A popular annual for use in flowerbeds and borders, the French marigold is a low, bushy plant with dark green leaves and red or yellow flowers, although some cultivated varieties may offer flowers of gold or mottled coloring and can be either dwarf or

high growing. French marigolds are fairly easy to grow because they will do well in average garden soil, and do not require frequent watering. Seeds are started under glass in spring so that young plants will be ready for outdoor planting in early summer. Flowers will appear in mid-summer and continue through early autumn if spent flowers are removed to promote new growth.
