

Area Hay Shortage Could Be Critical

The supply of hay is running short almost anywhere in Texas this season, and this area is no exception. If another extra severe winter should follow in 1984-85 cattlemen will be in serious trouble, while dairymen are already feeling the shortage pinch. Many ranchers will be putting in winter pastures such as wheat or clover, but many more do not have the acreage to do so.

Several county extension agents, and the Texas Extension Service predict that the hay crop on first cuttings was only around fifty percent of the usual amount, and in spite of a number of heavy rain storms that have provided much needed moisture, the outcome of the second cutting is uncertain. Without continuing moisture, or if an early frost

should strike, the second cutting will also be short.

Area ranchers are considering culling their herds sharply to rid themselves of older cattle, scrubby calves or mother cows that are not as productive as they should be. This move will provide fewer head to be wintered, and reduce their hay needs. With cattle feeds such as range

cubes or similar feeds and mineral supplements being expensive, feeding cattle through the winter without hay may prove unfeasible.

Because of the hay shortage many highway right of ways, railroad beds, or farm to market roads are being cut by hay producers in an effort to provide more hay. Although unfertilized, and not of the best quality, the ranchers seem to have

the attitude that "every little bit helps", and, indeed, it does.

If ranchers are forced to sell too many calves or cows, the cattle market will definitely suffer a depression. Although this should result in lowered meat prices to the consumer, in the past prices have not dropped. The packers, middlemen, and grocery stores do not pass that

savings along to the consumer. Those few farmers with excess hay to sell can almost name their price this season.

The long term effects of the shortage cannot be predicted, but the outlook at present points to a long, tight winter for ranchers in this area.

And while it may not ALL be right with the world, just looking at things helps make up for a lot! Try it, there is a reward!

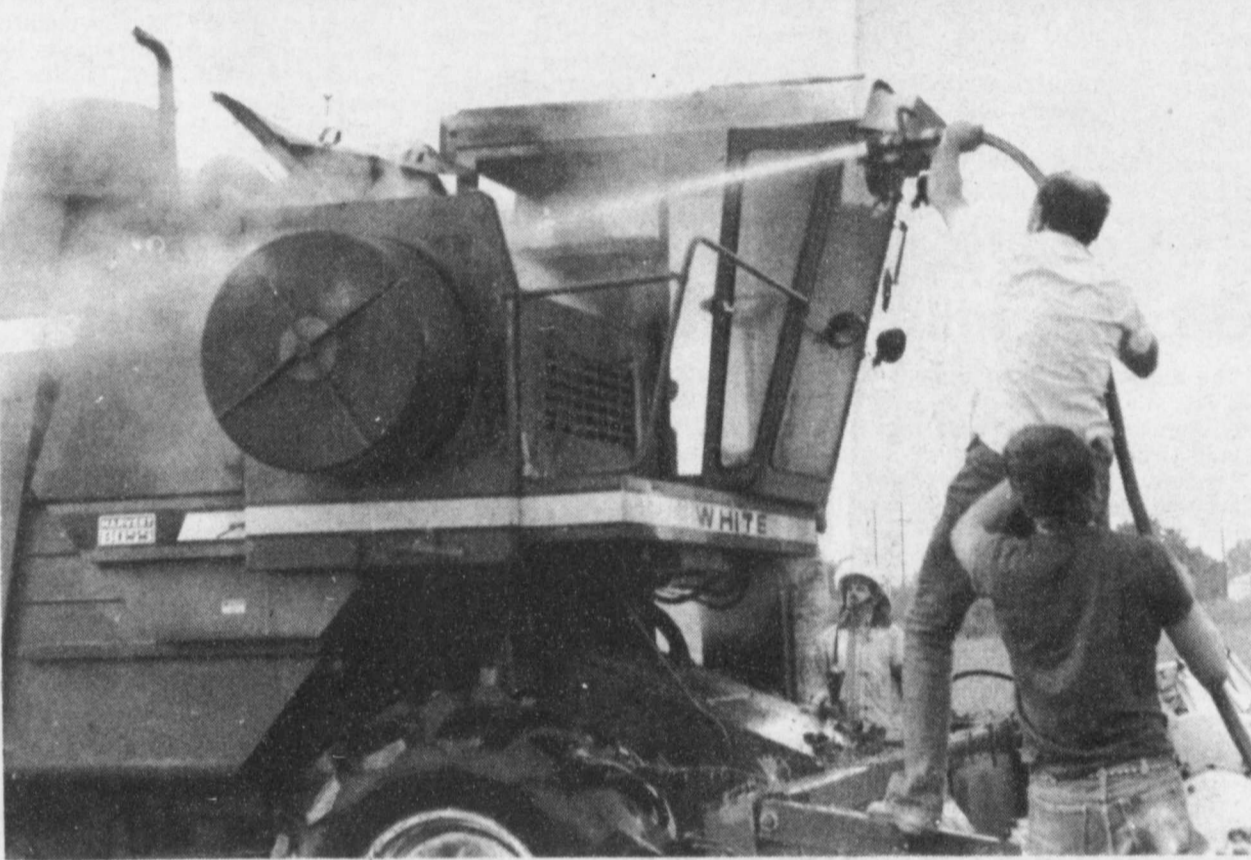

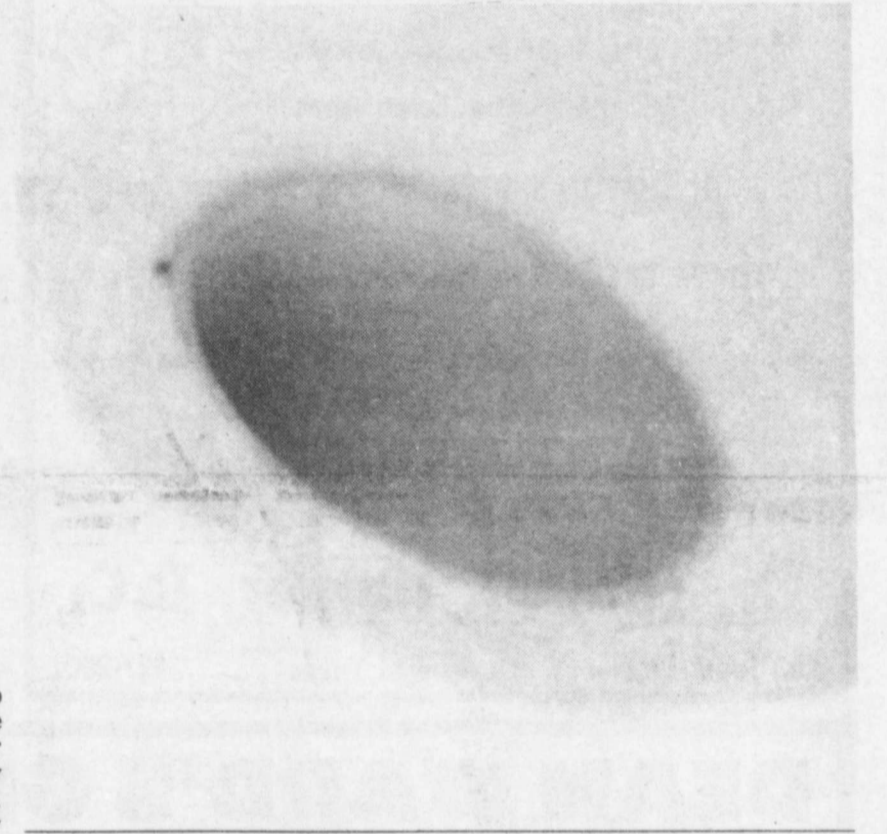

Harvest Of Milo, Soybeans Beginning

This year's milo crop and early maturing soybeans will be heading to town shortly, as both are nearing maturity. Both crops have been hurt by the dry weather and this is particularly true of the south part of the county as well as scattered parts of the rest of the county.

We are not expecting record yields of either crop, but then neither are we having crop failures as are farmers in other parts of the state.

The early maturing soybean crop

looks promising again this year. An estimated 50 percent of the soybean acreage planted in the county as the Williams variety or one of the other indeterminate varieties.

Many of the seed companies are placing a lot of emphasis on these Group III and IV varieties in our area. We think these early maturing varieties have a place in the farming operation of area farmers. We would not recommend that one go totally to this type soybean until further work

is done on these varieties.

It appears that these varieties do not have the yield potential of the Lee 74, Centennial and similar varieties. We have not heard of any 60 bushel per acre Williams soybean, but then we have not heard of very many 60 bushel Lee either.

The early maturing soybeans do permit farmers to follow soybeans with wheat in a rotation program. By harvesting in August, one is able to plant wheat and graze it. This is not possible with varieties such as Lee.

We have not had a whole lot of yield information on these early maturing soybean varieties. Nor research has been conducted in the area and the best information available has been from farmers.

However, hopefully, this will change after this year, thanks to efforts of the Texas Soybean Producer's Board. Through the efforts of this board some excellent result demonstrations have been established in Delta, Bowie, Red River and Lamar County.

There are two early maturing variety result demonstrations planted in Lamar County. One is located on the Lloyd Thompson Farm in the Direct bottom in far northwest Lamar County. It was planted on April 18. The same 14 varieties were planted on the Kessel Farm, located south of Blossom on May 15.

Varieties included are Pershing, Mitchell 450, Paymaster Bounty, Pioneer 4880, Asgrow A4268, Stevens, Dallas, JMS 4982, Crawford and the following Ring Around Varieties: 480, 451, 481 and 405.

The varieties are identified with signs and individuals are encouraged to stop by at any time to evaluate the varieties.

Dr. Marshall Was Early Blossom Healer

In the early days of Blossom Prairie, so many of the citizens gave so much of themselves, not expecting anything in return. A good example of these citizens was the country doctor. One of these faithful people was Dr. J.S. Marshall. According to his son, Maurice Marshall, who still resides in Blossom, his dad would sometimes treat a patient, give medicine, for as little as 75 cents.

Many times he wasn't paid with money, but more often was paid with farm animals or produce, but many times wasn't paid anything at all.

Dr. Marshall was a practicing physician in Blossom for 44 years. He served his country as a First Lieutenant in the Medical Corps during World War I.

In Blossom, Dr. Marshall, upon the time of his death in July, 1948, was the last of four sons of Confederate veterans who, because three of them had birthdays on January 19, the same as General Robert E. Lee, celebrated the occasion annually in Blossom. The others were W.M. Gantt, W.C. Watson and J.D. Dickey. Whom all died within five years of each other.

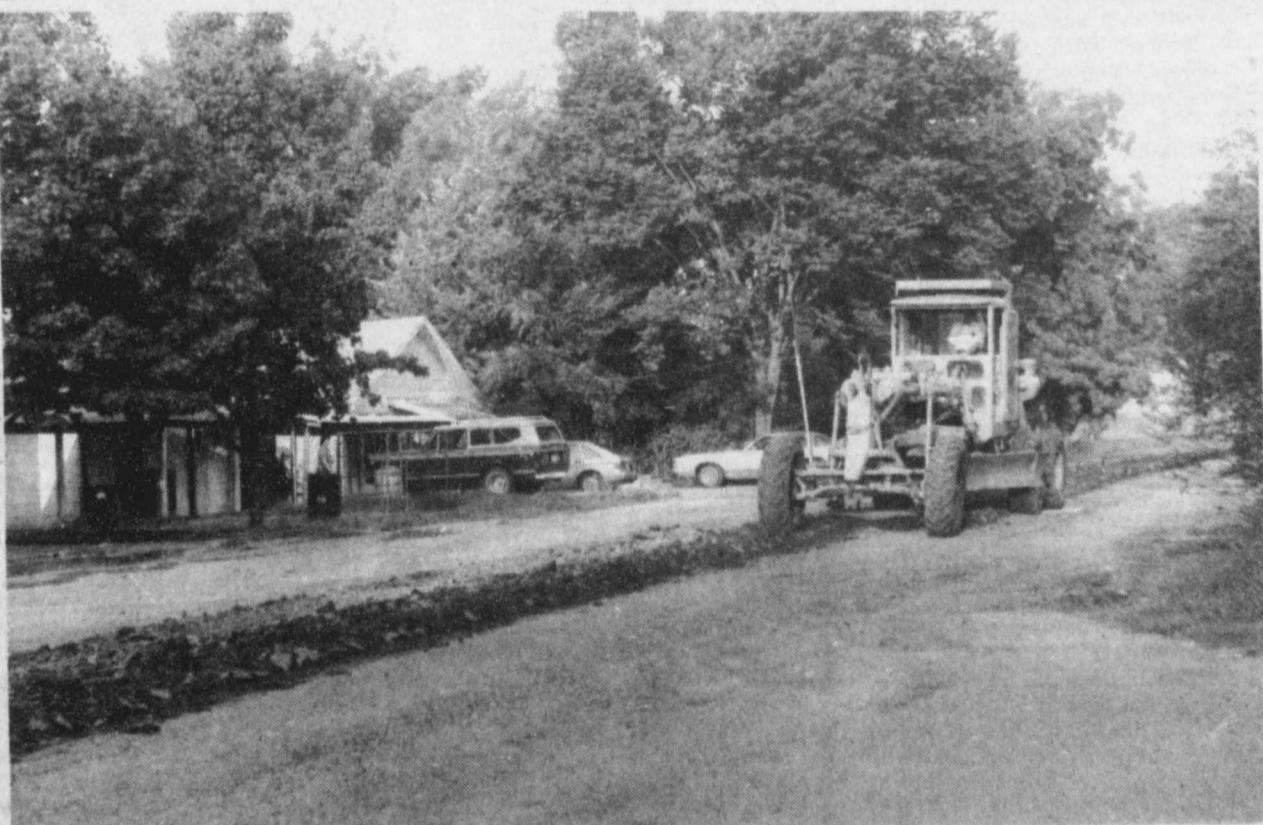
Dr. Marshall was the son of Capt. Clement L. Marshall, an officer in the Texas Confederate Army. He was born in Cass County, January 19, 1867, and moved to Blossom in 1878. He was a graduate of Vanderbilt University Medical School, he was

president of the class and a member of Kappa Sigma fraternity. He attended Jefferson Medical College in Philadelphia. After graduation he returned to Blossom Prairie to practice.

He married Miss L. Josephine Moore, daughter of a Confederate veteran, and herself a member of Paris High School's first graduating class.

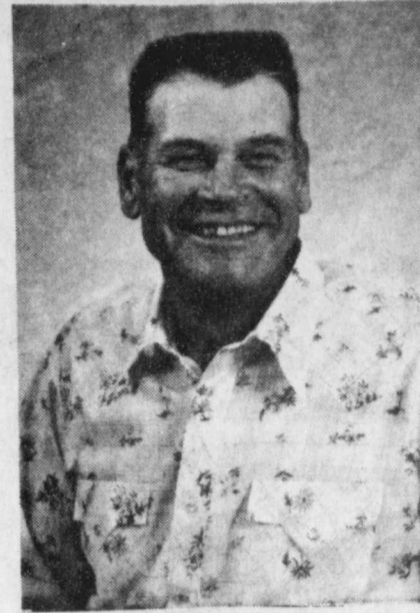

Mr. Rateliff was born February 20, 1938 in Red River County, a son of Charles Edgar and Flora Lee Mays Rateliff. He was a carpenter.

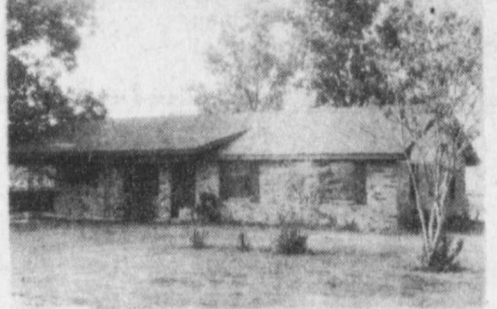
