In 1776 there must have been many who believed that the revolution was futile, or wrong, and would mark the end of this new country entirely.


Through world wars, depressions, recessions and civil unrest this nation has survived. And it will continue to do so as long as citizens


someone's face. So, finally in desperation, we pitched the little feller out the door. Where he promptly circled around to the bedroom window and began trying to tear through the screen,

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

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
