As most folks know, my husband and I have bought about 19 acres just about a mile out of Deport, and plan on building a house on the back side of it.


The place, located on a hill, lacks only one more pool to be surrounded by a moat...one has to drive across a bridge to reach the house site.

AHA...we have plans. And early within the next few mornings we are going to set up a cage, catch said geese, and PEN them up on our property. Such is the penalty for insurrection!




