

Four Seeking Place Two In Prairiland Election

The Prairiland CISD Trustee election will be held Saturday, April 7 from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., with voting places set as Prairiland High School Administration Office; Cunningham Community Center; Blossom Elementary School and Deport Elementary School.

Six people have filed for three positions, but four of those on the ballot are running for Place 2, and the remaining two, with incumbents Johnny Dawson, Deport in Place 3 and James Norwood of Cunningham in Place 6.

The contested race has incumbent Harold Morrison, Elizabeth Irwin, Steve Dunagan and Frank Mowery running for the seat.

Morrison, who has served on the board since 1980, is married to the former Shirley Sessums and they have two children, P.G. and Jeff.

He is employed at Varco and is a life-long Blossom resident and a graduate of Blossom High School. He is active in Little League Baseball and other community activities.

They are members of the Blossom Church of Christ where he is a song leader.

Elizabeth Irwin is married to Jim Irwin and they have three daughters, Jamie, Amy and Cari. They make their home in the Red Oak community, and have lived there for 14 years.

She is an active Prairiland 4-H Club adult leader, coaches the 6 to 9 year old Daisies softball team, and the 10 to 13 year olds on the Honeybees softball team.

She has been a girl scout leader for five years, and now serves as Neighborhood Chairman for the Blossom and Detroit neighborhood.

Frank Mowery and his wife, Linda, have three children, Darren, Kevin and Katie. He attended Blossom High School and Paris Junior College.

His wife is the daughter of Reginald Crawford and has lived in Blossom all of her

life, except for two years while Mowery was in the army.

They are members of the First Baptist Church of Blossom. Mowery says he is concerned about the quality of education for his children, and is interested in achieving a balance between academics and athletics at Prairiland School.

John Steven Dunagan and his wife, Donna, have two children, Donna and Adam.

He, too, is a life-long resident of Blossom, and a graduate of Blossom High School. He attended Paris

Junior College and graduated from ETSU with a major in health and physical education.

Dunagan taught school for two years, and is currently employed at Campbell Soup Company in the Factory Accounting Department.



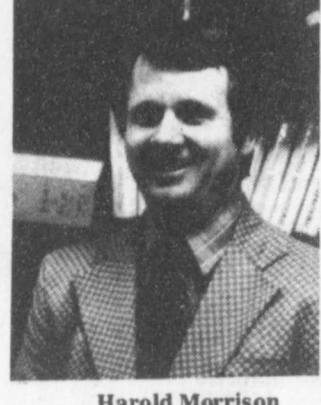

Patriots Rack No Hitters

The Prairiland Patriots evened their record at one win and one loss with a one to nothing victory at North Lamar Thursday. Both teams played fundamentally sound baseball and received good outings from their pitchers. Prairiland pitcher Scott Scudder rebounded off a sluggish performance against Clarksville to shut out North Lamar in a game in which he never yielded a base on balls.

Prairiland lead-off man, Heath Kennedy, started a rally in the first inning as he hit the first pitch to left field for a single. The North Lamar pitcher walked Scott Scudder and Joe Smith to load the bases. North Lamar's second baseman then made a heads-up play to force Kennedy out at home after he fielded a hard hit ball by Barry Johnston.

Prairiland resumed scoring in the second inning. After a leadoff single by Joe Smith, he was moved to third base on Todd Davis' ground-out. Smith came in to score on Johnston's double. After two innings, Prairiland lead 7 to 0.

Prairiland wasted no time scoring in the second inning. Robbie Connot started the rally as he singled and moved over to second on a wild pitch. After singles by Barker, Chris Sparks, Kennedy and Mike Connot's hit, Prairiland lead 10 to nothing.

That was all of the scoring for both teams as Todd Davis continued his no-hitter into the fifth inning. Davis was in full control of Winsboro's offense as he was only threatened to score upon in the fifth inning. With a runner on at second and one out, second baseman Joel Ballard caught a line drive and stepped on second to force the napping runner out at second. The runner was the only player for Winsboro who managed to get a hit off of Davis.

The game was the second time in as many days that Prairiland shut out its opposition.

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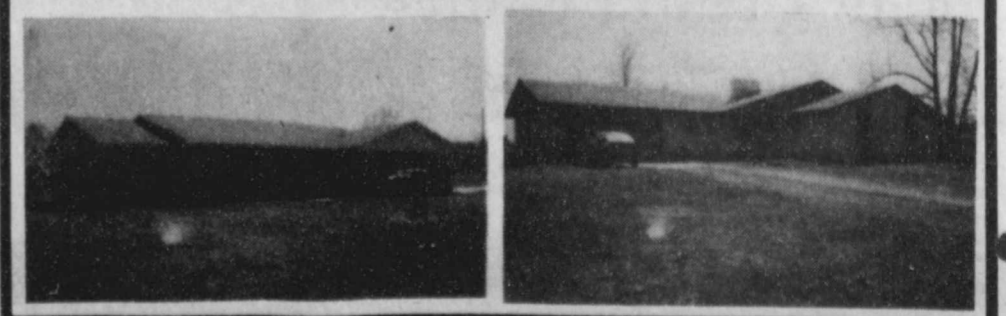

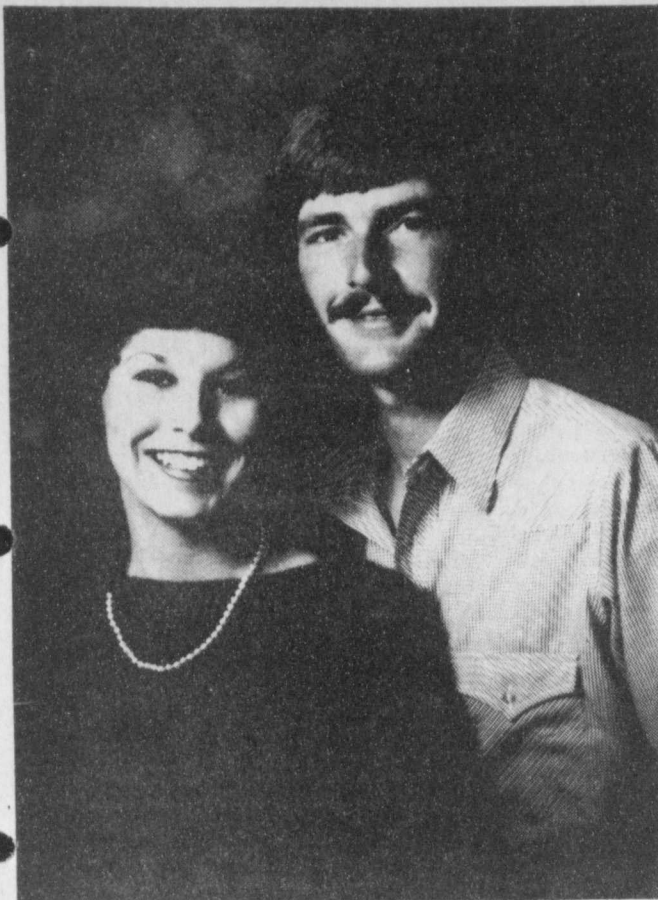

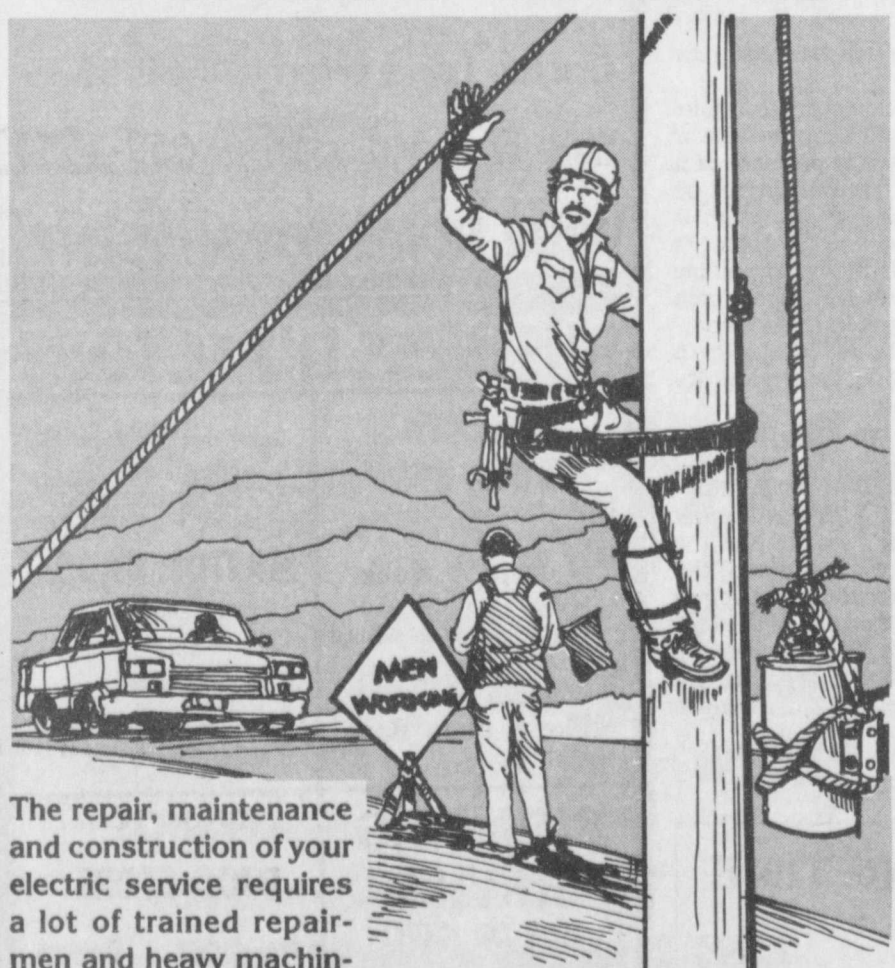
Program leader for this meeting, Mrs. Ida Lou Read, presented a review of the book "Because He Lives" by Gloria and Bill Gaither.

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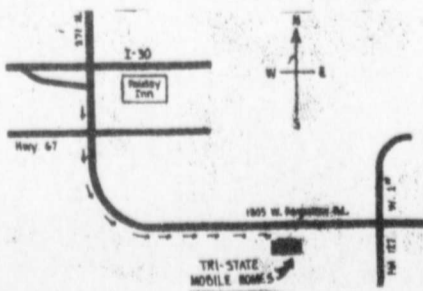
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BUDDY'S WORKSHOP

Telling Signs Warn Of Inadequate Wiring

What are some of the most obvious signs of inadequate home wiring?

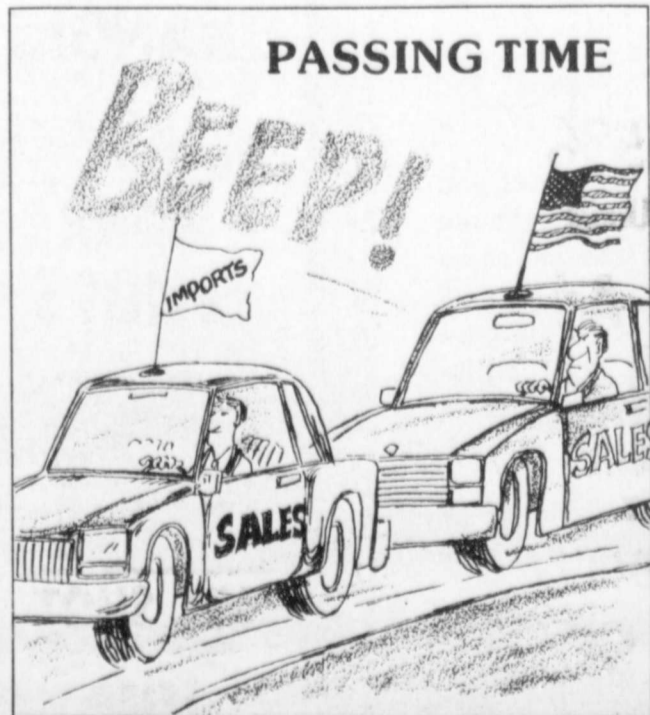
Blown fuses and tripped circuit breakers are a definite indication that something is wrong. If it happens once or twice, a short in an appliance could be the problem. If it happens frequently, the electrical system should be checked by a professional. Another obvious sign is dimming or flickering of lights when an appliance is turned on. There's also a problem if the radio volume fades when the dishwasher is operated. Appliances such as dishwashers, washing machines, and garbage disposers provide a good check. If they start slowly and seem to operate at less than full speed, the wiring system is probably inadequate and should be checked.

Is the problem necessarily a major one when the waste disposer leaks water during operation?

The problem could be nothing more than a faulty gasket. There are three on the disposer. One is at the sink outlet where the disposer is attached, a second is at the drain pipe connection and a third at the junction of the shredder house and the hopper. Where the first two are concerned, stopping the leak is often a matter of tightening the gasket screws. If the leak comes from the center of the unit, it will probably be necessary to separate the hopper and shredder housing and replace the shredder housing gasket.

Mrs. Towers Honored On Retirement

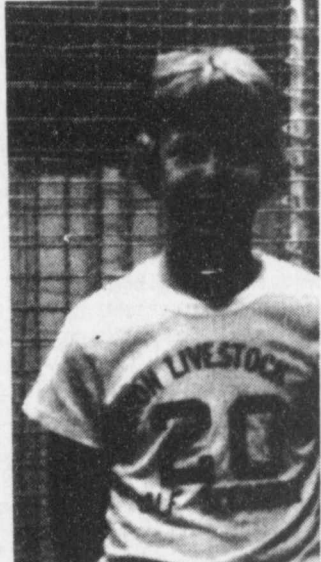
Employees of North American Philips Corp. honored Mrs. Edna Towers with a retirement party at the plant on Thursday, March 29.

 1 cup chopped pecans
 3/4 cup chopped pitted dates
 1 tsp. freshly grated orange peel
 1 tsp. baking powder
 1 tsp. baking soda
 1/4 tsp. salt
 3/4 cup sugar
 1/4 cup butter, softened
 1 egg
 1 can (8 1/2 oz.) Dole Crushed Pineapple in Syrup, undrained

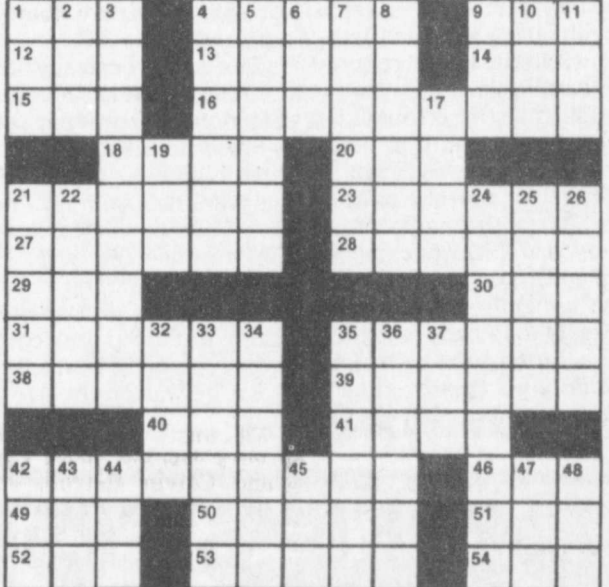

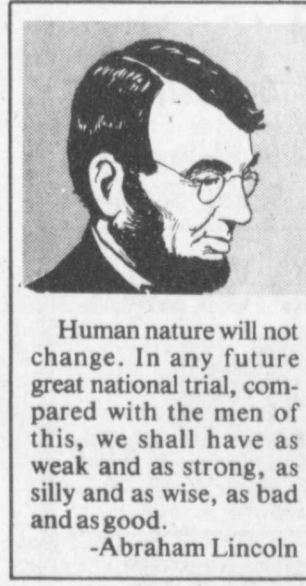

A FATHER-IN-LAW'S ADVICE

Background Scripture: Exodus 2: 15b through 3:1; 4:18; 18:1-27. Devotional Reading: John 1:43-51.

Moses had come a long way since the last time his father-in-law had seen him. Jethro could remember when Moses was nothing more than an Egyptian fugitive whom he took into his home. Moses had been a nobody and some might have questioned Jethro's wisdom in trusting a complete stranger. But it had turned out to be a good choice and, in time, Jethro had given his daughter Zipporah in marriage to Moses. After the passage of many years, Moses came to him and asked permission to take his family with him back to Egypt to join the Israelites there. Moses took with him, not only his family, flocks and possessions, but also a

different concept of God which Jethro had taught him. **Moses Sat to Judge** Now, however, things were different. Moses had become a renowned leader. The Egyptians quaked at the sound of his name and the tribes of Israel looked to Moses as God's prophet and their spiritual father. The God to whom Jethro had introduced his son-in-law had done marvelous works with and for Moses. What could have been more impressive to the priest of Midian than to see his son-in-law sitting from morning to evening to adjudicate the problems of his people.

But Jethro was not as impressed as we might have expected him to be. In fact, Moses was making a big mistake and he didn't hesitate to say so: "What you are doing is not good!" That could very easily have been the end of the relationship right there. What son-in-law is not likely to bristle when his father-in-law tells him what he's doing is "not good"? After all, Moses was God's right-hand man. He had risen to the "top" in his profession as God's spokesman. Who did this back-country priest think he was, telling Moses he was on the wrong track?

Someone has said that "Behind every great man there stands a surprised mother-in-law." Perhaps it was that same feeling that had led Jethro to be critical of Moses' work. He could remember when Moses knew nothing at all about the Lord and Jethro was the one who had introduced them.

Not Able Alone But it is obvious that Jethro didn't come to criticize his son-in-law, but to help him. He was deeply concerned about Moses and his ability to continue this back-breaking schedule. One must admire him for his generosity and concern.

And we must also admire Moses who, despite his great acclaim and stature as God's prophet, did not feel he was too important to learn from someone else—even a father-in-law. And the advice he gave Moses is still wise today: "the thing is too heavy for you; you are not able to perform it alone." Nothing has "burned-out" more valuable people than the assumption that they were meant to carry the world on their shoulders all alone.

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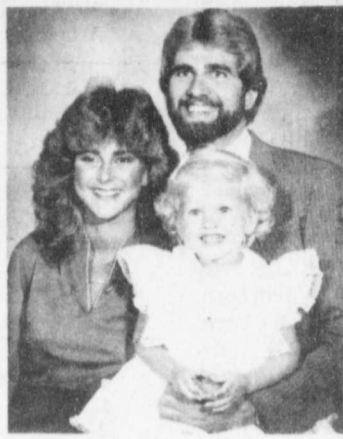

so you can spend time doing those things that are really important to you. The fee for the workshop is \$50.

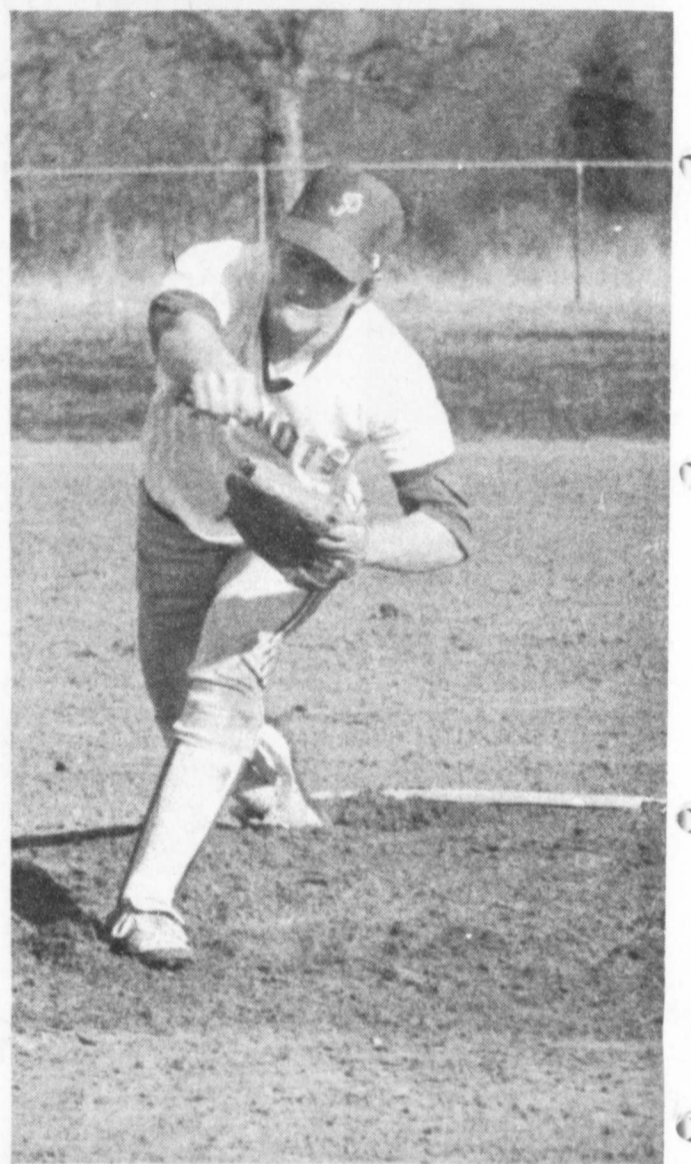

Tuna Spaghetti

- 1 pkg. (7 oz.) thin spaghetti
- 2 cloves garlic, finely chopped
- 1/4 cup margarine or butter
- 1/4 cup half-and-half
- 1 tsp. dried basil leaves
