Statistics compiled by the Department of Public Safety show 448 fewer persons lost their lives in Texas traffic accidents last year compared to 1982. The 10.5 percent decline in 1983 follows a reduction of 430

fatalities in 1982. "This is the first time in 25 years that Texas has experienced a reduction in fatalities for two years in a said Colonel Jim

Adams, DPS director. A total of 3,823 persons died as a result of motor vehicle crashes in Texas last year compared to 4,271 in 1982, and 4,701 in 1981.

The mileage death rate for 1983, three deaths per hundred million miles traveled, was the lowest in Texas history. The 1982 mileage death rate was 3.4.
