

Prairiland Patriots Drop One, Take One

The Prairiland Patriots fell out of first place Thursday evening as they lost a 6-3 game on the road in Daingerfield. It was the first district loss for the Patriots and it puts them a game back of Paul Pewitt in second place.
The Patriots started the game in typical Patriot fashion as Scott Scudder singled and then stole second base. Scudder then came around to score the first run of the game as a result of an error following a John Dusenberry single. Daingerfield then had a little more charity to give away as Dusenberry came in to score the second run of the game as a result of another error. That would be the only Patriot scoring of the inning and Prairiland led 2-0.

Daingerfield was quick to draw blood in the latter half of the first inning. Pitcher Heath Kennedy gave up only two hits in the inning but the second one proved to be a two run homer as Daingerfield tied the game at 2-2. The inning came to a close on a fine Patriot play as catcher John Dusenberry threw out a runner attempting a steal second base.
Daingerfield took the lead after the Patriots failed to score in the second inning. The lone run that scored in the inning put Daingerfield up 3-2 after two innings of play.
Prairiland was quick to answer the Daingerfield run in the top of the third inning. With one out in the inning, pitcher Heath Kennedy singled and then stole second base. Kennedy then came in to score when Dusenberry, who played a great

game, singled him in. That would be the only run of the inning for the Patriots as the game was tied at 3-3 after 2 and 1/2 innings of play.
Prairiland did not score in the game again but did have a strong rally in the seventh inning trying to come back from a 6-3 deficit. With one out, Scudder, Kennedy and Dusenberry singled to load the bases. The rally ended there, however, as the next two Patriots struck out.
Pitching the last three innings and doing a terrific job was Mike Blackburn as he failed to yield a run in his three innings on the mound.
The Prairiland Patriots got back on the winning track Tuesday night as they dealt DeKalb an 8-1 loss in DeKalb.
The Patriots wasted little time in

scoring in the game. After an out, Scott Scudder walked and stole second base. Scudder then advanced to third base when Heath Kennedy reached first base on an infield single. Scudder then came in to score the first and final run of the inning when DeKalb tried to throw Kennedy out at second base.
Scoring came to a standstill until Prairiland got rolling in the top of the third inning. Mike Connot got the inning going in good fashion when he singled and then stole second base. After a Joel Ballard walk, Connot stole third base to put runners on the corners. Scudder then got the second RBI with a single to put Prairiland in front 2-0. That was the final run of the inning and Prairiland led 2-0.
In the fourth inning, with one out,

John David Loyd was hit with a pitch and then stole second base. Then, Chris Sparks alertly made it to first base when the catcher dropped the ball on a strikeout. After Sparks stole second, third baseman Rob Connot hit a three run homer over the left field fence. Mike Connot followed with a single, and as usual, stole second base. Scudder then singled in Connot putting Prairiland in front 6-0 after 3 1/2 innings.
After Scott Scudder mowed down the side in the bottom of the fourth, catcher John Dusenberry hit a home run to lead off the fifth inning giving Prairiland a 7-0 lead. Following a Patriot out, John David Loyd singled and then stole second base. Loyd then moved on over to third base as a result of a passed ball. Rob Connot

then walked putting runners at the corners. When Connot was attempted to be picked off first, Loyd came in to score the final run of the inning and final Patriot run of the game with Prairiland leading 8-0.
DeKalb finally got on the scoreboard in the bottom of the sixth inning.
The Patriots hung on to win the game 8-1 as the Patriots improved their district record to 4-1. Scott Scudder did a great job pitching as he pitched a four-hitter. Scudder struck out 12 batters in the game and issued only one walk.
The next Patriot game will be Friday afternoon in Prairiland when they take on Paul Pewitt in a game for the first place lead.

City, School Elections Decided

Turnouts for Blossom and Deport City elections, and the Prairiland CISD school trustee elections were small Saturday, as the school board was uncontested and spring weather seemed to tempt people out for more entertaining things than voting.

Blossom registered a pleasing turnout, however, with a total voter response of 126. Rickey Thomas,

with 86 votes, was elected to the City Council; Cecil Kuykendall received 69 votes, and incumbent Ann Thompson 64 votes. Incumbent Tommy Owens lost out by one vote, finishing with 63 and James T. Anderson received 50 votes of the five people for three positions race.
In Deport, three people were elected to the City Council; Tom

Webb, 75 votes; incumbent Gordon Isbell with 71 votes; and Kenneth Gifford with 65 votes. Nancy Gresham received 49 votes.

The Prairiland school board election had 67 people voting to put Billy Ray Oats and Rufus Merritt back to their seats in an uncontested race.

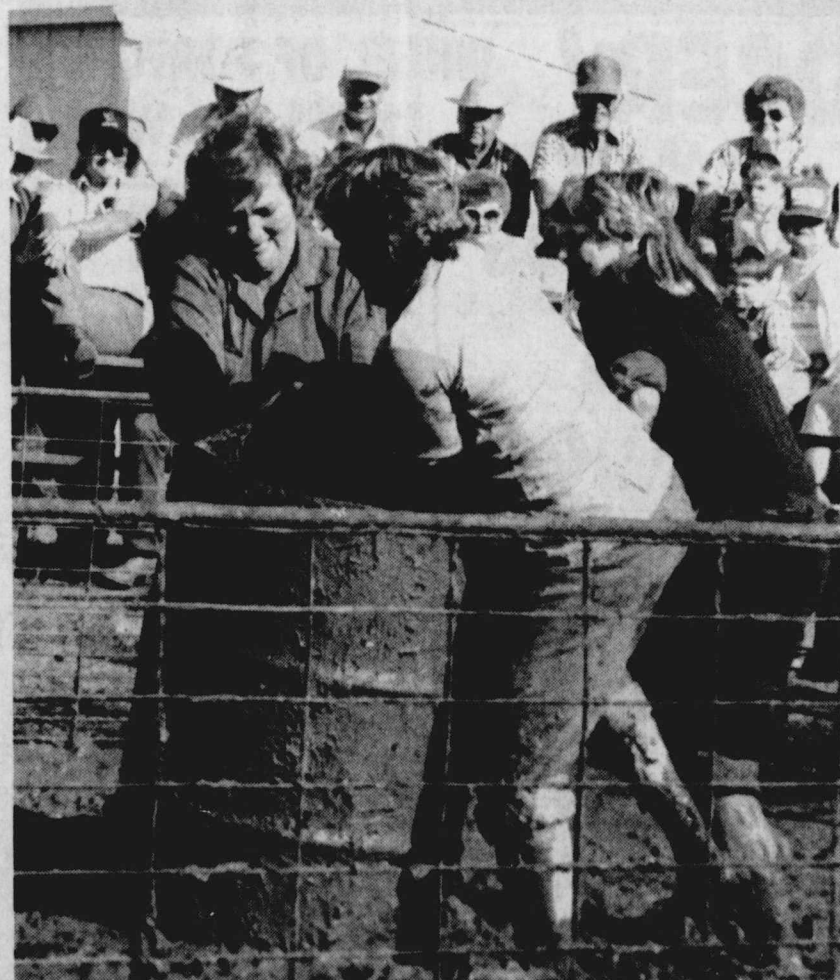

Board Extends Contracts

In a regular Prairiland CISD board meeting Monday night, the results of Saturday's election were canvassed, and the two unopposed incumbents, Billy Ray Oats and Rufus Merrit, were sworn in.

The board extended all auxiliary personnel such as cooks, bus drivers and custodians contracts by one year.

The financial report was approved and bill payment authorized.

A tax summary was presented on collections for March, and new board policies concerning immunizations and workman's compensation were adopted to meet the state guidelines.

Keystone Insurance Company was selected for the student insurance policies.

Deport To Get Rebuilt Cable System

The Deport City Council covered a number of items of business, including a proposal from the local cable company, and several girls interested in forming a girl's softball team.

Jim Short, district manager for CCA cablevision, and Don Chaney, owner, proposed that because the current system was so deteriorated, a new system could be rebuilt in Deport. The rebuilt system would be an aerial system. They would add the Nashville channel to the basic subscriber package, which is a country music and family entertainment channel. The Cinemax channel would be dropped, since it duplicates much of what is already on HBO, and the Disney Channel, a family and children's channel, would be added.

Upon completion of the rebuilding, which is scheduled for completion at no later than November 1, 1985, and upon the addition of the new channels and dropping of the Cinemax station, the basic subscriber fee would be increased to \$15 per month per subscriber, and the present functions with CCI would be renewed for an additional fifteen years.

The council gave the approval on this plan.

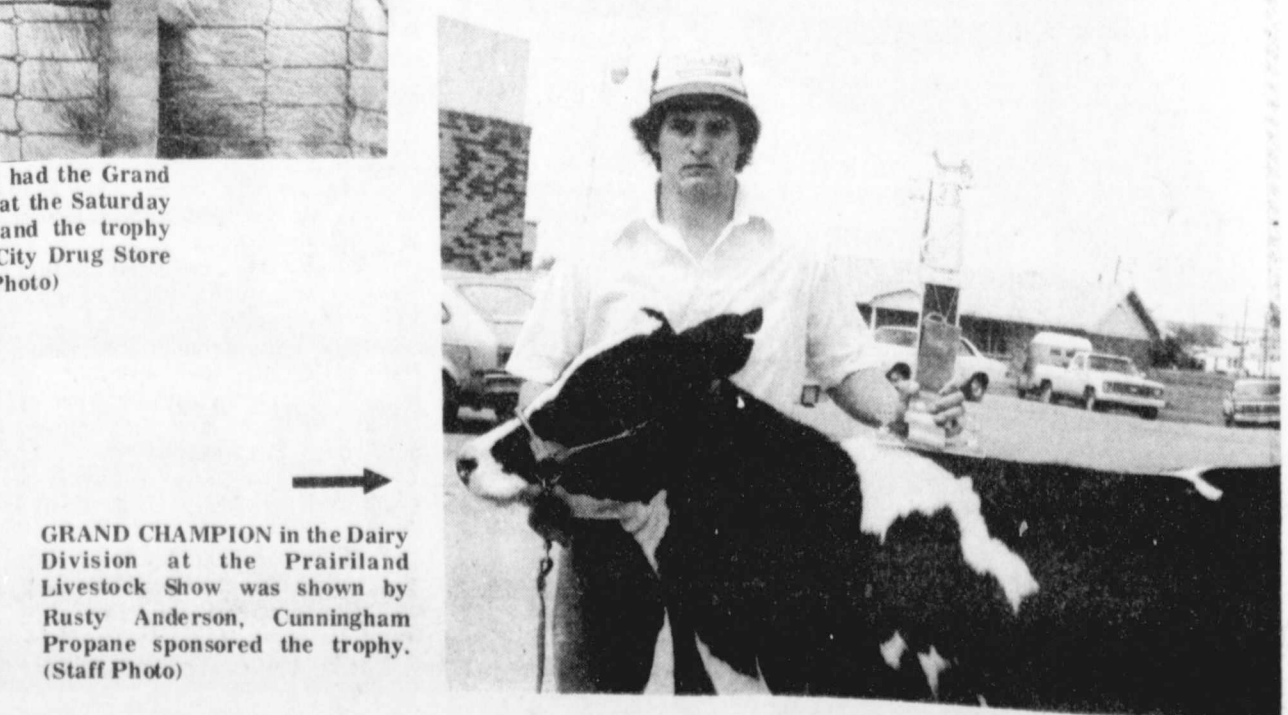
