

# Prairiland Patriots Drop Homecoming Game

strategy worked. Just inside the Patriot territory Mt. Vernon passed for first down on the 30 yard line. On the next play on a QB keeper they ran all the way for six. The PAT also found pay dirt, giving the Tigers the first seven points of the evening's seventeen.

Ladd Davis and Mike Cannot were the mainstay of the Patriot running game, with Quarterback Scott Scudder and Tailback Tony Duncan bursting through now and then also. Late in the first half Robby Cannot

excited the crowd with an excellent kick that backed the tigers up to their six yard line for first and 10. There, Travis Vaughn and Paul Binion and Dennis Rhodes caged the cats until half time.

After half time ceremonies that saw Paula Farmer crowned as queen, and two excellent performances from the Patriot and Mt. Vernon bands, the Tigers and Patriots simply seemed to slide in the mud until late in the third, when Mt.

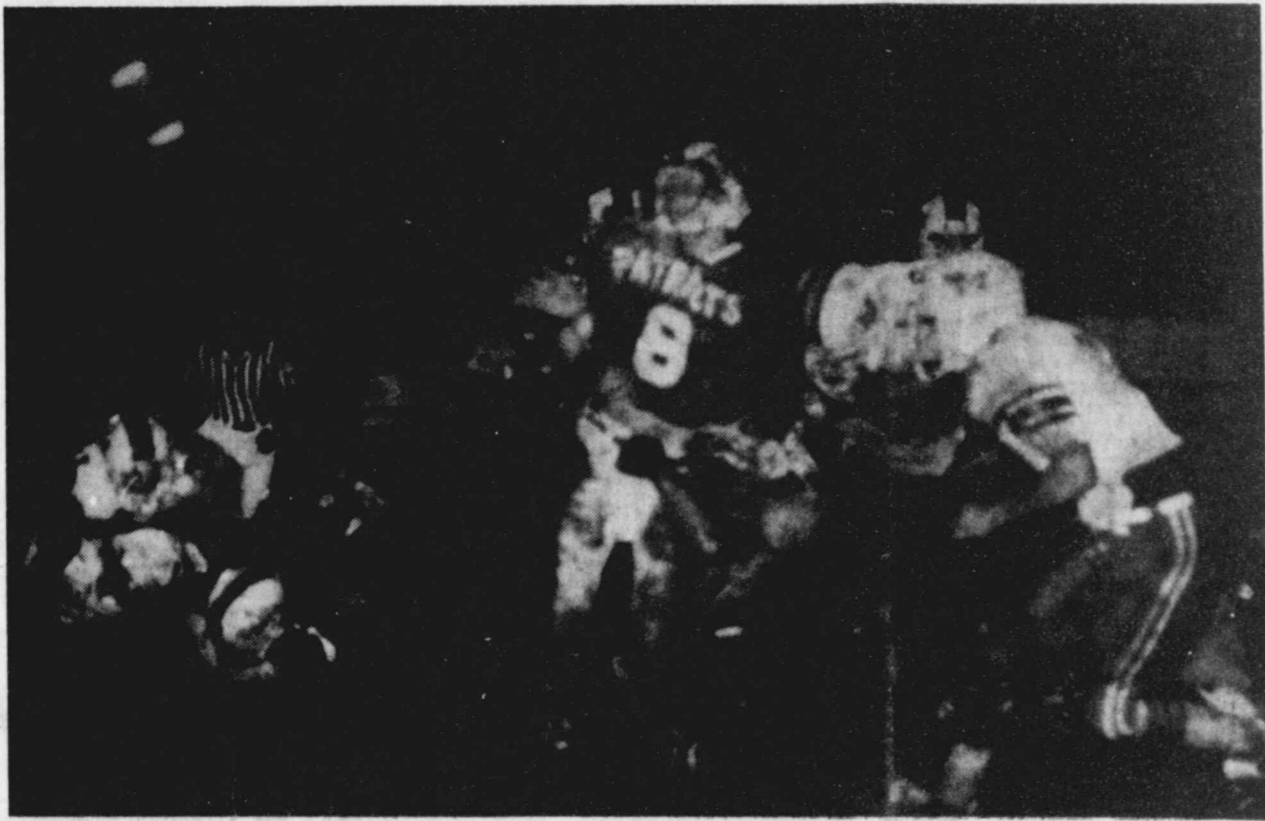

## Local Sales Tax Figures Released

State Comptroller Bob Bullock today sent checks totaling \$58.2 million in local tax payments to the 990 cities that levy the one-percent local sales tax.

"So far this year, these payments are running better than 16 percent ahead of last year, and most Texas cities can expect even bigger checks for the rest of 1984," Bullock said.

Houston received the largest check, \$9.8 million, pushing payments this year up 7 percent to \$117.8 million.

Locally, Blossom's 1984 payments to date total \$9,923.41, for a 12.45 percent increase over 1983.

Deport received \$7,081.88 in payments to date for 1984, marking a 28.75 percent increase over last year's payments of \$5,500.67.

Bogata has received \$16,241.89 in payments to date, compared to \$16,487.36 for last year, marking a 10.64 percent increase.

Talco received a payment of \$2,237.95 for this period, compared to a zero payment for the same period last year, making their yearly total \$19,289.64 for a 12.21 percent increase over the 1983 total of \$17,189.98.

# Agricultural Briefs

Persons planning to use wood to heat their homes this winter should have the wood cut and drying by now. However, if the wood has not been stockpiled, there is still time to get it dry by using solar drying, says Chuck Stayton, forester-wood products for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Stayton says to select a dense wood such as red oak or hickory for best heat efficiency. Stack the wood in an open area and build a frame around the stack of wood. Fasten a sheet of plastic on the frame so that the wood is enclosed except for an opening of about six to 12 inches around the bottom of the plastic. The opening allows air to circulate under the plastic. This method will produce dry wood in approximately 30 to 60 days while normal air drying may take six months to a year.

When buying firewood, be sure of the measurement. A standard cord is 128 cubic feet or 4 feet by 4 feet by 8

feet. Another method of measuring the volume is to multiply the width times the height time the length of the stack of wood and divide the answer by 128. The result will be the number of cords in the stack.

Stayton says that ordinary fireplaces are not economical for heating houses, most of the heat is lost up the chimney. This can be corrected by using a fireplace insert which keeps most of the heat inside. The preferred insert is the catalytic type which has proven very efficient. Many wood burning stoves are also efficient, however, the newer catalytic stoves seem to be the best choice.

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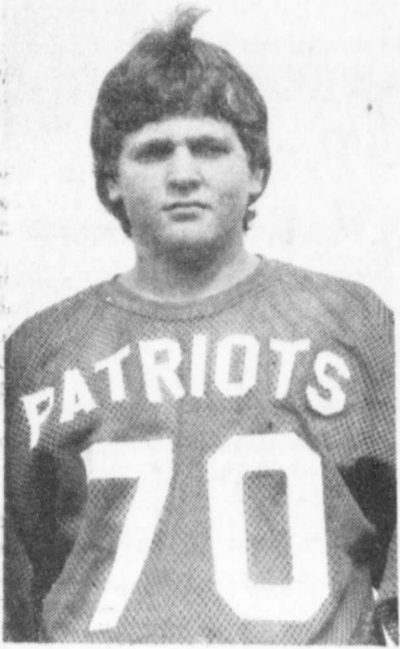

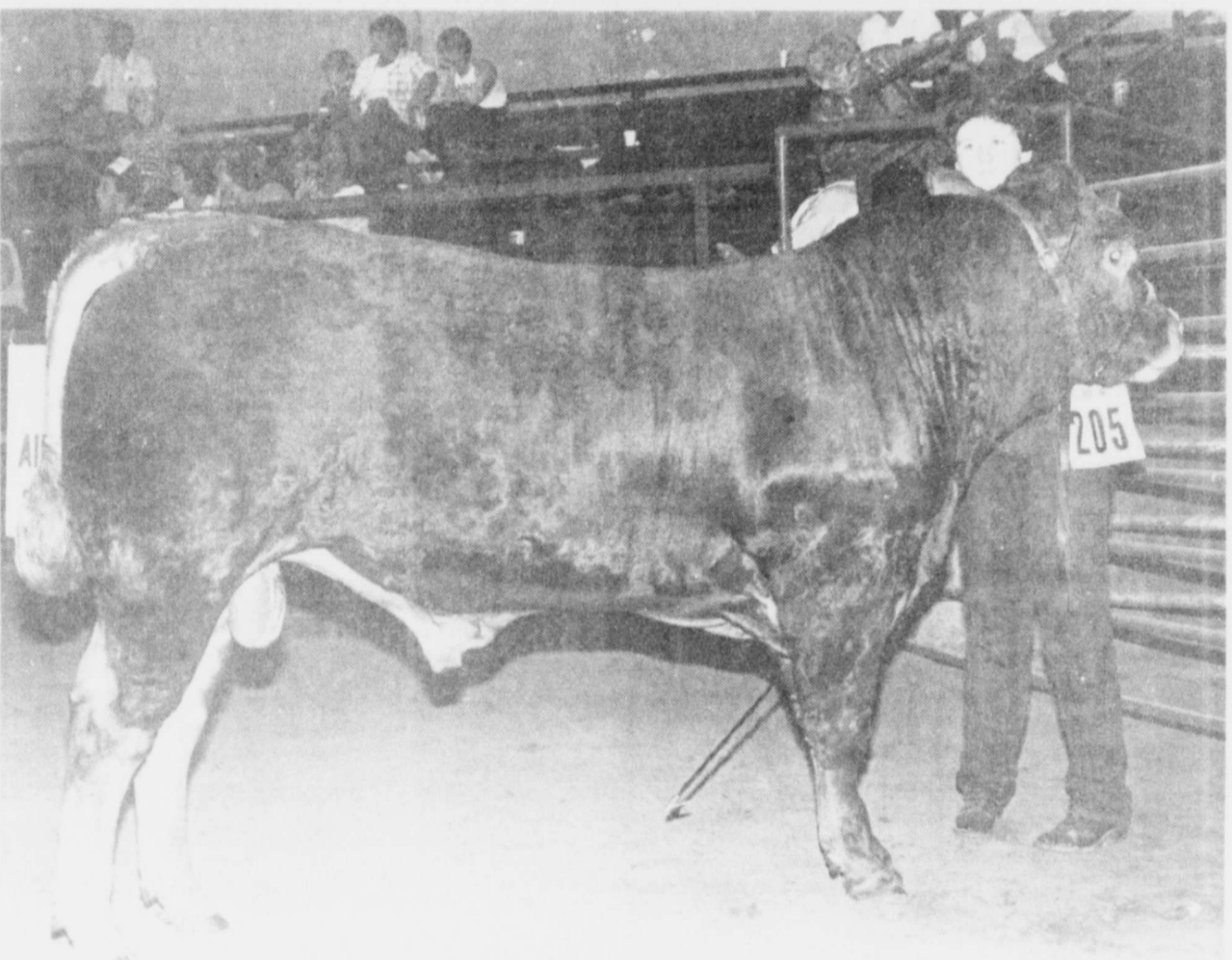

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### More Looks Into The Past

One time, I think it was the summer of 1920, or 1921, Sam Bell, Uncle Charley Barnard, and my father, decided that the three families would to Dalby Springs in south west Bowie County for a vacation. The group consisted of Sam Bell and daughters Reecy and Doris, Charlie Barnard and daughter Lera and sons Harold (Joe) and Homer, and Mack and Maggie Barnard and sons Clifford, Osie, and Ed, and daughter Gladys. Chlor Williams a cousin of the Barnards was also a member.

Dolby Springs at one time had been a thriving Health Spa, with mineral springs flowing water the color of coffee or strong tea. By the time of our visitation the boom days of dolby were long passed, it was a deserted sandy land ghost village in the piney woods. There was one rundown country store in operation. The other buildings and most of the houses were empty and falling down. There were three old vacant and sad looking hotel buildings still standing, it was really a deserted and dilapidated looking place.

Our party with three cars loaded with camping equipment arrived in the afternoon. We soon located a camp site in the shade of some sweet gum trees near a spring where we set up our tents. The older people soon settled down to a routine of drinking the mineral water and relaxing in the quiet park like camp. The kids spent most of their time exploring the old empty houses and hotels. About the third nite in camp a summer thunder shower came up, and there was enough wind to blow some of the tents down. The next day after some discussion it was decided to move into one of the old vacant hotels to be safe from the weather. We would sleep inside, but do our cooking and eating outside near a red water spring in front of the building. Some trash and junk was removed from the dining room and after it was swept out, preparations were made for the beds. The cots for the grown people were located in the center of the big room and the pallets for the kids were placed on each side with the boys on one side and the girls on the other. During the day the boys had fabricated and told some ghost stories about how some people a long time ago had been murdered during a hold up and robbery, and that there had been heard unexplainable noises and seen moving shadows around the old building.

In the afternoon, and without being observed by any one, some of the boys removed the mudchains from the cars and stashed them in the hallway of the third floor. During the evening meal around a camp fire, the ghost situation was discussed by

the children, especially by the boys. Come bed time while the adults were directing the bedding arrangements by the light of a dimly burning oil lantern, Harold, Joe Barnard and I sneaked up to the third floor hall way. We picked the end of a chain in each hand and ran down the two flights of stairs, screaming yelling and rattling chains. When we reached the landing on the ground floor, every one had left the big dining room. We saw the last one as he dived through an open window. While we were laughing and surveying the empty room, I felt some one grab my arm and spin me around. It was Dad and Uncle Charlie. When they got through with, us we didn't see any more ghost apparitions.
