

Farmers Don't Get Much Of Food Dollar

Figures released by the American Farm Bureau Federation should cause consumers to stop and think! Whether one is directly in contact with agriculture...and few people in this area are unfamiliar with it, or if food is only something that is found packaged on a supermarket shelf, these figures are startling, and discouraging to the farmer.

The AFBF says that marketing costs are where our food dollar goes. Seventy-three cents of each consumer food dollar goes to marketing! The biggest portion, 33 percent, goes for labor costs, while the remaining 40 cents covers a multitude of marketing charges from advertising to transportation. Largest among the marketing charges are packaging,

taking around eight cents of each dollar, about five cents for inter-city transportation. Energy, rent and depreciation costs about four more cents of each food dollar, while before-tax profits earned 4.5 cents. Advertising, taxes, insurance, professional services, promotion, bad debts and miscellaneous items

are lumped under other costs, and take about 2.5 cents. Broken down into different classes of food, variations appear, largely because of how much, or little, processing is required between the farm and the table. A one pound loaf of bread had an average retail price in 1983 of 54.2

cents. Its farm value was only slightly more than a nickel, with the wheat used to make that loaf of bread worth only 4.3 cents to the farmer! Animal products such as beef, broilers, pork, milk and eggs ranged around half as much farm value as retail price, some less, and some a

little more than fifty percent. Fruits and vegetables stand close to farm values by a little more than one-third of the retail price. A 10-pound bag of potatoes selling for 162 cents had a farm value of only 62.9 cents.

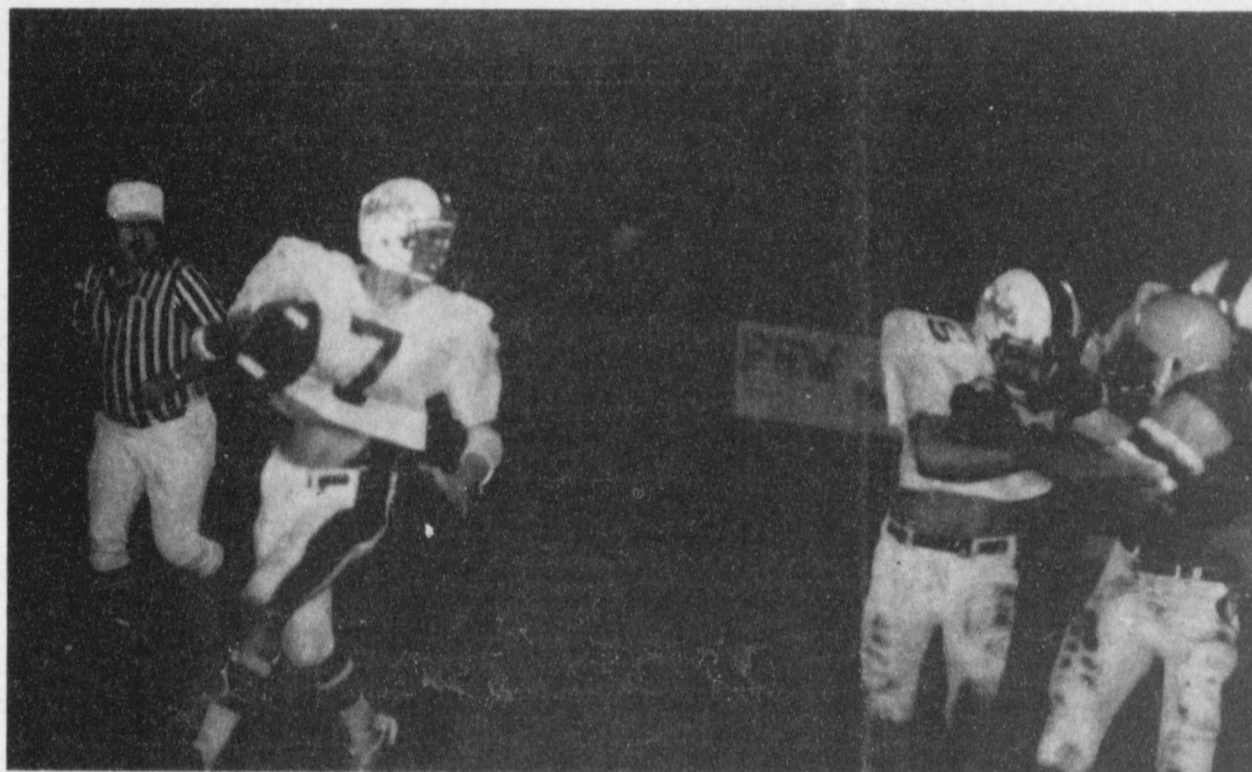

Patriots Drop Game To North Lamar 21 - 7

It was billed as the "Superbowl of Lamar County" as the Prairiland Patriots took on the North Lamar Panthers at R.L. Maddox stadium Friday, losing 21-7 in a race for the cellar.

Mistakes once again seemed to be as much the enemy as the opposing team.

Head coach Mike Allen said that "Our record wasn't much better this season, but we played more games, against tougher teams, and didn't really get beat except by Daingerfield, who tears up everybody."

"Mistakes killed us," he continued, "we fumbled on first down, goal to go, fumbled the ball on the three yard line, etc., etc."

The Patriots won the toss and Larry Weddle returned the kick off from Panther Joe Moore back to the Patriot 43 yard line, leaving the Patriots with good field position. Ladd Davis picked up six yards, but the Patriots were called for delay of game.

It seemed to set the trend for the evening.

On a well-mixed series of plays from Ladd Davis, Mike Connot and quarterback Scott Scudder, the Patriots moved down deep into Panther territory. Faced with fourth down and 4, a good pass play was wiped out with an illegal man downfield for the Patriots, giving North Lamar a first and ten on their own 20-yard line.

The Panthers didn't fail to cash in on the Patriot turnover, as they marched right back downfield on a series of runs and passes until their quarterback, Craig Jones, zipped in from the 7 to give the Panthers their first score of the night. The P.A.T. gave them a 7-0 lead.

Late in the first half, the Patriots moved down to the Panther three yard line on the running of Ladd Davis, Mike Connot and Scott Scudder, but the Pats were unable to hold onto the ball, fumbling it away to the Panthers.

The Patriot defense had one minute and six seconds on the clock, but held the Panthers and forced a punt with 32 seconds left.

The Patriots took over on their own 42, and Scudder passed to Jon Loyd

for a good gain, then to Connot for a first and 10, at the Panther 35.

Excitement was high as it appeared the Patriots might tie the game at the half, but two incomplete passes later, the clock lost patience and sent both teams inside for the half.

The third quarter started with the Patriots kicking off to the Panthers. The North Lamar team took over on their own 35. Two plays later, a Panther fumble set the Patriots up for their touchdown.

Taking the ball on the Panther 37, the Patriots ran Ladd Davis for a short gain, then, on third and five, Scott Scudder fired off a bullet to Robby Connot, who ran the ball on in. Brent Franks kicked the extra point, tying the game at 7 all.

The Panthers came storming right back, as their quarterback scored with five minutes 36 in the third quarter.

The Patriots were able to move the ball against the Panthers, but twice more in the game they turned the ball over inside the North Lamar 25-yard line.

On the other hand, the Panthers were able to capitalize on the Patriot mistakes and tacked on two more TD's for the night.

The final blow came as the Patriots were faced with a punt situation at the beginning of the fourth. Ronnie Bridges ploughed through the Patriot line, blocked the punt, scooped up the ball and raced untouched for the final touchdown of the game.

Neither team was able to muster another successful attack in the game. The Panthers earned the braying right to victory in the "Superbowl".

Head coach Mike Allen said that he would "die thinking Prairiland should have won that game."

On a positive note, Allen says that he is "already ready for next year." He says that it was his first year, and he learned a lot. His entire backfield will return, and he says that there are lots of good kids who will be staying, plus some more good ones coming up from the junior varsity.

"We'll have a good team next year," Allen smiled.

Sales Tax Figures Released

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday sent checks totaling \$99.5 million in local tax payments to the 985 cities that levy the one-percent local sales tax.

"So far this year, we've sent 13 percent more money to these cities than we did last year," Bullock said. "And they can expect another increase next month as we begin sending them receipts we collect for the new items and services that became taxable October 2. We'll be getting this extra money later in November and sending it to the city halls in December."

Houston's check was the largest, \$16.9 million. Dallas received \$11.4 million.

November checks represent taxes collected on sales made in Sep-

tember and the third quarter and reported to the Comptroller by October 20.

Locally, Blossom received \$1,441.60 for a \$11,365.01 total to date, marking a 2.26 percent decrease from last year.

Deport received \$1,537.67, a 12.66 percent increase, with the yearly total being \$8,619.55, compared to \$7,650.73 last year.

Bogata received \$2,781.24, a 4.62 percent decrease from 1983, for a yearly total of \$21,023.13, compared to \$22,041.72 last year.

Talco received \$4,342.60 for this period, bringing the 1984 total to \$21,873.49, compared to \$21,532.58 for the same period in 1983, making a 1.58 percent increase.

Time Running Out For Hay

Those producers who did not get their final cutting of hay during recent warm, dry weather may be

faced with the possibility of a frost before the hay can be harvested. Quality can decrease rapidly if the standing forage is hit by a frost.

According to Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr. quality will stay in the forage for 10 days to two weeks following a dry frost and dry weather. The hay will turn brown, but color is not an accurate measure of quality.

A freeze breaks open the cells in the plant, therefore, with rain, the nutrients leach out of the plant, Reeves said.

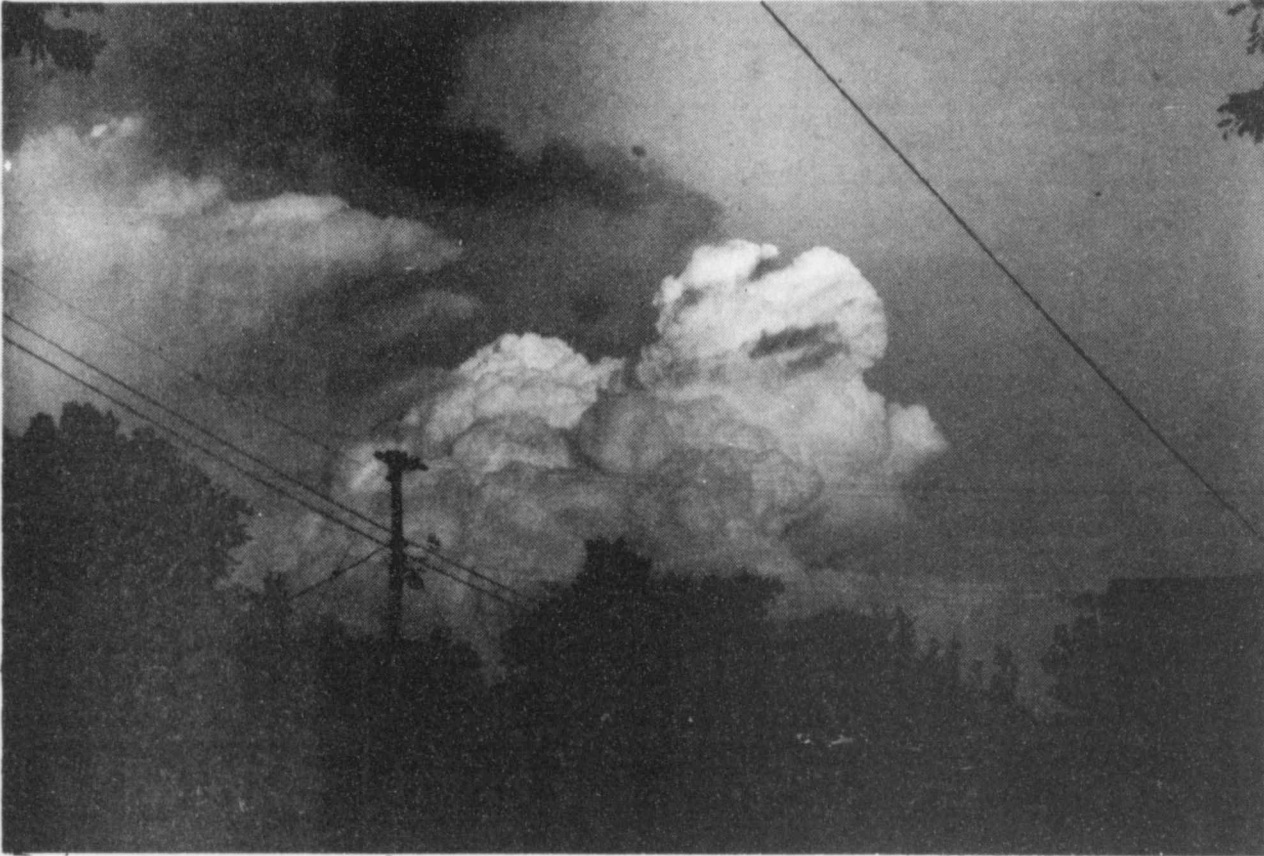

Local member of the Show Choir is Mark Gray of Blossom.

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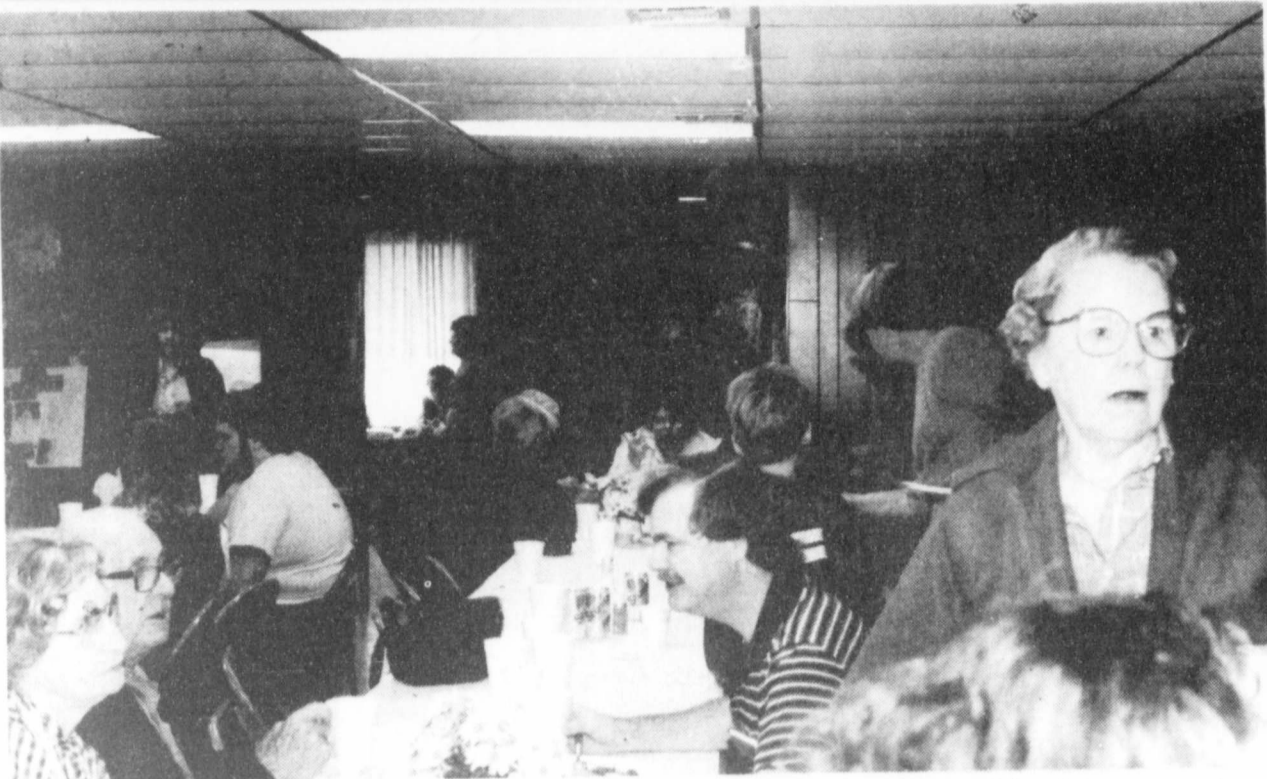
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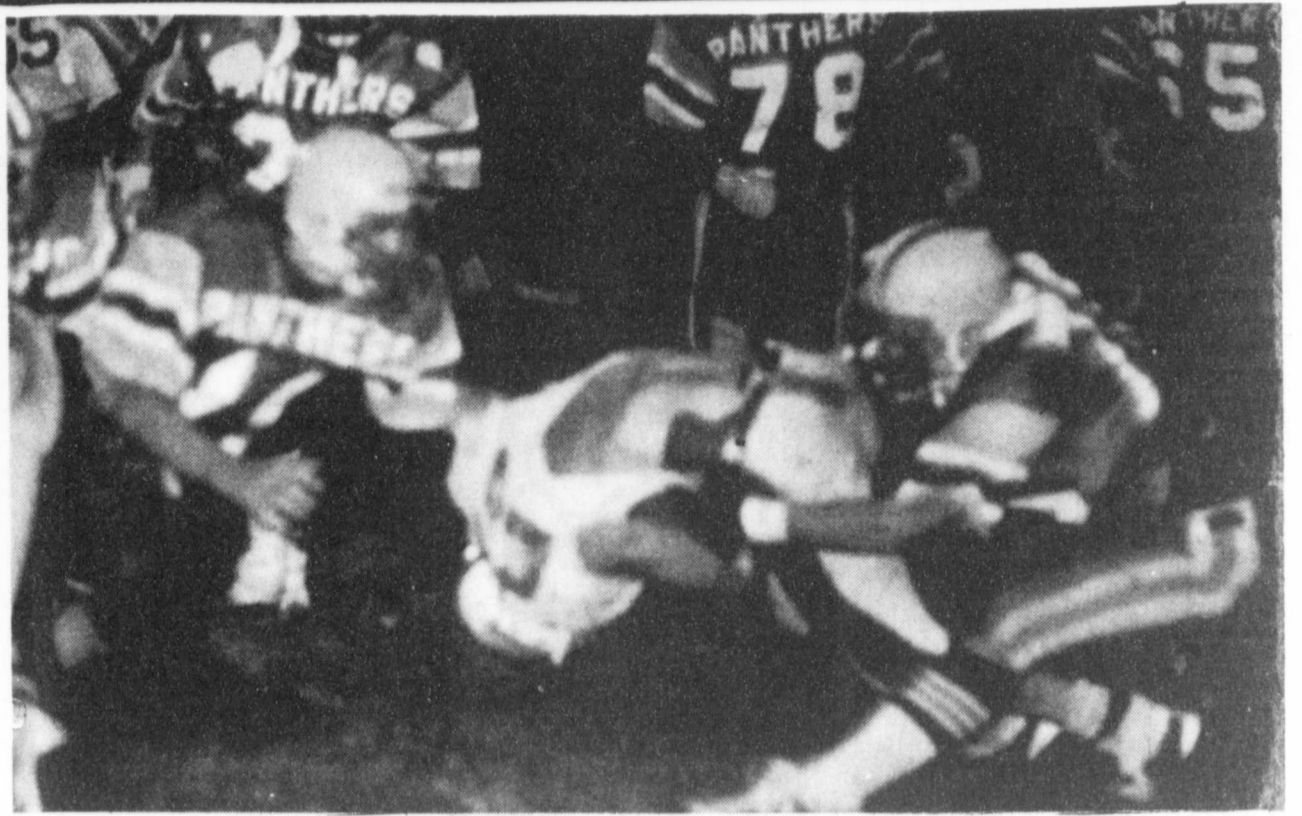

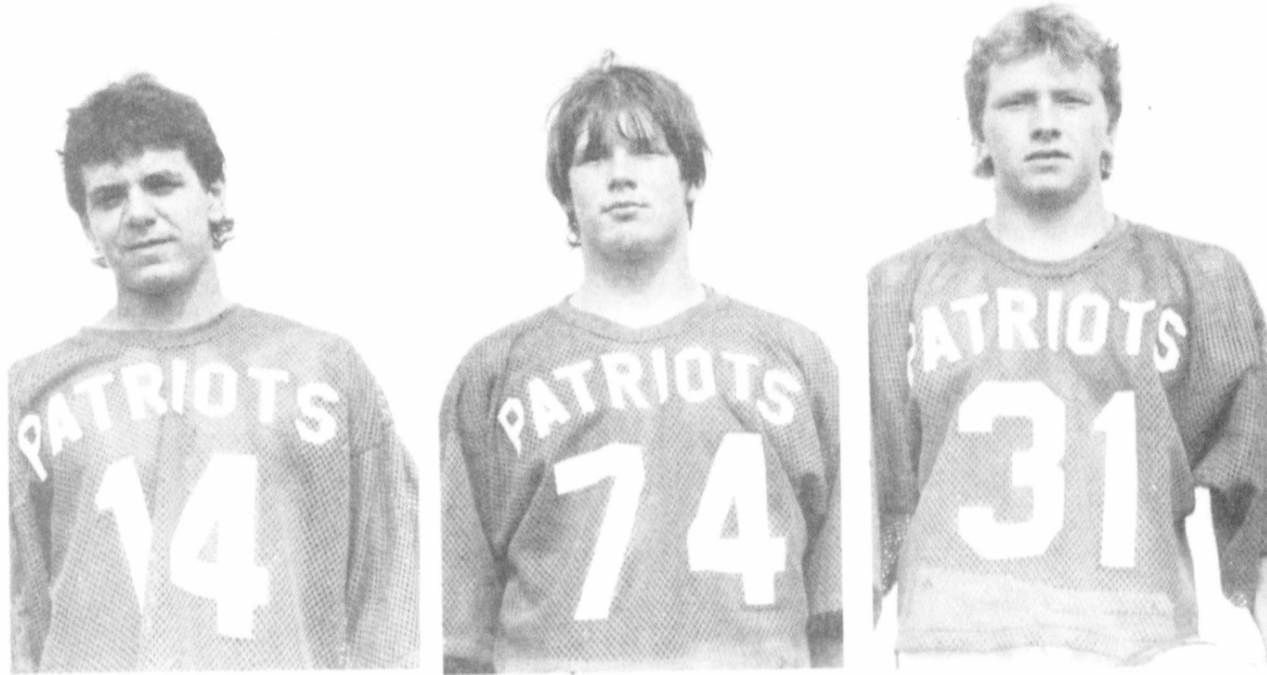

Friday night's football game. The Panthers defeated the Prairiland Patriots in the last game of the

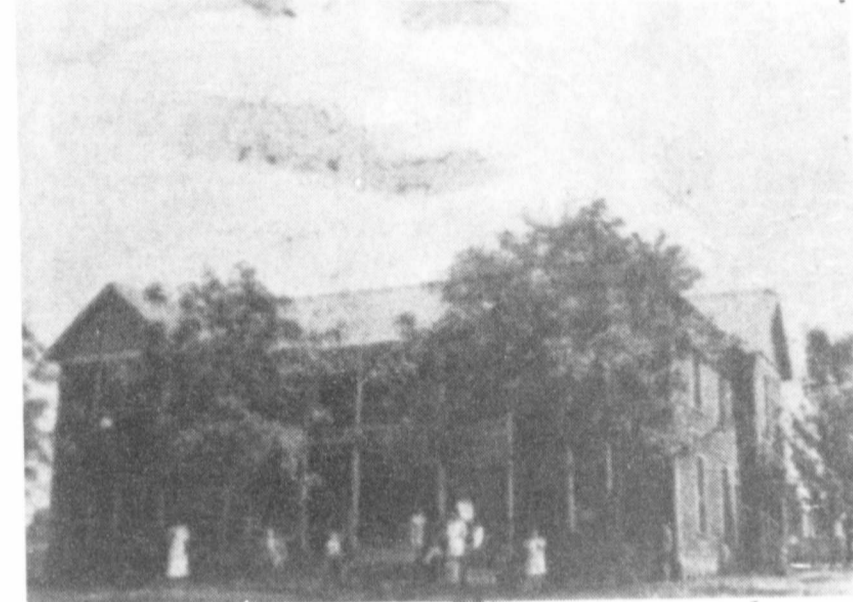

THE BURKE HOUSE, one of the most popular hotels in Northeast Texas, was owned by Mrs. L.R. Burke and her daughters, Mrs. Fannie Smith and Misses Gramp and Minnie Burke. According to the "Blossom Bee", January, 1911, was built in 1893 and from the beginning became a stopping place of every salesman making Blossom and people desiring to take mineral baths. The Burke House was a two-story frame building near the depot, had one of the finest mineral wells in town. It was electrically lighted, with an office, large dining room, and many well-arranged rooms and furnished bedrooms. It had a reputation of having "something good to eat" all the time and first

class beds and sanitary rooms. Mrs. Burke is listed as one of the pioneers of Lamar County. Coming to Texas in 1868, with her husband, Rev. W.M. Burke, and family from Georgia (both Georgia born). Her husband, an able, Baptist preacher, died in Blossom in 1878. She reared a large family of children, some of them holding high positions with the Texas and Pacific Railway Company. The house still stands in Blossom today, and is still in good repair. A few years ago, the house was remodeled by removing the upper story. The house is located across from Blossom School and is owned by Mrs. Myrtle Smith.

Brucellosis Vaccination Required For Heifers

Regulations relating to the
brucellosis vaccination of heifer
calves in the Class C Area of Texas
have been amended by the Texas
Animal Health Commission and will
become effective November 5.
The changes were made in
response to recommendations from
the livestock industry during recent
hearings favoring an increase in
vaccination for brucellosis control,
explained Bob Moody, county agent.
The new regulation is in two parts.
1. Heifer calves born after Jan. 1 of
this year which are between 4 and 12
months of age and acquired and used
for breeding, grazing, dairying or
confinement in a dry lot not under
quarantine must be officially vac-
cinated according to the amended
regulation.
2. Heifer calves born after Jan. 1 of
this year which are unvaccinated
when they are over 12 months of age
may change ownership only after
being spayed or consigned to a
livestock market to be spayed or "S"
branded prior to the sale; or con-
signed directly to slaughter,
quarantined feedlot or quarantined
pasture.
Producers should start making
plans now for vaccination of all
eligible heifers, the agent reminds.
State funds are available for free
vaccinations. Producers should
contact their own private
veterinarian or their area Texas
Animal Health Commission office for
complete details. The new regulation
applies to the 113 counties making up
the Class C Area of Texas.
It is important that livestock
producers make sure their calves
are properly identified when vac-
cinated. A tattoo in the right ear is
proof of vaccination, but the
procedure must be done correctly.
The person doing the vaccination
should clean the ear carefully, rub
the ink in thoroughly and press the
tattoo pliers firmly.
A vaccinated calf is worth more,
but if not properly identified it will
cost the producer later on, reminds
the agent.
