Prairiland Vocational Agriculture Program Provides Wide Learning

The week of February 18 through 22 is National FFA Week.

Members across the entire nation will be participating in many different activities to mark the week, and Prairiland FFA has several things planned.

To start the week off on Monday, the Ag Talent Team will perform during home room.

On Tuesday, FFA members will wear their FFA jackets.

The Area VI Convention will be that day in Mt. Pleasant.

On Wednesday, there will be a faculty brunch, and Thursday they will hold a "Beauty Contest" where four boys will dress up as girls and be judged on dress, appearance and beauty.

Friday is "Old Fashioned Farmers

Day" and the student body will dress up as farmers in the "good ole days".

There is also, of course, a great deal of serious work going on at the Prairiland chapter.

There are 170 members in the chapter, which has an ag mechanics class, a co-op program, and Ag I, II and III.

The youngsters are involved in a number of competitions, the chapter has an annual livestock show, auction, stew supper and pig wrestling.

One of the most successful of the competitions has been the talent team. They will be competing in area competition on February 19.

Their sweetheart, Kenda Allen, is co-sweetheart for district.

The youngsters in FFA learn by actually doing what they are studying. The training provided is of a practical nature.

Welding, carpentry work, livestock judging or showing, field trips, all make up an active, "hands on" program.

The awards captured by the Prairiland Chapter are far too numerous to mention.

The chapter advisors are Bobby Winters, Frankie Norwood and Buddy Freeman. They are as enthusiastic in teaching as the students are in learning!

FFA provides a unique opportunity for young people to learn and develop. The skills acquired cover a much wider range than many people

realize. Mathematics are taught in shop and vocational ag by figuring such things as board feet, bill of material, cost of shop projects, rate of gain on livestock projects, pound of gain per 100 pounds of feed, etc.

Bookkeeping is acquired through the complete record books required on projects.

English is sharpened by the written reports required.

History is studied in the background and origin of animals.

Physical education is a part of the physical work done and the amounts of exercise expended as part of their projects.

Speech is in the development of public speaking skills.

Biology, both botany and zoology

are taught in forms of plant and animal science. Animal diseases are studied extensively in Vo Ag.

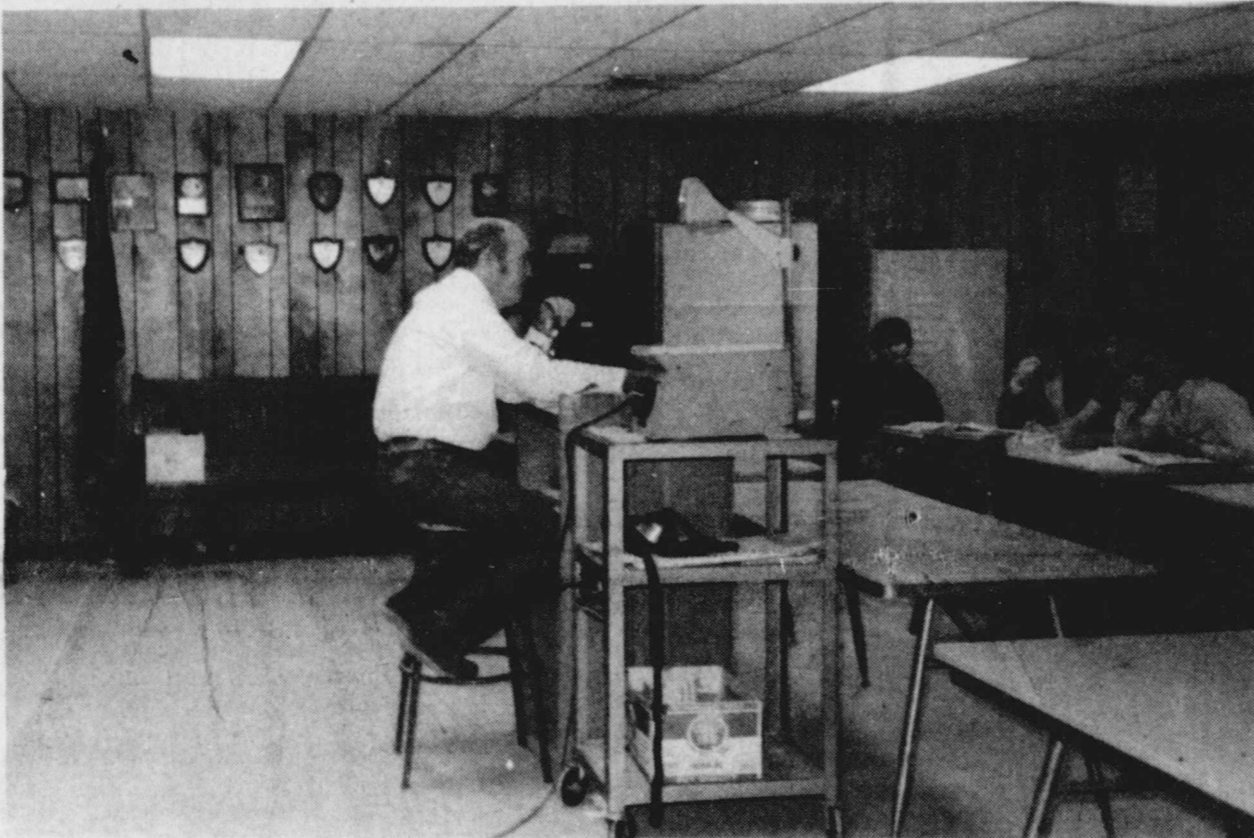
Chemistry is taught in the testing of soil to figure amounts and kinds of fertilizer.

Free enterprise is a value taught extensively, and economics of agriculture also.

Marketing and economics enable Vo Ag students to understand and use their knowledge in all phases of life.

Large Crowd Airs Views To School Board

About fifty interested citizens from the entire Prairiland CISD area appeared Monday night at the regular school board meeting, once again concerned about the possibility of a junior high school being constructed at Pattonville.

People for it, and people against it, had their say during a meeting that

Superintendent Leslie H. (Buddy) Taylor characterized as a "healthy expression of the way people feel".

The idea of constructing a junior high school at the Prairiland campus is far from new, but no decision has been made concerning it yet.

The board stated that they would not take major action on the subject without the consent of the people.

Taylor says that "at present there are no definite plans to build a junior high, but all angles must be considered". He also expressed his feelings that the board would not act without finding out what the voters wanted.

The whole issue has arisen once more because of new state laws which will allow no more than 22 students in the classroom, require bigger, fully equipped science labs and other requirements. This has created the necessity of more classrooms at all campuses.

The board has decided that if financing details can be worked out they will build a new cafeteria at Prairiland, and remodel the old one into four classrooms and a biology lab. The money required to do this would be approximately \$225,000. Whether additional classrooms will be provided by remodeling the

auditorium at Blossom or building a separate building has not been decided yet. Some extra space is available at Deport.

At present, continued renovation of the two elementary schools is approved, as of Monday's meeting. A science lab at Blossom will have to be constructed to meet state requirements, and enlargement and renovation of the old science lab at Deport will take place.

In additional business matters the contracts of Principals Max Ballard, Gary Ballard and Charles Martin were extended, and the supplemental tax roll was approved.

A trustee election has been called for April 6 with Place 5, Cunningham, Billy Ray Oats presently filling the unexpired term of Bobby Kennedy; Place 7, Pattonville, Rufus Merritt filling the unexpired term of Bobby Dunn, will come up.

The two terms will be for three years. The financial statement and payment of bills and reading of the minutes were also approved.

Superintendent Taylor expressed his appreciation to the people who attended the meeting, saying that public opinion and interest was vital to the school system.

Local Sales Tax Reported

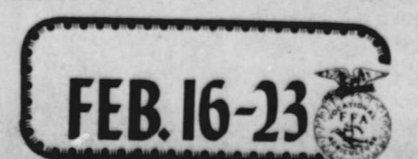
State Comptroller Bob Bullock recently sent checks totaling \$111.8 million in local payments to the 991 cities that levy the one-percent local sales tax.

Locally Blossom received \$1,434.78, for a 21.51 percent decrease over last year's payment of \$1,744.48.

Deport received \$1,283.28, compared to last year's payment of \$1,455.70, for an 18.42 percent decrease. 1985 payments to date for Deport total \$1,795.52, compared to \$2,200.84 for last year.

Bogata received \$3,493.59, compared to last year's \$3,345.14, marking a 3.83 percent increase over 1984. Payment to date for Bogata are \$4,415.55, compared to \$4,252.59 for 1984.

Talco received a check for \$2,848.97, compared to \$3,061.40 for the same period in 1984, making the 1985 to date payments total \$3,595.73, as in comparison to 1984 payments to date of \$5,507.03, for a 35.71 percent decrease.

The shower will be in the church's Fellowship Hall and will begin at 6 p.m. and conclude at 8 p.m.





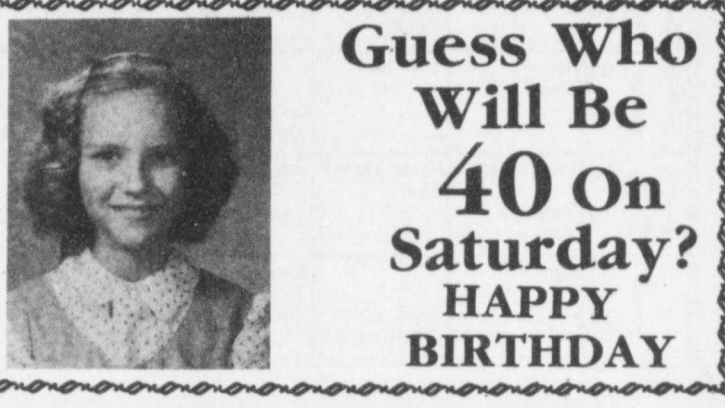

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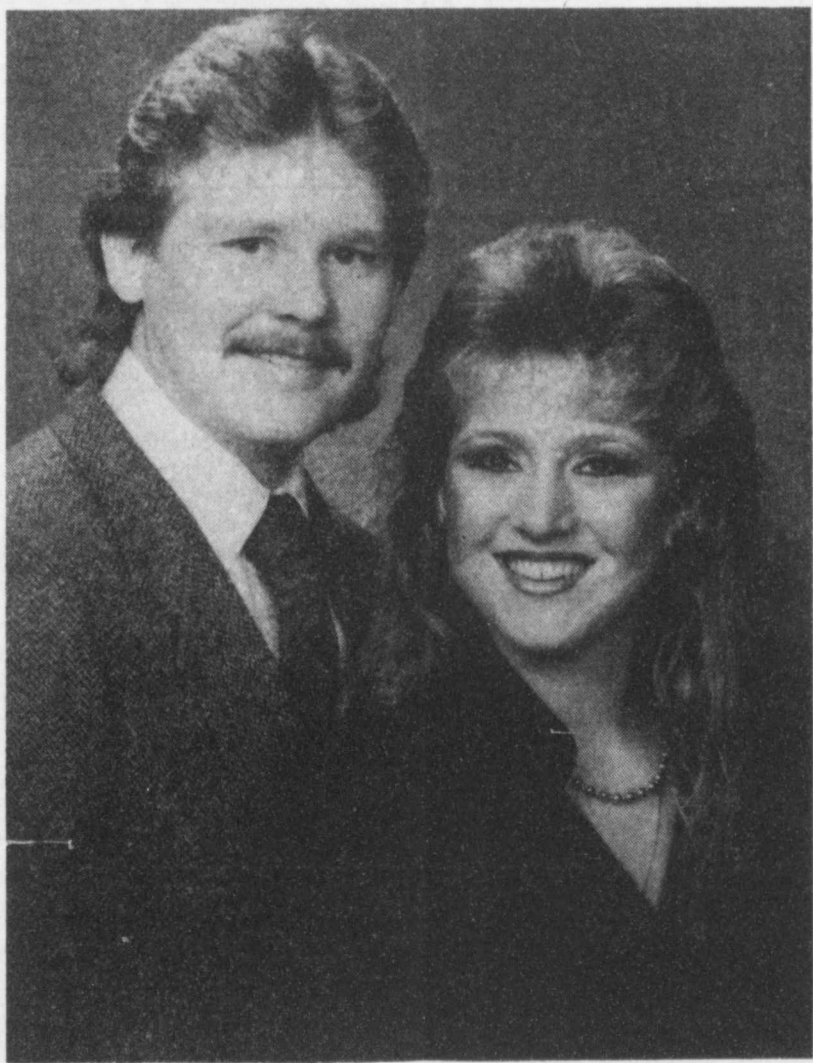

The FFA has been doing a remarkable job in this endeavor since 1928 and we hope they will continue to do so in the future.

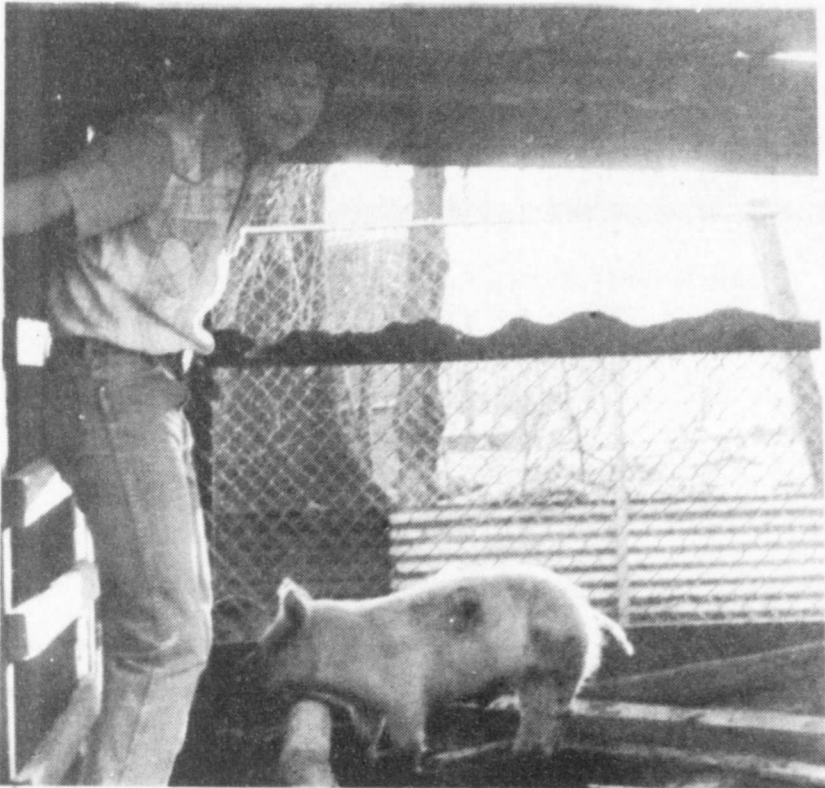

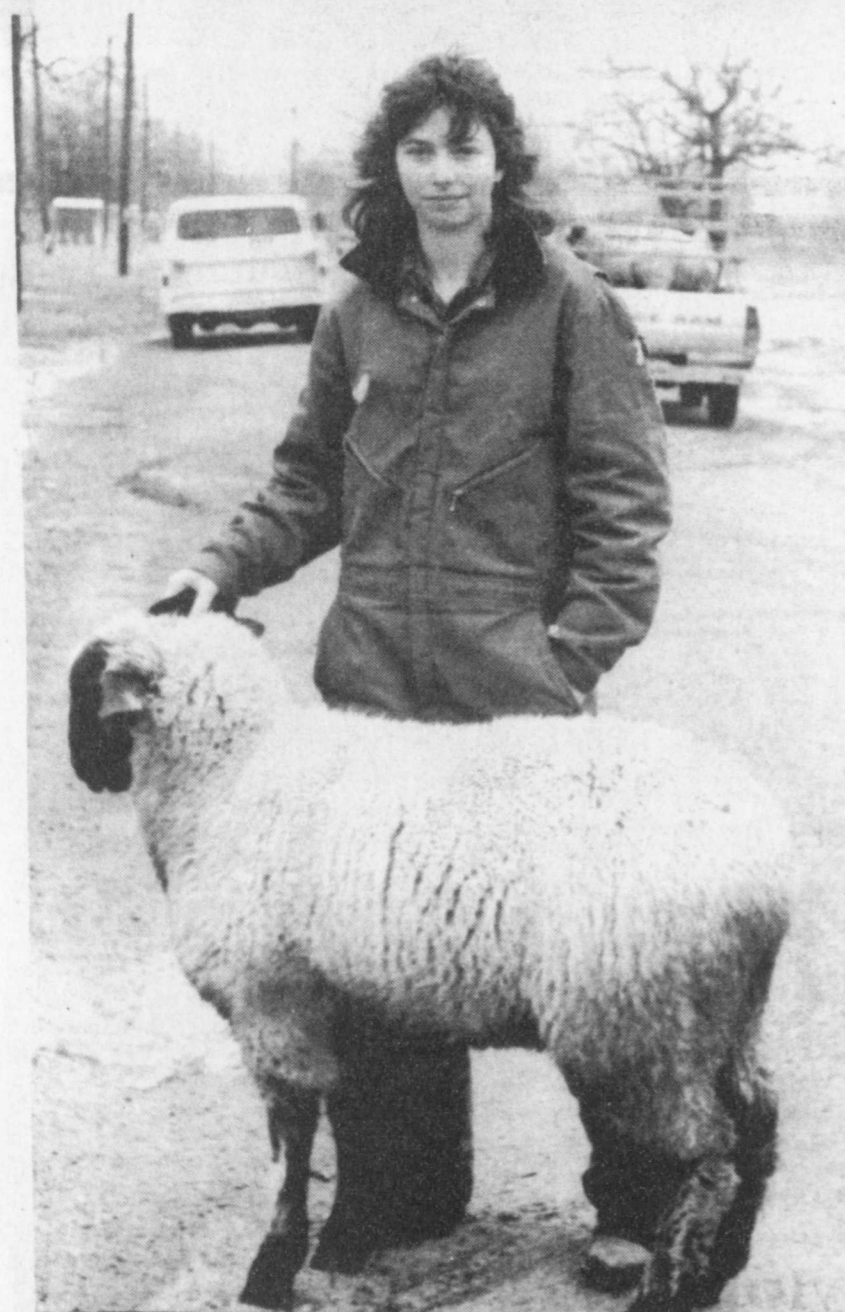

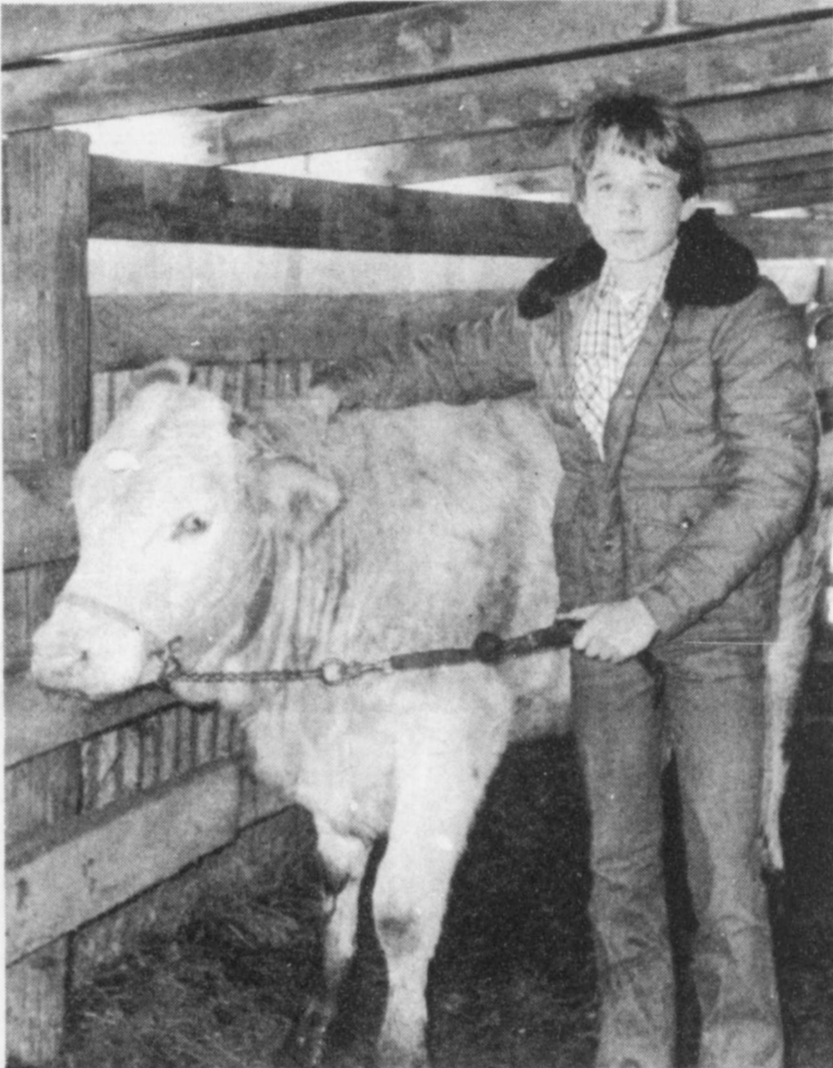

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Texas To Celebrate Sesquicentennial

AUSTIN—With two years remaining in the countdown to 1986, the Texas Sesquicentennial Commission has already organized more than a dozen statewide special events to celebrate 150 years of Texas' independence. Texas won its release from Mexico in the spring of 1836, but remained an independent Republic for nine years before joining the United States in 1845.

To coincide with this special "freedom" anniversary, nearly 200 community and county planning committees are sponsoring hundreds of local celebrations and projects for 1986. Wagon trains, trail rides, a commemorative stamp and special cultural and sporting events are only a few of the statewide festivities planned for two years from now by the Texas Sesquicentennial Commission.

The Texas Wagon Train will leave Sulphur Springs on January 2, 1986, and travel a 2,800-mile circuit, ending in Fort Worth on July 4 after stops in 130 Texas communities. Texans can travel the eastern and western halves of their state in one of two 2,200-mile Texas trail rides starting July 4, 1986, and concluding the following November. Five major Texas museums will develop a traveling Texas history exhibit as part of Project 150. In preparation for an ambitious collection of oral histories from older Texans living in different corners of the state, the Sesquicentennial Commission will hold 14 free "how-to" workshops across Texas before late 1985.

The Texas Highway Department will issue special license plates, featuring the words "Sesquicentennial/1836-1986" in red and blue lettering. The new license plates should be available to Texas motorists by December 1984. The South Texas Public Broadcasting System, based in Corpus Christi, is planning an eight-hour mini-series, "Lone Star," adapted from the book by Texas historian T.R. Fehrenbach. The series will be available to public television stations nationwide. A series of 52 one-minute television spots, sponsored by the Texas Committee for the Humanities, will highlight significant events in Texas history during broadcasts throughout 1986. In honor of the Sesquicentennial, many national sports events have been scheduled for Texas in 1986 including the LPGA Golf Tournament in Sugar Land, the Baseball Allstar Game in Houston, and both the NBA Allstar Game and the NCAA College Basketball Championship in Dallas. Austin is a finalist to host the National Sports Festival, a preliminary competition for the 1988 U.S. Olympic team. The State Fair of Texas is planning an expanded 60-day exposition in 1986, and the city of Dallas is making much-needed improvements to the 50-year-old fair grounds and buildings. A record number of out-of-state and foreign visitors are expected during the year-long Sesquicentennial celebration in 1986. Through grassroots planning and coordination at the state level, Texas can host events that both capture the state's independent spirit and pay tribute to the different cultures and nations that helped shape Texas history.

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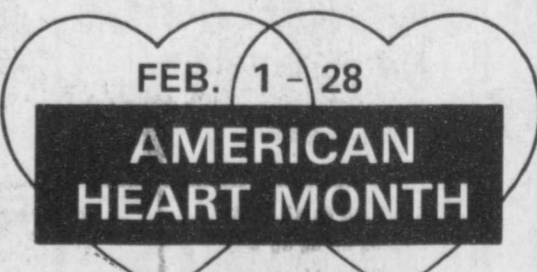

Good Bulls Crucial To Cattle Operation

Most East Texas cattlemen are either ready to put out bulls or will be in the near future. Serious time, thought and consideration should be given prior to the breeding season, says Dr. Randall Grooms.
If the cattlemen uses the right bull, he will maintain daughters and granddaughters in the herd for the next 20 years. If he picks the wrong bull, without genetic merit, it can be very costly and expensive in sacrificed production.
Eighty-five percent or more of all genetic improvement is made through the herd sire, Grooms says. If cattlemen select bulls of known superior genetic merit, genetic progress can be made very rapidly.
Many breeds are now publishing sire summaries that give accurate breeding values of birth weights, weaning weights, yearling weights and maternal values.
Commercial cattlemen may be able to use the truly superior bulls if their management program allows for artificial insemination. If they are not geared for AI, many top sons of these bulls are available after completion of their yearling performance tests.
Commercial cattlemen seeking genetic improvement should select sons of trait leaders that excel in their wean weight and yearling weight ratios. Ratio expresses the relative standing of an individual in his contemporary group, with 100 equaling the average. Ratios above 100 are the superior individuals.
Grooms says that care should be given to select bulls without extremely heavy birth weights and from cows that excel in milking ability. The idea commercial bull would have 100 plus ratios for weaning and yearling weights and a small birth weight.

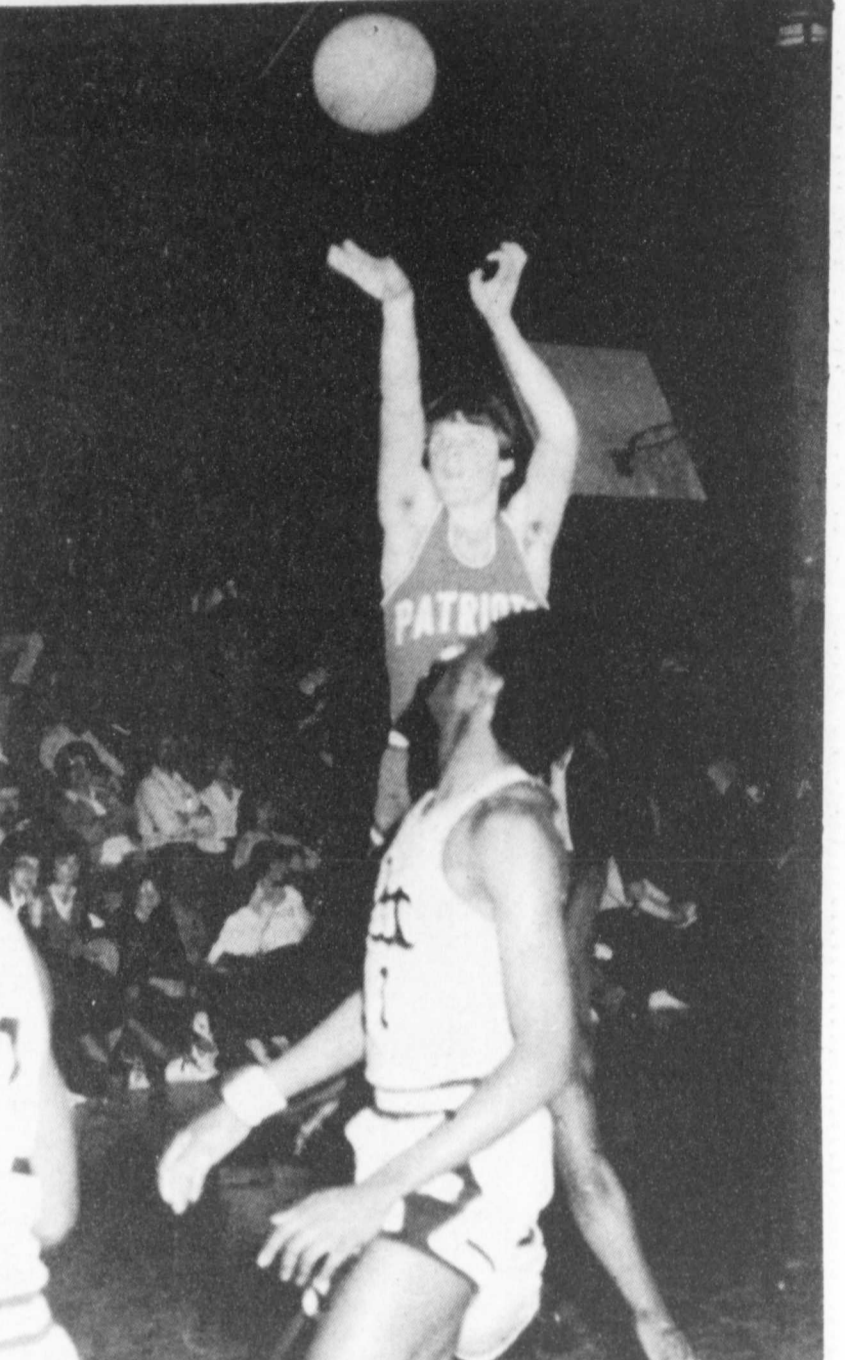
Patriots Work Towards Bi-District

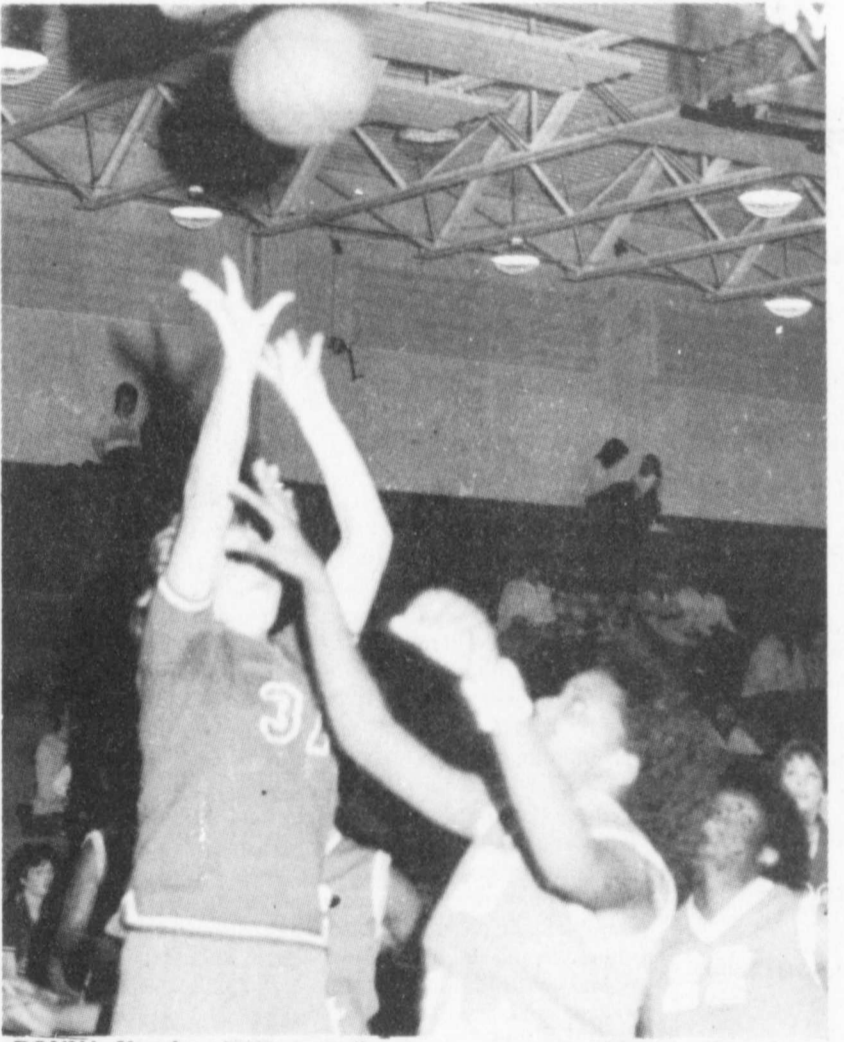
within four points at five to nine after the first quarter.
