

Erosion Is A Major Problem Nationwide

Erosion, in any rural area, it is a major problem...and this area is no exception.

The National Wildlife Federation has released some statistics that point out just how crucial a problem it is. Our soil, coupled with the extremely difficult economic climate for farmers and agriculturists at this time is a major factor in the area's economy.

The United States is losing 6.5 BILLION tons of soil each year, according to the U.S. Department of

Agriculture. This amount of soil would fill 320 million dump trucks, which, if parked end-to-end would extend to the moon and three-quarters of the way back!

Besides being crucial for farming and ranching, the soil provides homes to countless forms of life. One acre of soil may be the home to 5 to 10 tons of animal life!

Kentucky leads all other states in the amount of soil lost per acre from sheet and rill erosion. Texas, for-

tunately, doesn't rate in the top five of that sad fact.

But the nation's cultivated cropland is eroding at an average rate in excess of 8 tons per acre each year, much more than the rate at which eroded soils are replaced through natural processes.

Topsoil, as just about any East Texan knows, is essentially the "cream" of the soil. It has the most nutrient matter and the best structure for aeration, moisture and temperature.

Texas does have a high level of wind erosion, some 13.4 tons per acre!

Texas, in terms of sheer tonnage, loses more soil from wind erosion than any other state. It is losing, according to the most recent federal data, 436.1 million tons of soil annually from cultivated cropland.

There are three types of soil erosion caused by rain, sheet, rill and gully.

Sheet erosion is the most difficult to see. It is the gradual wearing

away of a thin, uniform layer of soil. It occurs when there is not enough vegetation covering the soil, and seen as muddy runoff water.

Rill erosion occurs on gentle slopes that have little protective vegetation. Water runoff on the slopes accumulates into small channels of only a few inches deep.

Gully erosion occurs when runoff water accumulates into rapidly moving water channels. The water causes the channels to grow wider and deeper. This happens on steeper

slopes with little or no protective vegetation.

Erosion is a serious problem, not just a minor matter. An increased awareness of this fact by everyone can only help.

No human, plant or animal is exempt from a dependency on the soil. Some people live further from the earth, but their dependency is no less, only less evident.

National Wildlife Federation's slogan for this year is "Soil, we can't grow without it", is an appropriate one.

We immediately loaded up and started home. Before we had gone very far, big drops of rain began to splat down on us and we could see the storm coming up fast. Marion, Rose's oldest son, put the mules into a fast trot. We could see the rain streaking down across the prairie behind us as the lightning flashed and the thunder boomed. That just increased our speed.

We got home when the storm hit. We unhooked the team and turned them into the lot with the harness on, and ran to the house. By the time we got inside, the hail was coming down on the sheet iron roof with a deafening roar. When it was over, the ground was covered with balls of ice.

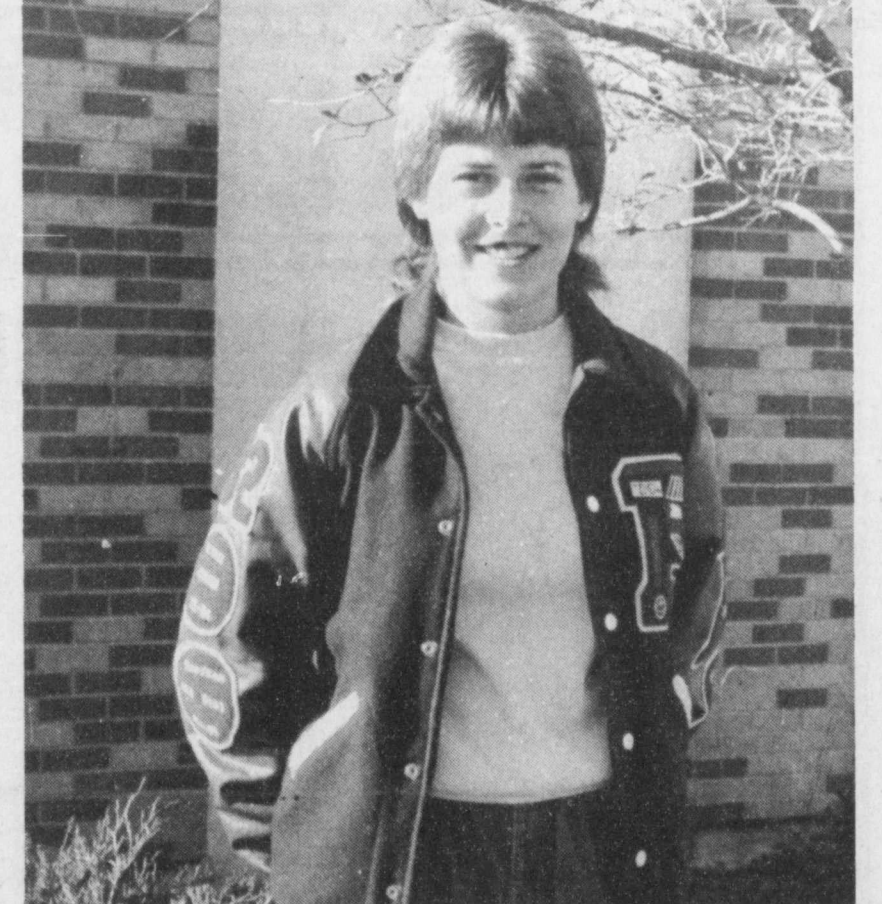
The runnign beans were beat into the ground, but we had plenty of poles for next year.

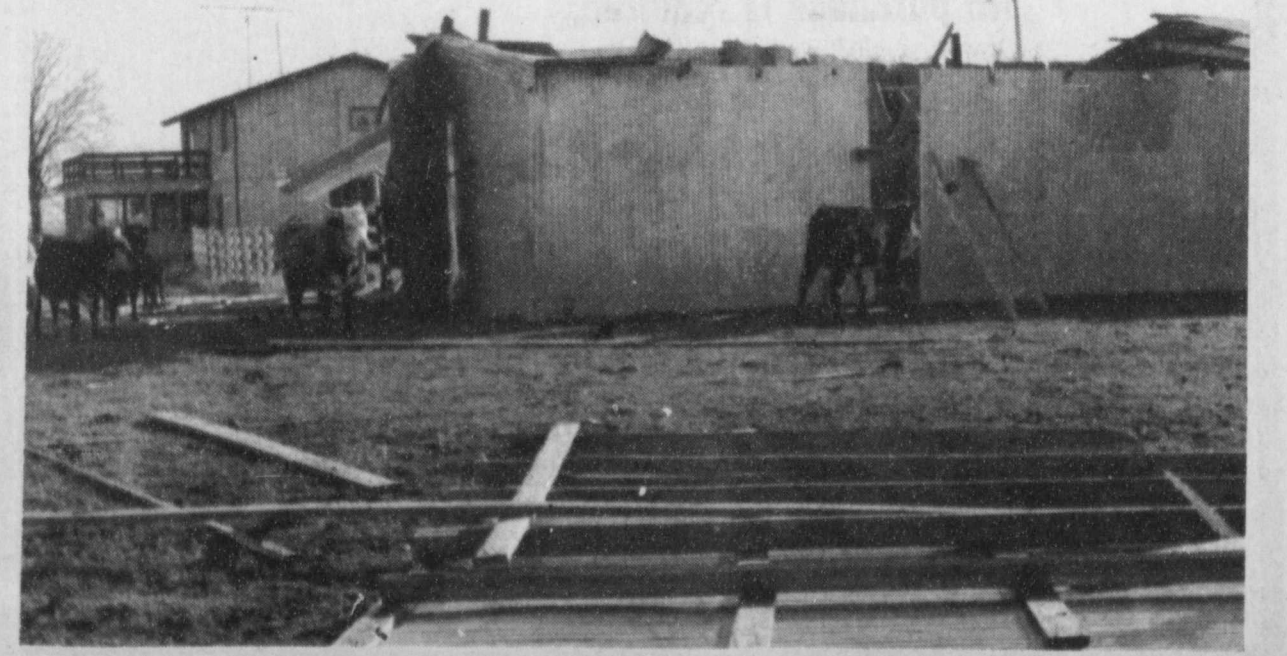

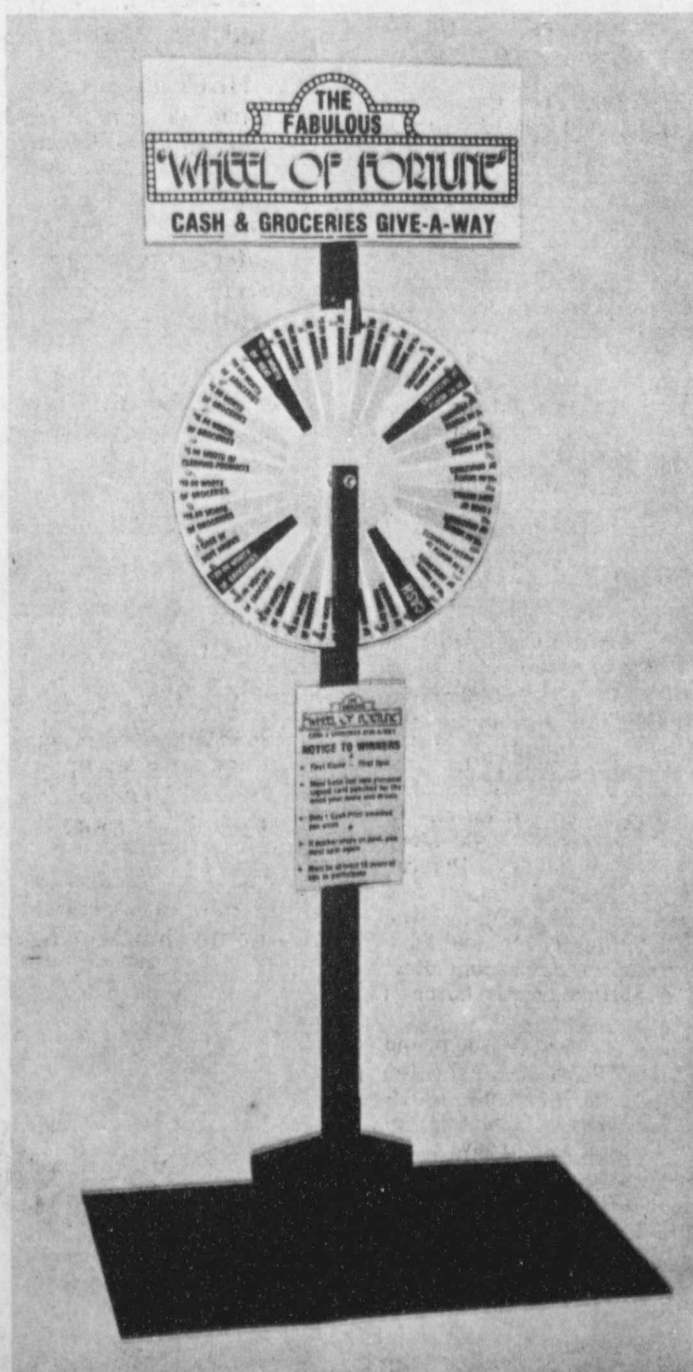

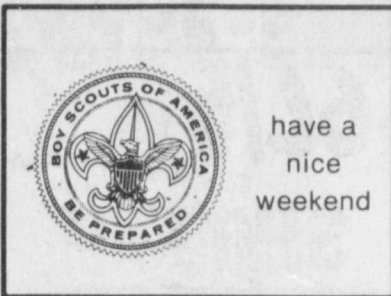

Time For Planting Pine

The optimum time for planting pine seedlings are from January 1 through March 15, because at this time the trees are dormant and moisture is available.

Over one-half million pine seedlings will be planted in Red River County during this planting season. Over two-thirds of this amount will be planted by International Paper Company. The remainder will be planted on land owned by individuals.

Because of man's ability to foul up things, our once abundant supply of pine timber is slowly decreasing. However, there are two basic principles that a woodland owner can and must apply to assure an adequate wood supply for the future. First, the forests that are well stocked with good quality trees must be properly managed to keep them, productive. They must also replant desirable species on suitable soils that are not now in profitable timber production.

The trees that are planted must be the most adapted species. There are

three species of pine adapted to this area: short-leaf, loblolly and slash. They must be planted at the correct stocking rate and must be given good growing conditions. Given these details, pine trees will and can be a very profitable investment.

The soil conditions that exist must be considered where trees are to be planted. They will determine the expected growth rate of the trees, and the particular species that can be planted.

After all the conditions have been evaluated on the farm, the species can be selected and ordered.
