

Lamar County Sees Farm Yield Increase

Texas farms gained in numbers and decreased in size between 1978 and 1982, according to the Commerce Department's Census Bureau.

Preliminary reports just released for the 1982 Census of Agriculture show 186,026 farms, compared with 175,395 in 1978. Land in farms totaled 130.8 million acres, an average per farm

of 707 acres, compared with 773 in 1978. Total sales of agricultural products amounted to \$8.9 billion in 1982.

The average value of land and buildings per farm was \$388,198, with a per acre value of \$549.

Land from which crops were harvested was reported to be 20.8 million acres, and acres irrigated

fell from 6.9 million to 5.6 million in 1982.

The Bureau defines a farm as any place from which \$1,000 or more of agricultural products were, or normally would have been, sold in the census year.

The preliminary data indicate expenditures for livestock and poultry feed were \$1.5 billion; total costs

for farm energy, \$730 million; for fertilizer, \$368.1 million; and for hired labor, \$477.9 million.

The total cattle and calves inventory of 12.5 million head on 143,473 farms was down from 12.7 million. The 10.5 million sold were down from 12.1 million four years earlier.

The sale of crops amounted to \$3 billion. By

harvested acreage, among the leading crops were wheat, with 123 million bushels from 5.1 million acres; sorghum, with 256 million bushels from 4.8 million acres; and cotton, with 2.7 million bales from 4.5 million acres. Other crops included corn, 1.1 million acres; soybeans, 718,668 acres; and rice, 520,227 acres.

Of the total farms in the state, 13,787 had gross sales of \$100,000 or more while 121,183 reported sales of less than \$10,000.

The average age of farm operators was 52.9 years; 22,035 were under 35 and 88,677 were 55 or older.

Land from which crops were harvested increased to 125,945 acres since 1978.

The county's farmers sold \$26.6 million in agricultural products. The figure represents an average of \$18,564 for each farm.

Reports are that \$9.2 million or 35 percent of total sales were for crops, while \$17.4 million or 65 percent of the total came from the sale of livestock, poultry and other products.

Women operated 12,427 farms or seven percent of the state total.

Preliminary reports show that the number of farms in the county increased from 1,393 to 1,432 since the 1978 census. All land in farms totaled 388,214 acres, an average of 271 acres per farm.

Weekly Agricultural Update

To most producers, recent rains were very beneficial. However, some bad things often come with the good. The rainfall, plus high humidity and cloudy weather has created an environment conducive to the development of brown rot on peaches. This is

especially true for varieties nearing ripening.

Growers should keep a close watch on the peaches for any signs of brown rot or other diseases. Even those producers who have been following a strict spray schedule should be aware of the situation and follow through on spray applications, possibly at shorter intervals.

Philly says that preharvest sprays should begin two to three weeks before anticipated harvest. Some fungicides can be applied the day before harvest while others have a waiting period of several days. Check the labels to determine the proper application rates, procedure and waiting period.

Vegetable diseases will also be increasing on most crops that are susceptible to foliar diseases. Septoria leaf spot on tomatoes, alternaria on cantaloupe and numerous fruit rots may become

prevalent if cloudy, humid conditions continue.

Keep a close watch for signs of diseases on vegetables. Broad spectrum fungicides should be used since they can control

several diseases. Product labels should be checked to be certain the fungicide is cleared for particular vegetables. Also, observe the waiting period before harvest.

Agricultural Briefs

The season is approaching for tick and flea infestations. Some reports have already been received of infestations in yards and on pets.

Since ticks are vectors of some important human diseases, persons would be wise to control any infestations. One of the most common tick borne diseases is Rocky Mountain spotted fever. Hikers, campers, etc. should protect themselves from tick bites by applying insect repellent to shoes and trouser legs. Layering clothing will also help.

Robinson says to put pants legs inside boots and keep shirt tails tucked in.

Ticks can be controlled in yards by treating with dursban or diazinon. Pets should also be treated with a recommended pesticide which can be purchased from local outlets or veterinarians.

Fleas are a nuisance and can also spread diseases. Control measures used for ticks will also control fleas. More than one application of some insecticides may be necessary.

Inside the home, it is essential to eliminate or treat areas where eggs are laid and fleas are found. Cracks and crevices should be thoroughly tested with an approved insecticide. Carpets should be vacuumed regularly and the dust bag disposed of properly and quickly.

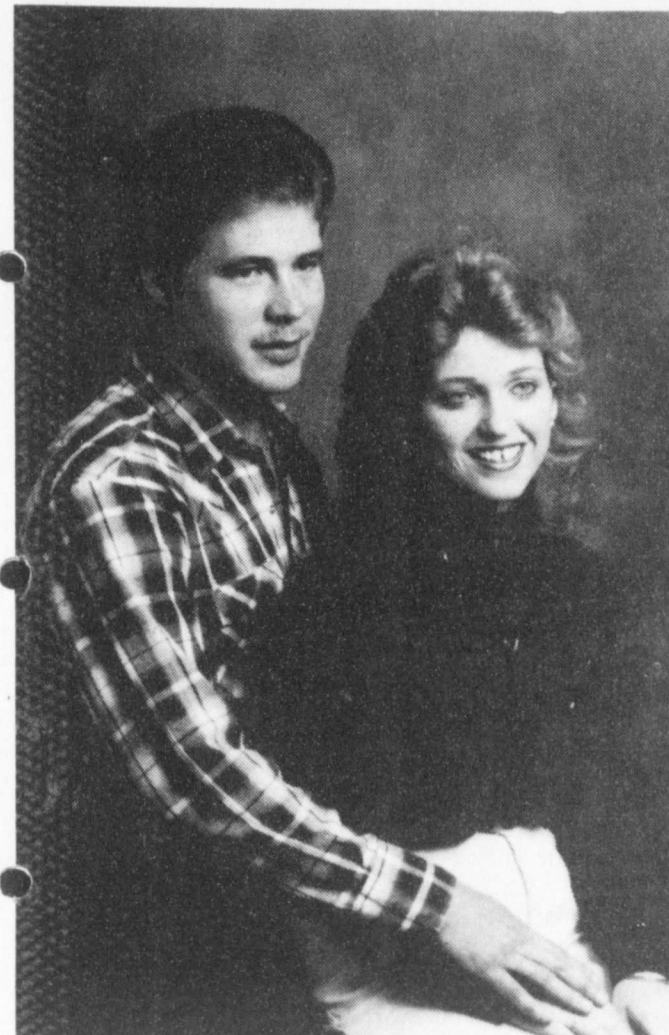

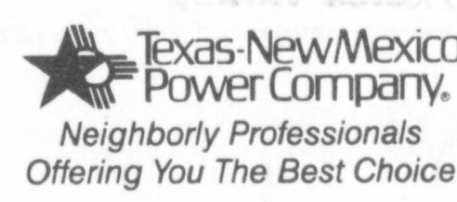

The benediction was Psalms 90: 16-17 repeated in unison.

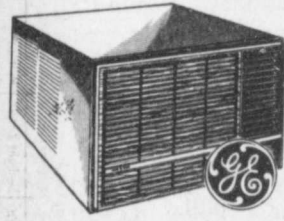

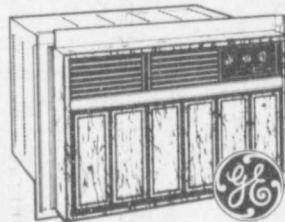
