

The Post Office, A Vital Part Of A Town

The first errand many people can recall being trusted with as a child was "going to the post office". The feeling of importance and responsibility, plus the anticipation of what might be in the mail made it a pleasurable errand to run.

And few people every completely outgrow the feeling of curiosity as they check the mail box, even knowing that there is likely to be more bills than anything else!

The local post office is as much a part of the community as the volunteer fire department or the schools. In many ways it is the communication hub of a small town, not just because of the mail, but

because it provides a perfect center to exchange local news and happenings as people sift in and out, but because the postmaster is a well of vital information about nearly anything.

In Bogata, Blossom, Deport, Talco, Cunningham and Pattonville, the post office serves as a convenient meeting place for impromptu get-togethers, the place to go where sooner or later most of the citizenry will pass by. And all the postmasters agree that it should also be listed as a central directory for the town, because of the numerous requests for information concerning where people live, what time an event is scheduled, or who to consult about a problem.

Carlos Denison is the postmaster at Deport. He has served in the capacity for 23 years, and enjoyed the whole time.

When asked why he likes the the job, he replied "I like to serve people...that's what the post office is for, to serve people. We're not here to be served."

He says that probably the most curiosity-provoking piece of mail he ever mailed was a regular size envelope that squeaked loudly every time it was touched! He never did get to satisfy his curiosity, and still wonders about it to this day.

He gets a lot of mail addressed to "Grandma and Grandpa" and can deliver it because the box number is available...but it was by his own

knowledge of people that he was able to deliver the letter addressed simply to "Peepaw", Deport Texas...a childish letter to a grandparent.

He makes every effort to deliver mail no matter how incorrectly addressed, and says that a small town post office really has little need for the computers and mechanization that the larger centers have.

He acknowledges the need for mechanical mail sorting, forms and reports, but is glad that his post office is small enough to be free from the big business attitude.

He loves his job, likes meeting people and having a moment to exchange the time of day with kids and the elderly.

Currently the Deport Post Office has no boxes available, since they are each and every one rented!

At Cunningham there is no separate building, but rather postmaster Nelda Musgrove tends to the mail, which is put in boxes located within the Musgrove Store building. The operation is small, personal and very much an integral part of the Cunningham community.

Ed Parker serves as Postmaster at Pattonville. A former Paris postal employee, he had planned on retiring years ago when he was asked to serve at Pattonville. That position was to have been temporary, but evolved into a full time job. He's been there ten years now!

Each post office in each community has it's own personal touch, added by each postmaster.

It is one of the centers of small town life...the hub of society in many ways. The post office is the place where the elderly receive the precious letters that keep them informed about family, where teenagers receive the notice that they have been accepted into college, where Christmas presents to kids are picked up. It is a place special, and unique to the small town.

September 16 through September 22 will be National Cystic Fibrosis Week. Mark Figueroa will coordinate the education and fundraising campaign in Deport.

funds raised in this community will be used to fund research and to increase public awareness of CF.

Cystic fibrosis is the number one genetic killer of children and young adults in America today. It is a disease which strangles and starves its victims. Approximately ten million Americans, one in twenty of us are unknowing carriers of the gene which causes cystic fibrosis and there is no carrier test. When two carriers conceive a child, there is a

Kiss your baby. If she or he tastes very salty, he may have CF. Other signs of CF are breathing difficulties; failure to grow despite large appetite; nasal polyps; frequent, bulky bowel movements; and clubbing of the finger tips. If you are worried that your child may have CF, visit your doctor. There is a simple, reliable test called the "Sweat Test" to determine if your child has cystic fibrosis.

25 percent chance the child will have CF and a 50 percent chance the child will be a carrier. And, while nearly half the babies born today with cystic fibrosis will live past the age of 21, the disease is always fatal. The

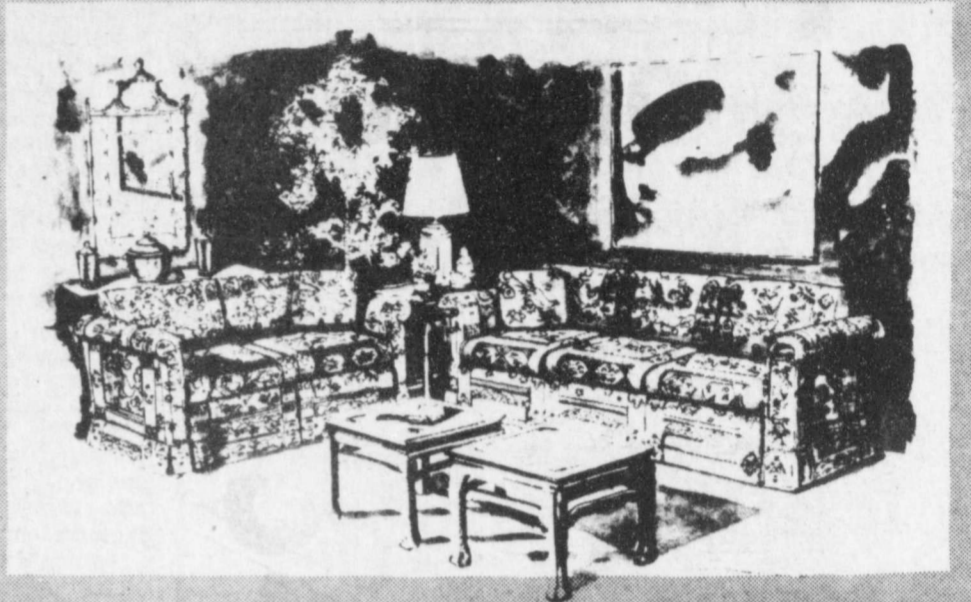

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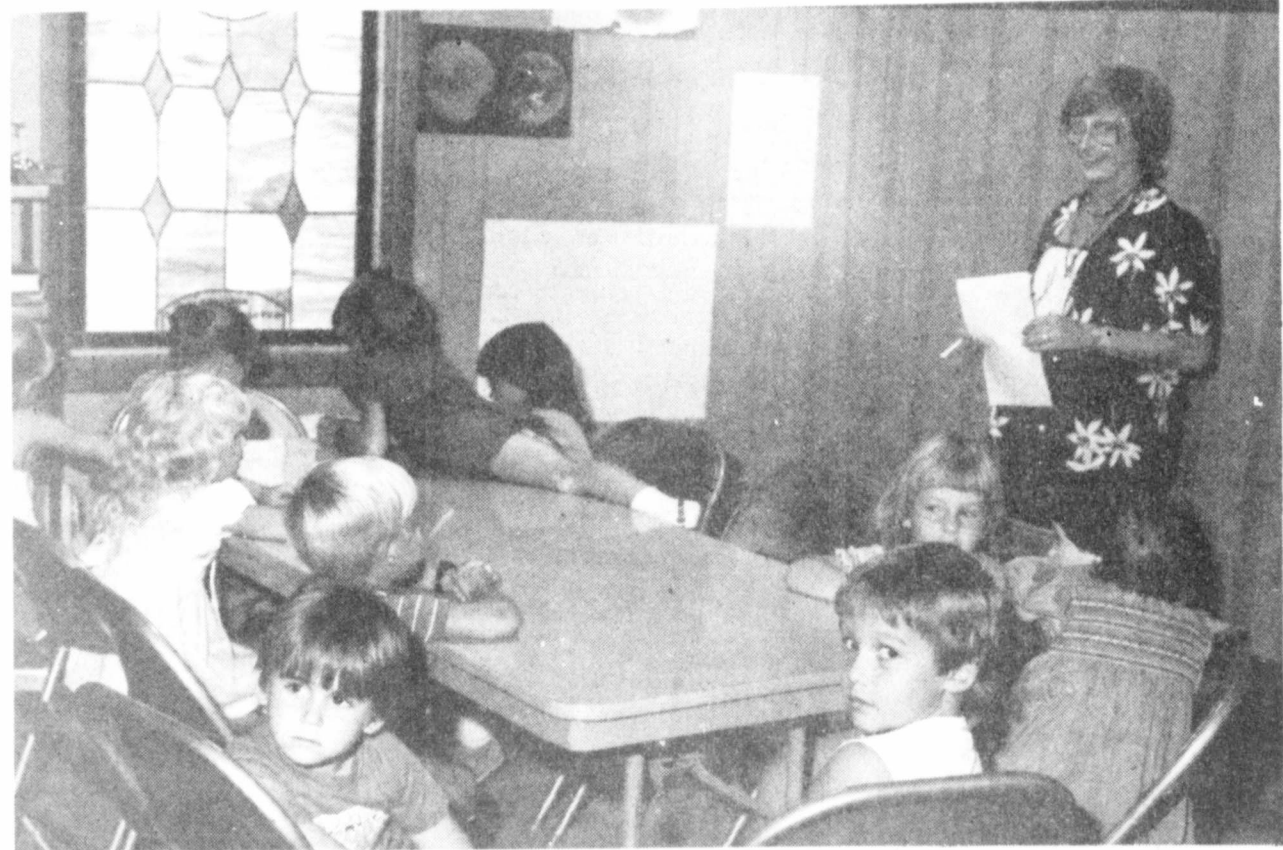

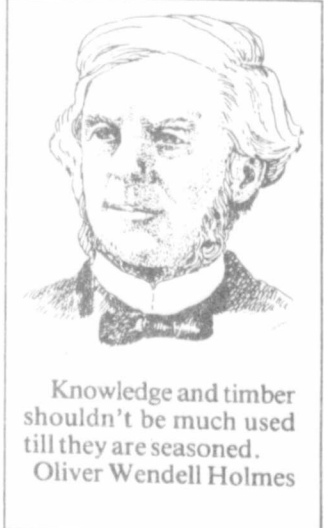
