

Board Considers Expansion Options

The Prairiland School Board considered several alternatives at their meeting Monday night, discussing once again the possibility of a junior high school located at the currently existing Prairiland High School at Pattonville, but making no definite decisions.

New state mandated programs concerning class size have made necessary the construction or creation of some new classrooms at the Blossom campus, the high school and Deport campus.

At Blossom, two classrooms are needed by next year to fulfill the state law, at Prairiland High School,

three classes are needed. The needs at Deport could be filled by using space available.

Also, the construction of a science lab at Blossom, and the renovation of the science lab at Deport were discussed.

At Blossom, the classroom problem could be solved by converting the auditorium into classrooms. At Prairiland, it could possibly be handled by building a new cafeteria and converting the old one, located inside the main building, into four classrooms. This would take care of space needs for the next five years, to meet state standards.

Continued renovation of both elementary schools was also discussed.

The possibility of a junior high, however, has arisen as a long term solution to growth needs.

Superintendent Leslie (Buddy) Taylor, said that "The board wants to make sure that any money we spend is spent wisely...we don't have it to waste. Any new structures we build we want to make sure can be used to best advantage."

Taylor also stated that it would take three years at the least to work towards a junior high without a bond election, and that with extremely

close financing.

He continued to say that "Myself, I wouldn't want to build a junior high unless it was with the consent of the people...and I don't think this board would either." He expressed feelings that the board simply wanted what was best, and trying to look at all sides of the situation.

However, it is possible that the school could do such a think without a vote...if funds were available.

Basic outside sketches of additional classrooms at Prairiland have been made up if that were done instead of creating a new cafeteria.

In other business, Rufus Merritt

was sworn in to fill the unexpired term of Bobby Dunn, Place 7. Dunn resigned because his wife has been hired to work in the school system.

Merritt will fill the term until it is up in April.

Superintendent Taylor's contract was extended from the current two years to three years, and Assistant Superintendent Nash's contract from one year to two. Jerry Nell Stout and Joyce Allen, employees in the administration building, had their contracts renewed for the next year.

Pat Norrell was hired to work part time in the administration office, and Mrs. Bobby Dunn has been hired to

help with kindergarten in the mornings at Deport and work with the specialized reading program at Blossom in the afternoon. She was hired on the state compensatory fund system.

New policies pertaining to student discipline and student retention were adopted to comply with state regulations, and a text book committee was appointed to study new textbooks.

Textbooks are available for any group or person who would like to inspect them.

The next meeting will be on February 11, and the public is reminded that these meetings are open.

Pats Up District To 6-0

The boys Tuesday night kept their district record unblemished as they defeated Pittsburg to raise their record to 6-0.

The game appeared to be a blowout in the early goings as Kalvin Williams and the Patriots were red hot. Pittsburg changed the momentum drastically though as they made a half court shot at halftime buzzer to get within five points at 25-20.

The second half of the game was nip and tuck. The Pirate momentum put them tied with the Patriots at 34-34. After three quarters, the last quarter was a team effort. As soon as Kyle Martin went into the game, he tipped in a basket to put Prairiland ahead 38-36. Earlier, replacement Eric Stewart made a basket to put Prairiland ahead 36-34. The game was finally decided in the last couple of minutes as their free shots and defense carried them to a 49-44 victory. Six different players made baskets in the final quarter.

Kalvin Williams was the top scorer with the Patriots with 17 points. Joel Ballard and Heath Kennedy also turned in stellar performances at guard.

Coach Dan Harris was pleased with his team's performance. Harris commented, "We kept our discipline and kept on playing the way we wanted to play. Alluding to the fine teams in the district, Harris said, "Every team in our district is tough. We were fortunate to win."

Prairiland had little trouble containing North Lamar in the first quarter. Mike Connot tipped in a shot in the first minute of the game and Prairiland led 2-0. Prairiland would score five more unanswered points before North Lamar would finally get on the board with 2:23 left in the quarter. Each team made a free shot in the remaining two minutes of the quarter and Prairiland led 8-3.

Connot began the second quarter also as he made two free shots to put

the Patriots in front 10-3. Prairiland again could not get going offensively as Heath Kennedy made the final Patriot points in the quarter with 1:44 remaining. Using a stingy defense and reaping the benefits of Kalvin Williams rebounding, Prairiland led at the half 17-15.

The third quarter was a disastrous one for the Patriots. Kennedy made the one Patriot point in the quarter as they trailed North Lamar 23-18 after three quarters of play.

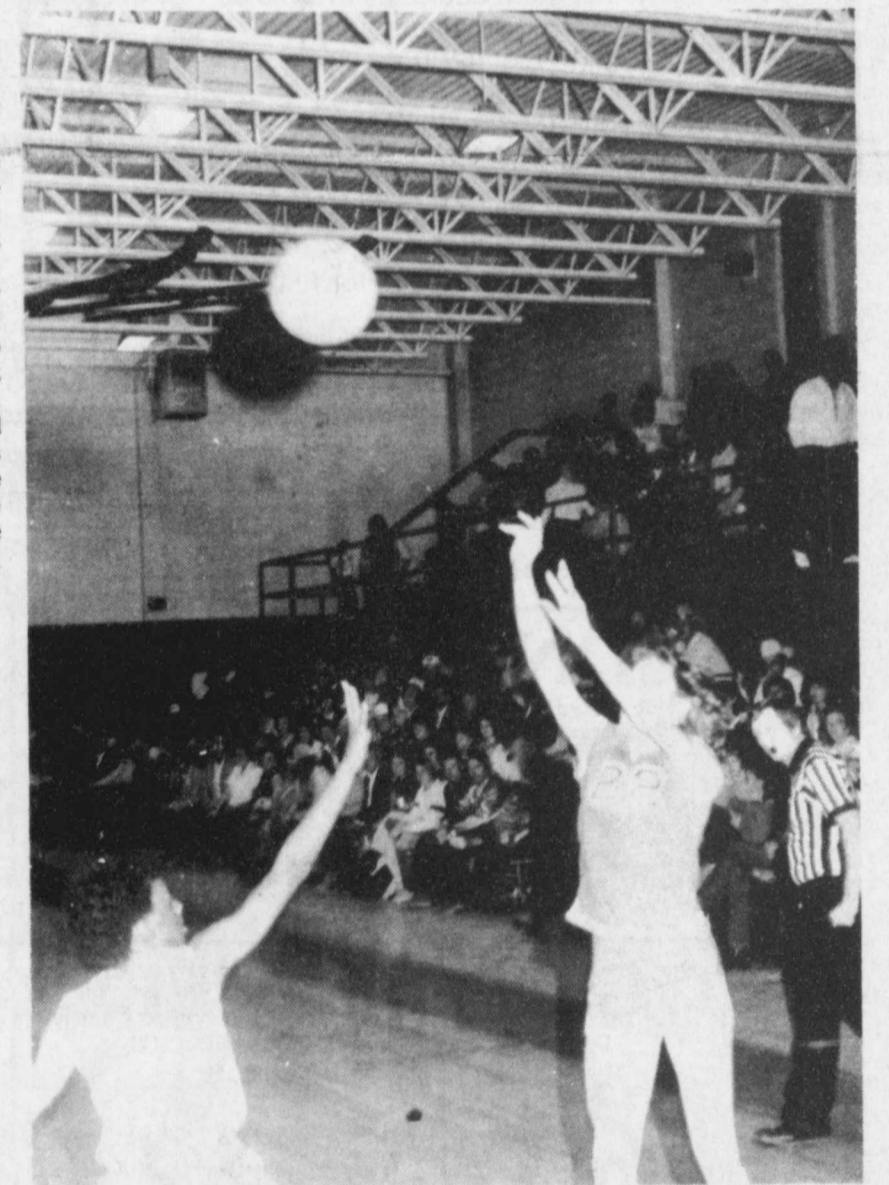
Both teams put up strong efforts in the final quarter. Prairiland finally showed a little firepower with their offense as they got back in the game. Heath Kennedy stole the inbounds

pass with 4:13 remaining and put the ball in the hole as the North Lamar lead was tied to a 29-28 lead. Joel Ballard tied the game at 29-29 with a free shot with 1:40 remaining. Neither team was able to score in the final minute as the game went into overtime.

Mike Connot scored the first basket in the overtime period, as he put the Patriots in front 31-29. After a North Lamar free shot, Joel Ballard made two clutch free shots with :36 left in overtime as Prairiland led 33-30. Kennedy made the final point of the game with nine seconds left to give Prairiland a 34-30 win.

Time To Plant Nut Trees

This is the time of year that many people are making the final decisions on fruit and nut varieties to set out during the winter. According to Dr. George Philley, the most important consideration is to select varieties that are adapted to the area.

Recommended varieties have been tried and tested in the area and will be more resistant to diseases and insects. Even though unadapted varieties will occasionally produce a fairly good crop, they are not dependable and quality will generally be lower.

When purchasing trees for the orchard or backyard, be persistent and do not accept unadapted varieties. If the local nursery does

not have the recommended varieties, try another nursery or check some of the mail order catalogs from reliable sources.

Philly suggests shopping early since some of the varieties may sell out of recommended varieties early. If desired varieties are not available, delaying the planting for a year is usually better than planting varieties that are undesirable. Producers will be more satisfied with varieties that produce quality and are less trouble.

Some varieties need cross-pollination with another variety to produce a good crop. If this is the situation with the primary variety selected, the second variety must also be planted.

Prairiland Lady Pats played the tough Pittsburg Pirates Tuesday night and fell short as they lost 43-33. The score of the game was not indicative of the intensity of which the Patriots displayed. It was the second loss at the hands of the Pirates but only their second loss in district play.

Tonya Burdine faced the Patriot attack with 12 points and Donna Vaughn added 9. Pittsburg, by the way, is ranked fourth in the state.

Ten next game will be Friday night in Clarksville.

The Patriot fems ended the first half of their district schedule Friday night as they defeated North Lamar. The fems now stand at six wins with one setback in district play.

Deport Radio Club

In about 1922 people of Deport became aware of radio as a wireless method of communication and entertainment.

There were no radio receiving sets as we know them today. The few receivers in existence were homemade from locally available materials such as oat meal boxes, copper wire, tin foil, old binding posts, etc. Later the various components were manufactured and could be ordered from supply houses in Dallas or elsewhere. The School Superintendent, a Mr. Ward, as well as some of the high school boys were interested in the newfangled apparatus. Some of us had built receivers by using round oatmeal boxes for cylinders on which to wind up a few panes of window glass with alternate sheets of tin foil to use as condensers or capacitors. A piece of galena crystal with a cat whisker of thin brass wire served as the detector. With these constituents, beginning with a long wire antenna,

and wired together and adjusted, voice and code signals could be heard by using an old time telephone receiver as an earphone.

Store ordered parts became available, but were a little expensive for boys of our financial status. Prof. Ward was interested and encouraged us to organize a radio club and pool our resources and purchase the various parts.

Well, we organized the club and Prof. Ward was elected president. We ordered the parts which consisted of variable condensers, machine wound induction coils, transformers, choke coils, gridleaks, three sets of earphones, and most important, were three of the new de Forest vacuum tubes.

We had to buy batteries because no one had yet come with a rectifier tube that could change high voltage alternating current to smooth direct current that was required for the plate circuits of the tubes.

The little brick building just north of the old First State Bank Building

was not occupied and was available for the club laboratory and meeting room. A table, a few chairs, and a bread board were brought in and we were ready to begin operations. I don't remember who all the members were, but Prof. Ward and Rob Lovin were two of the senior members. Jerry Reece, Russell Grant, Eugene Latimore and Curtis Glover were among the junior members. Mack Glover was a little too young to become a paying member, but he hung around and absorbed everything that went on.

One night, after we had been in operation a few weeks, the equipment was all assembled on the bread board in the center of the table. Prof. Ward was at the controls, three people had the three sets of earphones in use, while the rest of us were sitting or standing around straining our ears trying to hear a sound. The room was empty except for our table and club members assembled in the rear.

You could hear a pin drop because of the attentive silence around the radio, and then a couple of men came in the front door and clomp! clomp! clomped! the length of the building, with the sound of their heavy boots echoing from the floor to the ceiling and back. Everyone put a finger to his lips and tried to schish them to less noise. When they came up to the table, they looked it over a bit, then someone whispered that we were trying to hear some music on the radio.

One of the men, I think was old man Jimmie Curbow from Fulbright, answered in a loud voice, "If you want to hear some real music, come with us down to Halesboro, we are going to turn a bunch of wolf hounds loose."

Note: Two of the members continued on in electronics after the club had served its purpose. Jerry Reece became an electronic technician and radio operator and went with Admiral Byrd to the South Pole. Mack Glover grew up to become a successful radio and television technician and merchant.

Agricultural Weekly

The weather thus far this winter has been excellent for winter pastures. However, extremely cold weather, diseases or insects could still have a big impact on the total success of winter pasture programs.

Dr. George Philley says that conditions are excellent for another leaf rust epidemic on wheat. Leaf rust overwintered in many areas in Texas. It was found on volunteer wheat in mid-December in Lamar County and very mild conditions during the Christmas season favored leaf rust development.

Some varieties of wheat in the San Antonio area have heavy infestations of wheat rust. Philley says that in past years reports of rust in the San Antonio area were followed by rust outbreaks in Northeast Texas.

The basic components for leaf rust development are in place. Winter conditions have been mild and the fungus is present and increasing. A seige of cold weather would help reduce disease development and inoculum build-up more than any other factor. If mild weather continues, there is a potential of another epidemic.

Philley says it is too early to consider chemical control. At this time, cold weather is needed to stop disease development rather than relying on chemicals. Producers are advised to check their fields regularly for symptoms of leaf rust as well as other diseases and insects.

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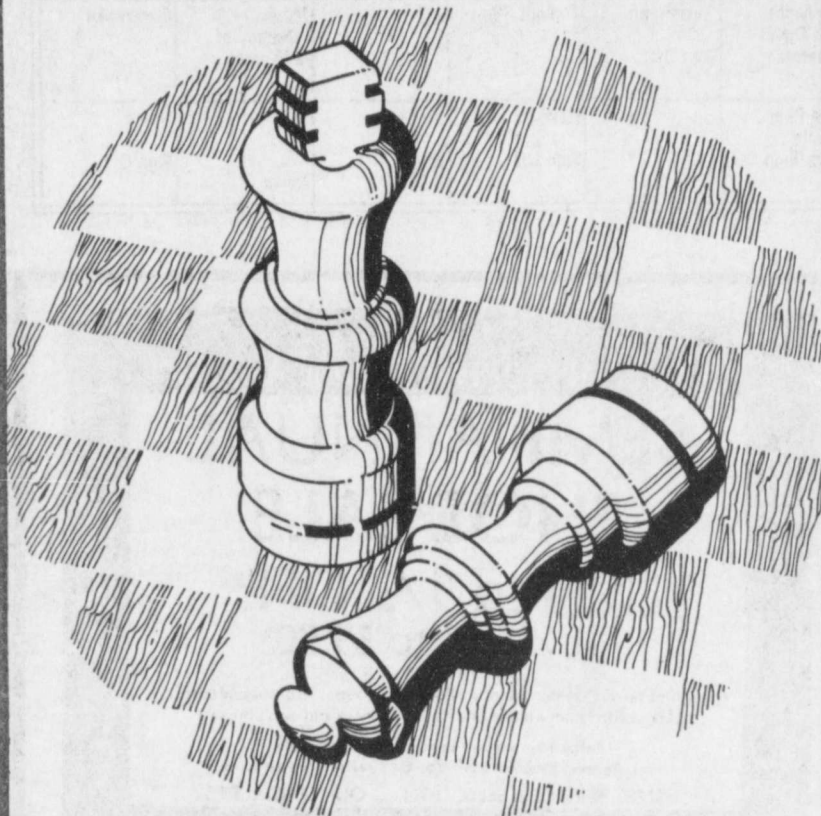

Competing for senior division were Cherie Bright of Prairiland, Wendy Milford of Prairiland and Tina Sheppard of Prairiland.

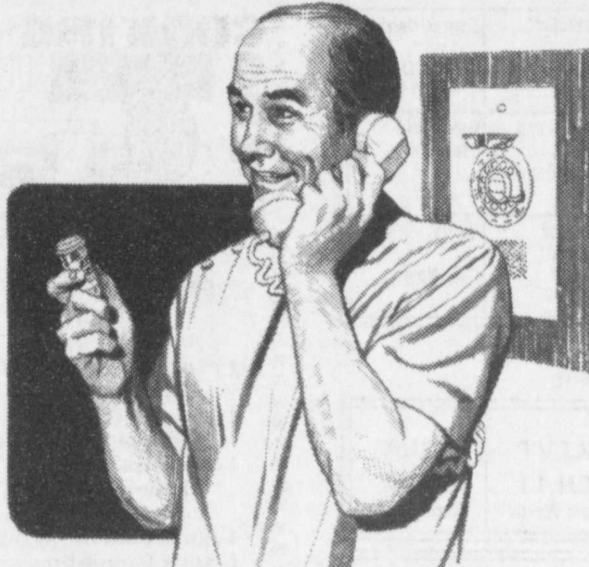
