bound on Highway 37.

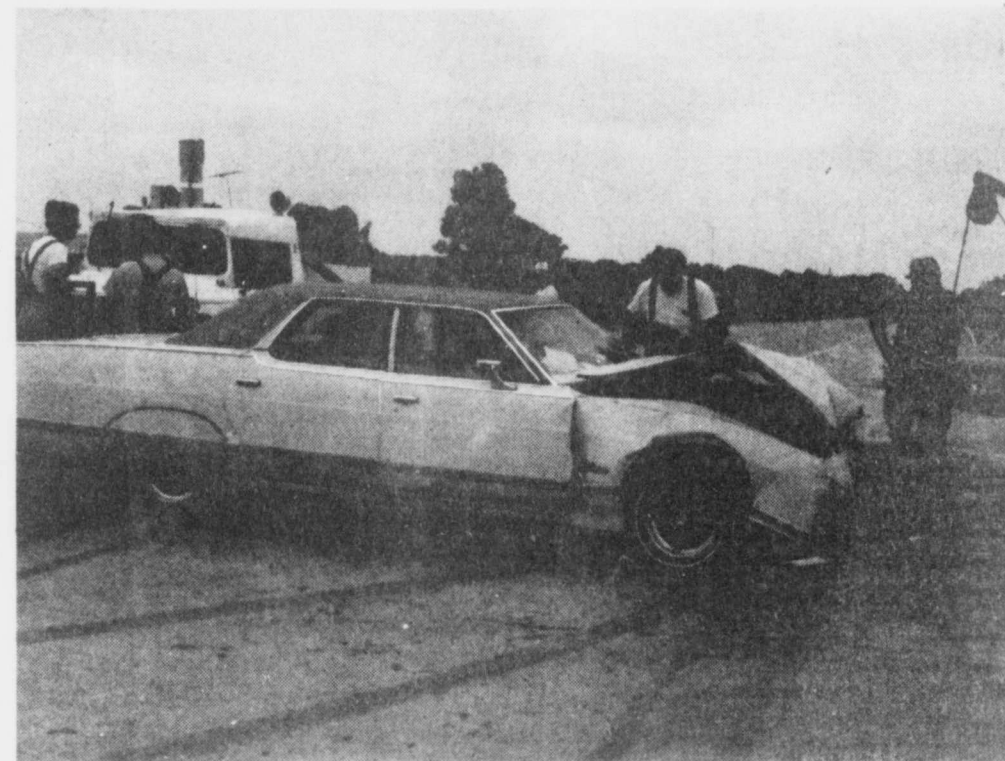
Six people were taken to Franklin County Hospital: Robert Giddens, age 61, was treated and released with multiple scrapes; John Pope, age 37, treated and released for facial injuries; passengers in the Pope vehicle, Debra Pope, age 32, examined and released for neck injuries, Claudia Whitney of Deport, treated and released; Ronya Currin, age 9 of Clarksville, treated for minor abrasions and Courtney Currin, age 6, treated for a broken wrist.

Taken to Titus County Memorial Hospital was

Bobbie Giddens of Talco, who is reported in stable but serious condition following surgery for a collapsed right lung, multiple broken ribs on the right side, a broken collarbone and severe cuts to the face.

At last report she was still in the ICU unit.

Three ambulances, the Talco ambulance, the Titus County Ambulance and Franklin County Ambulance, plus the Talco VFD, North Franklin VFD and Titus County Rescue Unit responded to the scene of the accident. The jaws of life were not required, however,

Local Sales Tax Figures Released

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday sent checks totaling \$72 million in local sales tax payments to the 988 local tax cities and four transit authorities, including the first check for collections for the new Fort Worth transit tax.

Bullock said the city checks totaled \$52 million of the \$72 million.

"So far this year, we've sent these cities a little over \$400 million, which is more than 13 percent better than what they had gotten by this time last year," Bullock said.

Blossom received a check for \$1,021.59, compared to

last year's payment for the same period of \$535.67, for a 5.67 percent increase. Deport's 1984 total to date is \$4,314.88, comparable to last year's payment of \$3,452.74 for a 24.97 percent increase. Paris received \$119,708.63, for a 10.41 percent increase from 1983.

In Red River County, Bogata received \$1,136.87, totaling \$11,297.86 to date for a 0.36 percent increase from 1983. Clarksville received \$10,218.62 for a 3.98 percent increase over last year.

In Titus County, Talco received a check for \$2,290.46, totaling \$12,515.99 to date for 1984, for a 7.45

percent increase over 1983. Mt. Pleasant received \$63,275.38 for a 18.81 percent increase from last year.

June payments reflect taxes on sales made in April and reported to the Comptroller by May 20.

All in all, the television hasn't been missed yet. And, perhaps, it won't be before we have a chance to get it going.

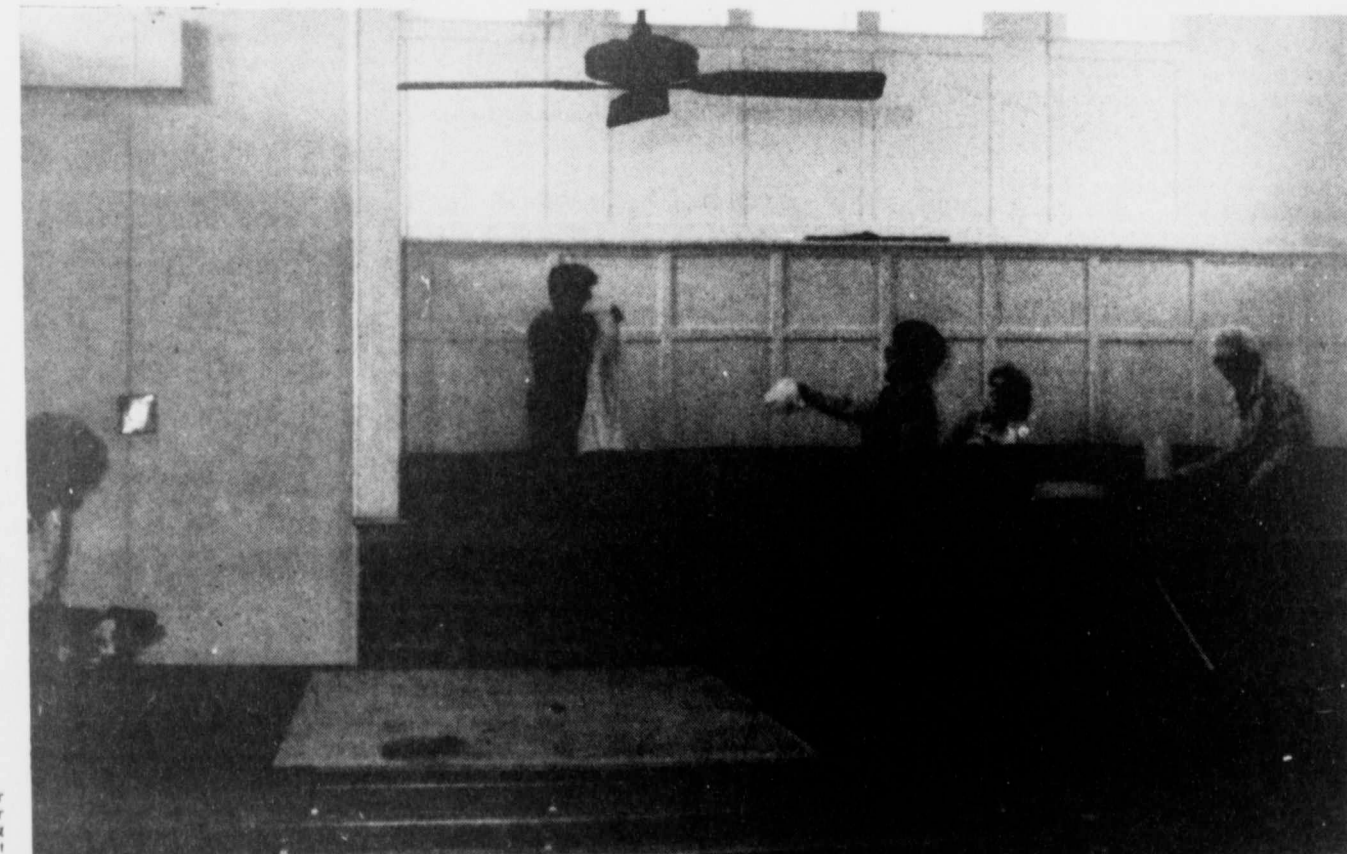

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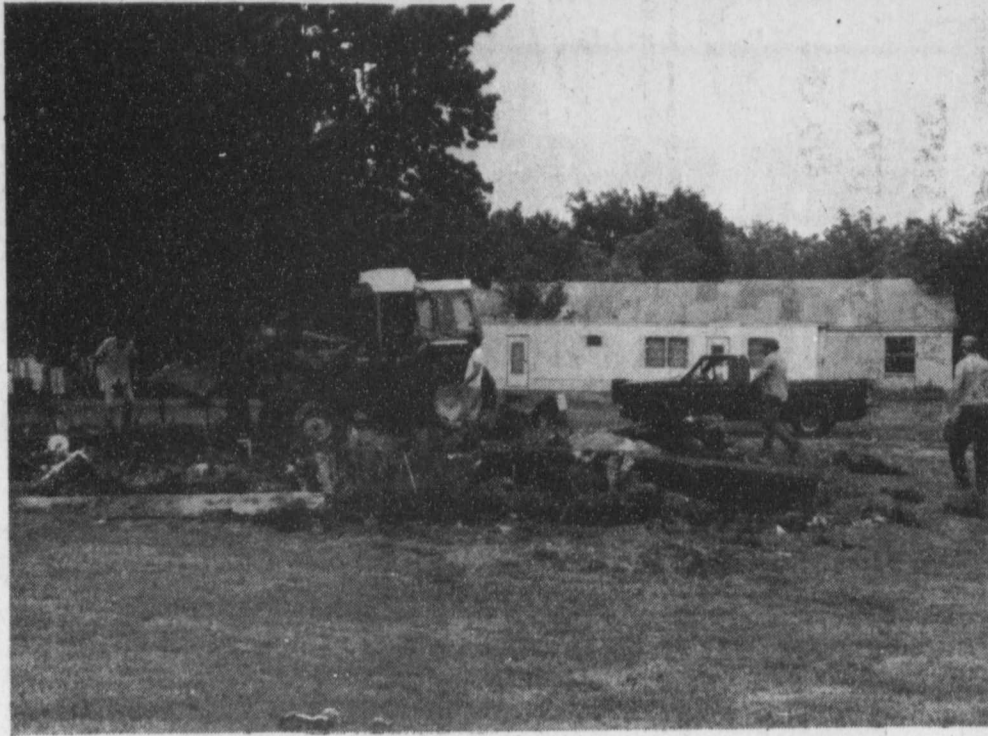

Weekly Agricultural Update

By Herb Brevard
Many East Texas cattlemen are facing forage deficiencies due to drought, says Dr. Randall Grooms. In many areas, rainfall is far below average for March, April and May, the months we normally have an abundance of rainfall.

These traumatic times give cattlemen an opportunity to evaluate and update their managerial practices. Many producers are beginning to wean calves to reduce stocking rates, hoping to have sufficient forage to maintain the dry cows until adequate rainfall is received. If culling must be done

now, remove poor producers, late calvers and other marginal animals from the herd. With the shortage of lush forage, cows that calved late in the season and are currently being rebred are likely to be more seriously affected by poorer rebreeding performance. Grooms points out that this culling affords the opportunity of selecting those cows to remain in the herd that will calve during a short calving season.

Some producers want to resort to creep feeding, but Grooms says this is a very questionable practice in view of feed prices and anticipated cattle prices.
