

# Sheriff-Tax A-C To Be Decided In Run-Off

Lamar County voters will go to the polls Saturday, June 2, to decide two county-wide races of importance. Probably the most talked about race is for that of Lamar County Sheriff, which is between Jim

Parker and incumbent Roger Peterson. The two beat out Dean Jones and Jack Malone in the May 5 primary, with Parker reaping the largest number of votes by far. The second race is between Theda Cotton, the office's chief deputy for twelve years, and W.W. (Bill) Hutchinson for county tax-assessor-collector. Mrs. Cotton led in vote-getting in the race, Hutchinson second, L.Z. (Pete)

Wilkerson third and Austin Dowdy and J. Elma Bunch. Also on the ballot will be three state races. The most campaigned for of those is the fight between State Senator Lloyd Doggett and U.S. Representative

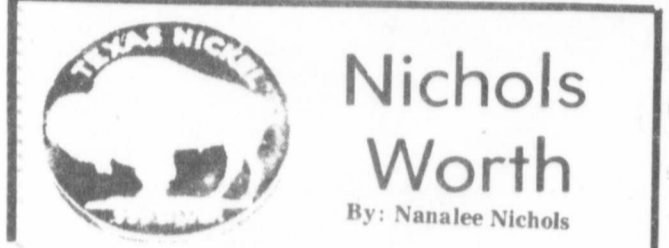
Kent Hance. They defeated U.S. Representative Bob Kruger in the primary, and have waged a heated campaign against one another for the undisputed nomination of U.S. Senate. ## Ten-Digit Dialing To Take Effect June 3

Beginning June 3, all 214 area code residents and business customers must dial 214 before making any long distance calls within the 214 area code. Rapid growth throughout North Texas is the reason for the change in dialing procedures. Forecasts for customer growth indicate that phone numbers in this area will be exhausted by the end of 1984. As growth occurs, the availability of combinations decreases. By implementing ten-digit dialing, the telephone company can create new combinations using numbers previously reserved for area codes.

These dialing changes do not affect local or long distance rates. Calls that are local or long-distance now will remain local or long distance after the

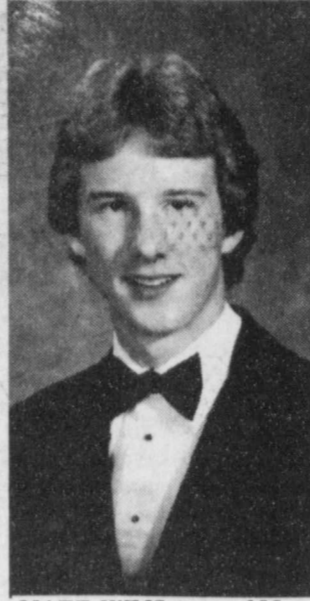

## Registration For Youth Mini-Course At PJC

Registration is still open for youth mini-courses scheduled June 4-22 at PJC. The courses for those five years of age through high school are planned in the daytime and evening during the three week period.  
Music, art, Spanish, reading aloud and wildlife are planned for those of kindergarten age through the second grade while computer, Spanish, art, literature, music drama, tennis, wildlife and math magic have been arranged for students in grades three through five. Students in grades six through nine may take computer, drama, Spanish, math magic, wildlife and tennis.  
Courses offered for high school age students are electronics, drafting, beginning and intermediate tennis, computer I, II and III, drawing and painting. Some of the courses meet for one week, and others meet once or twice weekly for the three week period.

Fees range from \$15 to \$25 and instructors are from area schools in the community. Registration must be made by paying the fee in the Alford Center on the PJC campus.

## Weekly Ag Update

May 31 is the date established to spray pecan trees for control of the Casebearer. This date may vary some with variety of pecan and location within the county.  
Insecticides that are suggested are Sevin, Malathion or Guthion. We would suggest that individuals add some NZN or cinz sulfate to the spray mixture. Either chemicals is compatible with these insecticides.  
Many pecan trees have those knots or galls on the new growth again this spring. These are correctly called dPhylloxera. Individuals finding a heavy infestation for those conspicuous swellings should not become alarmed. Neither should they go out and spray their trees, because the damage has already occurred.  
Many of these galls are splitting open presently and jillions of the tiny insects can be found on the leaves. They will do no further damage unless there is new growth. If there is, the insect will secrete a substance that causes another gall to form and deposit eggs inside.  
The 1984 wheat crop is beginning to turn which means that harvest is about two to three weeks away. All signs point to a possible record crop as about the only two things standing in the way is a hail or extreme wet harvest conditions.  
Leaf rust is showing up more on area wheat, but it is too late for this year's crop. Rust was found on several of the varieties in teh demonstration of last week.  
Interested individuals are invited to stop by and inspect the varieties as they are individually identified. It is located midway between Evergreen Cemetery and Paris High School.

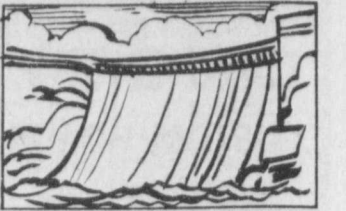

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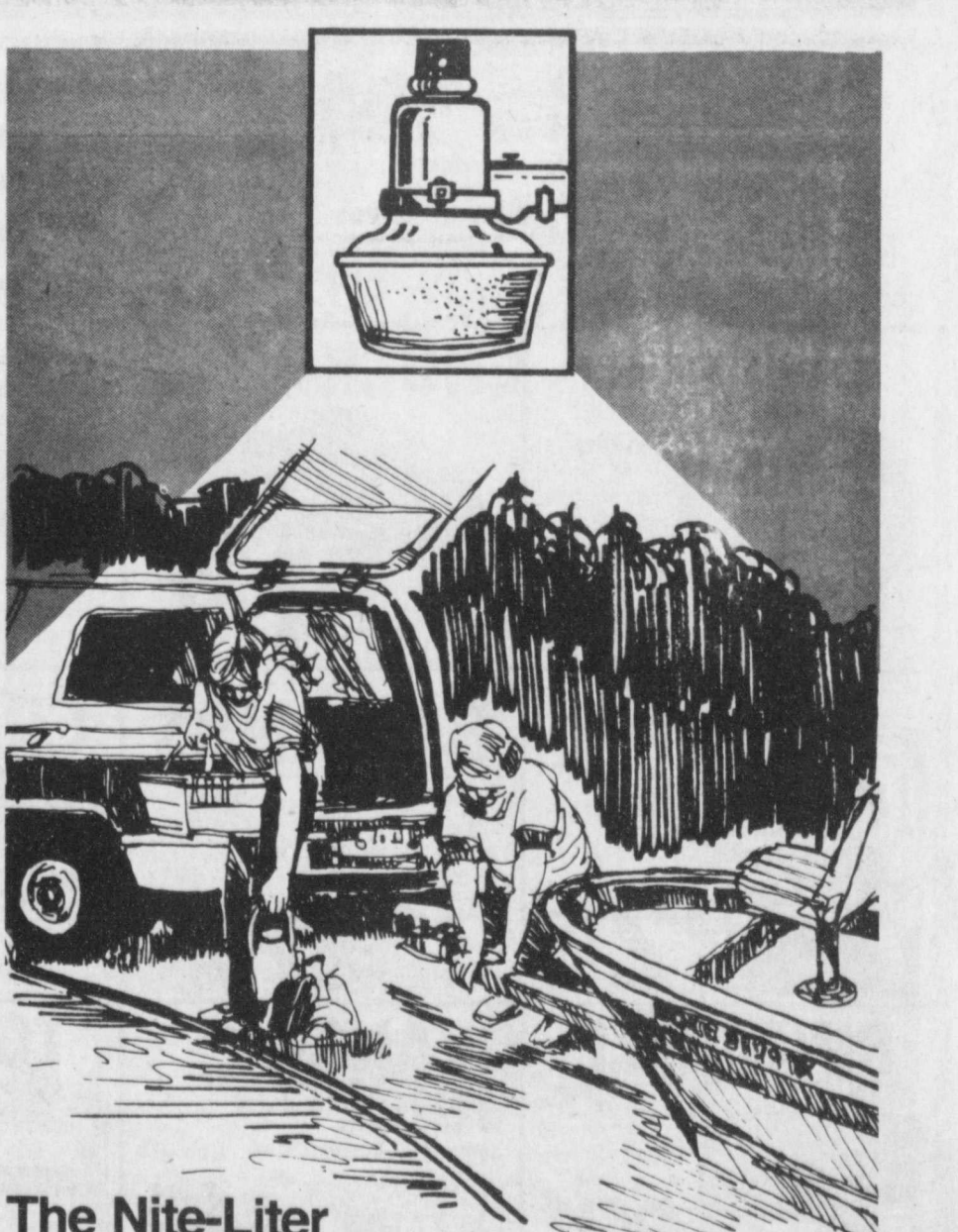

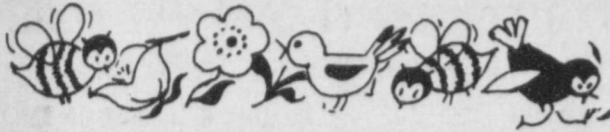

**4-H Scholarships Available**

Present and former 4-H members can qualify for national scholarships totaling more than \$20,000 if they meet requirements set by the Cooperative Extension Service.

Most of the grants of \$1,000 each are for young people planning careers in agriculture or related fields, such as forestry, veterinary medicine, dairy goats or animal science, says Brenda Hunt, county 4-H program coordinator with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Another scholarship for \$3,000 is provided for a youth planning a career in the fashion industry. Three other scholarships have no limit placed on choice of study.

All these scholarships are provided by private sector donors and arranged by the National 4-H Council a not for profit organization supporting the 4-H program with private resources.

The recipient will enroll during 1985, in a 10 month program. Selection will be based on the applicant's expressed interest in a fashion career, leadership abilities, 4-H experiences, scholastic record and financial need.

Six \$1,000 scholarships, provided by DeKalb AgResearch, Inc., DeKalb, Ill., are available to current 4-H members interested in agricultural careers. In addition, the recipients will attend the 63rd National 4-H Congress, Nov. 25-29, in Chicago as guests of DeKalb.

A \$1,000 scholarship, donated by the Education Foundation for Alpha Gamma Rho, Des Plaines, Ill., goes to a current 4-H member who will be enrolled as a college freshman this fall. The recipient must be planning a major in agriculture, forestry, veterinary medicine or a closely related field.

Wayne Feed Division, Continental Grain Company, Chicago, donates two \$1,000 scholarships to present or former 4-H members who will enroll as college juniors this fall with a major in animal science.

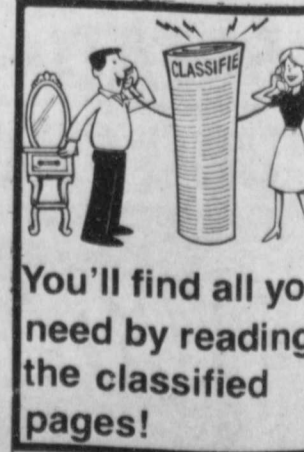

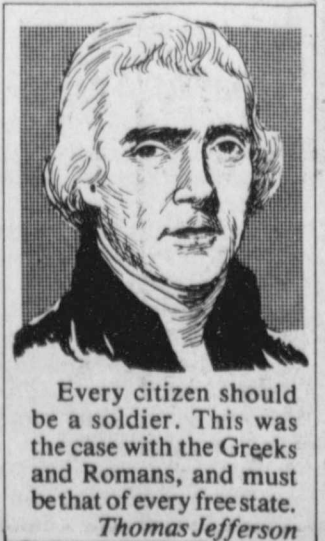

### Congressman Hall To Represent House At Ceremonies

The Speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives, Thomas P. O'Neill, Jr., appointed First District Congressman Sam B. Hall, Jr. to a delegation of house members who attended services honoring the unknown American soldier of the Vietnam War era.

Considered one of the most solemn ceremonies in American military history and tradition, the occasion of burying a United States soldier whose remains were never positively identified has only taken place three times. Those included the unknown soldiers of World War I, World War II and the Korean War.

Congressman Hall, who is a senior member of the House Veterans Affairs Committee, joined 25 of his house colleagues in receiving the remains of the unknown soldier from the Vietnam War as the casket arrived in the Rotunda of the United States Capitol Building on Friday, May 25.

The casket was placed on the same historic catafalque that bore the remains of the other unknown soldiers, as well as such noted Americans as Abraham Lincoln, John F. Kennedy, Dwight Eisenhower, John J. Pershing and Douglas McArthur.

This commemorative

ceremony was initiated in 1865 with the body of the assassinated Abraham Lincoln.

"One of the greatest honors I have ever recieved was to be appointed to represent my colleagues at the ceremonies honoring the unknown from the Vietnam War," Hall said.

"Seeing something like this makes you realize how much has been sacrificed for our freedom and I hope we never forget it or stop thanking God for it," Congressman Hall said.
