

Foster, Community Service A Way Of Life

Community service. It's something lots of people do a certain amount of, and lots of people wish they had time to do more of.

But to Charles Foster of Deport, it is much more than a phrase, it is a way of life that he has pursued with the dedication that some people pursue hobbies.

Charles, (known to most Deport folks as "Dugan") is the mayor of Deport and has been since 1972. He is involved in the Deport Volunteer Fire Department, the American Legion, the Masonic Lodge and numerous other civic organizations and activities.

He was born in Delta County, and moved with his parents to Deport in 1936. He and his wife, Maxine, make their home on Monroe Street in Deport in an attractive, "neat as a pin" house.

But the mayor doesn't have a whole lot of time to spend at home.

He can be found frequently down at the city office, standing on the street discussing the world, or at whatever meeting requires his presence.

In case anyone has the idea that to do all this Foster is retired, think again...he has worked for Babcock and Wilcox Boiler Company in Paris for the past 31 years!

Among the offices and duties he has performed in his quest for civic improvements are: twenty-five years as a Deport Mason, a past Master, 20 years as the secretary; twenty-eight years as a member of the Deport American Legion Post, and during that time he has served as Post Commander for eight years, 1st District Vice-Commander, 1st District Commander and State of Texas Vice-Commander; he has served on the National Security Commission for two years, and the

National Distinguished Guest Committee for four years; served as a delegate to the National Convention for the past twelve years, and this year is an elected delegate to the convention in Salt Lake City, Utah.

He was elected to the board of directors of the Ark-Tex Council of Governments after being elected mayor of Deport, and is now serving on the executive board of the Council of Governments.

He was appointed to the new Jobs Training Partnership Act by Governor Mark White in 1983.

Another appointed position was to the Community Development Block Grant Regional Review Committee, again by the Governor.

Foster says, "I feel that this appointment is quite an honor, to be appointed by the Governor." That he will take the honor seriously and do

whatever is necessary to do a good job goes without saying.

Without the hours and hours of diligent work he has spent the grants the city has would have been much more difficult, perhaps impossible to achieve.

Those Block Grants the city has received include a \$250,000 land easement grant for the flood control lake and sewer line improvement which has made the quality of life in the small town better.

A \$300,000 sewer plant and sewer and water line improvement grant that has also made a difference in the services available to the city, and a block grant for Church Street in front of the school, which was received recently through a joint application with the county.

Foster also has served on the board of directors for the Lamar County Water District, having been

appointed to the post by the Lamar County Commissioner's Court from 1970 through 1983.

He received the Professional Man of the Year Award from the Soil and Water Conservation District's Region IV. He has also received plaques or certificates of appreciation from the American Legion, the Water Board for community service and the Legions' prestigious National Achievement Award, as well as recognition from the Lodge.

During the course of these many activities, he has had the opportunity to travel a great deal. He has been to Washington D.C. several times, and to Hawaii several times. Most of the United States' major cities have been visited, through the course of attending conventions and delegations.

But lots of other trips haven't been so glamorous. He believes that if he hadn't been sitting in on the grant sessions, someone else would have been there to receive the grants. That meant hours of travel, most of the expense of which came from his own pocket.

Why? What makes a man devote his life to such projects?

When asked, he replies with a gentle smile, "I like to do public service, community service."

Charles Foster doesn't ask for praise, he doesn't really think about the time he devotes to his duties. He just does what he sees needs doing. And in doing, he has proved to be one of the finest additions to a community that could ever be.

Rules To Live By Can Be Useful

Editor's Note: This appeared in my desk...I don't know how, nor who put it there. I hope they weren't trying to tell me something...but if they were, it isn't that it wasn't deserved.

Most of us could benefit from these rules. We may follow many of them, but it doesn't hurt to take a look at them written down and think about them. So, here goes:

- 1: Stop thinking about yourself; instead think good thoughts about other people.
- 2: Don't criticize or complain.
- 3: Be an eager listener. Encourage the other person to talk about himself.
- 4: Show real honesty, and hearty appreciation.

5: Become genuinely interested in people you come in contact with.

6: Smile often. It generates enthusiasm, friendliness and good will.

7: Remember names. A person's name is the sweetest, most important sound he hears; and instantly captures his attention each time it is used.

8: Talk a little, listen much. Try to hear, understand and digest what the other person says.

9: Let the other person be the hero of the situation, make him feel important.

10: Ask questions. He who asks questions, has control.

11: Lead the other person to discover the answer; don't tell him what to think.

12: Let the other person think the idea or solution is his.

13: Give before you get. Always give the other person a good reason to agree with you.

14: Whenever you are asked, ordered or instructed to do something; first, as yourself, "What is it exactly, step by step, that I have been asked to do?" and "How can I carry out these instructions detail by detail, in the most efficient manner that will be most pleasing to the person who has asked this to be done?"

15: Approach all scheduled activities, one at a time, with eager enthusiasm, friendliness and happiness.

16: Attack each task with force and vigor, until completed.

17: Spend some time at the day's end mentally reviewing those things you did accomplish.

Prairiland CISD Sets Lunch Prices

The Prairiland C.I.S.D. school serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for \$.80 and breakfast for \$.50.

Children from families whose income falls within the level shown on the following scale are eligible for either free meals or reduced price meals.

To apply for free or reduced price meals, please fill out an application as soon as possible, sign it, and return it to the school. Please answer all questions on the form. An application which does not contain the total household income, the names of all household members 21 years or older or a statement that the household member does not have one, and the signature of an adult household member cannot be processed by the school.

The information on the application may be checked by the school or other officials at any time during the school year.

If your child is approved for meal benefits you must tell the school when your household income increases by more than \$50 per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases.

You may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now, but have a decrease in household income, become unemployed, or have an increase in family size, fill out an application at that time.

If you have foster children living with you, they may be eligible for those benefits. If you wish to apply for these benefits for them, please contact the school and they will help you complete the application.

Children who receive free or reduced-price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for meals. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will

be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing the following official: Supt. L.H. Taylor at 652-6476.

The information you provide will be treated confidentially and will be used only for eligibility determinations and verification of data.

If you have any questions or need help in filling out the application form, please contact 652-6476. You will be notified when the application is approved or denied.

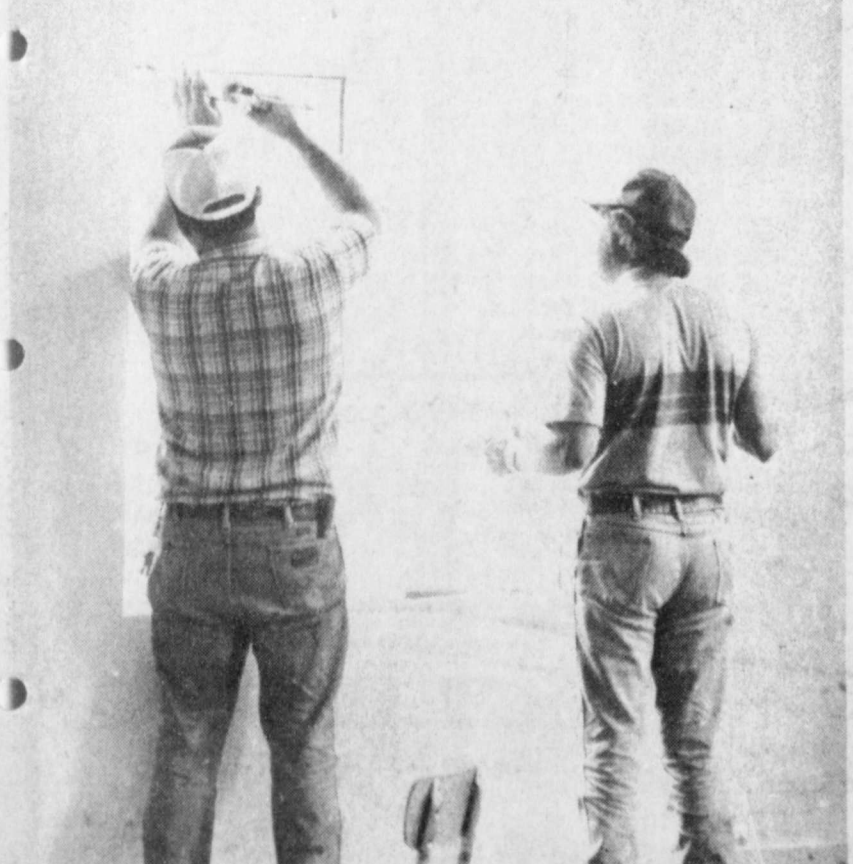

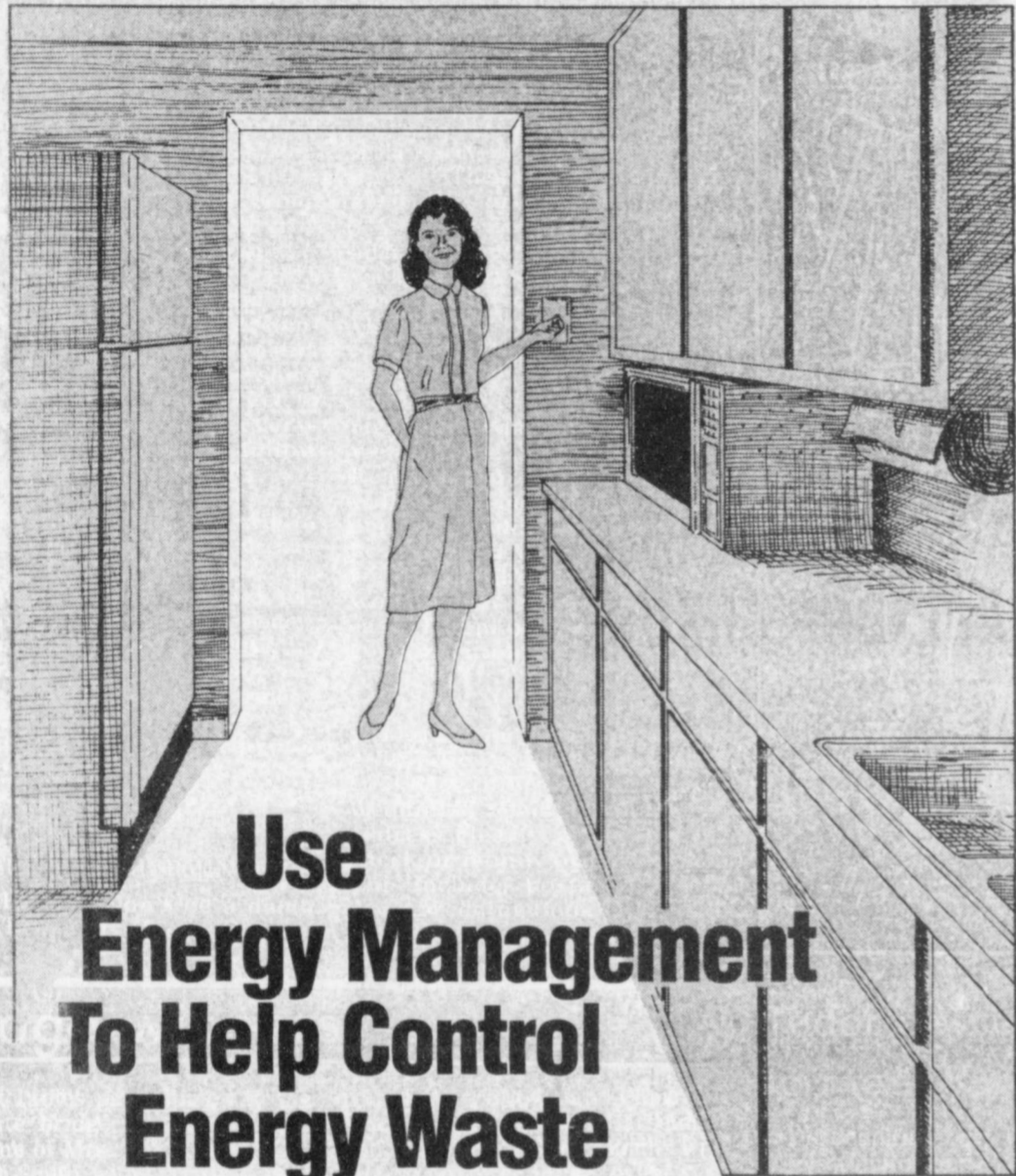

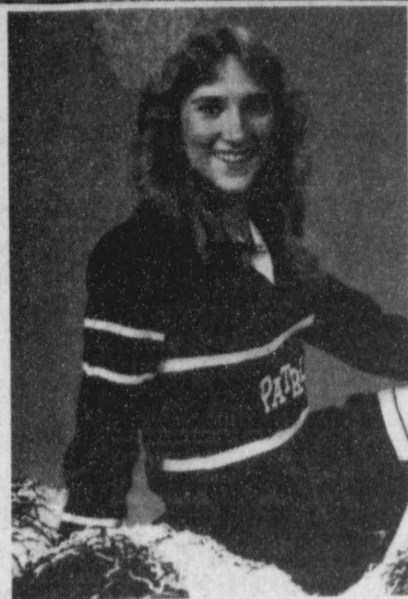
