

# Few Surprises But Heavy Election Turnout

There were few surprises on a nation-wide, state-wide or local level in the 1984 elections, as the Reagan-Bush ticket took its predicted sweep of the nation for an overwhelming victory for the presidency. Republican Phil Gramm soundly defeated Lloyd Doggett for retiring

U.S. Senator John Tower's seat, and after that the democrats took all other contested races on a local level.

In Lamar County, as throughout most of the state, there was a heavy voter turnout, with a 63 percent of the registered voters casting ballots.

Total votes cast for the presidential tickets were 14,971 in the county.

In Blossom, box 408, 513 votes were cast. In the South Blossom Box, 106, 261 were cast. Cunningham had 87 voting, and Pattonville 253.

Deport had a total of 325 casting their ballots.

Six of the eight Texas amendments seem passed, the two being voted down being Proposition 6, which would have allowed public subdivisions such as cities or school districts, to buy insurance from mutual insurance companies, and

Proposition 8, which would have increased the daily allowance paid to state legislators.

In Lamar County there were 7,068 votes cast for the College Funding amendments, and 5,146 against.

The county went with the rest of the state on the two failed amendments, voting 3,252 for, and 8,343

against the amendment which would have increased the Legislative Per Diem, and 3,549 for and 8,007 against the insurance proposition.

Jim Parker will be the new sheriff, and the commissioners and constable's races on a local level were also uncontested.

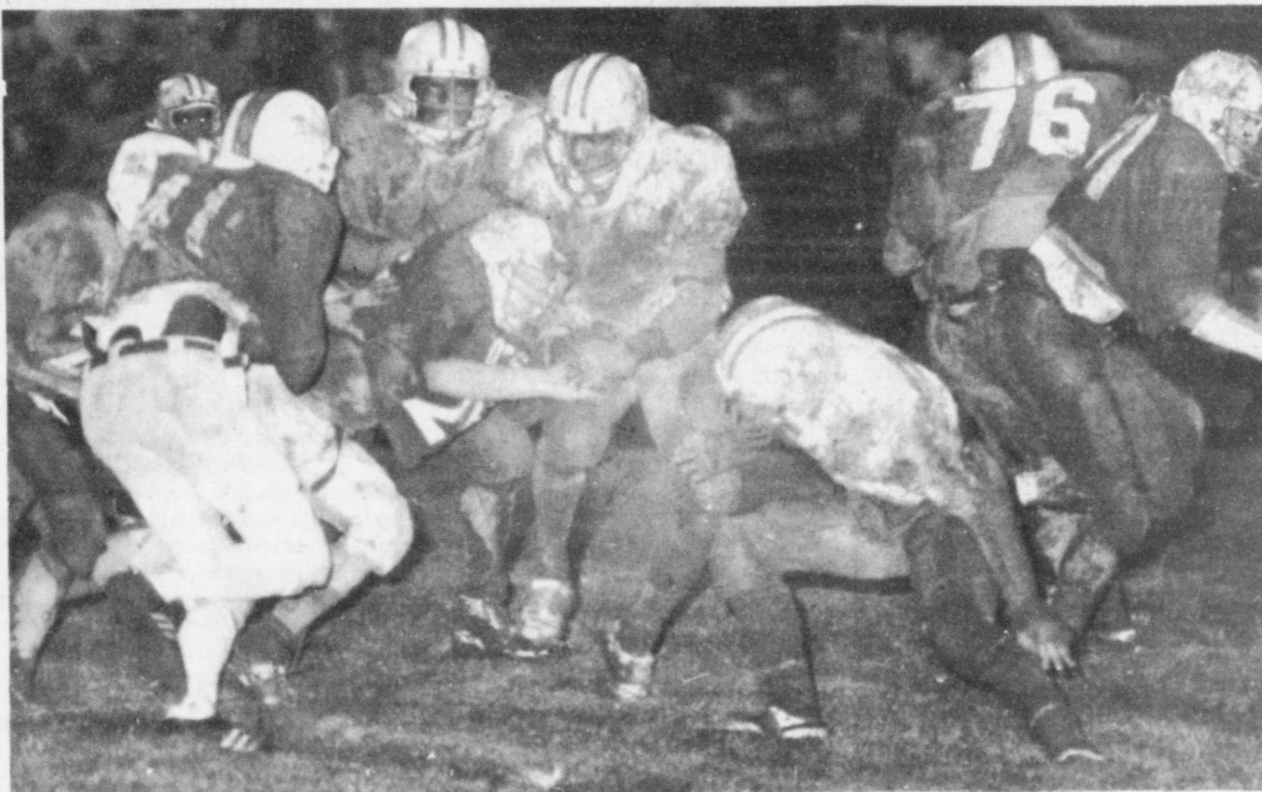

## Patriots Defeated By Paul Pewitt

Another cold, wet and muddy night was the situation at Patriot Stadium last Friday night, and a bruised, battered and weary Patriot team left the field with a 28-0 defeat at the hands of the Paul Pewitt Brahmas.

In first quarter action, both teams were penalized for delay of game, offsides and exchanged possessions of the ball on pass interceptions.

Both teams were still empty of points until late in the second quarter.

With just under two minutes in the first half, Paul Pewitt was awarded a fumble on their own 15-yard line.

Three running plays later the Brahmas were called for delay of game and faced a fourth and five situation, when Prairiland was called for offsides, giving the Brahmas a first and ten.

On the next down, the Patriots were called for holding, facemask, giving the Brahmas another first and ten on the Patriot 45.

The Pewitt quarterback found unprotected turf on the next play, and sprinted all the way for the first score of the evening.

The two point conversion was good and the half ended 8-0.

Three plays into the third quarter, Paul Pewitt's Marcel Lewis raced all the way from the Pewitt 40-yard line for six more, followed by another successful conversion.

The Patriots were visited briefly by Lady Luck on the next series of downs, but then the Brahmas took over after the Prairiland team was forced to punt.

Again the Brahma quarterback dropped back for a pass, which connected, and the receiver raced all the way for an apparent TD. That score was called back due to a

holding call, however.

The Patriot defense came together to force the Brahmas to punt, giving the Pats a first and ten at mid-field.

The offense moved the ball down to the Pewitt 35, but fumbled in the sour black mud and the Brahmas came up with the ball to keep it until the third quarter ended.

At the beginning of the fourth quarter, Paul Pewitt was at second and ten on the Patriot 15-yard line with the quarterback taking to the air again, this time to his own receiver, waiting in the endzone for yet another score.

The conversion failed, but the score had risen to 22-0.

The struggling Patriots were turned back again on their next possession as the Brahmas intercepted a Scudder pass to take over on the Patriot 22.

Two plays later yet another holding penalty gave the Brahmas a first on the 10-yard line, and on the next play, the Brahma quarterback called his own number and raced in for the final score of the game.

With just over three minutes in the game, Patriot Paul Binion recovered a Pewitt fumble on their own 31-yard line, but the Patriots gave the ball up only two plays later with a fumble of their own.

The Brahmas had no trouble exhausting the clock from there.

Head Coach Mike Allen says that this Friday night's final game of the season, against North Lamar, on the Panthers home turf, will be exciting.

"North Lamar is better than their record shows. They only have one win, but they are tough."

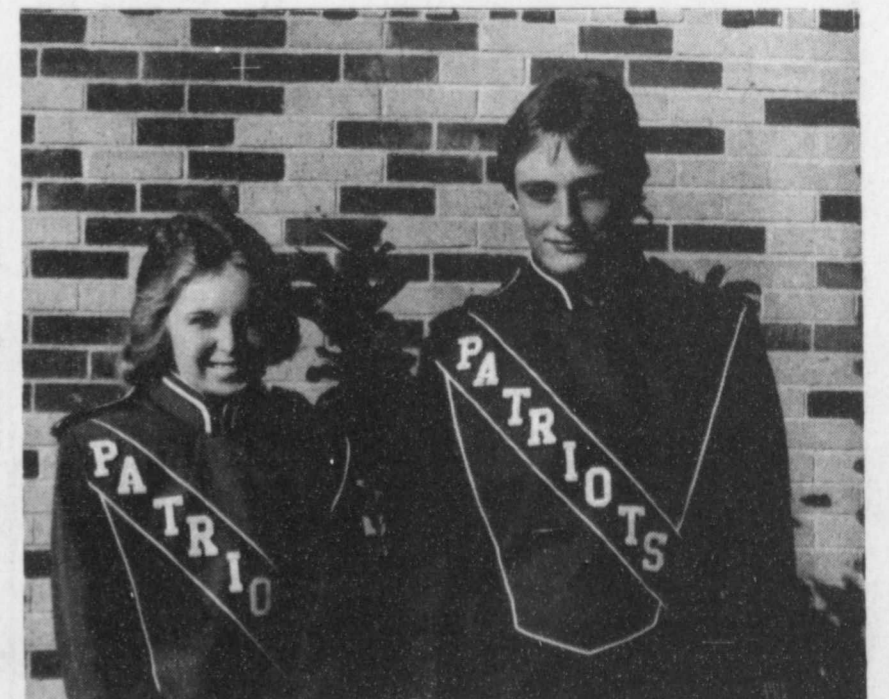
The Patriots, too, are capable of better ball than their record shows, so come out for the final game this Friday.

## Effective Date On Bangs Vaccination Is November 5

By Paul D. Payne

November 5 was the effective date for the new bangs vaccination regulation. If you still have questions on the new proposal, give us a call.

Many individuals in the area plant a row or two of sweet potatoes each year and are presently facing a problem of digging their crop in muddy conditions. This condition reminds me of the fall when I was nine years old and my dad had 75 acres of yams and it was about as muddy as it is this fall.

This year's potatoes will have a higher moisture content and could require more time to cure. Under normal conditions, yams are cured for seven to 14 days at 85 degrees and high humidity. Maintain these conditions until you are certain the skin is well cured.

While on the subject of sweet potatoes, there is a new variety that will be available in the future by the name of "Regal." According to available information, Regal has yielded very good and has excellent baking flavor. It has a brilliant purplish-red skin which retains an attractive dark red color in storage. It is questionable that it is an improvement over the Jewell variety.

"Topaz" is another new variety that was released this year. It has a copper skin, brilliant orange flesh and excellent yields and quality.

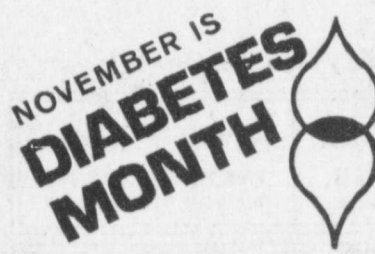

### Farmers Home Assists 7,283 Texas Farmers

The Farmers Home Administration assisted 7,283 farmers and ranchers in Texas through farm loans during the 1984 fiscal year, State FmHA Director J. Lynn Futch, reported recently.

The loans, totaling \$337,378,859, were made under programs to assist with farm ownership and operation, natural disaster, economic emergencies and soil and water projects, Futch said.

"Most farmers never have it easy but this has been a particularly difficult year for them," Futch said. "The loan programs of the Farmers Home Administration make it

possible for many farmers who cannot get credit elsewhere to continue operating."

For the 12 months ending September 30, the breakdown on loans in the state is as follows:

- Operating loans, 5,319 loans totaling \$199,998,019
  - Ownership loans, 238 totaling \$21,612,950
  - Disaster emergency loans, 1,372 loans totaling \$69,725,820
  - Economic emergency loans, 284 loans totaling \$44,117,510
  - Soil and water loans, 70 loans totaling \$1,924,560
- Nationally, preliminary figures

show FmHA provided 110,245 farm loans totaling \$4.4 billion during the fiscal year, Futch said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It provides loan assistance to farmers and ranchers who need credit but cannot obtain it from private lenders. All loans must be repaid in full, plus interest.

In Lamar County during the 1984 fiscal year, FmHA provided \$2,026 million to 65 borrowers with farm loans, County Supervisor Joe Wishard said.

The loans totaled \$2,026,770 during the 12 months ending September 30.

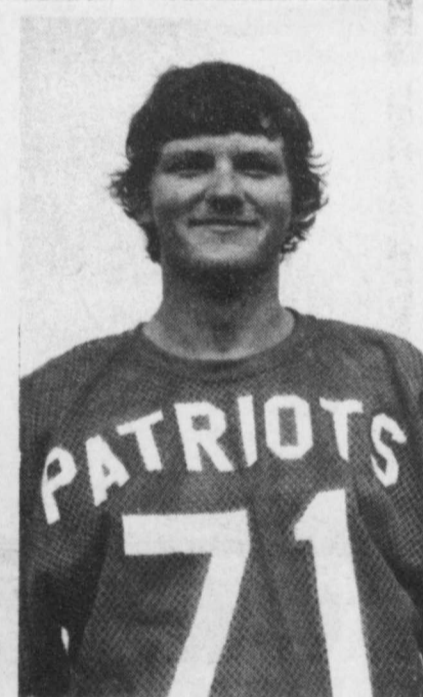

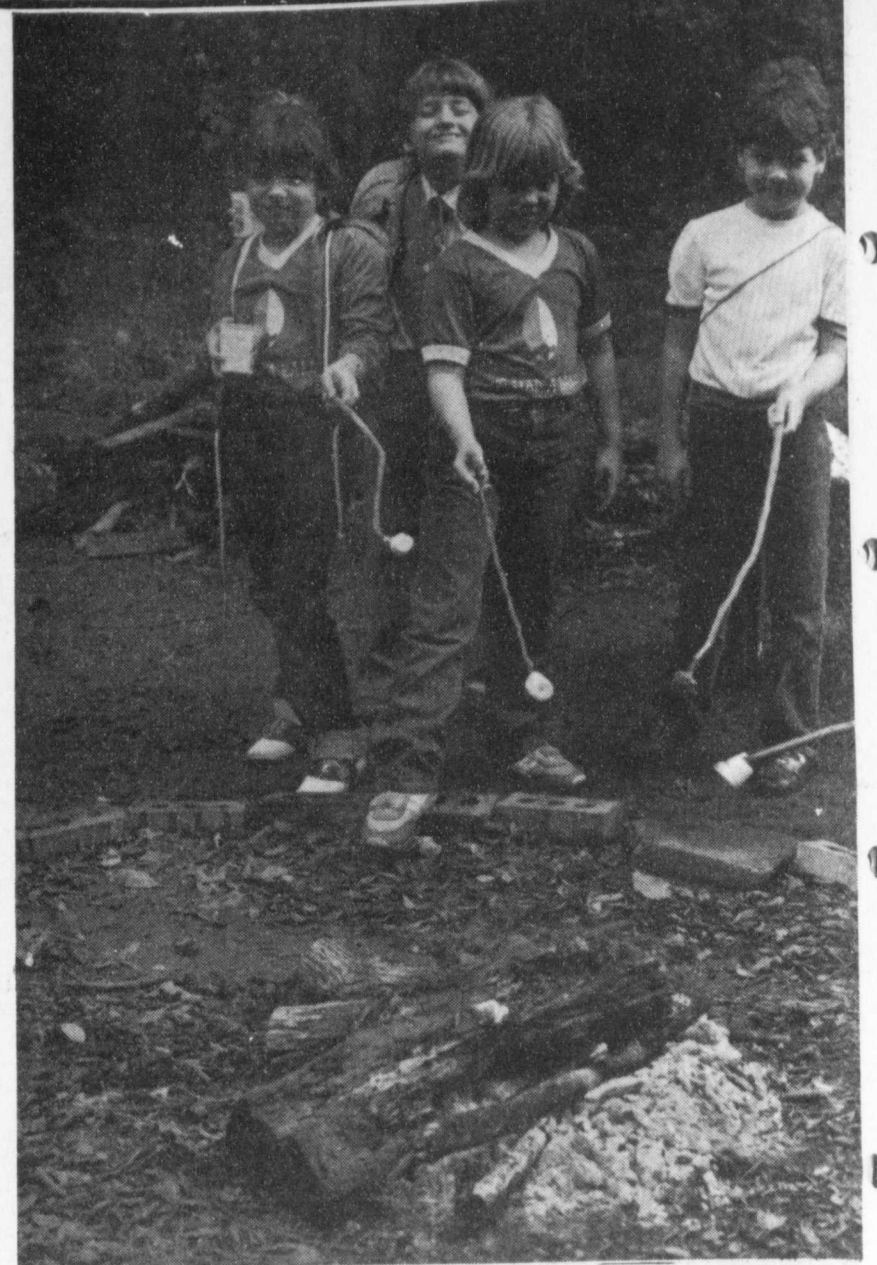

## Deport Girl Scouts Have Fire Safety Fun

Fire Safety Fun, a special event for Brownie Girl Scouts, was held recently by the Red River Valley Girl Scout Council at Camp Gambill near Paris. It was similar to an event held earlier in the month for Junior Girl Scouts. The day long event was attended by 170 girls and adults from within the Council's 13-county jurisdiction.

Attending the event from Deport was Troop 74 and their leader Sherry Denison.

Fire safety measures were presented to the Brownies in an entertaining and informative manner, according to the Program Coordinator for the Council, Gaylon Holliday. One of the activities included trying on various pieces of equipment worn by firemen responding to a fire. Members of the Paris Volunteer Fire Department demonstrated the use of the equipment and encouraged the girls not to be frightened. Statistics have shown that many children will hide from firemen attempting to rescue them, out of fear of their strange-looking equipment, resulting in serious injury or loss of life.
