

Local Newspapers Conduct Solid "Wollop"

Newspapers pack a solid wollop for Texas business and residential communities alike...far outdistancing all other forms of communication.

Results of Texas Consumer Survey 84, the largest and most comprehensive study ever conducted on readership, listening, viewing and shopping habits, heavily documents Texas newspaper superiority.

+86.3 percent of Texans read a newspaper every week, with 80 percent reading their local community newspaper;

+70.6 percent of Texas newspaper readers usually read local merchant ads and

+87.6 percent of the readers say they are important in their local newspaper and its staffs.

These are just three of the dozens

of highlights revealed by the statewide study which was conducted by Consumer Data Service of Oklahoma City.

The massive survey was under the supervision of Dr. Ernest Larkin, director of the Journalism Research Center, University of Oklahoma.

The study also provides in depth detail of the vast audience appeal of Texas newspapers. This portion of the data emphasized: 69.6 percent read at least five issues of their local daily, and 84.3 percent read every issue of their local weekly newspaper; 72.6 percent of local newspaper readers who responded to the survey are married; over 50 percent of the families subscribing to local newspapers comprise three or more people;

Lyndell Williams, Executive Vice-

President of the Texas Press Association in Austin, after receiving the huge study report said this week:

"This survey not only confirms what major advertising retailers already know, but also provides undeniable proof of newspaper strength in all other areas as well."

He cited the high readership interest in local news as an example of "newspaper wollop for a better informed community and state."

Williams pointed out the following additional facts that were revealed by the survey data:

+82.8 percent of Texans read all local news in their newspapers;

+70.3 percent read the special sections;

+58.4 percent read the editorials, and

+54.3 percent read the state news.

Williams also cited local merchant ads as the most thoroughly read advertising matter. Those figures read: 89 percent of Texas newspaper readers usually or at least sometimes read all local merchant advertising; 85.4 percent usually or sometimes read all grocery ads; 85.8 percent usually or sometimes read all the inserts in newspapers, and 85.59 percent usually or sometimes read department store advertising.

The survey also outlined the strengths and weaknesses of direct mail along with radio and television.

Direct mail advertising in Texas, much of it conducted by out of state firms, is usually read by 43.7 percent of the addresses, with only 31 percent of that number reading all of a single mailing.

Radio and television while being

listened to by as much as 73 percent of Texas consumers and seen by at least that many people, nevertheless, must divide those numbers by dozens of stations and channels. And the most watched cable television channels of all don't even accept advertising.

John Taylor, Director of the Texas Newspaper Advertising Bureau explained that an analysis of the massive survey easily reveals numerous additional newspaper assets that may be overlooked at first glance.


Taylor explained: "Every Texas newspaper is a dues payer to its community and state, as well as a major contributor to a better society. Texas newspapers, their publishers and staffs have spent lifetimes creating communities that justify the

investment of millions of dollars by major retailers.

"Our newspapers represent major local payrolls and substantial taxpayers to the local, county and state governments. And in all cases, one newspaper and not more than two thoroughly dominates the markets which they serve.

"Texas newspapers represent quite a choice from the major direct mailers who often don't even pay state taxes, and the electronic media which must share its hour by hour audience with about 50 competitors."

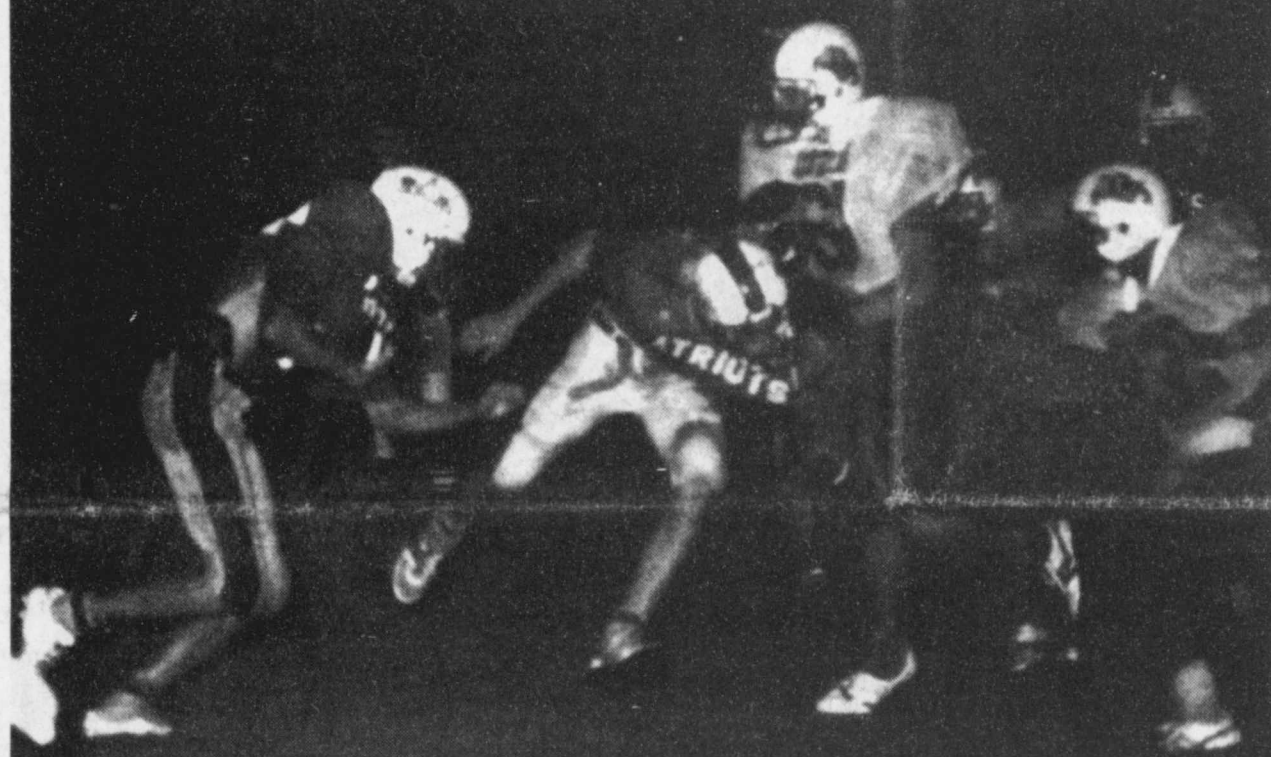

Patriot JV Comes Back To Win

The Prairiland Patriot JV flirted with disaster Thursday night at Cooper but came back with under 1:30 left to walk away with a victory. The win upped Prairiland's record to 2-0 for the year.

The Patriots started things off in the second quarter by establishing a scoring drive that was capped off by a Shawn Philpot run for six points. The two point conversion was stopped short and the Pats had what they thought was a nice 6-0 lead. That lead lasted maybe 15 seconds because on the ensuing kickoff the Cooper return man found an opening that led to paydirt. The extra point attempt was good and the Patriots found themselves trailing 7-6.

Neither team moved the ball a great deal for a while but the Patriots decided they needed more points so they got tough and grinded their way into Cooper territory. The Patriot offense stalled a slight bit and were forced to pass. A pass interference call gave the Patriots a first down inside the three yard line. Philpot again got the call from quarterback Chris Sparks and again scored, giving the Patriots a 12-7 half time lead.

Cooper got first chance at the ball in the second half but a strong defensive line held and forced them to punt. It looked as though Prairiland would score again but a Cooper safety sneaked up and snatched a Sparks pass that was intended for Jeff Morrison.

Cooper hit paydirt a few plays later and led 13-7 after the point after attempt was blocked by Morrison. For most of the fourth quarter, both teams played pretty much in the middle of the field with neither team getting inside the twenties.

The Patriot JV took a good look at the clock and found they were behind and running out of time. They pulled out all of their tricks, they ran a flea-flicker where Sparks pitched the ball to Mike Blackburn who took off on a sweep but stopped abruptly and threw back to Sparks for a nice 20+ yard gain. After a few plays up the middle, they pulled another rabbit out of their hat and ran a nifty reverse to Morrison who scampered 15 yards before being brought down. Then with the Cooper defense not knowing what to expect the Patriots

A hungry Patriot team soundly defeated a stunned Cooper Bulldogs team with a 34-7 victory to make it three straight wins for the season.

The Patriots, on their home turf, didn't seem to mind the mud as they racked up the score.

Head coach Mike Allen said that "The offensive line was the key to the game. The reason why was that we kept the ball practically the whole game, and wore 'em down so that they didn't have much offensively left in them."

He continued that Mike Connot and Tony Duncan both had over 100 yards rushing and Duncan scored a touchdown run on the first kick off.

There was a total number of 320 yards rushing, and they threw for two and completed two.

The first play of the game, as mentioned, Tony Duncan sprinted through a maze of fenders from deep in Prairiland territory for six points, leaving the crowd gasping.

The point after attempt was no good, and the Bulldogs took over on their own 35 yard line. Two plays later, their quarterback raced for a catch up TD which put the Bulldogs ahead because of a good extra point attempt.

It was the only time during the entire game that they posed a threat.

Late in the first quarter, the Patriots carried again when Mickey Connot carried the ball down to Cooper's 7 and Tony Duncan tried to carry it in but couldn't manage it. On the next try, the ball came loose in the rain and bounced into the endzone. An alert Kevin Pasley covered the ball for a TD.

The two point conversion attempt

wasn't successful.

The wet conditions hampered the movements of both teams which sent players slipping and sliding, and fumbles popping around.

With less than a minute in the first half left Mike Connot again broke loose down to the Cooper goal line for six more points.

A pitch-out from Scott Scudder to Connot met with success for the two point conversion, and the half ended Prairiland 20 to 7.

With 43 seconds in the third quarter, Mike Connot once again was the man with the ball for six more points. Point after attempt was good giving the Patriots a 20 point lead going into the fourth.

With seven minutes and 26 seconds in the game, the Patriots found their way back across the Bulldog's goal line on the fine running of Tony Duncan, Ladd Davis and Mike Connot, who again carried the ball in for the final score of the game.

Prairiland recovered a Cooper punter fumble with only a minute forty-five left and completed a very impressive performance by the team as a whole.

The Patriots will travel to Pittsburg this Friday to take on the always tough Tigers.

Coach Allen says that Pittsburg is not big this year, actually, Prairiland is bigger, but they have an asset in speed.

Martinie Burns, a 6 ft. 3 inch, 195 lb. running back, will, according to Allen, "Simply have to be stopped."

Although Prairiland has never beaten Pittsburg in varsity play, the kids are ready, and Allen says they know they can go down there and play them...they are anxious to do so.

Darrin Gifford of Deport was right behind for the \$7 loot with only five misses and predicting Prairiland to beat Cooper 33-12.

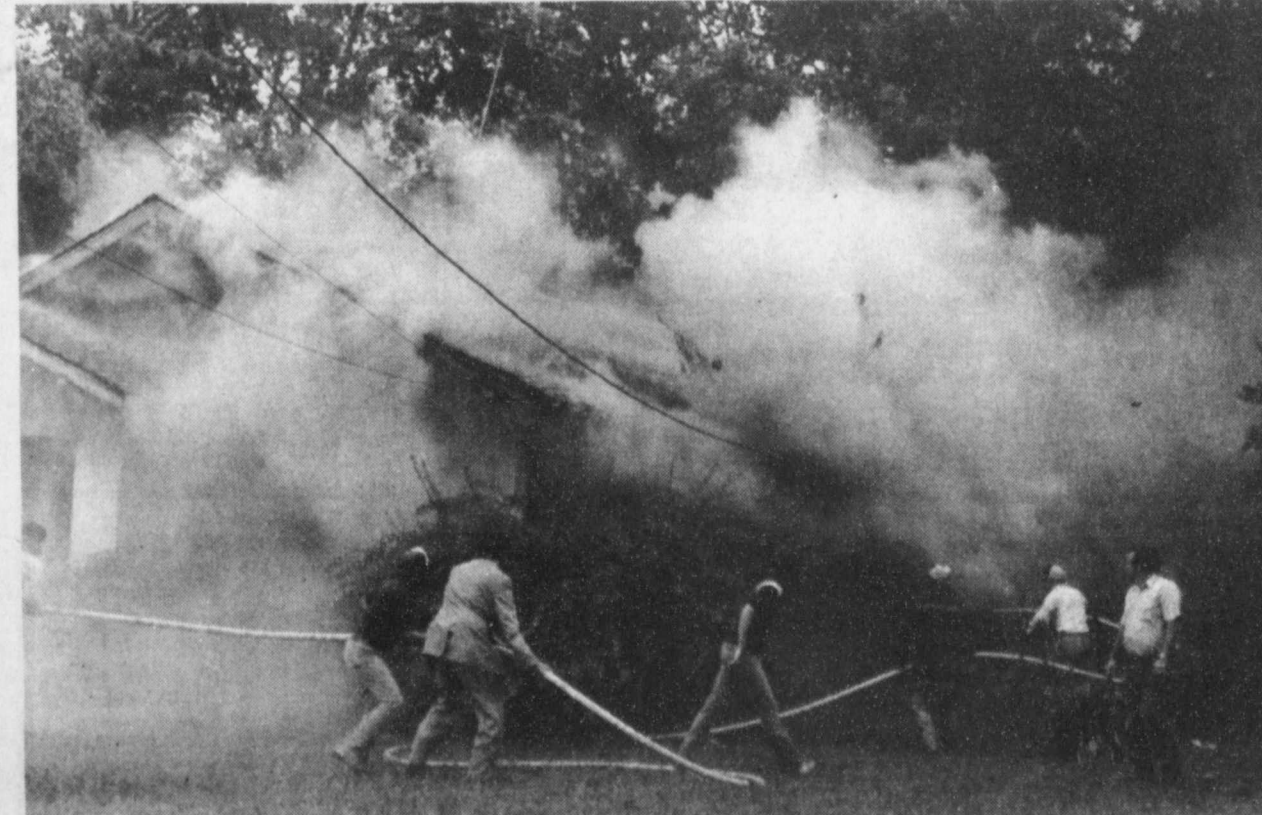
In third place, Ruth King of Bogata missed five games too, and predicted Prairiland over Cooper 24-7.

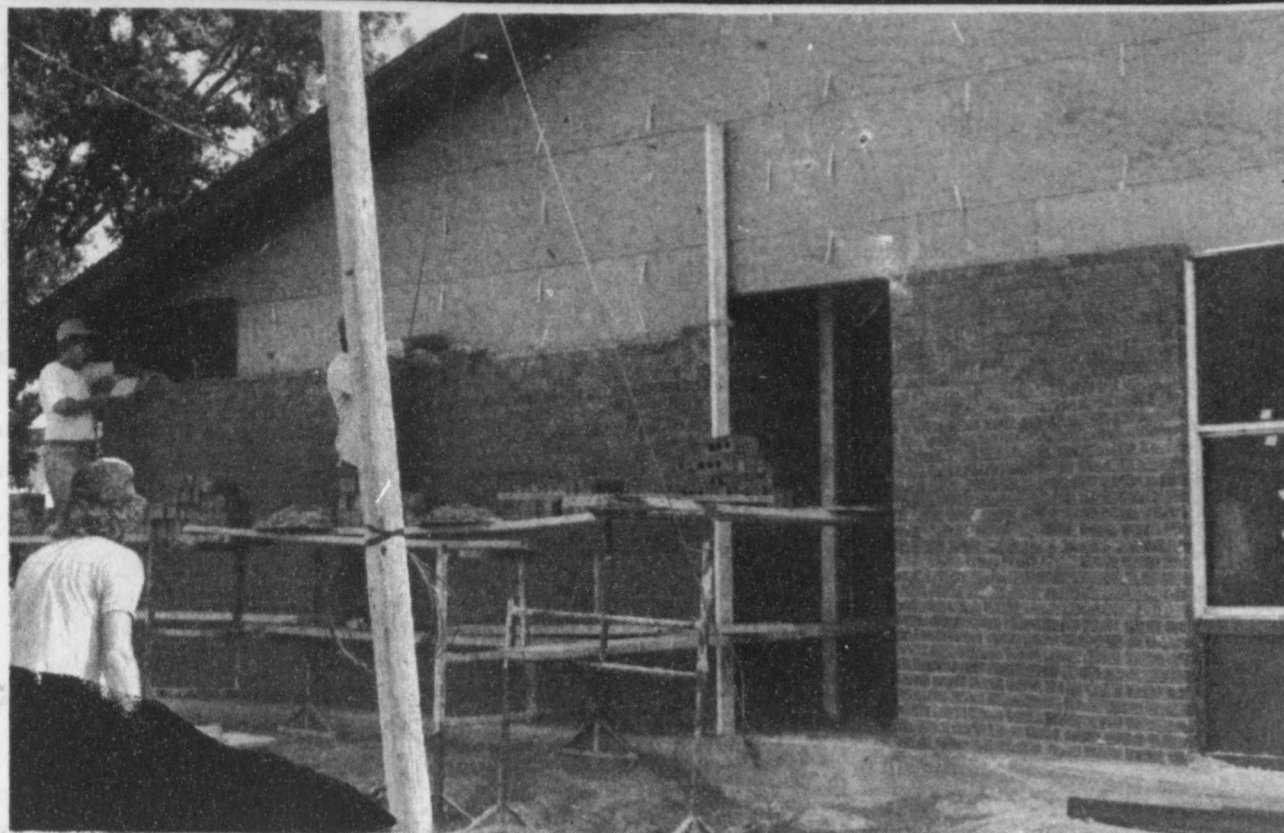

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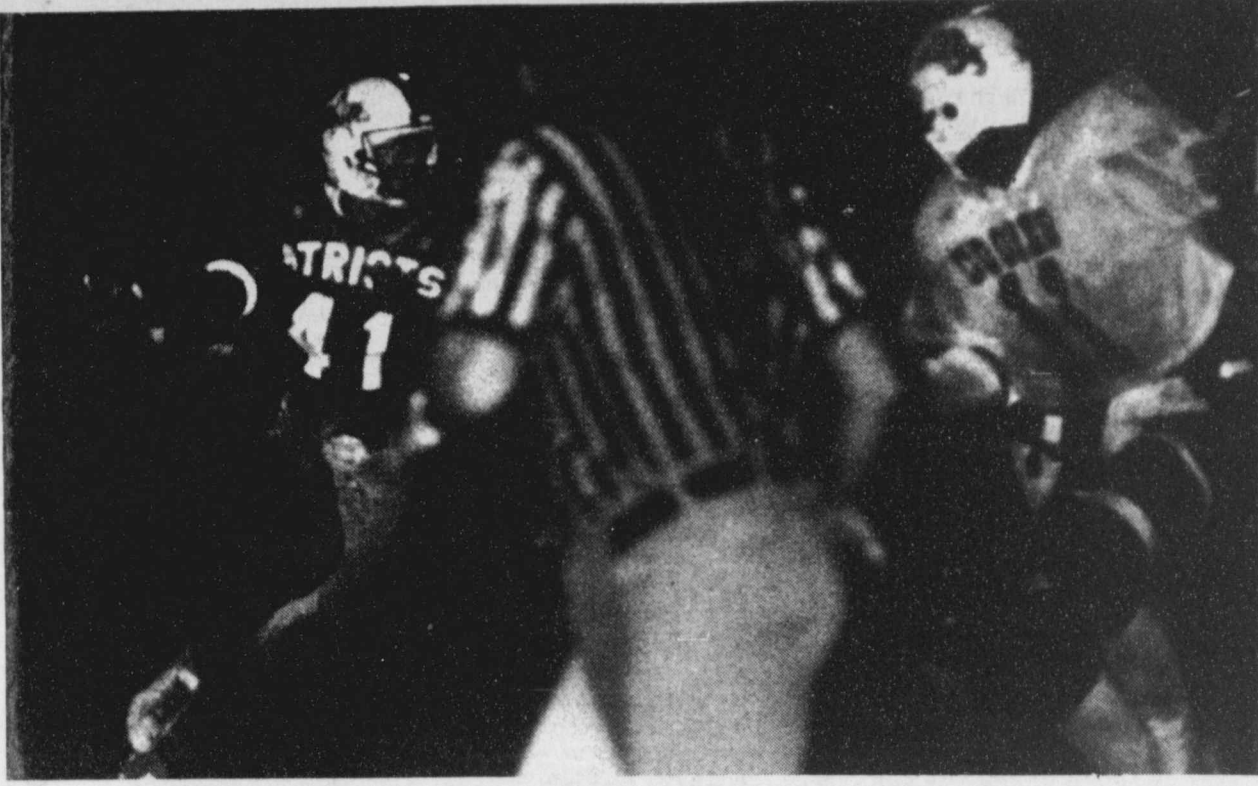
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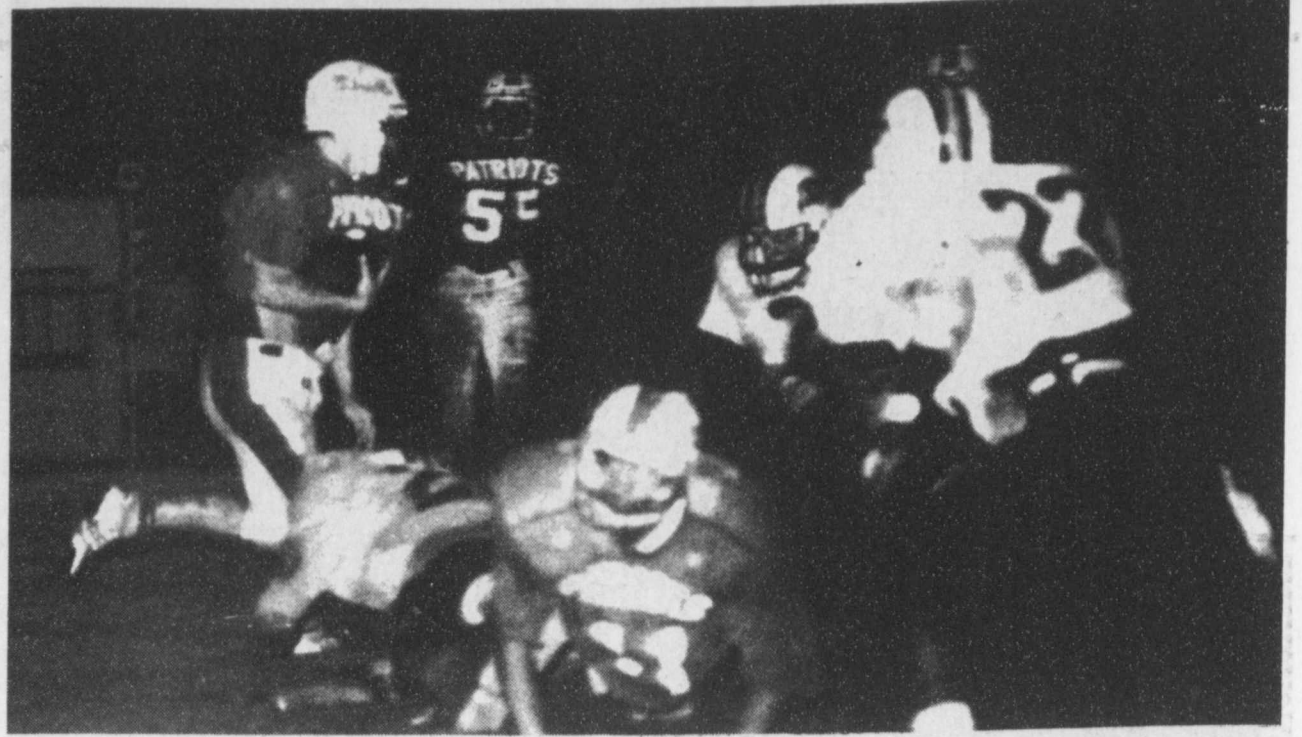
