

# Voter Registration Deadline Drawing Near

As the presidential campaign warms up and as the Texas Senatorial race goes into its last acrimonious days, those who plan to vote on Tuesday, Nov. 6, would be well advised to be certain they can exercise that right.

Especially should those who have become 18 years of age before

election day check on their eligibility.

Those who wish to register may do so in the County Clerk's office in their county of residence up until 5 p.m. on Friday, Oct. 5.

Those who wish to register by mail may do so if the application is received in the Clerk's office no later

than 5 p.m. Monday, Oct. 8. Applications are available from that office or from several Deputy Registrars around the county.

Those with incorrect information on their voter registration card should go to the Clerk's office for corrections.

A spokesman said the most common changes are a voter moving

from one voting precinct to another and women who change their names for marital reasons.

In the case of those moving to this county, a person must be a resident for 30 days prior to the election to vote here; otherwise, they must vote in the previous county of their residence.


The spokesman emphasized that the blue Voter Registration Card is the valid one, with emphasis on blue, not salmon, or yellow, or green.

Absentee voting will begin on Wednesday, Oct. 10 and extends through Friday, Nov. 2.

Such voting is restricted to those who will be out of the county on

election day or those unable to visit the polls because of physical reasons.

Absentee voting will be in the Clerk's office during regular business hours in the designated period.

## Patriots Fall To Pirates 43-21

Pride was alive and well last Friday night at Pittsburg, as a much improved Patriot team stood their ground, and even though suffering defeat at the hands of the last year's district champs, made sure the Pirates had been in a ballgame.

Prairiland head coach Mike Allen said that after the first quarter the offensive played pretty good...but defensively, he commented "we didn't play good the whole game, not at all...and the kids know it."

Part of the plan, according to Allen, was to keep the ball offensively, which they did pretty well, but "we didn't do a good job stopping them."

Prairiland took the opening kickoff with a touchback. Three plays later Pittsburg was blessed with a high punt, which gave them a first down on the Patriots nine yard line. On the very first play from scrimmage, Pittsburg's number 25 broke loose for six with ten minutes and 22 seconds still in the first quarter. The Pirates tried a two point conversion, to no avail, but there was a flag on the play which gave them a second chance. This time they kicked for the extra point, giving them a seven point lead.

On the next play Prairiland's Mike Connot returned the kickoff all the way for a tie-up TD! The Pats

seemed to have been bitten by the same snake as the Pirates, as their conversion play, on a quarterback sneak by Scott Scudder appeared good, then was recalled by a flag. The Patriots, too, settled for kicking the extra point the second time around.

The next play Prairiland's kickoff went straight up and came down on a Pitt player. Prairiland covered it immediately, however, another flag gave Pittsburg the ball on the Prairiland 44-yard line.

Three plays later, Prairiland was flagged for a late hit, giving Pittsburg a first and ten on the 14-yard line. Three more plays and Pittsburg made it in on a TD with an extra point tacked on.

Pittsburg didn't wait long in adding more points as late in the first quarter they recovered a Patriot fumble on their own 41-yard line, and two plays later zoomed in for six more points, giving them a 14 point lead with a minute and 49 still in the first quarter.

The Patriots rallied late in the second quarter on the fine running of Mike Connot and Tony Duncan. Duncan scored from two yards out, and Brent Franks capped it with the extra point.

The Patriots looked sharp early in the third quarter, too, with the Pirates threatening once more from the Patriot 20, and an alert Patriot,

Travis Vaughn intercepting a Pirate pass on the 12 and returning the ball to the Patriot 21.

Although the Patriots were unable to score on the turnover, it kept a confident Pirate team from scoring again in the third.

Early in the fourth quarter Mike Connot tacked on six more points followed by Frank's extra point, narrowing the Pirate lead to only one touchdown.

A rash of penalties against the Pirates, and some very fast running on the part of the Pirates finished off hopes of a win, however, as Pittsburg added two more touchdowns to their score to bring the final tally to 43-21.

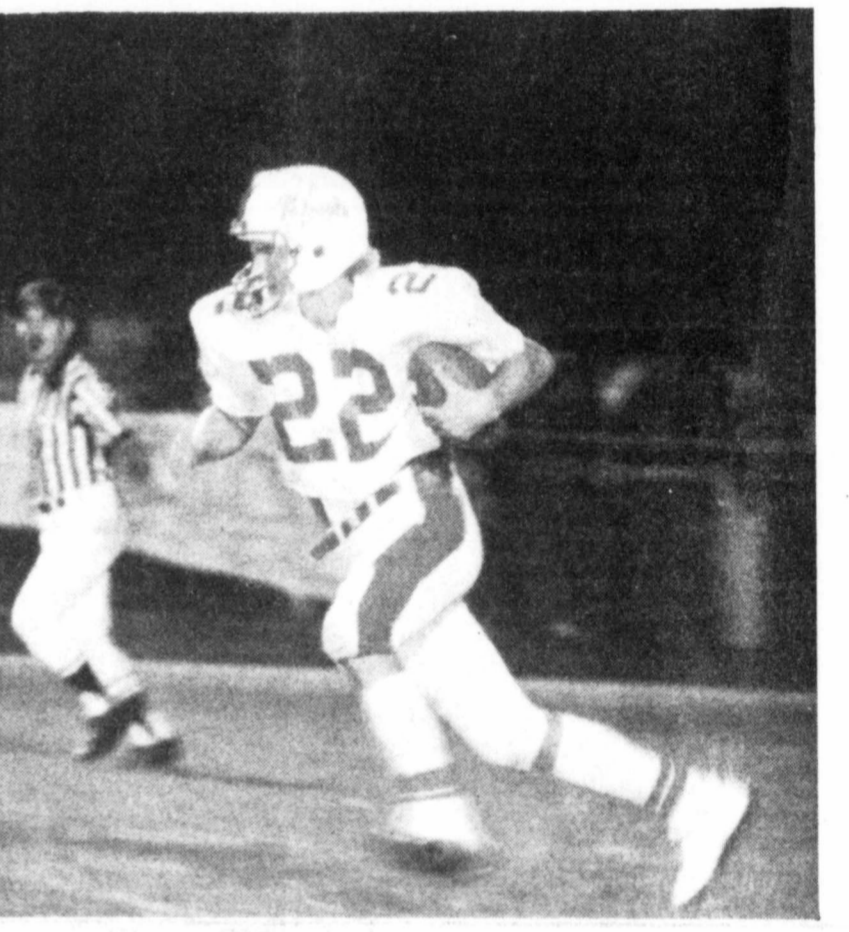
With a 3-1 record so far this season, the Patriots aren't too upset by being defeated by last year's district champs, and are excited about this Friday's game.

Kickoff will be at 8 p.m. at Prairiland against the Clarksville Blue Tigers.

Coach Allen says of the Tigers that "they run the veer, and have an excellent defense. They aren't as fast as Pittsburg, but they are bigger and play their positions better."

Stacy Dillard, a 6 ft., 5 inch, 275 pounder, is a defensive lineman, reputed to be really good.

Allen says "To beat them we are just going to have to control the ball and move it."

## Costs Increase, Tax, Force Subscriptions Up

Due to sales tax on newspaper subscriptions, increases in production costs, and a proposed hefty postage increase in January, the Deport Times, Blossom Times, Bogata News and Talco Times has been forced to go up on its subscription rates.

A sales tax on newspapers, for both newsstands and subscriptions, went into effect on October 1, which

raises the cost of a subscription \$.50 for that alone.

It has been almost three years since there was an increase in subscription rates, and the total amount of the increase will amount to \$2.50 more per YEAR...a very small amount compared to the subscription increases going on in many larger newspapers.

The cost of a subscription in

Lamar, Red River or Titus County will now be \$10.00, in the state of Texas, but out of the above-mentioned counties, \$12.50, and out of the state entirely will be \$15.00.

For the amount of local news, children's photos, area coverage and excellent advertising, the cost for an entire year really isn't much!

## Patriot JV Defeated By Pittsburg

The Patriot JV dropped their record to 2-1 with a 13-0 loss to the Pittsburg Pirates. The Pirates scored quickly after the Patriots were forced to punt early. The Pirate back took a pitch from the quarterback and started around the left end where it appeared that he was going to be brought down by a band of Patriots, but he cut back across the field and rolled 57 yards for a quick 6-0 Pirate lead.

The Patriots got a good drive going in the second quarter by just going up the middle and "grinding meat". The Patriots had driven to the Pitt 22 yard line where they were faced with a fourth and two situation. The Patriots took it right up the middle again and they had the first down but the slick, muddy pigskin squirted loose from the Patriot back and was recovered by a Pitt

defender.

Without much time left in the second quarter, the Pirates were throwing the ball. The first pass was imperfect except that it was to a Patriot defender. Fate just wasn't on the Patriots side though because the wet ball slipped through the hands of the Patriot defensive back. The half ended with Pitt clinging to a 6-0 lead.

In the second half, the game was mostly a mud-slinging battle because due to the past rains, the field was getting sloppy and with the ball being slick, neither team chanced to throw much. The Patriots controlled the ball most of the quarter but could never capitalize and score. But a stiff Patriot defense also held Pitt scoreless through the quarter.

Early in the fourth quarter the Patriots were forced to punt from deep in their own territory. A Pitt

defender sneaked in and blocked the punt giving Pitt great field position. The Pitt quarterback ran up the middle and poor tackling allowed him to get inside the Patriot five yard line where three plays later Pitt bulled over from the six inch line to lead 12-0. After the extra point, Pitt led 13-0.

The Patriots got down and dirty again and were fighting for points but a drive to the Pitt eighteen yard line was stopped when time ran out on the home folks.

Coach Dan Harris said, "We played a hard game. I won't say we played a great game, but we played hard and should have won the game."

The Patriots travel to Clarksville to battle the Blue Tigers Thursday. The freshmen team will start things off at 5:30 p.m. with the JV following immediately afterwards.

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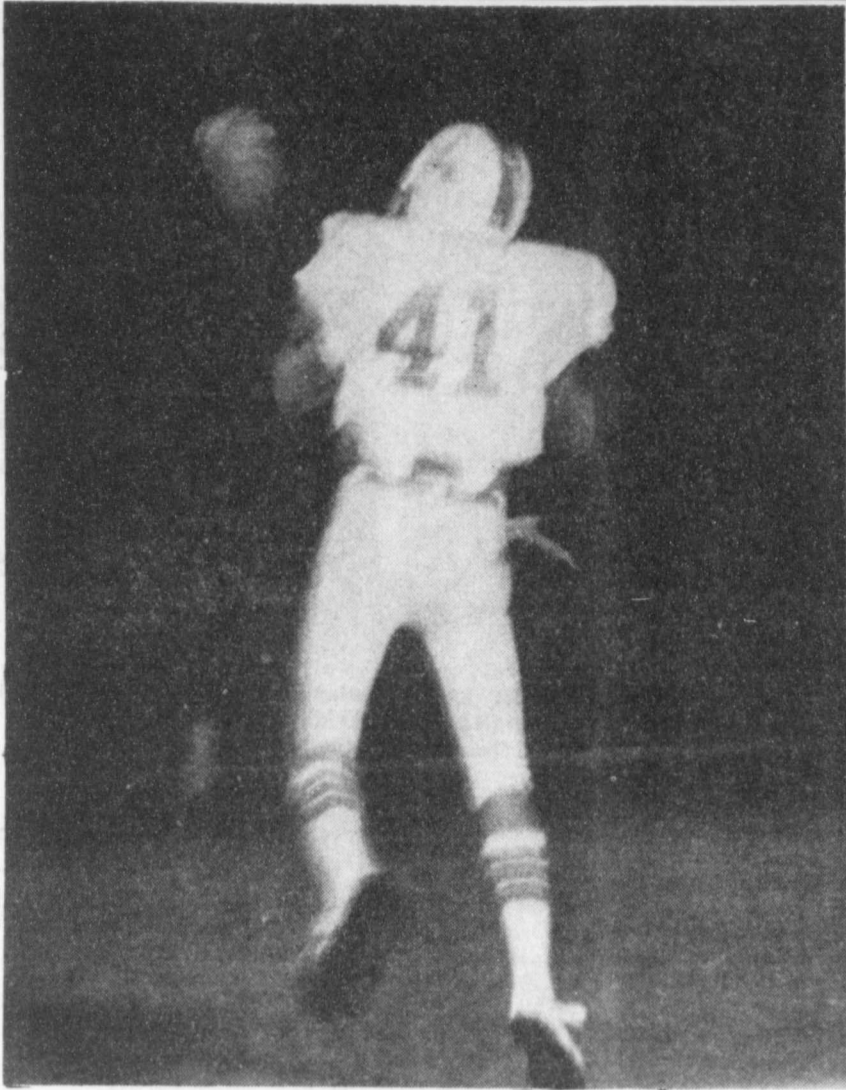

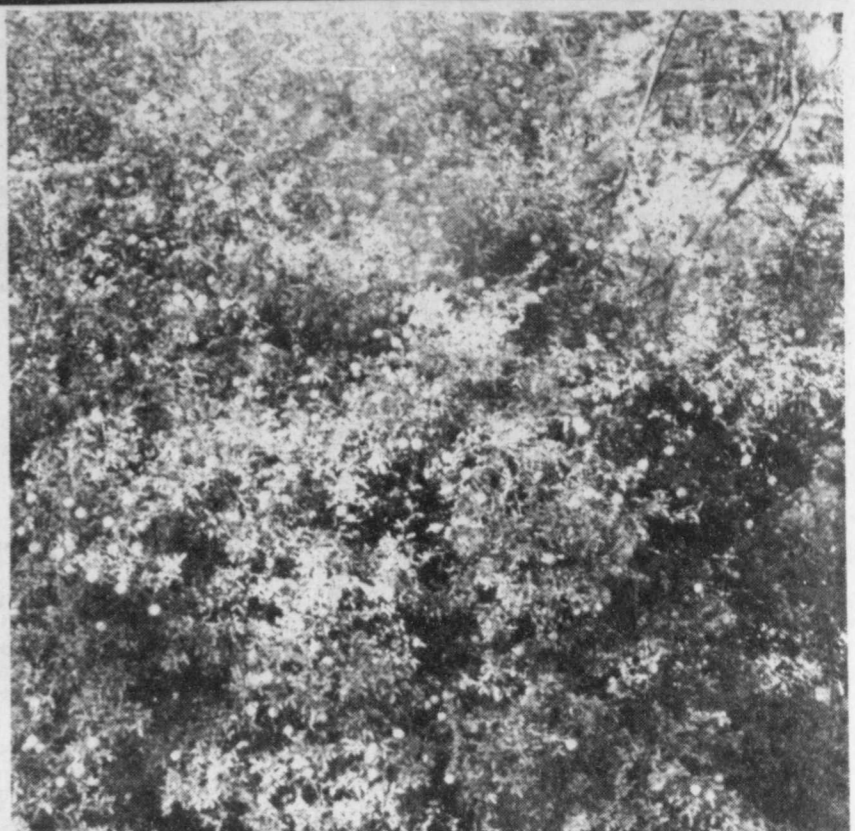
