Patriots Close Season With Bi-District Loss

The Prairiland Patriots season came to an end Monday night in Mt. Pleasant as they lost the bi-district championship to Hooks, 4 to 2.

After three consecutive Patriot strikeouts in the top of the first inning, the Hooks bats came alive in the bottom of the inning. Following Scott Scudder's strikeout of the first batter, he then walked the next hitter and then gave up back to back doubles as the scoring ended with Hooks scoring two runs. After one inning of play it was Hooks 2, and Prairiland 0.

Barry Johnston displayed some of his power in the second inning as he hit a pitch with one out over the center field fence to cut the lead to 2 to 1. That ended Patriot scoring for the inning.

Scudder was again ineffective in the second inning as he gave the leadoff hitter in the second inning a home run pitch which was promptly hit right beside Johnston's. After walking the next batter, he managed to get two consecutive outs. The next hitter was more fortunate as he hit a double and drove in another run. That run would be the last run Hooks would score. After two innings, Hooks led

4 to 1. Scudder and the Hooks pitcher pitched the next four innings with great success as both allowed no runs. Scott used his overpowering fastball and dipping curve while the Hooks pitcher threw hittable off speed pitches. Prairiland rallied in the

last inning as their last ditch effort nearly produced enough baserunners for a victory. Joe Smith led off the inning with a single and moved over to third as a throw sailed over the fence. Todd Davis nearly tied the score as he drove a pitch nearly over the fence but was unfortunately just

another long out. Joe Smith then cut the lead to four to two as he scored on Barry Johnston's single. John David Loyd managed to strike out and beat the catchers throw to first with two outs as there were two runners on base and Vern Barker at the plate. Barker hit one of the

hardest hit balls of the game which many felt would be a home run. The ball finally was caught by the right fielder with his back against the fence to give Hooks a four to two victory. The Patriots will lose some valuable seniors this year.

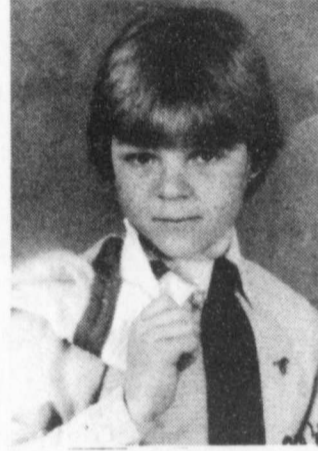

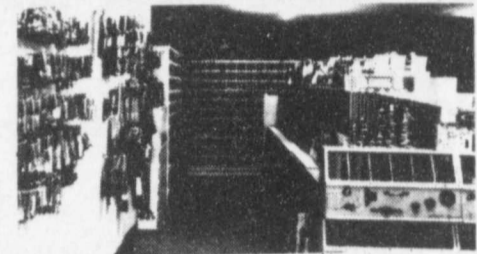

The Blossom Garden Club met at Sizzlin' Steak House on Thursday, May 17 for dinner and installation of officers.

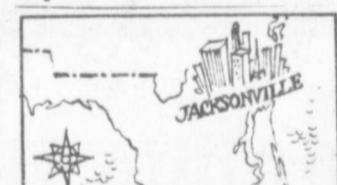


