you must have all sun for high vegetable yields.  
 The soil should be fertile and easy to till preferably a loose, well drained loamy soil. Consider the availability of water. Locate the garden near a spigot or at least where it can be reached with a garden hose.  
 Now you are ready for planning stage. Select vegetables you want to grow and that you like to eat. Avoid those that your family doesn't purchase at the grocery store.  
 After you select your vegetables, make a rough diagram of your garden. Indicate the number of rows and different vegetables you wish to grow. Show the desired location of each crop, the number of plants or feet of rows you want to plant and the best time to plant. The planting guide will help you determine what you need to buy and organize your gardening activities.

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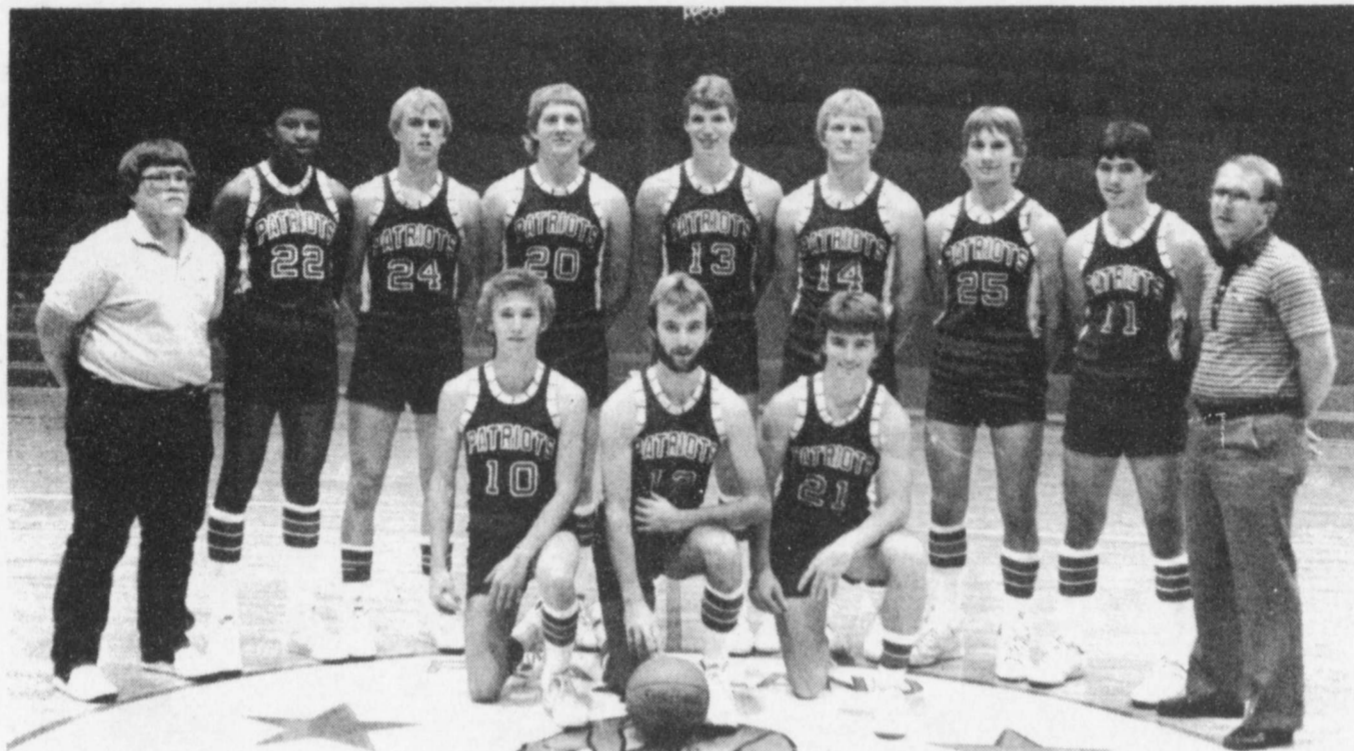

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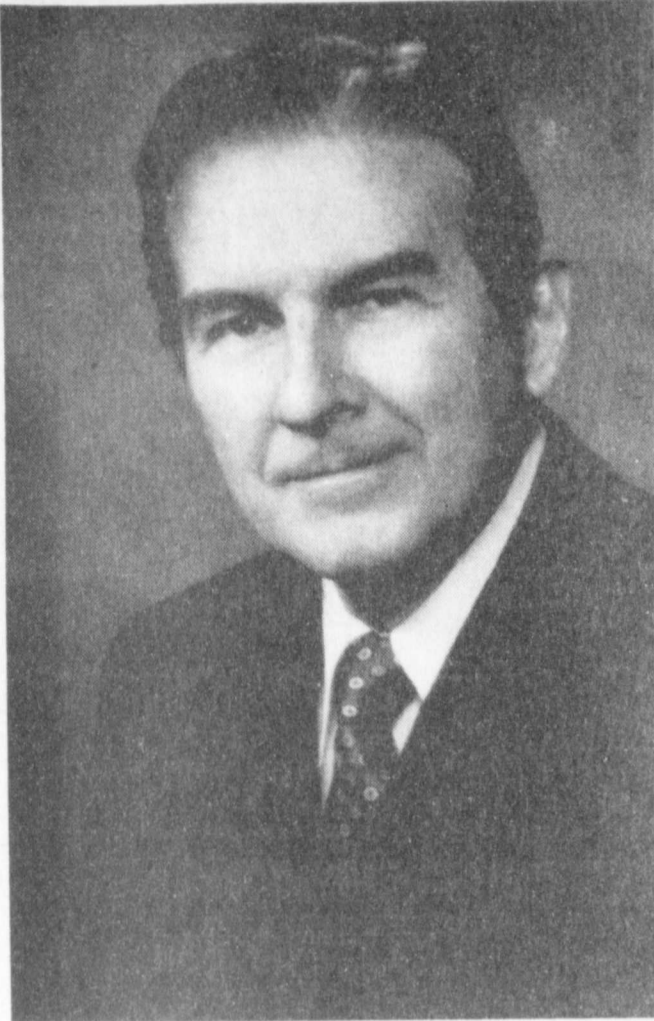

### Ball Receives Award

Charles E. Ball, executive vice president of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association for a dozen years, has been named by Progressive Farmer magazine as "1983 Man of the Year in Service to Texas Agriculture".

The announcement is carried in the February issue of Progressive Farmer. A presentation was made to Ball during the recent NCA convention in New Orleans.

The magazine cites Ball's involvement in 4-H Club leadership; a distinguished agricultural journalism career, which spanned 25 years with both Farm and Ranch magazine and Farm Journal and in national legislative affairs.

In the announcement story, Progressive Farmer editors say: "Bold ideas come naturally to Charlie Ball. He has spent his entire

career helping agricultural producers making things happen...Make that two careers, 24 years as a keen sighted, aggressive farmer editor and a dozen years as a hard charging association executive for a major agricultural industry. In both capacities, he has helped farmers and ranchers become a stronger force in shaping their own economic destiny."

Since Ball became executive vice president of TCFA in 1972, TCFA membership has grown from 963 members to over 5,000 and the annual budget has increased eight fold.

Ball graduated from Deport High School in 1941 and later earned degrees from Texas A&M University and Iowa State University. He is married to the former Ruth Kimball of Deport.

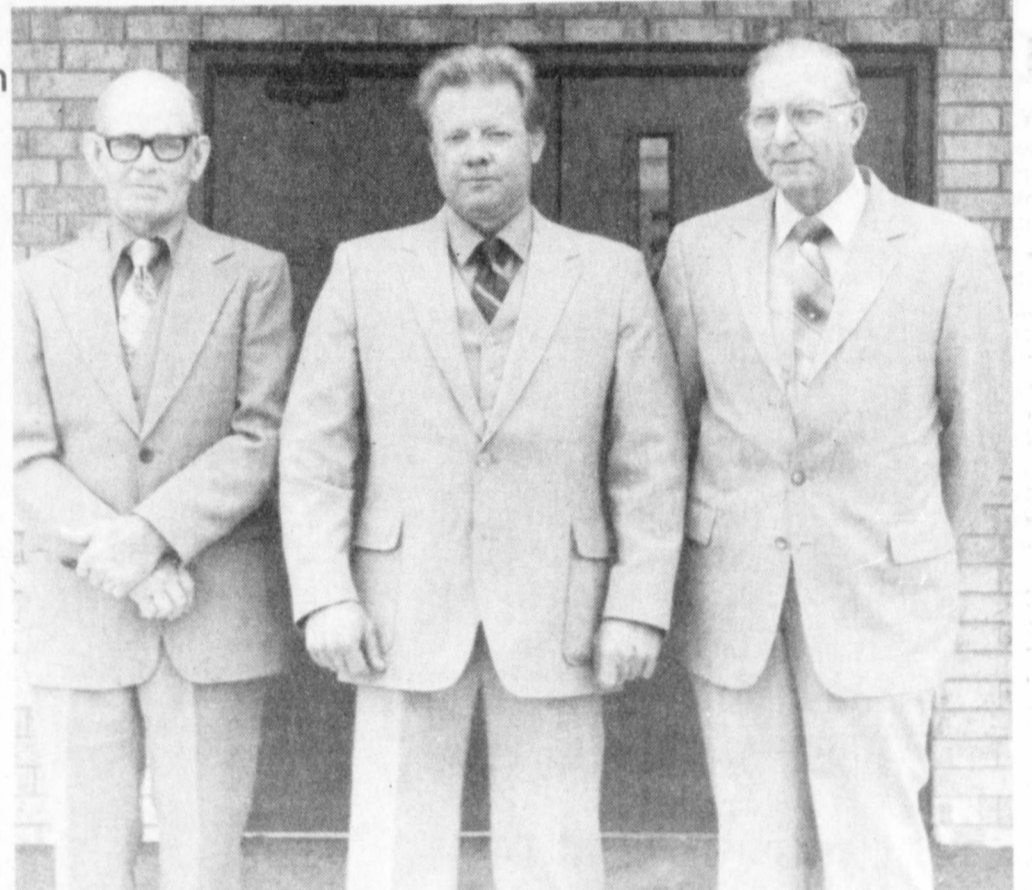
### Deport UMW Meets At Church

### Weekly Agricultural Briefs

By Herb Brevard

Catfish fingerlings should be in good supply for spring stocking of farm ponds. Commercial fingerling producers indicate they have an abundance of catfish fingerlings.

Stocking involves more than just putting the fish in the pond. Recent heavy rains have increased the water level in most ponds. It's a good idea to have a water sample from the pond checked, especially in areas where acid soils prevail.

Catfish need water with a pH range between 6.5 and 8.5 for best results.

Ponds less than one surface acre in size or ponds that stay muddy throughout the year should be stocked only with catfish fingerlings.

Larger ponds may be successfully stocked with additional species of proper management is practiced.

Stocking rates for catfish fingerlings vary from 100 to 1,000 per surface acre. The stocking rate depends primarily on the frequency

of feeding a supplemental ration.

Six-inch fingerlings stocked in the spring and fed regularly should gain one pound or more by the onset of cool weather.

County agents throughout the state have lists of sources for fish fingerlings. Interested persons should contact their local county Extension agent for further information.

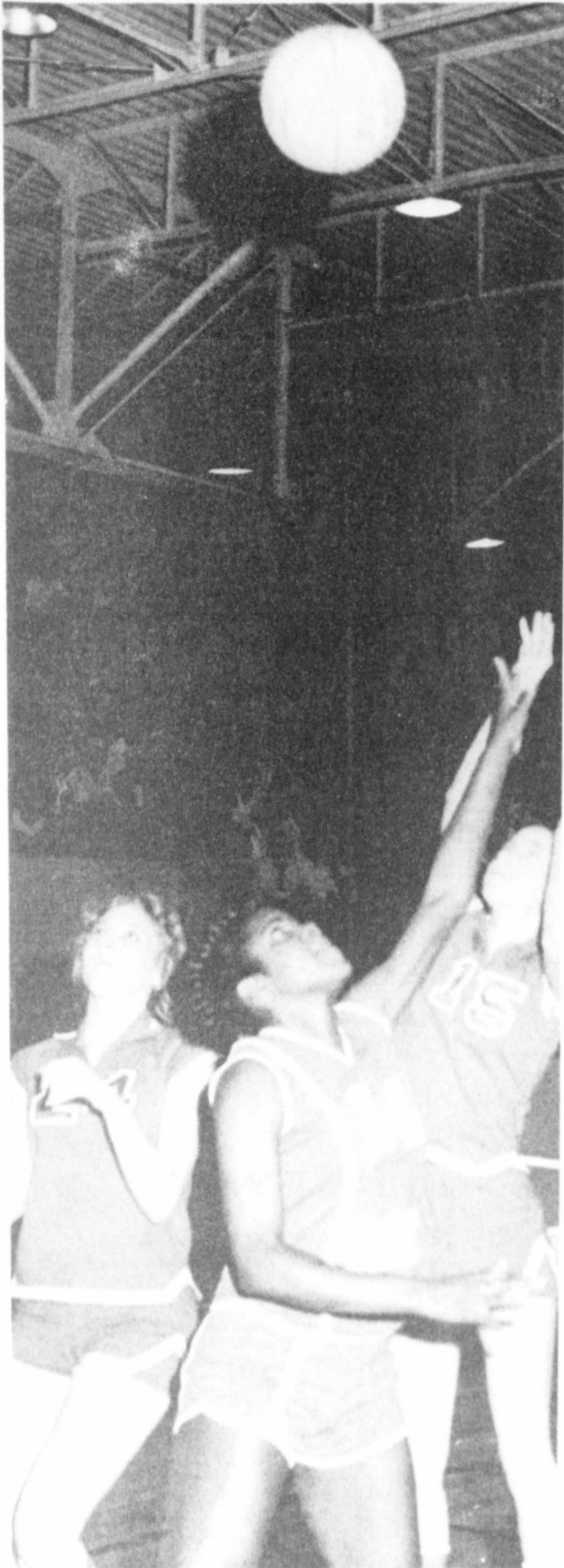

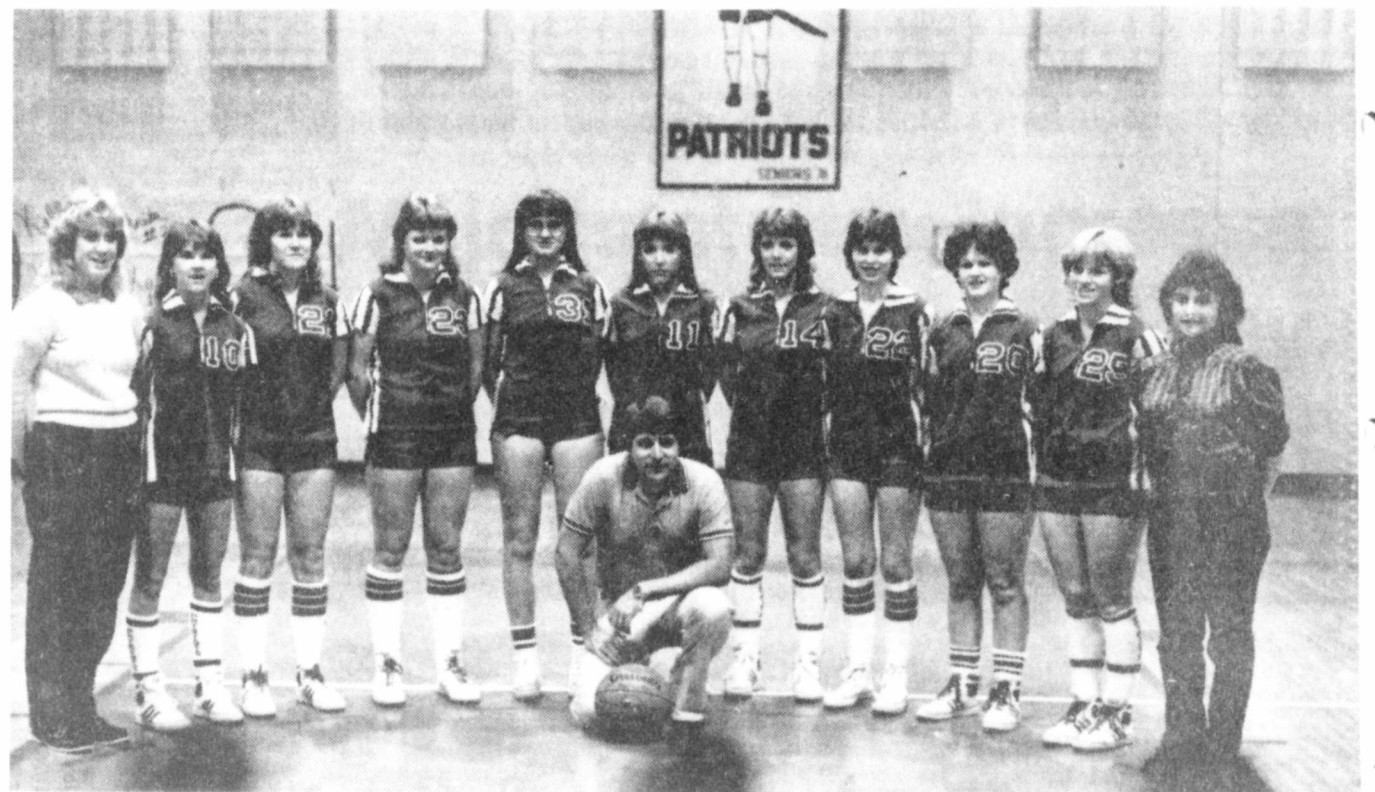
