

# Pre-Registration Set At Prairiland CISD

New students to Prairiland C.I.S.D. will have the opportunity to pre-register for the 1984-85 school year, which begins on Friday, August 17.

New students may register for Kindergarten through the eighth grade at the Blossom School Campus

or the Deport School campus from 8:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. and from 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. on August 13-17 in the campus principal's office.

Elementary and Junior High teachers will be available for registration on August 15 and 16, in

their rooms.

Kindergarten teachers will need the child's birth certificate and immunization record.

First grade students new to the district will need health records and records from the previous school

as well as a birth certificate.

All other students that are new to the district should submit health records and records from the previous school.

Prairiland High School will hold an orientation meeting for all high school students on Monday, August

13, 1984 at 7 p.m. in the gym. Schedules for all students will be distributed at this meeting.

Also, all parents of ninth-graders are invited to attend for an explanation of the new curriculum (Chapter 75) requirements to be

implemented and required of freshmen students this year. Other parents or interested patrons are also invited.

The entire meeting, orientation and explanation of Chapter 75 will last approximately one hour.

## Prairiland Board Accepts Bids, Hires

The Prairiland CISD School Board met in a called meeting Monday night to review the budget, accept bids on several school services, and attend to personnel matters.

They accepted the bid of Blankenship-Roach Oil Company for fuel and oil services for the transportation system of the school this coming year, and the bid from Mitchell Paving, Mitchell Paving will resurface the driveways at the high school.

Jeff Beckett was hired to teach government and work in the athletic department coaching in all sports at the high school.

Pat Kilmer was hired as Plan A

teacher for the high school, and Buddy Freeman from Honey Grove will serve as one of the three vocational agriculture teachers.

The board also discussed salaries for administration, secretaries, aides, and custodians, and the salaries were adjusted to fit state recommendations.

The school budget received a thorough going over, and the final adoption of the budget will take place in a meeting scheduled for August 20.

The board policies were reviewed and some revisions made in order to comply with state regulations.

The school calendar for inservice and work days for teachers was revised, with the student days

remaining the same.

Prairiland CISD school system will begin for students at 8 a.m. August 17, with bus schedules and routes remaining much the same as they were last school year.

All teachers and school personnel will report to work on August 13, in order to have everything ready for students on Friday.

The board also accepted the resignation of Glenda Hatcher, and a number of applications for an English teacher have been received and are being considered.

Routine matters such as the approval of the financial report and payment of bills and reading of the minutes was also taken care of.

## Governor Announces Jobs Training Program For N.E. Texas

Governor Mark White announced today that \$1,650,867 will be used for job training programs for economically disadvantaged, unemployed, and underemployed Texans in the North East Texas area. The Governor has approved the expenditure for job training programs in Bowie, Cass, Delta, Franklin, Hopkins, Lamar, Morris, Red River and Titus Counties. The

Texas Department of Community Affairs has executed a contract effective July 1 for the provision of a job training program under the Job Training Partnership Act.

"The Job Training Partnership Act is a catalyst for integrating the private and public sector in developing skills needed by Texans for productive employment and

economic self-sufficiency," Governor White said.

Under the Job Training Partnership Act, local elected officials in partnership with private industry councils, composed of business and community representatives, plan and provide programs best suited for residents of their area. Program services include basic education skills training and job placement.

## Bullock Releases Sales Tax Figures

State Comptroller Bob Bullock today sent checks totaling \$98.3 million in local sales tax payments to 988 cities that levy the one percent sales tax.

Although bookkeeping changes that were part of last year's deadline speedups made the August 1984 payment smaller than the previous

August amount, Bullock said year to date comparisons can be made accurately.

"This 12 and a half percent increase is honest growth over last year because both this August payment and last August's are based on all sales reported during the first half of both years," Bullock said.

Locally, Blossom received \$1,859.27, compared to \$2,809.20 last year, marking a 6.90 percent decrease.

Deport received \$1,918.54, compared to \$2,047.93 for the same period

last year, bringing the 1984 total to \$6,233.42 for a 13.32 percent increase from 1983.

Bogata received \$3,629.66 for this year's period, compared to a \$4,687.57 payment last year, or a 2.20 percent decrease.

Talco received \$2,388.14 for this payment, bringing the yearly total to \$16,060.59 showing a 3.22 percent decrease.

The August checks were for taxes collected on sales made in June and the second quarter and reported to the Comptroller by July 20.

## County Grant Work Begun

Lamar County Commissioner Jimmie Sparks and County Judge Brady Fisher have announced that construction work has begun on the county's Community Development Block Grant project.

The first roads being paved are Church Street and a portion of Kelsey Street in Deport.

The improvements will consist of a six-inch rock base and a two-inch asphalt topping.

"There are many people who deserve much credit in obtaining this road," said Jimmie. "First, Commissioner Jimmie Sparks, whose consistent support of the

project was so important. Second, Mayor Charles Foster and the Deport City Council, who agreed to include this area as a part of the county's project, rather than submit a competing project which would have hurt both efforts".

## Tax Shelter Can Be "Schemes"

IRS says that in recent years many abusive tax shelters have appeared on the market that claim benefits never intended by law. Generally, these abusive shelters are marketing schemes, often for substantial fees, that involve artificial transactions lacking economic reality. Other characteristics include inflated appraisals, unrealistic allocations, package deals designed from the start to generate losses far in excess of investment, buying in volume at wholesale to claim charitable contributions based on retail, and a number of other devices lacking in economic substance.

Investing in an abusive tax shelter, the IRS says, is an expensive proposition. Consider the consequences: the promoter generally charges a substantial fee; the chance of examination by the IRS is great;

and the taxpayer will face payment of the tax, substantial interest on the underpayment, plus a variety of penalties.

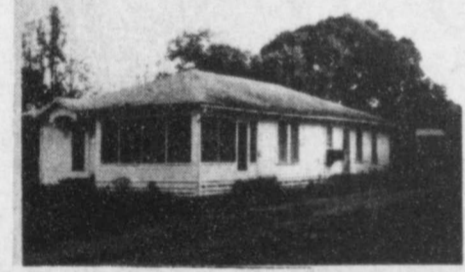

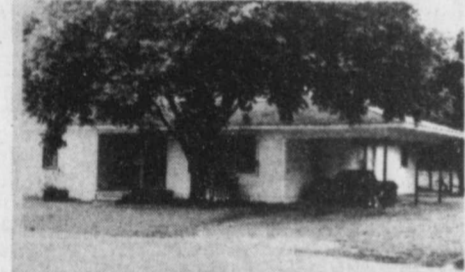
