Bogata Rodeo, Frontier Days Action Begins

Championship rodeo comes to Bogata, Texas beginning June 28 (tonight) at the Bogata Rodeo Association Arena. Performances begin at 8:00 p.m. nightly.

The rodeo is approved and sanctioned by the Cowboys Regional Rodeo Association, headquartered in Tulsa, Oklahoma and advance entries indicated that over 100 of the nation's top competitors will be in Bogata for the annual Frontier Days and Rodeo.

Special features at the rodeo are the queen contests, a Rodeo Queen Contest and a Rodeo Princess Contest. This year there are six contestants in the Rodeo Queen Contest. They are: Cheryl Justice, daughter of Marvin and Connie Justice of Paris; Jennifer Spencer, daughter of Mrs. Janet Spencer of Paris; Francis Allen, daughter of L.P. and Claudie Allen of Negley; Shabecka Thurman, daughter of Ken and Martha Thurman of Paris; Christy

Bankhead, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Bankhead of Cunningham and Sandy Brooks, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Doyle Brooks of Johtown.

The public is cordially invited to attend the horsemanship portion of the queen contest at the rodeo arena on Saturday morning at 8 a.m.

In the princess contest, there are four young ladies who will be selling advance tickets to the Bogata rodeo as the deciding factor for the

Rodeo Princess title. This year's candidates are Donna Stockton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Don Stockton; Patches Raines, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Paul English; Cami Eilers, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Eilers; and Susan Tabb, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Tabb.

On Thursday night at the rodeo, a drawing will be held for a \$100.00 savings bond, along with two drawings on Thursday and Friday nights for \$10.00 worth of gas.

Friday night, rodeo goers will be treated with a special performance by the Texas Sunshine Girls from Canton, a quadrille on horseback made up of young ladies who travel across the United States to perform at special events.

Thursday night will also feature a professional Clown Bullfighting Contest.

Frontier Day activities will begin with a pancake breakfast sponsored by the Bogata Lions Club at 7:30 a.m. Saturday morning in

downtown Bogata, followed by day long activities for the public.

The rodeo activities will be kicked off on Thursday afternoon at 5 p.m. with the big downtown rodeo parade. Special guest at the parade will be Lynda Chambers of Collinsville, Oklahoma, the 1984 Miss C.R.R.A. She will also be at the rodeo on Thursday and Friday nights during the performances.

Admission to the Bogata rodeo is \$3.50 for adults and \$2.50 for children under 12

years of age.

On Thursday night, children under 12 who are accompanied by a parent or guardian will be admitted free of charge.

The Bogata Lions Club will again sponsor Frontier Days on Saturday, June 30. The day will begin with a free pancake and sausage breakfast at 6:30 a.m. until 8 a.m.

Following breakfast, there will be music by the Patonville 4-H band. At 9 a.m., the egg throwing contest and

a watermelon eating contest.

Following these contests, more music will be provided by Gayle Roach, followed by a tobacco spitting contest. At 10:30 there will be a turtle auction followed by the 15th annual turtle race.

Representative Sam B. Hall, Jr., a senior member of the House Veterans Affairs Committee, paid tribute to the GI Bill of Rights recently on the 40th anniversary of its enactment by Congress.

In a statement included in the Congressional Record, Congressman Hall said that the "GI Bill is a monument to every man and woman who has put on the uniform and made the commitment to defend America."

that the signing of the GI Bill by President Roosevelt took place just 16 days after American fighting men hit the beaches at Normandy to begin the last great drive against aggression in Europe. Many of the men at Normandy never returned home to take advantage of the GI Bill, but their friends and comrades-in-arms who survived the struggle did benefit immensely from this historic legislation," Congressman Hall said.

Just recently Mr. Hall was

named by the House Veterans Committee to attend memorial services at Normandy to honor those Americans, including many from East Texas, who participated in the D-Day Invasion.

"When we look back over the past 40 years and study the history of this legislation, it is almost impossible to truly grasp the importance of the GI bill and what it has done for this country."

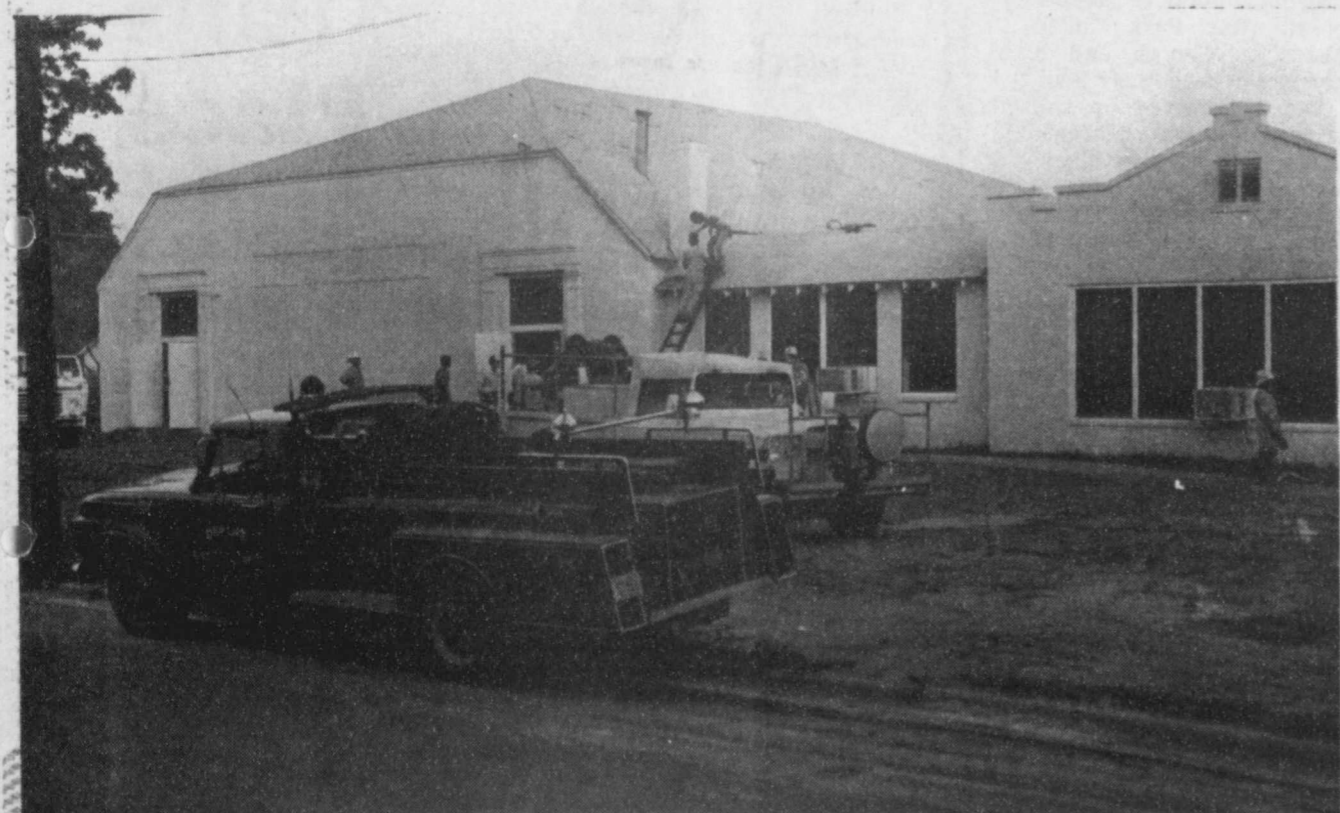

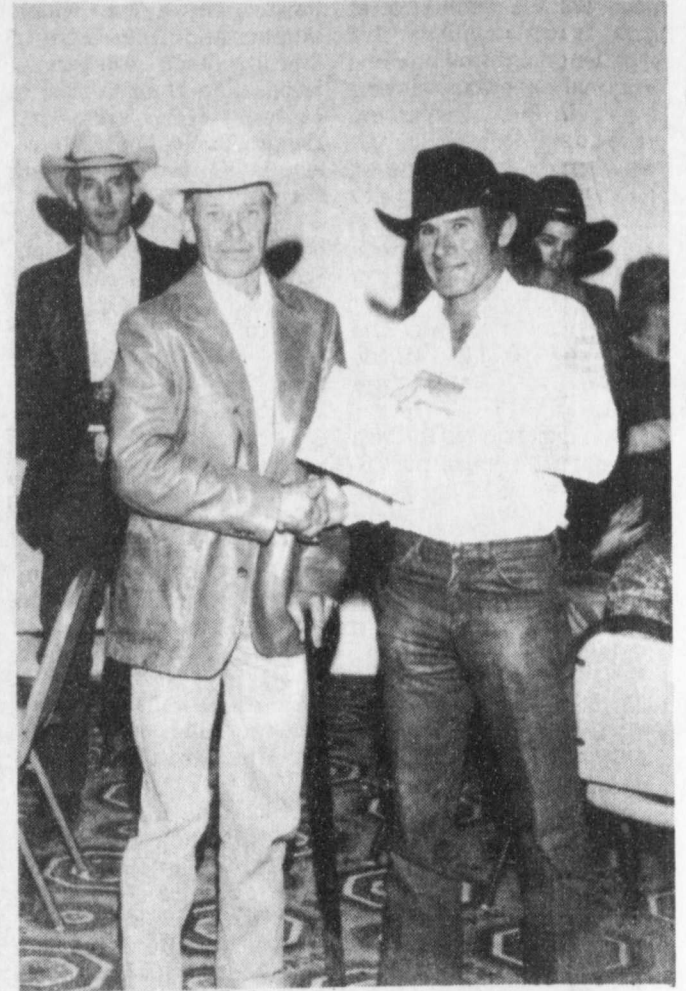
K-Bob, the famous

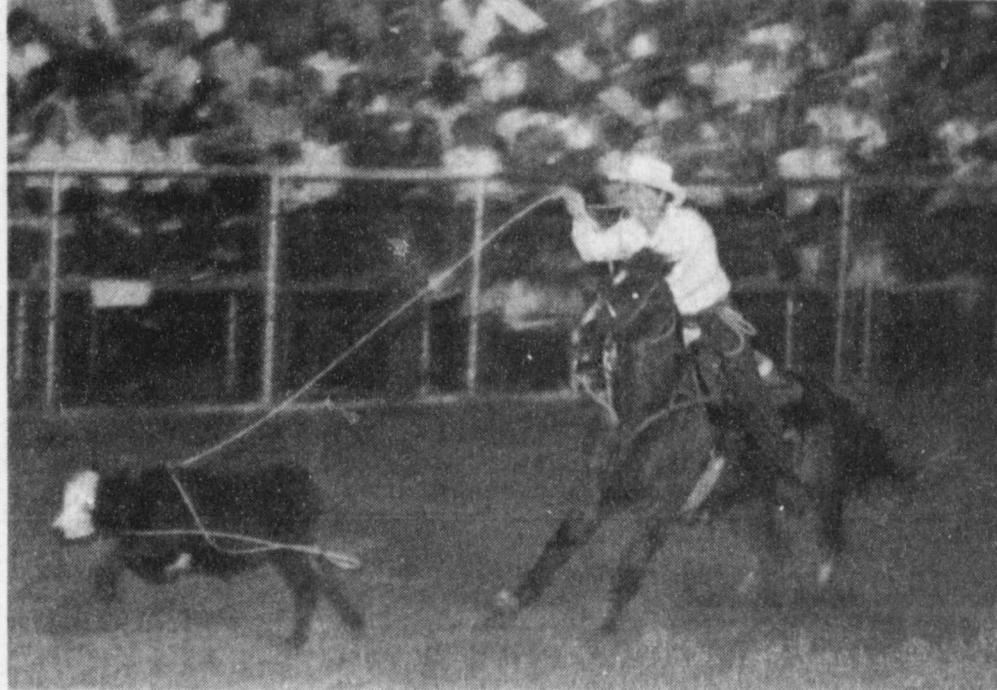

Bogata Rodeo Association Upholds Tradition

The Bogata Rodeo Association was established at the 1948 meeting in Rosalie and after a cattle show in 1949, the first association's first rodeo was held on August 17, 18 and 19, 1950 at Bogata. Stock for the initial rodeo was provided by Ramsay's Ranch of DeKalb.

There were approximately 15 charter members of the Bogata association, with the

four surviving members being Hale, Gibson, Jessie Gray and Steve Biggerstaff.

There are currently 70 members of the Bogata Rodeo Association. The group holds monthly meetings throughout the year and will begin plans for the 1984 performances immediately after this year's rodeo is concluded.

Although reports give no estimate on the crowd at the

1980 rodeo, it was stated that the "grandstands were full and overflowing".

Those 1950 performances were held at 8:30 p.m. and were lighted by 14 large electric lamps of 1500 watt capacity.

The 1984 Bogata, Texas rodeo is again approved and sanctioned by the Cowboys Regional Rodeo Association, the largest regional professional rodeo

association in the United States, serving contestants and rodeos in seven states: Oklahoma, Kansas, Texas, Arkansas, Missouri, Nebraska and Louisiana.

In the last seven years, The Cowboy Regional Rodeo Association has proven to be one of the most innovative rodeo associations in America. It has pioneered the first successful regional central entering system for contestants, which is in its third year of operation, as well as sanctioned jackpot rodeos and free rodeo clinics for rodeo newcomers.

In addition to innovation, the Cowboys Regional Rodeo Association is known for its service to the rodeo industry. The association works year round to serve all areas of rodeo, including the contestants, rodeo committees, producers, sponsors and rodeo fans.

The association was formed in 1976 to serve the needs of cowboys and cowgirls in this region. Before the energy crisis of the mid 1970's, cowboys normally traveled

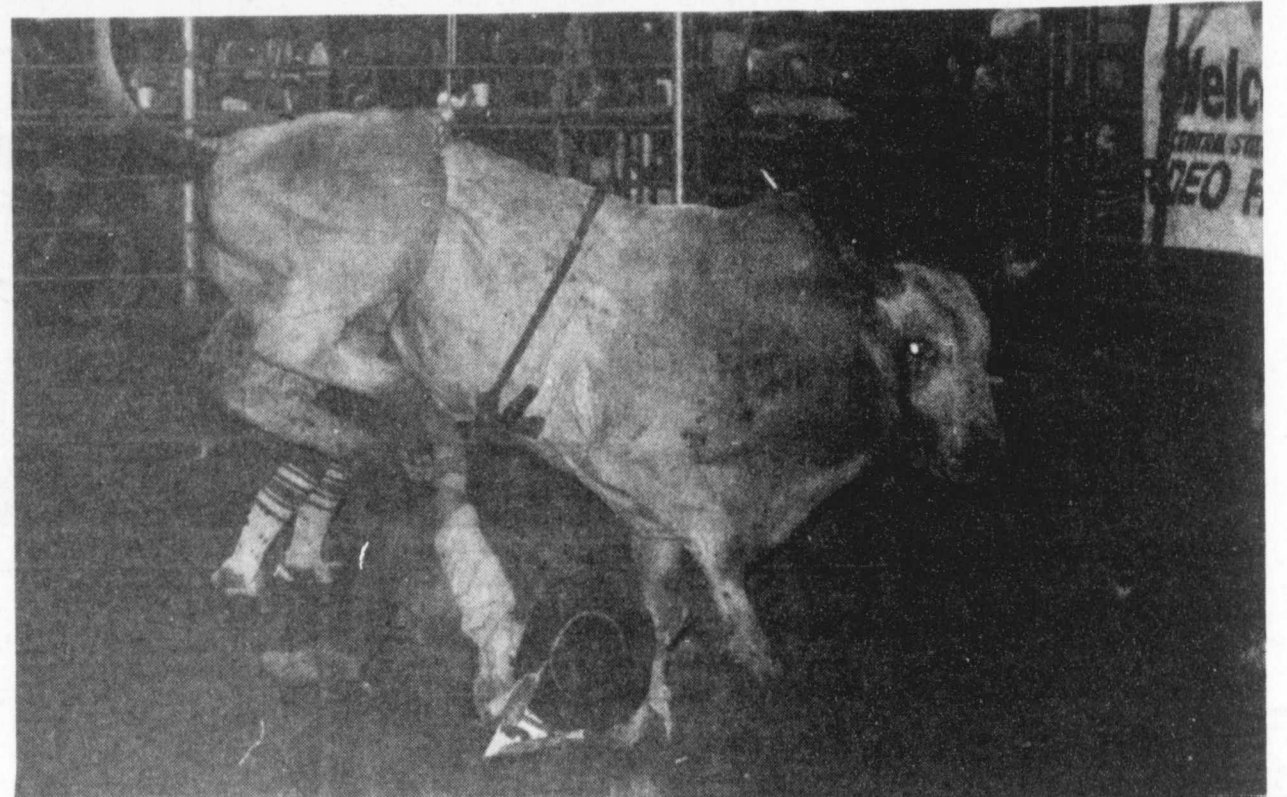

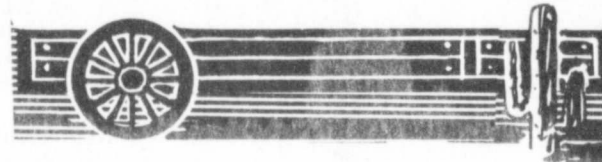

Next year the conference will be in Corpus Christi, June 16-20.

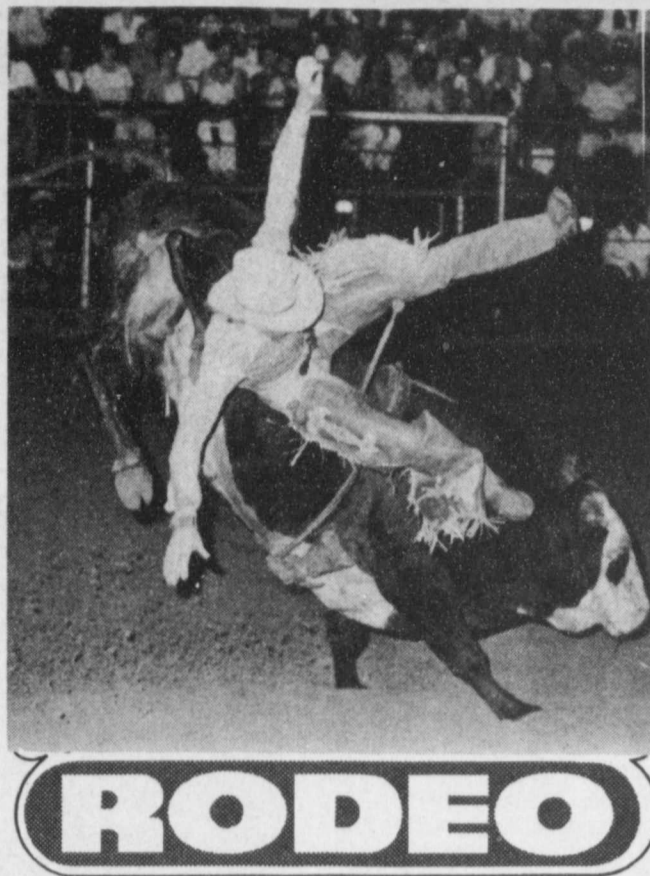
PJC To Offer Tennis

Second Quarter Tax Due

Some wage earners and other individuals who have income other than wages may be required to make estimated tax payments, the Internal Revenue Service says.

Generally, if you have income, with no tax withheld, of more than \$500 and you expect to owe at least \$400 on this year's return, you are liable for filing a declaration of estimated tax and for making payments.

Just like withholding by employers, the IRS says, estimated taxes are paid in advance of the actual tax return, Form 1040, due for the year. Estimated taxes are normally paid in four installments.

For 1984, four estimated tax installments dates are: April 16, June 15, September 17 and January 16, 1985.

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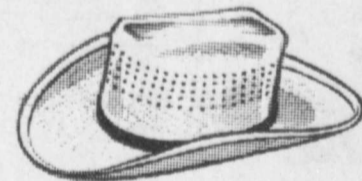

Ghost Riders in the Sky

Crash tests reveal that handicapped persons riding in wheelchairs inside vans face serious injury because of inadequate restraints even in collisions at less than 30 mph. The tests showed that typical wheelchair restraints offer no protection. In 25 mph collisions instrumented dummies were hurled through windshields, launched into the dashboard and somersaulted backwards in a back-breaking movement.

Local Girl At Bluebonnet Girls State

Girls State was organized as a National Americanism activity in 1937 by the American Legion Auxiliary. Non-political, the purposes of the Girls State program are to provide citizenship training for girls of high school age to afford them an opportunity to live together as self-governing groups and to inform them of the duties, privileges, rights and responsibilities which they will assume when they become adults. They learn the problems of government by simulating the duties of city, county and state officials. Each year citizens are selected at local levels from students who have just completed their junior year in high school. The selection is based principally on character, leadership and scholarship.

The 1984 session of the American Legion Auxiliary Bluebonnet Girls State has grown from an experimental conference of 94 girls held at Baylor University in 1941 to

become the largest single extracurricular educational program for high school girls in Texas. This year 575 girls are in attendance, making a total of more than 17,000 girls in Texas who have participated in the top level citizenship program.

Former citizens of Girls State and members of the Texas American Legion Auxiliary comprise the seventy members of the staff and counselors who volunteer their services to direct and lead this program. The Director, Frances Goff of Houston is a former assistant to the President of the University of Texas M.D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute at Houston.

One of the highlights of the session which began June 12 and ends June 22, will be the selection of two outstanding citizens of 1984 who will be sent to Girls Nation in Washington, D.C. by the American Legion Auxiliary. There the two young representatives will continue their study in responsibilities of the Republic.

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

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Computer Courses Slated At PJC

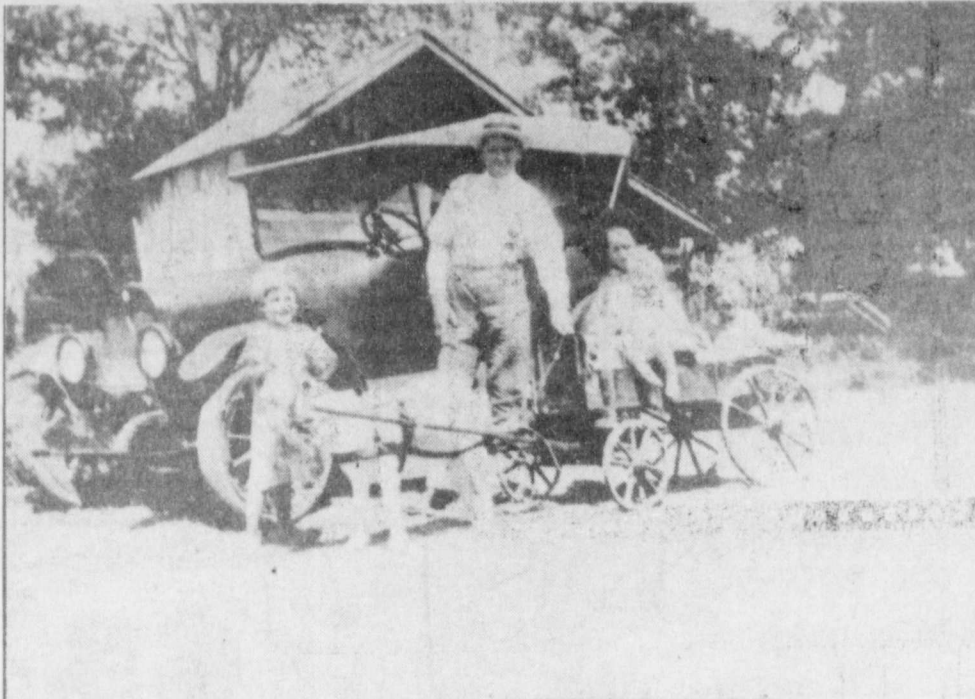

The nine hour courses are for those students who have completed Computer I in basic. It will utilize the disk operating system and builds on the concepts of graphics and structured programming in Basic begun in Computer I. Both are limited to 20 students. A new course for grades 3-5 to be offered during this week is LOGO. It utilizes a procedure language approach to the microcomputer through turtle graphics. No previous computer experience is necessary to take it. The class will be held from 1 to 3:15 p.m. and is limited to 15 students.

The fee for each of the courses is \$25 and must be paid in advance by registering in the Alford Center on the PJC Campus.
