

Prairiland Budget Approved For '84-85

The Prairiland School Board met in a called session to adopt the school budget Monday night. The budget for the 1984-85 school year will run \$2,614,084, and there will be a projected surplus of \$48,000, barring contingencies.

However, School Superintendent Leslie (Buddy) Taylor pointed out that "We must keep in mind that we have spent a little over \$100,000 of reserved funds on remodeling at the schools, so this projected surplus will

have to help replace some of those funds used up. That is, if an emergency or extra expense doesn't arise."

Funds expected to come in are as follows: Money from estimated local and intermediate sources such as taxes, tuitions, activities and lunch room money should amount to \$405,330.

Broken down it should have \$6,200 from Driver's Education Program, \$87,500 from student activities such

as lunch, \$20,000 from local sources such as extra curricular activities, gates and receipts, school pictures and annuals and \$291,630 from real and personal property taxes.

That figure does include an estimation of 100 percent collection on taxes, which will not happen. However, collecting of delinquent taxes usually offsets that.

State funds will be a total of \$2,098,924. This is the total of the per capita and foundation funds.

Per capita funds are those per student funds, while foundation funds are the amount the state pays on teacher salaries.

Transportation funding is up ten percent from last year, amounting to \$134,200.

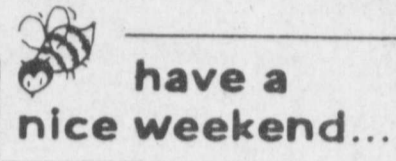
Federal funds for vocational programs is \$16,230. Title I is \$58,009. Reimbursement money from federal sources for lunch room programs is \$83,908. That makes the federal total at \$158,147.

As a comparison, there are 1,100 students in the Prairiland School System. They have \$291,000 in local tax income. North Lamar School System has 1,600 students in their system with an amount of \$1.3 million!

In other action, the board hired Tom Littlejohn to teach English at the high school, and moved Doris Jack from an aid position to that of Deport School secretary. Rena Good

was moved from Blossom to Deport as a Plan A aide, and the board is considering what they will do about the aide position at Blossom.

They also approved the certified tax roll of \$51,900,000.

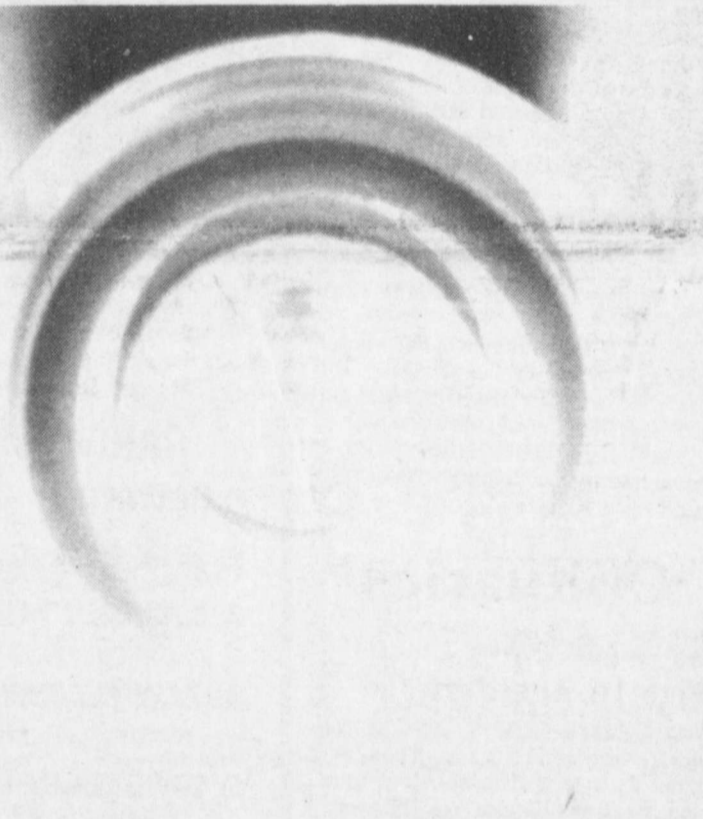
Guess What Contest Draws Big Response

Advanced Promotion Program Announced By Army

Prospective enlistees into the Regular Army, who meet the criteria, have six weeks in which to qualify for an advanced promotion, it was announced today.

"Enlistees who qualify will be promoted to Private E-2 upon completion of basic training, provided they are high school diploma graduates and score in the top half on the Armed Forces Qualification Test," stated Lt. Col.

George D. Featherston, Jr., commander of the Army's Dallas Recruiting Battalion. "To be eligible, enlistees must also contract in one of 40 military occupational specialties and enlist for three or more years."

Featherston is responsible for Regular Army and Army Reserve recruiting in 75 counties in north central and west Texas.

"Upon being promoted to Private E-2, after approximately two months

in the Army, the soldier will receive a pay increase of more than \$90 per month," Featherstone concluded.




Burial was at the Bogata Cemetery under the direction of Bogata Funeral Home.

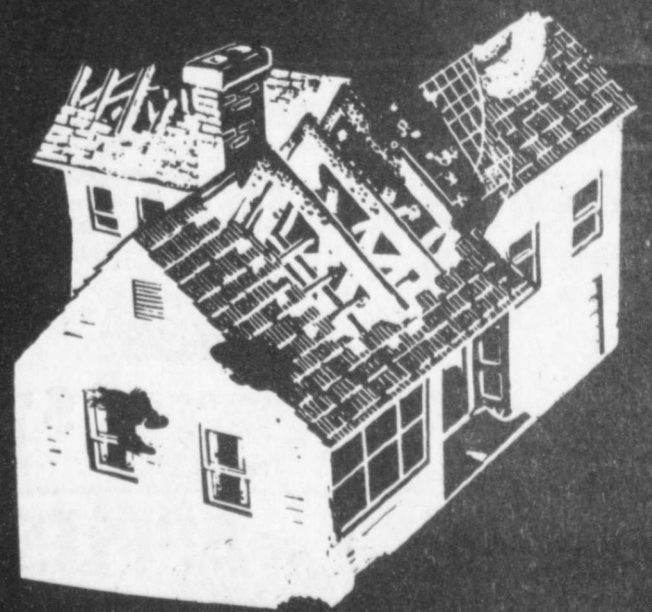

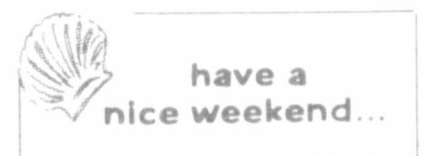
