



½ cup sugar ½ cup honey 1 egg

21/2 cups Bisquick baking mix 1/2 cup chopped peanuts

Mix peanut butter, shortening, sugar, honey and egg. Stir in baking mix and peanuts. Cover and refrigerate 1 hour. Divide dough into halves; shape each half into roll, 11/2 inches in diameter. Wrap and refrigerate at least 8 hours.
