

Parker-Peterson In Runoff For Sheriff

In Lamar County elections last Saturday, perhaps the most interesting and important race, that for sheriff, ended without really ending. Jim Parker and incumbent Roger Peterson will face off in a run-off in June.

James W. (Jim) Parker captured 4,198 votes, with Sheriff Roger Peterson following with 2,135. Dean Jones placed third, and Jack Malone fourth in the race. In the much coveted position of tax-accessor,

collector Theda Cotton and W.W. (Bill) Hutchison will be in a run-off. Cotton had 3,599 and Hutchison 1,931. L.Z. Wilkerson had 1,329, Joe E. Bunch 1,384 and Austin Dowdy 659. Tom Wells, incumbent

Lamar County Attorney defeated challenger David Holmes with an astounding 5,904 to 2,781. Chester Oakes, who has served as Justice of the Peace in Precinct 5, Place 1 since 1971 defeated Blossom

Chief of Police Ron Davidson and former deputy constable James Dorris. Oakes received 3,197 votes, Davidson 1,654 and Dorris 579. Jimmie Sparks had no problems defeating his

opponent, James Anderson, as Precinct 1 Commissioner, Sparks getting 1,661 votes, Anderson 524. Incumbent Gene Buster defeated Fred Blassingame and Johnie Ritchison in his bid to remain the Precinct 3

Commissioner. Incumbent A.D. (Al) Parks garnered 558 votes for Precinct 1 Constable, and Kenneth Thomas received 272. Unopposed State Representative L.P. (Pete)

Patterson received 7,560 votes for his position. Judician District Judges Henry Braswell and Jim Noble Thompson were also unopposed in their bids for re-election.

Patriots Clinch District Title Davis Ends District With Perfect Record

In Tuesday's game, Prairiland defeated Winsboro 9 to 3 to clinch the district title. Todd Davis upped his record to a perfect 9 and 0 record as he withstood early inning shakiness to win a 9 to 3 decision.

Barry Johnston was a force in the game as he hit his ninth home run and threw out a base runner.

Thursday afternoon the Prairiland Patriots defeated rival North Lamar 5 to 0 in Paris to continue their winning ways.

After a quiet first inning, the Patriots bats began to boom as they moved to a 3 to 0 lead in the second inning.

Senior first baseman, Todd Davis, started the rally with a walk and moved to second on a single by Barry Johnston. Davis

scored on Chris Sparks' solid single to left field. Two outs later, Barry Johnston and Sparks came in to score on an ill-fated pickoff throw which wound up in the outfield. They ended the scoring for the inning as Prairiland led 3 to 0.

Prairiland resumed scoring in the fourth inning to widen the lead. Barry Johnston reached second on a deep fly ball to right field and scored on John David Lloyd's double over the left fielder's head. That gave Prairiland a four to nothing lead going into the bottom of the fourth inning.

Prairiland added an insurance run in the fifth inning. With one out, Scott Scudder singled and scored on Joe Smith's triple. That run gave Prairiland a five to nothing lead which would be the eventual score.

The bottom of the seventh inning was particularly exciting as Prairiland realized that they had shut out North Lamar in the previous two games. Prairiland made it three consecutive shut-outs over

the Panthers as sophomore fireballer, Scott Scudder, put down the Panthers in order.

Monday afternoon in a make-up game with Winsboro at Prairiland, Prairiland upped its record

to 12 and 1 in district play with a 15 to 0 victory.

Heath Kennedy scored the only run the Patriots would need as he hit the first pitch of the game over the left field fence for his fourth home run of the season.

Scott Scudder pitched his second consecutive shutout for the victory in a game that was never in question although it was played with a low tempo by the Patriots.

Deport Methodists Having "Brush Arbor"

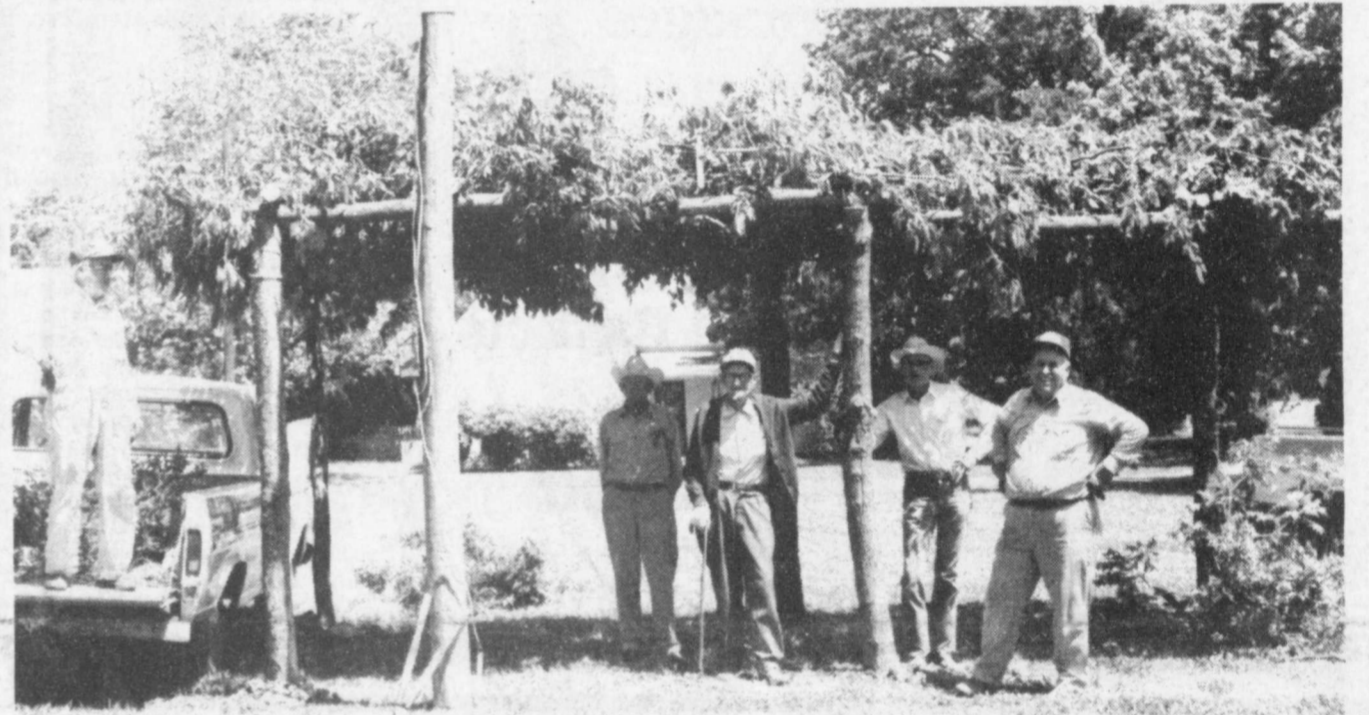

Local Sales Tax Figures Released

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$98.5 million in local sales tax payments to the 988 cities that levy the one-percent city sales tax.

"These payments are running 12.5 percent ahead of last year," Bullock said.

Houston received the largest check for \$17.9 million, for a 1984 total of \$63.7 million, up five percent from last year.

Talco received \$1,639.13,

for a 12.21 percent decrease over last year's payment of \$4,308.27.

Bogata received \$3,569.82, compared to last year's \$3,655.85, for an 11.52 percent decrease.

Blossom received a check for \$1,246.44, compared to last year's payment of \$2,964.51, for a 2.64 percent decrease and Deport received \$1,365.85, a 24.97 percent increase in payments to date for 1984 of \$4,314.88.

The bride is a 1979 graduate of Prairiland High School and is presently attending Paris Junior College and is employed at Regan's in Parks.

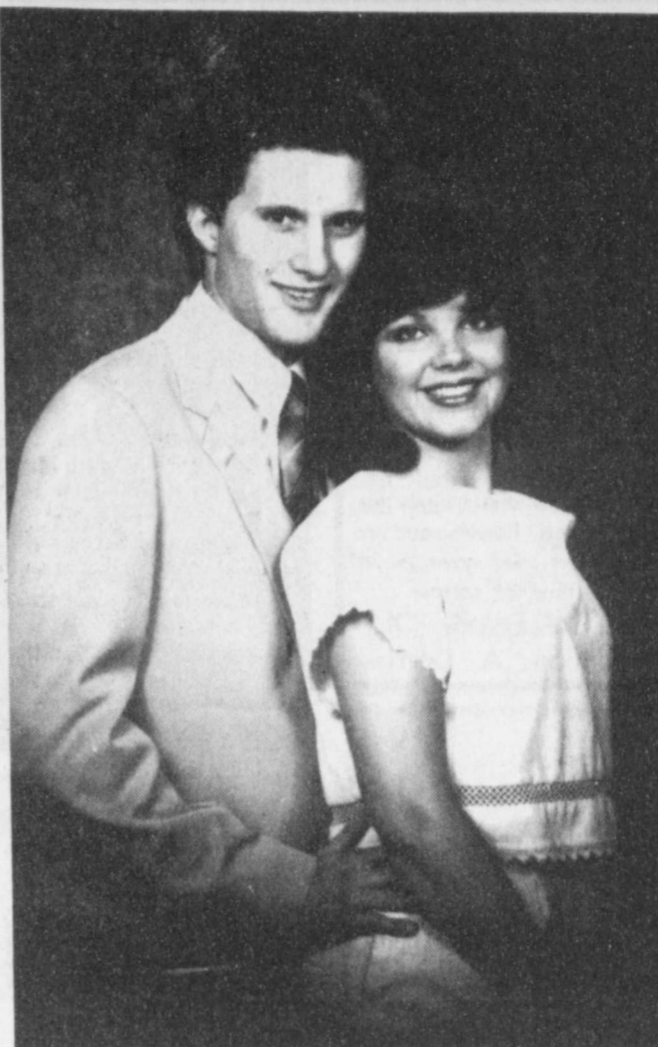
