

# Prairiland Patriots Drop One, Take One

The Patriots put another tally in the W column Tuesday night at Prairiland as they defeated DeKalb 57-40.  
The Patriots established their dominance in the first half. Without getting to shoot as many free shots as in their last encounter with DeKalb, the Patriots still led 25-11 at the half. Scott Scudder paced the Patriot scoring attack with 12 points


in the first half.  
The second half of play was also prosperous for the Patriots. Mike Connot led another strong second half as he contributed six points. With the game out of reach for DeKalb, Joel Ballard and Calvin Williams made free shots in the final ten seconds. The Patriots free shots gave Prairiland a 57-40 victory.  
The next game will be in Paul Pewitt Friday night as the Patriots

will try to complete a sweep of the Brahmas.  
The Prairiland Patriots lost their second district game of the season Friday night as they were defeated 51-47 by Daingerfield at home.  
Prairiland got off to a 2-0 lead early in the game as Joel Ballard threw in a long range jumper. With the muscular Daingerfield defense sagging in, Prairiland had to settle for the jumpers. Ballard made

another jumper and Calvin Williams made another four Patriot points but Prairiland trailed 14-8 after the first quarter.  
The Patriots found the going a little easier in the second quarter as they were finally able to get second shots inside. Scott Scudder had seven points in the quarter and Mike Connot six as they narrowed the Daingerfield lead to 28-26 after the

first half of play.  
Using a ball control offense and a disciplined defense, Prairiland was finally able to get the lead. Mike Connot scored another six points in the quarter and Calvin Williams made a basket with ten seconds left in the third quarter as Prairiland led 41-39.  
The final quarter was a nightmare for the Patriots as everything

seemed to go wrong, Calvin Williams made a basket with 4:23 left in the game to give Prairiland their lead at 45-43. Daingerfield controlled the remainder of the game as Prairiland could not seem to stop the Herculean Tigers. Joel Ballard made a basket with five seconds left in the game but Daingerfield went on to win 51-47.

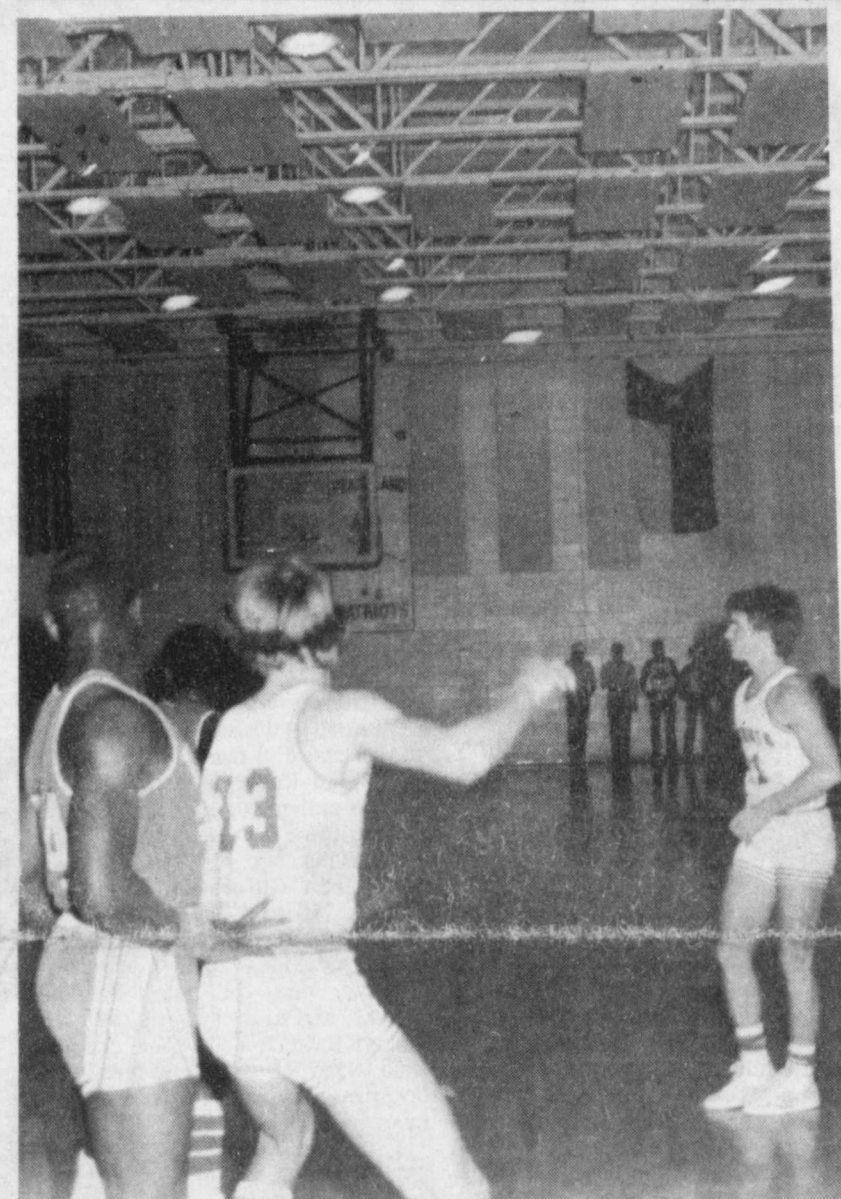

It is a simple, basic pleasure....and with the weather like it is right now, one we can all enjoy!



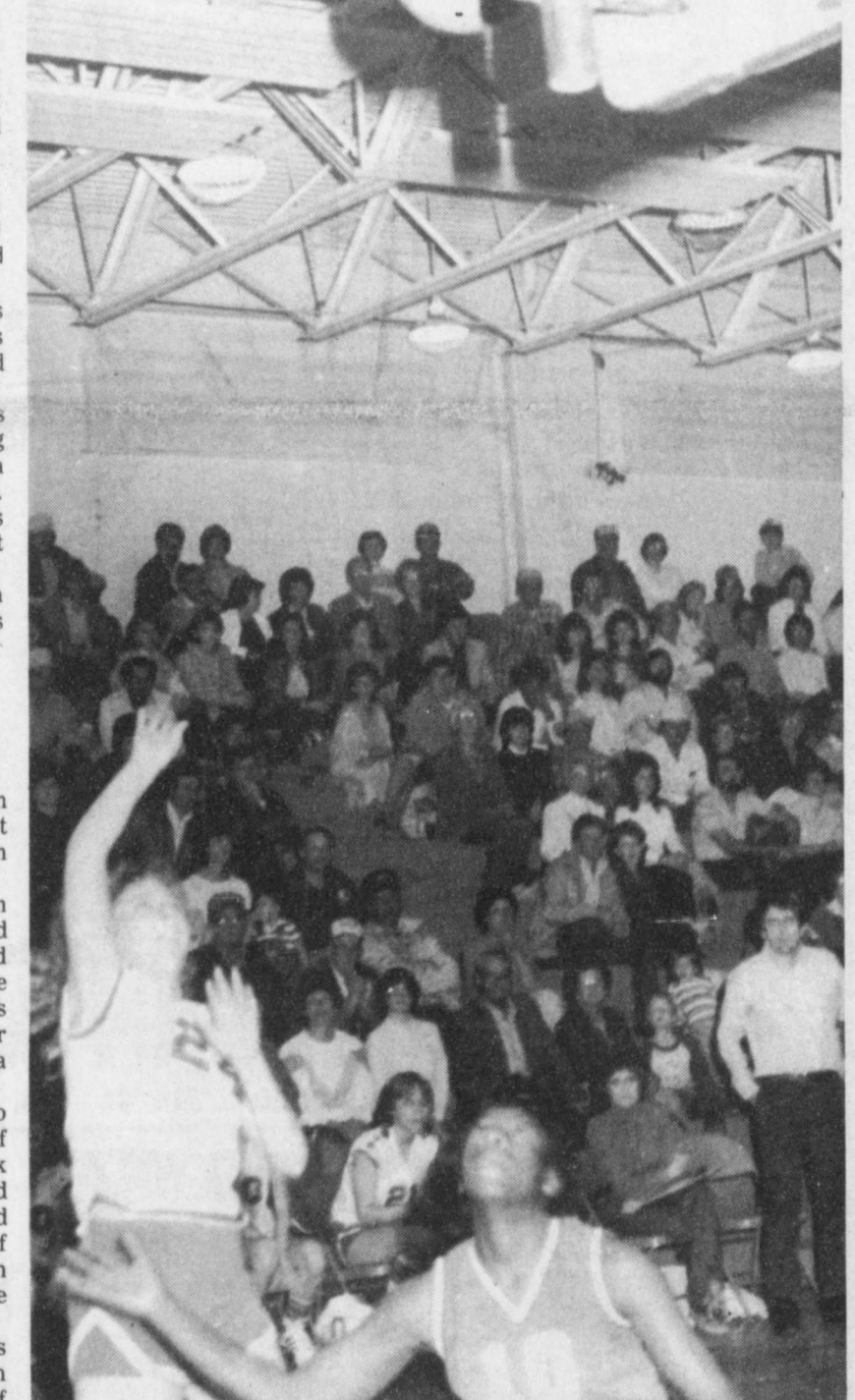

Janissa Baker led all scorers with 13 points, followed by Anderson and Pomroy with five apiece. Burdine finished with four points also.

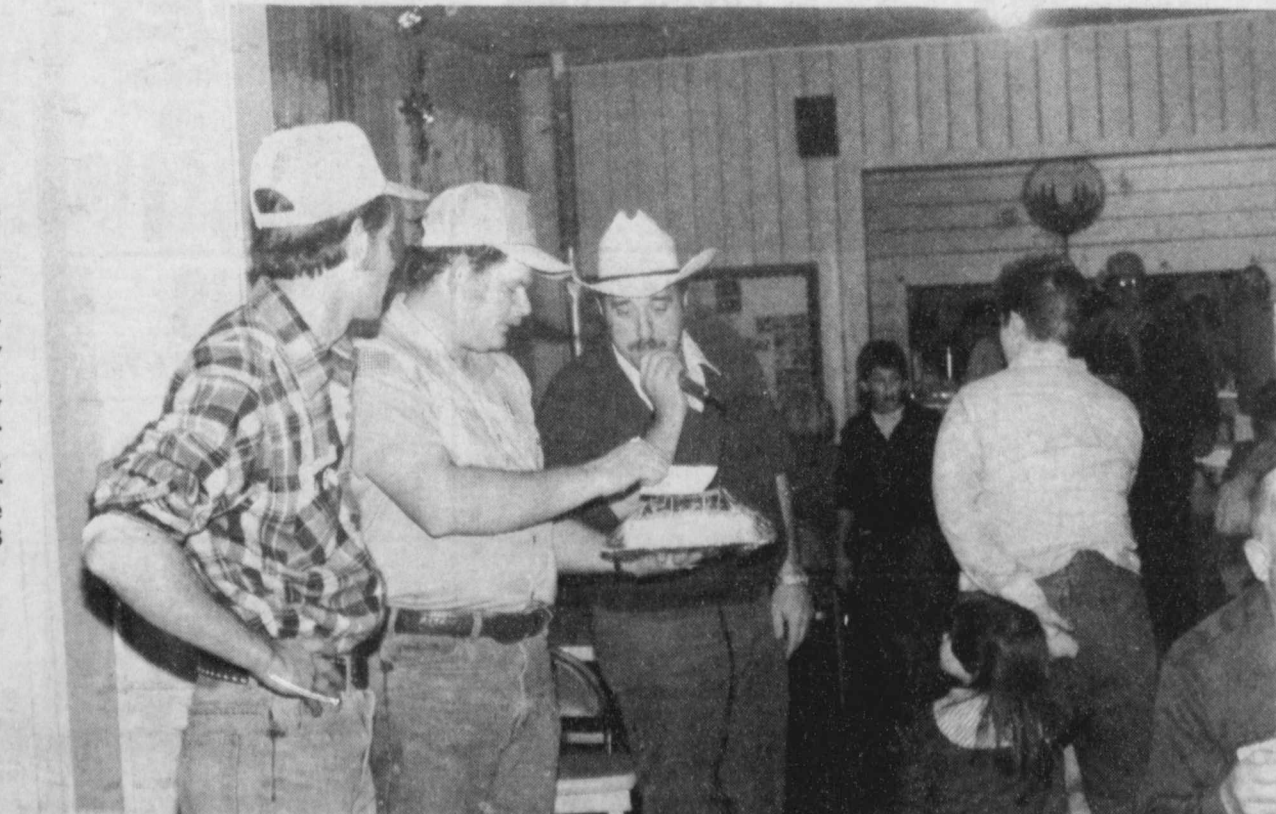
## Classified Ads Must Be Pre-Paid

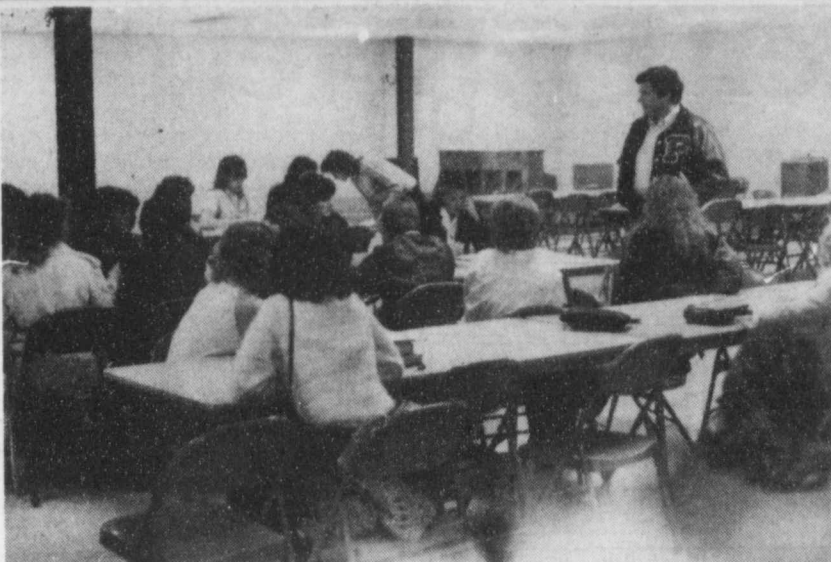

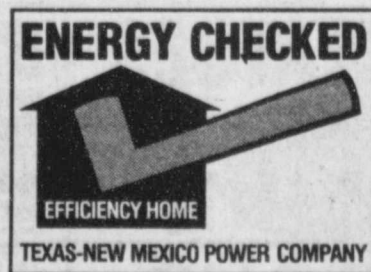

**Blossom Bits From The Past**

By Sue Clarkson  
The First National Bank of Blossom was established in 1901. It has been listed as one of the leading banks in Lamar County during its era.  
Officers of the institution in 1910 were R.V. Womack, president; A.M. Haraway, vice-president; A.P. Black, cashier; H.M. Norris, assistant cashier.  
The bank owned and operated its own two story building, which it built in 1910. The building is now owned by the Blossom Masonic Lodge. In January, 1911, the bank reported to \$216,398.52 on deposit.  
The First State Bank of Blossom was established April 24, 1910, with a capital stock of \$22,000.00. By January, 1911, it was recognized as one of the solid financial institutions of Lamar County, with reported deposits amounting to \$53,176.49. Bank was housed in a modern brick building it owned. Officers were Dr. F.M. Lenoir, president; Dr. W.J. Patton, vice-president; J.W. Ables, cashier. Directors were Dr. J.S. Marshall, L.T. Reasoner, J.M. Isham, R.F. Scott and J.G. Barnett.  
The Farmers State Bank, the third bank of Blossom, still remains a mystery. The only evidence left of its existence is a little savings bank resembling a black leather bound book with a gilt edge.  
All banks failed during the great depression and none have been established in the city since their failure.
