

Prairiland Patriots Fall To Dekalb Bears 21-6

 After hunting a long line of tough, assorted Tigers, the Prairiland Patriots traveled to DeKalb last Friday to take on even tougher Bears.

Luck, and skill was on the side of the Bears, and mistakes seemed to loom over the Patriots with ghostly persistence.

In the first quarter, the Patriots and Bears both seemed unable to move the ball on the ground, and

tumbles were a problem for both teams.

The Patriots fumbled twice and the Bears three times, but the points on the boards were hard to come by until in the second quarter when DeKalb's Michael White dashed half the length of the field for the first points of the evening.

The point after attempt was good, giving the Bears a 7-0 lead.

Mike Connot and Scott Scudder gave the Patriots most of their

yardage of the night, grinding away on the ground, but the aerial game just wasn't very successful.

The half ended, 7-0, but in the third quarter the Bears scored twice more, finishing off the Patriot's chance of winning the game.

The Prairiland boys scored half-way through the fourth quarter on a series of good plays and some penalties thrown in for extra measure.

On the Bear's kickoff to the

Patriots' special team, Mike Connot was tackled after calling for fair catch, giving the Pats a first and ten on their own 35-yard line.

Two running plays later, quarterback Scott Scudder was roughed on a pass play to Jay Ingram, giving the Pats another first and ten on DeKalb's 48-yard line.

From there, Mike Connot broke loose for a spring down to the Bears' 10.

On the next play, Connot made it to

the one yard line, and the next two plays the Bears really got tough and held the Patriots to just inches from six points. But on the third down, Connot would no longer be denied, as he bounded over for the score.

Scott Scudder ran the two point conversion, which appeared good, but the men in the zebra stripes said "no."


The Patriots never gave up trying, coming right back with an onside kick, but once more luck was with

the Bears, and the attempt failed.

The Prairiland defense held the Bears to three plays and a punt, and Prairiland took over on their own 18-yard line, but were unable to overcome the mistakes in the first part of the game, settling for a 21 to 6 loss.

The Patriots played a good game, but bad luck and mistakes cost them.

They will play Paul Pewitt this Friday night at Patriot stadium, and fans are urged to come out and cheer these tough, determined boys on.

Patriot JV "Muds" Through Game

 Picture this scene: It is wet, very muddy, a low fog hangs overhead as 22 unidentifiable creatures participate in some kind of battle. No this isn't a scene from a Steven Spielberg horror film. The setting is Patriot stadium, the "creatures" are the two teams, Prairiland and DeKalb, the battle, a hard-nosed football game.

The Patriots took first possession and marched downfield on the muddy, slick turf. The drive was stalled on the 12-yard line. Things got worse and the Patriots had more to worry about than a little mud. On the first play from scrimmage, DeKalb scored on an 88-yard run around the end. The conversion attempt failed and the Patriots trailed 6-0.

That lead lasted until the second quarter when the Patriots took it to

the Bears defense and drove right at them and right up the field, the drive was capped off by a three yard touchdown by Craig Burns. The score stood at 6-6 going into the second half.

The Patriots grinded away in the now total mud, no grass field, but another drive ended short on the Bear 22-yard line. After knocking the Bears for a loss on the first play, the Bear running back broke loose again for another 80+ yard TD run. The extra point attempt again failed and the Patriots trailed 12-6.

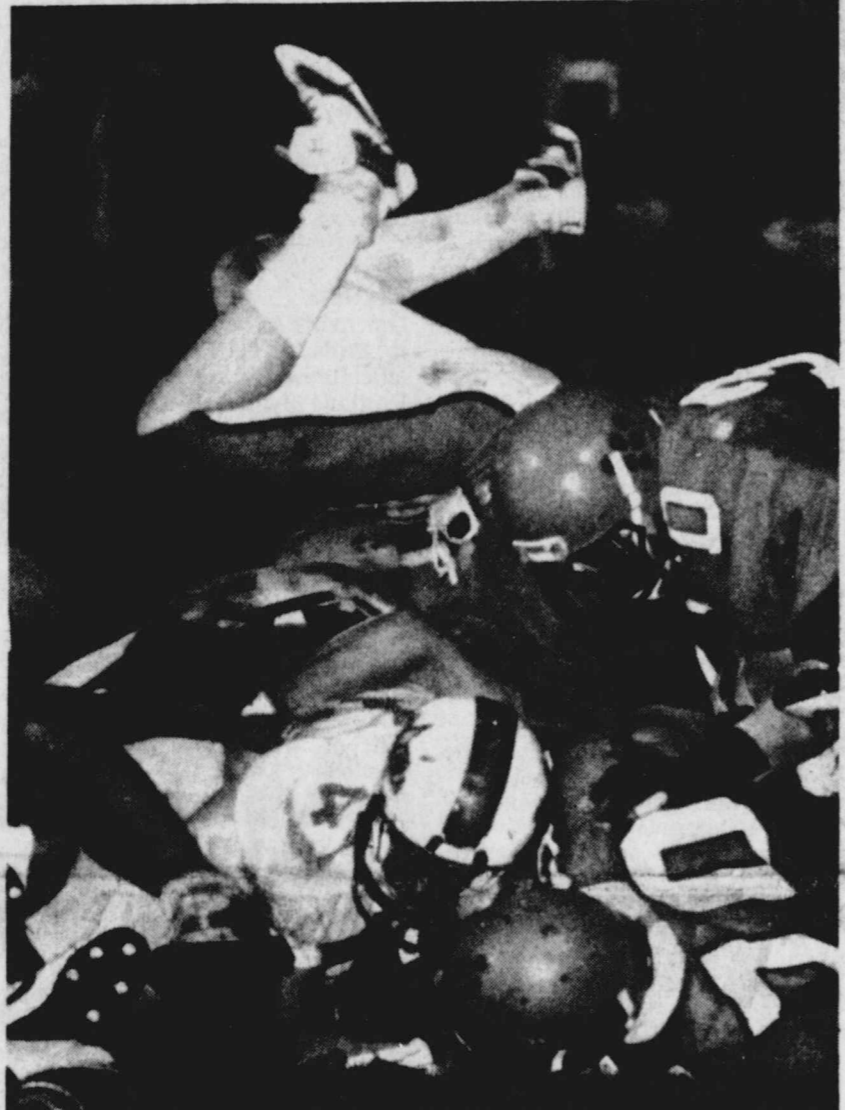
The Patriots held the Bears to nearly zero yards for the rest of the game. The Bears were faced with a fourth and long on their own six yard line. The Patriots were fired up for another chance at the ball but with less than two minutes left in the game, rather than take a chance on

having a punt blocked, the Bears took an intentional safety.

Trailing 12-8 with under 1:30 left in the game, the Patriots were forced to abandon their running game. After a reverse for three or four yards, a sweep for no yards, and two incomplete passes, the Patriots could only watch as the Bears sat on the ball and ran out the clock.

The team feeling after the game was that the scoreboard didn't reflect the true story of the game. The two long runs were practically all of the Bears offense, but nonetheless, a loss still went down in the books for the Patriots.

The next game will be at Paul Pewitt under hopefully better playing conditions, even though it couldn't get much worse. The game time is uncertain because Pewitt doesn't have a freshman team.

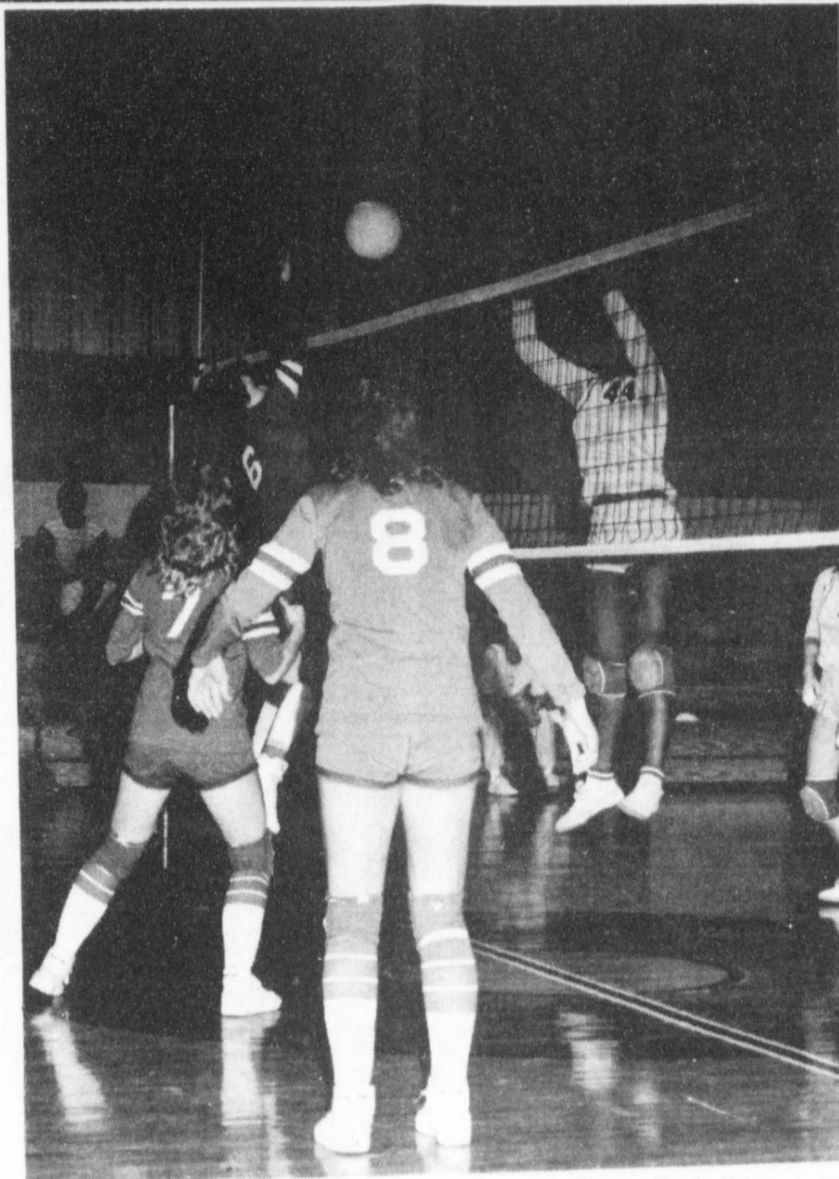
JV Pats Defeated

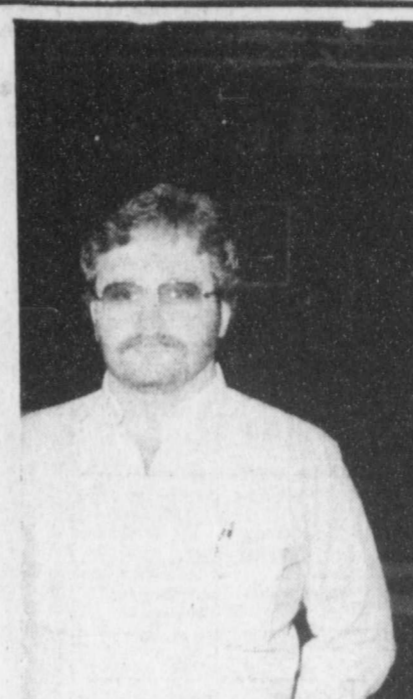

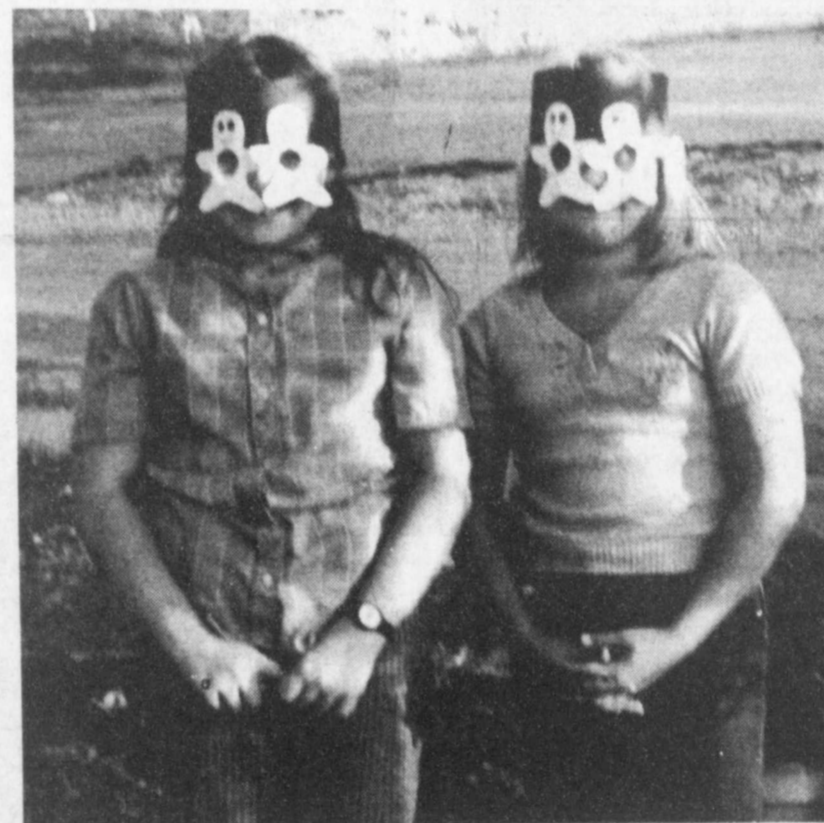

Bro. James Hensley of Reno, formerly of Texarkana, filled the pulpit at the Pattonville Baptist Church Sunday Mornign and Sunday night.

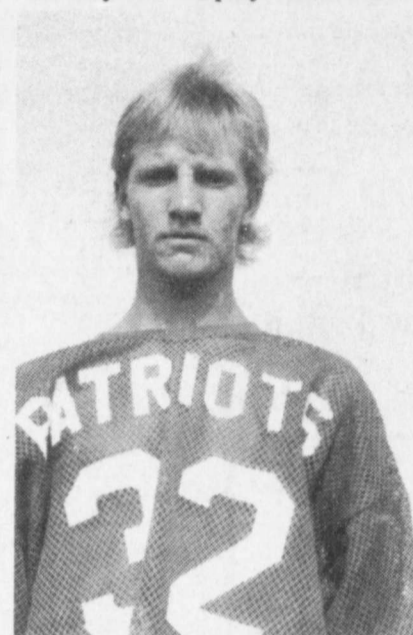

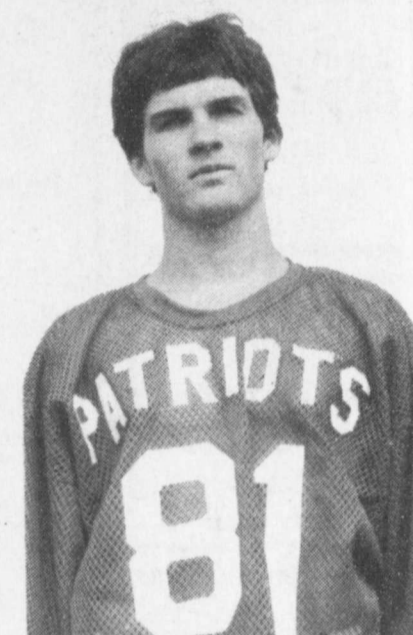

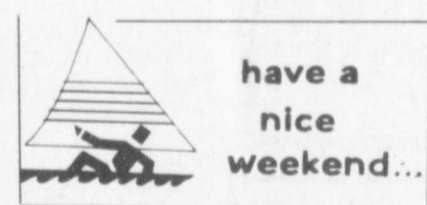
Quantities are limited. Only one pack per teacher, group or organization will be distributed.

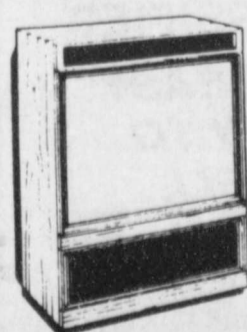

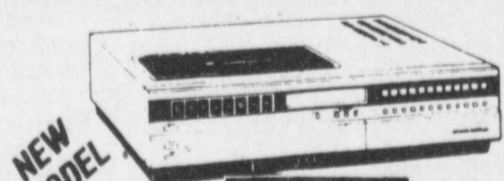
