Emergency Farm Loans Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by this summer's drought and extremely high temperatures are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration office located in Paris, supervisor Joe Wishard said today.

Lamar County is one of 63 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought.

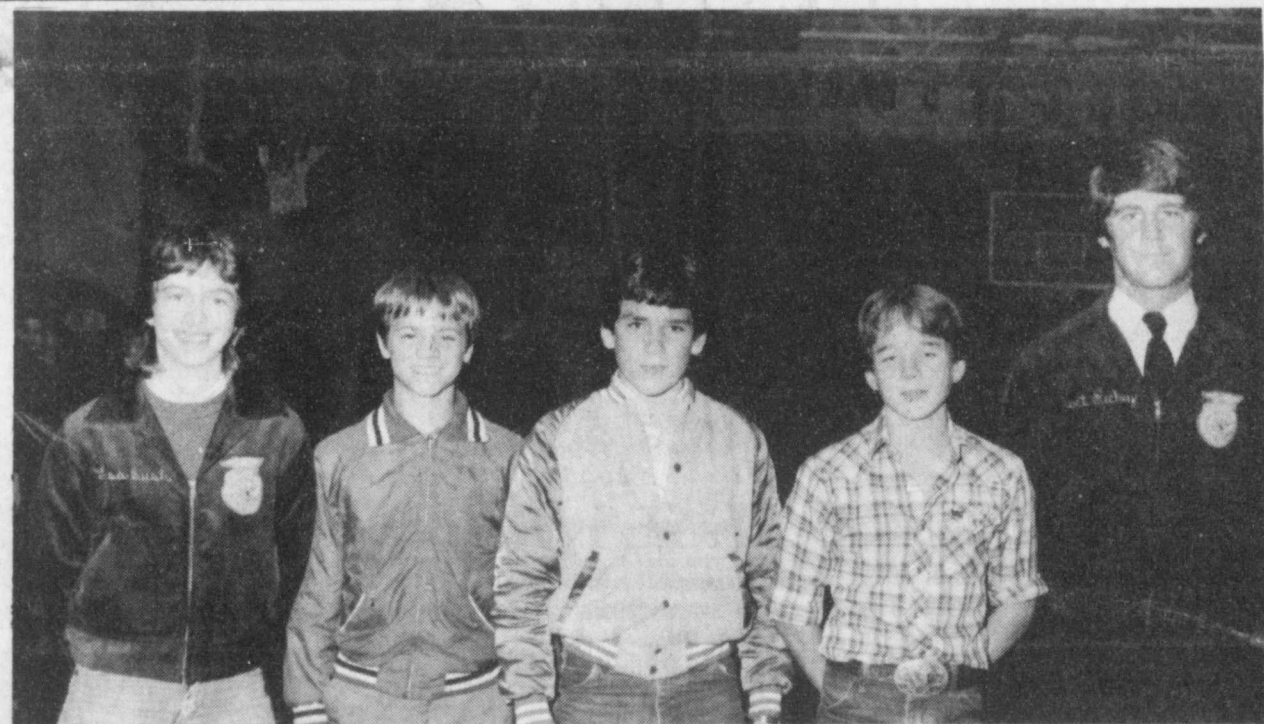
Wishard said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses, or the operating loan needed to continue in business, or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate on the first

\$100,000 borrowed is five percent; interest rate is eight percent on the balance borrowed over that amount.

For farmers who can obtain commercial credit but who choose to borrow from FmHA, the interest rate is 13.75 percent.

As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for a FmHA emergency loan, Wishard said. Farmers participating in the PIK or federal crop insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until June 24, 1985, but farmers should apply as soon as possible.

Footprints From The Past

Watching the football game tonight made me think of the days when I was in high school and played football.

I was going to Deport High School and we never had enough to play and substitute like we should. Sometimes only about 12 or 13 would come out to play so we had to play both offense and defense whether we wanted to or not. We never did want to come out of the game as that was the reason we had practiced all week, just so we could play on Friday.

Friday came around and then sometimes you wished that the coach would let you come out for just one or two plays for the boys on the other team were all playing for keeps. If you know what I mean, they were really hitting and it did hurt. We had

to buy our own uniforms as the school did not furnish them. Some times we all did not have too good equipment and what we had hardly ever matched. Some of us would have white cotton sweat shirts and some would have red, blue or whatever they thought was the best or prettiest.

The shoes were sometimes homemade. You had to get a pair of shoes and take them to the shoe shop and have the cobbler build up some cleats by taking different lengths and widths of leather and nailing them to your shoes one piece at a time until they were the right height. Sometimes when you were playing one of the tacks would come through the shoe and then you had a problem as you were walking on a tack. You were alright if the tack was on the outside for then you had something to scratch the other guy with.

We had a big old boy who played next to me on the line who had the biggest feet and when he tried to block anyone, he would just lay down and throw his feet around. He got to me more than he did anyone else and I always had sore shins all during football season.

I got where I would wrap my shins with one of the thigh pads. We bent them to where they just fit my legs then we would wrap my shins with gauze then put the thigh pads on the legs and tape them on with about a roll of tape. But that was the only way I could play for more than one week at a time.

We lost more games than we won and we would play anyone who would pay us to come play. We could do that as we were not in any conference and could play anyone we could get a game with. Sometimes we had problems scheduling games as we didn't schedule any games one year for the next year because we didn't know if we would have enough to play. Besides, the coach liked to choose his own games and as we had a new coach every year we never did schedule a game until we had a coach.

We did not have a good team if you go by the number of games that you won, for as I said, we did not win too many games but we did have some good boys playing and we made some friends that have lasted for a lifetime. Some of the ones that I played with have gone on to make farmers and went into the law, some into medicine, but for always we will always have a bond between us for we suffered and laughed together and enjoyed all of it.

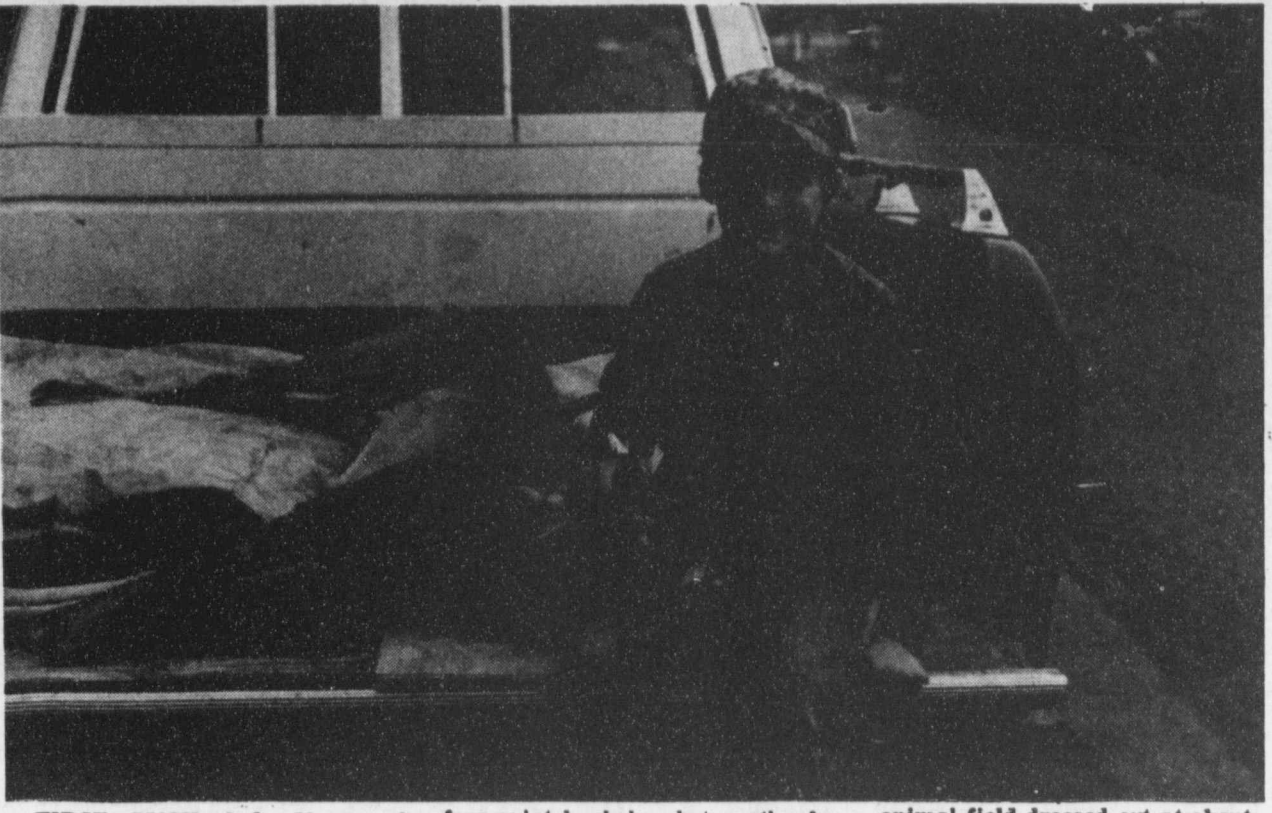



November 22: Remembering JFK

November 22nd will mark the 21st anniversary of the death of one of our most remarkable presidents—John F. Kennedy. Among those who have felt his loss most keenly over the years is a group of some of our most dedicated workers—public employees.

President Kennedy did what too few Presidents had done before him and too few have done since, they feel: he honored public employees. In his first State of the Union message he said, "Let the public service be a proud and lively career. And let every man and woman who works in any area of our national government, in any branch, at any level, be able to say with pride and honor in future years: 'I served the United States Government in that hour of our nation's need.'"

The young President often stressed that the quality of government is directly tied to the capabilities and dedication of those who serve our nation. He believed that "a career government service is one of the foundations of democracy. It must be strong, it must have prestige, there must be sufficient remuneration to make it worthwhile." In the problems he faced, from racial unrest to the Cuban Missile Crisis, Kennedy looked not only to policy choices for solutions, but to the people entrusted with carrying out the nation's will. He

matched his praise for the civil service with deeds, including the landmark Federal Pay Reform Act of 1962.

Morale in today's civil service is far from as high as it was in the Kennedy era. The consequences of "beating up on the bureaucracy" have been grave. According to the Public Employees Roundtable, a non-profit educational group, many top federal employees leave government for jobs with higher pay and better benefits.

In spite of these trends—and perhaps because of them—the anniversary of President Kennedy's death takes on special meaning for public servants. He spoke of an American ideal of service to one's country that still nurtures millions of government workers. As Kennedy once said, "We need to draw upon America's entire reservoir of talent and skill to help conduct our generation's most important business—the public business."

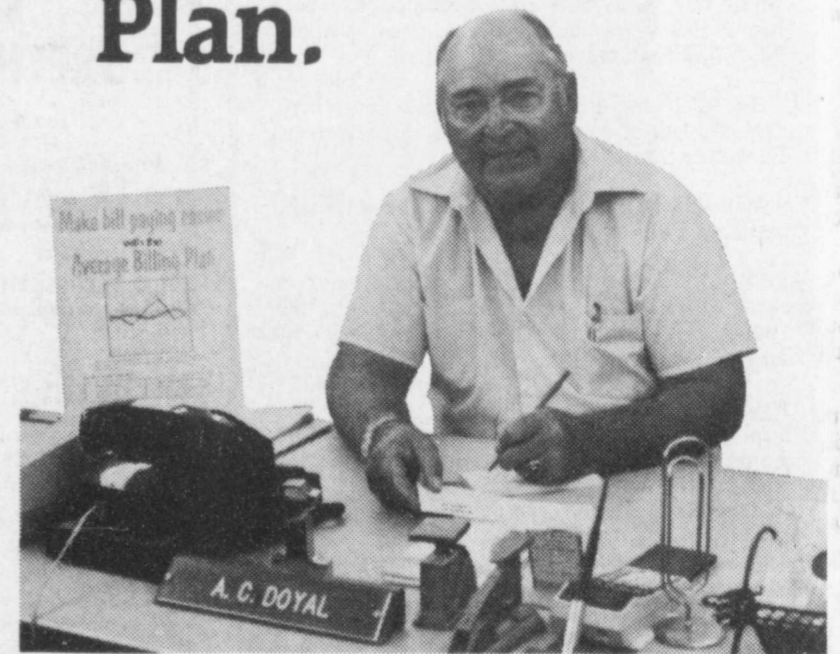
