The first roads being paved are Church Street and a portion of Kelsey Street in Deport.


The improvments will consist of a six-inch rock base and a two-inch asphalt topping.

### Tax Shelter Can Be "Schemes" IRS says that in recent years many

abusive tax shelters have appeared on the market that claim benefits never intended by law. Generally, these abusive shelters are marketing schemes, often for substantial fees. that involve artificial transactions lacking economic reality. Other characteristics include inflated appraisals, unrealistic allocations, package deals designed from the start to generate losses far in excess of investment, buying in volume at wholesale to claim charitable contributions based on retail, and a number of other devices lacking in economic substance.

Investing in an abusive tax shelter, the IRS says, is an expensive proposition. Consider the consequences: the promoter generally charges a substantial fee; the chance of examination by the IRS is great;

and the taxpayer will face payment of the tax, substantial interest on the underpayment, plus a variety of penalties


