He was a little runt that wouldn't weigh more than fifty pounds soaking wet. He liked money, and would sing for pay. He sang in a thin high pitched tinny voice and his repertoire consisted of most of the old songs as well as some of the songs that were popular at the time.

Pete Jack would stand on the hood of a car or on a box or crate and sing as long as someone would pitch him a coin. Everyone liked him and he became the object of lots of teasing and jokes. Buck Mathis would especially give him a bad time by sneaking up to him and pinching him.

What's The News? The Weather!

For nearly a full week, the weather has been the major event throughout the area.

Residents are tired of the ice turning every footstep into an adventure and every vehicle trip into a nightmare.

The first cold front moved into the neighborhood last Thursday, dumping snow so dry and powdery that youngsters were cheated out of the fun of snowmen! The tiny crystals would not stick together enough to make snowballs or snowmen, even though all area schools were turned

out. The next day saw yet another few inches of snow fall, as people skidded and slipped in their rounds to do only those things that were necessary. Those that could, stayed home, confidently expecting the white froze everything back solid.

Things were slowly improving by Monday morning, and people scrambled to stock up on dwindling supplies of groceries, make doctor or pharmacy visits, and generally prepare themselves for the predicted onslaught of yet another cold front,

this one to contain rain, turning to ice.

Surprise...the front hit sooner than expected, and by eleven Monday morning, steps, rails and everything exposed to the weather were coated with glazed ice, while sleet and rain pelted out of the gray skies.

The precipitation continued until after nightfall, while power company employees kept a watchful eye on groaning electric lines and trees began to crack and squeal in protest as the ice slowly built up.

Roads were a solid sheet of ice,

although the highway department sanded bridges and slick spots, and city employees used city maintainers to scrape down main streets.

Schools continued to provide youngsters with an unexpected holiday, and all basketball games and other sports had to be cancelled, leaving a lot of make-up games to be played when the weather finally does thaw.

Cattlemen have watched in dismay as their livestock ate their way through stack after stack of hay, the only alternative letting them weaken

from lack of food. The extreme shortage of hay during the past summer has made the ice and snow even more of a problem. Numbers of ranchers reported calves being born during the bitter weather.

What is next? According to the weather prognosticators, a thaw should arrive during the latter part of the week, and hopefully this area, not accustomed to northern type weather, can breathe a little easier and pick up where they left off in daily life.



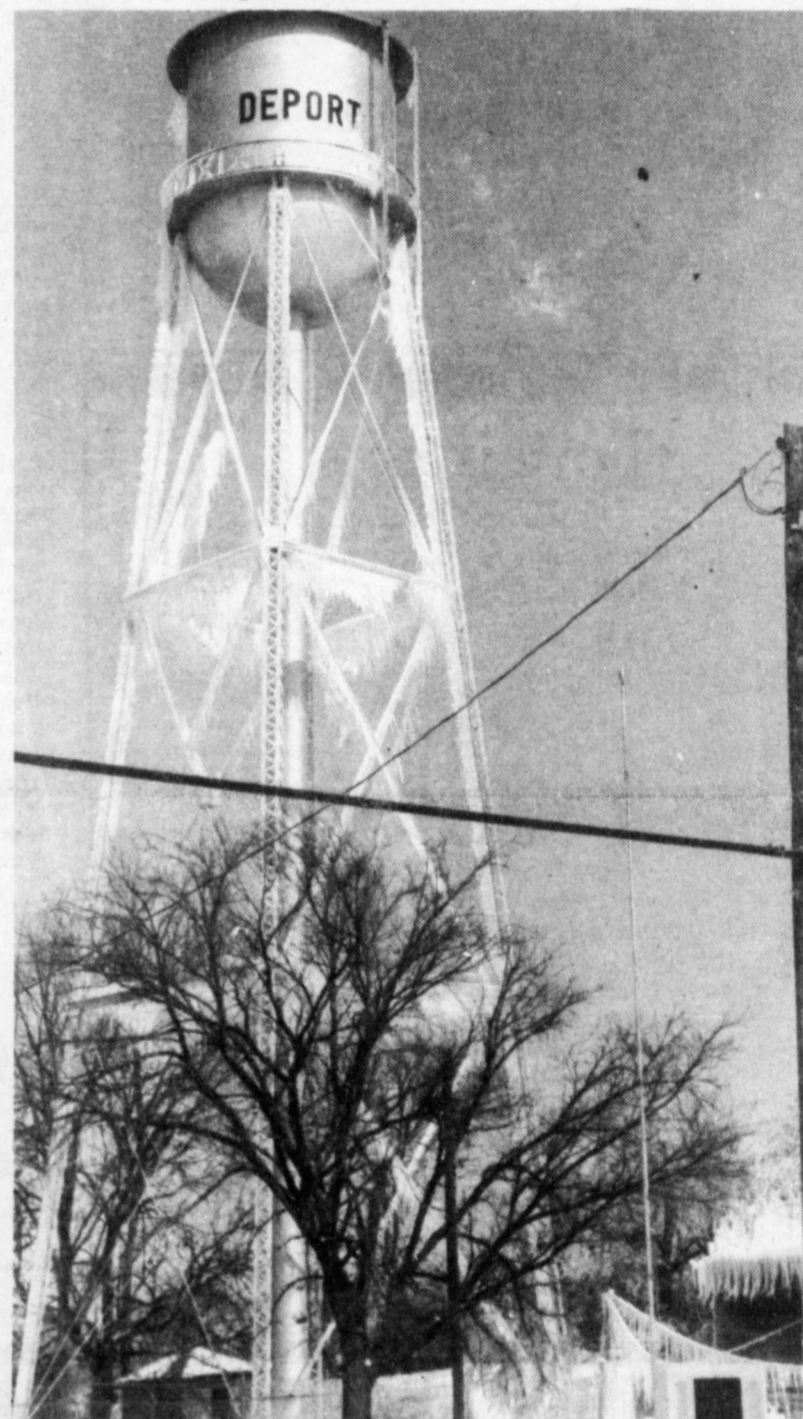

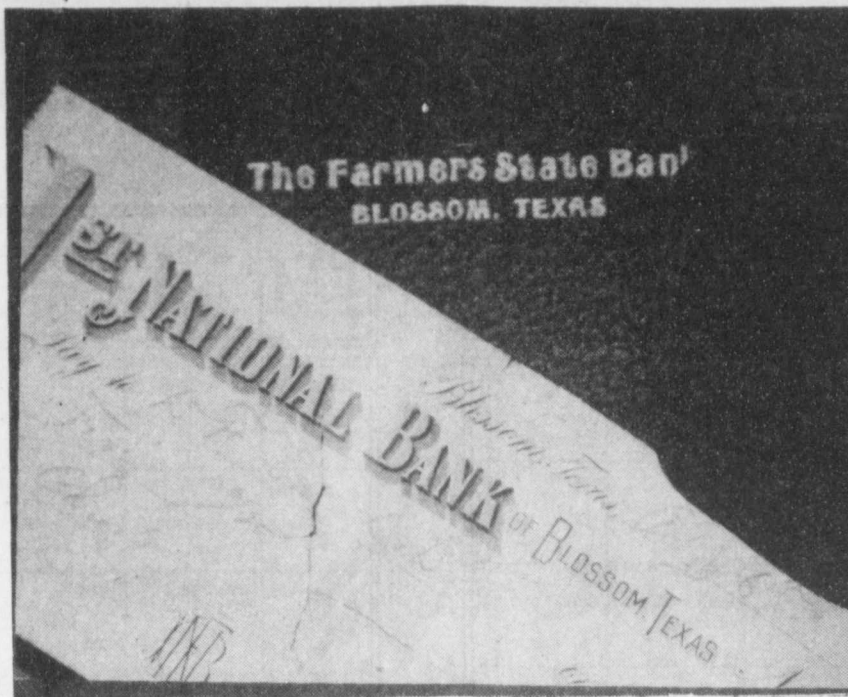

 The meeting will be February 7 at 10 a.m. at the Federal Building, 101 S. Main, Room 134, Temple, TX.

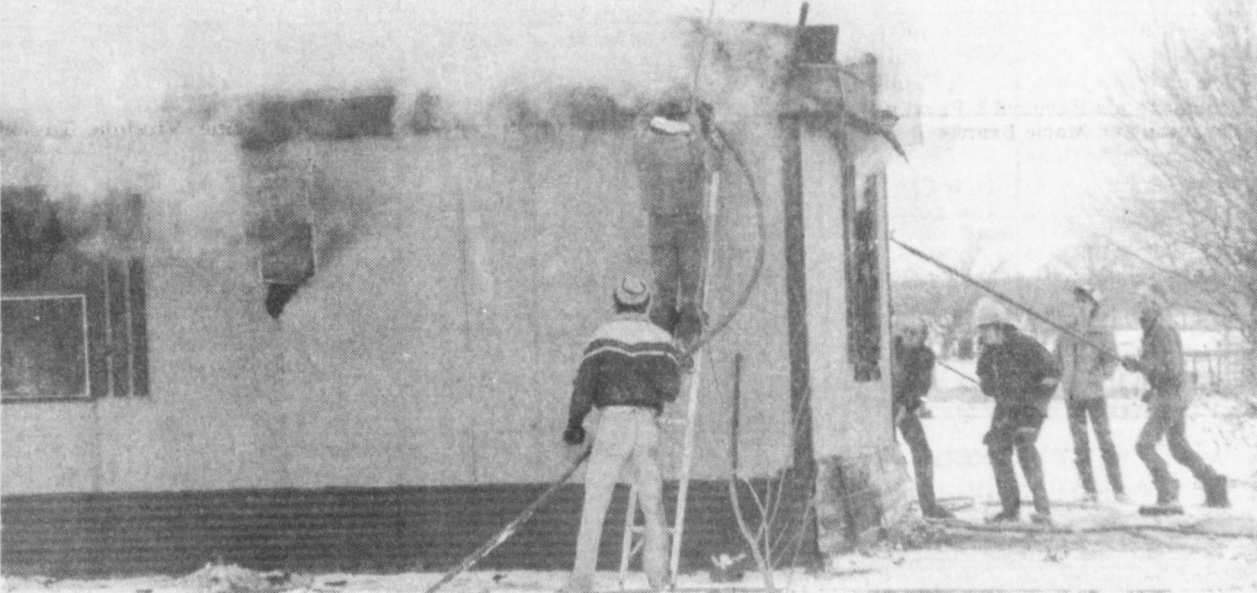

Cattle Need Additional Nutrition

 Cattlemen and their cows have suffered during the recent extreme cold weather. These conditions increase the nutrient requirements, particularly energy, to maintain body heat and condition says Dr. Randall Grooms.
 Many cattle were extremely thin and under conditioned coming out of last summer's drought. The warm fall and above average rainfall in much of East Texas provided grass to put cattle in respectable body condition entering the winter. Grooms says this body condition must be maintained and cattle should not be allowed to get thin before calving to prevent a long post partum interval.
 If dry cows are in average body condition, they can be adequately maintained with 18 points of six percent protein hay per day. If the dry cows are thin and need to gain body weight before calving, it may take 22 to 24 pounds of hay and possibly two or three pounds of grain supplementation.
 Lactating cows require an extra amount of nutrition. These are the cows that calved earliest and will wean the heaviest calves, therefore they deserve extra supplemental feed. Lactating cows require 25 to 30 pounds of eight to 10 percent protein hay per day. If they are good milking cows or down in body condition, four or five pounds of grain supplement will generally pay dividends.
 Ryegrass, clover and small grain pastures can adequately meet these energy needs as a grain replacement, Grooms says. Cottonseed or soybean hulls may be substituted for grain supplementation.

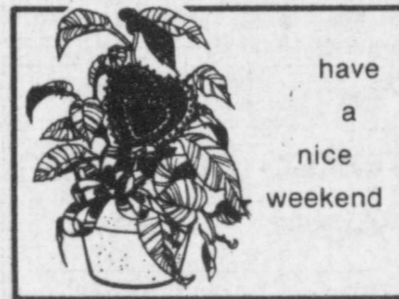

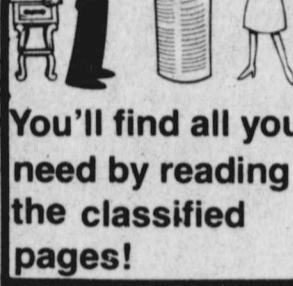

ABOUT YOUR WILL

If you are old enough to
draw Social Security and
don't have a will, you are
years late. Your benefici-
aries would have been in for
a lot of grief had some-
thing happened to you.
However modest your es-
tate, lack of a will, spell-
ing out in clear language
what is to be done with it,
creates a costly, tangled web
that may reduce it to noth-
ing. The state could get
most of your assets; your
relatives may be hounded
for unpaid debts.
Making a will is easy and
inexpensive. In some states,
a handwritten will is valid,
and keeps your wishes a
secret. Such a will, how-
ever, should be stored in a
safe place, such as a safety
deposit box and someone
you trust should know
where to find it.
You can get an attorney
to prepare your will at a
reasonable price. You just
spell out your wishes and
your will is written accord-
ingly. If you decide to write
your own, you can do it
without legal language, but
you must write clearly and
concisely. State your wishes
quickly and plainly, so that
nothing may be misunder-
stood. Completely identify
all the people named in
your will, by full name. If
there is a cash distribution
to your heirs, allot percent-
ages, rather than dollars, so
that a changing economy
won't upset your plans.
You can change your will
any time, naming new ben-
eficiaries or a new executor.
If this is done, it's best to
write a complete new will.
Never mark over, erase, or
insert new language be-
tween the lines of your will.
You can add to a will, but
it's better to do it over,
from scratch, to avoid con-
troversy or conflicting state-
ments.

Winter Disking Promotes Quail Food

February is the month to disk strips throughout pastures to improve quail habitat next summer, Charles VanDeaver, district conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service in Clarksville says.

"The purpose of disking is to prepare a seedbed for increased germination of large seeded forbs, such as crotons, sunflowers, and ragweeds as the soil warms up next spring," VanDeaver said. "Proper disking in February will remove winter annuals that would compete next spring with germinating quail foods for moisture and sunlight.

VanDeaver said the land should be disked at least four inches deep to kill or bury existing vegetation. Locate 25 to 50 food strips near woody cover or areas of tall and medium height grasses to enable birds to move safely between protective cover and food supply. At least five percent of a pasture should be disked to have a noticeable effect on your quails' food supply.
