

Pats End First Half Of District In First Place

The Patriots ended the first half of district play Tuesday afternoon at North Lamar as they defeated the Panthers 10-0 in five innings.

The Patriots, after failing to score in the first two innings, finally pushed across a run in the third. Chris Sparks started the rally with a single and then stole second base. Mike Connot then moved Sparks over to third base on a single. Joel Ballard then hit a ground ball to the second baseman which scored Sparks. That ended the Patriot scoring and after three innings Prairiland led 1-0.

Prairiland doubled their run production of the prior inning in the fourth inning as they widened their lead. After

an out in the inning, Jay Ingram reached first base on an error. Ingram, however, was then erased from the basepaths on a fielder's choice by John David Loyd. Loyd was then able to move on over to second base as a result of a balk committed by the North Lamar Pitcher. Loyd then moved to third base when Robbie Connot was safe on an error at first base. Chris Sparks then singled in Loyd for the second run of the game and advanced Robbie Connot to second base. Mike Connot then singled in Robbie Connot for the second and final run of the inning. After four innings of play, Prairiland led 3-0.

Prairiland erupted in the fifth inning with one of their more explosive scor-

ing outburst of the year. With one out, Scott Scudder started the rally with a single, Heath Kennedy and John Dusenberry followed suits with consecutive singles to load the bases. Jay Ingram then singled to right field to score Scudder and Kennedy and to advance Dusenberry to third base. John David Loyd then singled in Dusenberry and moved Ingram to second base. After Robbie Connot flew out for the second out of the inning, Sparks drove in Ingram for the fourth run of the game and moved Loyd to third base. Mike Connot then drove in Loyd with a single and moved Sparks on over to third base. Joel Ballard then drove in the final two runs of the inning with a single and Prairiland led 10-0 after 4½

innings. Scott Scudder then made sure that the ten run rule would go into effect as he struck out the side in the bottom of the fifth inning as Prairiland went on to win 10-0.

Scott Scudder racked up his sixth win without a loss in the game as he struck out seven and yielded but three hits. The victory improved the Prairiland record to 6-1 and kept them in first place after the first half of district play.

The Prairiland Patriots beat Paul Pewitt Friday afternoon 4-1 to put the 5-1 Patriots in sole possession of first place.

The first 5½ innings of the game was a pitcher's duel as Scott Scudder and the Paul Pewitt hurler racked up goose

eggs. As impressive as the two pitchers, however, was the flawless fielding of both teams. Third baseman Robbie Connot played the hot corner to perfection and left fielder Jay Ingram played the wind-blown fly balls with judgement.

While the Patriot defense kept Scudder out of possible jams, the Paul Pewitt defense was as duly impressive. Several Patriots were robbed of potential hits by the slick-leather-flashing Paul Pewitt fielders.

Ironically, the Patriots finally broke the game open in the bottom of the sixth inning as a result of numerous Pewitt defensive lapses. With one out, Joel Ballard singled and moved to third base on an error by the third baseman. Scudder then hit a ground ball which

scored Ballard for the first run of the game. Scudder reached first base on an error on the play and then swiped second base. Heath Kennedy then singled in Scudder and moved on over to second base on the throw, to the plate. After the second out of the inning, Jay Ingram singled in Kennedy for the third run of the game. John David Loyd then proceeded to reach base on an error. Paul Pewitt then had another error up their sleeve as Ingram scored the fourth and final run of the inning when the pitcher threw the ball away, trying to pick Loyd off first base.

Paul Pewitt finally got on the board for the first time in the seventh inning as a result of a leadoff triple. The lone run, however, meant little as Scudder struck out the final three Pewitt batters giving Prairiland a 4-1 victory

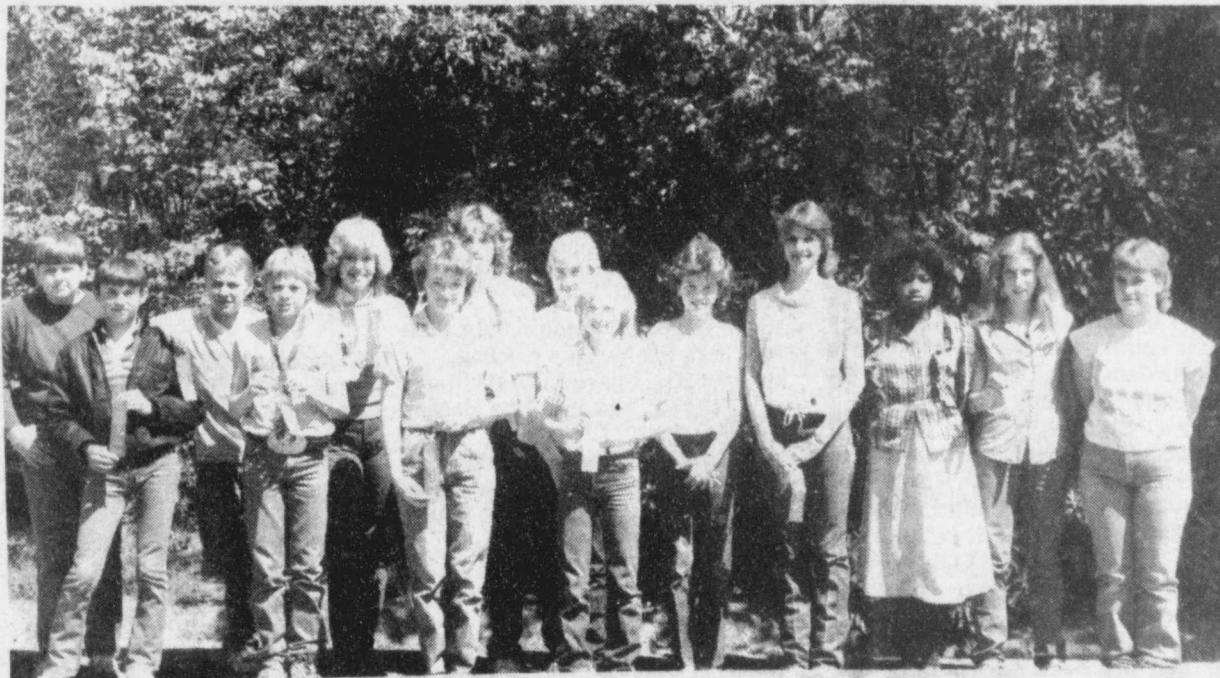

Local Sales Tax Figures Show Ups And Downs

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday sent checks totaling \$48.9 million in local tax payments to the 1,003 cities that levy the one-percent sales tax.

Bullock cautioned against attempts to draw conclusions about the Texas economy based on one month's rebate figure but added the April payments "are in line with our projections for the state."

Houston received the largest check—\$8.5 million—for a total \$48 million in 1985. Dallas' check for \$6.1 million brought this year's payments to \$35.4 million.

Locally, Blossom received a check in

the amount of \$900.44, for a 5.84 percent increase over last year's total to date of \$4,089.09.

Deport received no payment this period, bringing the 1985 payments to date of \$2,759.33, marking a 6.43 percent decrease.

Bogata received payment of \$1,025.88, bringing 1985 payments to total \$7,273.97, for a 13.81 percent increase over 1984.

Talco received a payment of \$2,226.20, compared to a payment of \$2,097.60 this time last year, bringing the 1985 payments to total \$7,563.41 for an 11.91 percent decrease.

May 24: B and L, 8-10: 15 a.m.; A,M, U and V, 10:15 a.m.-12:30 p.m.; D,E,F,J and K, 12:30 p.m. D,E,F,J and K 12:30-2:45 p.m. Students unable to register at their scheduled time may enroll from 2:45 to 4:15 p.m. on May 24. Schedule changes and late registration will begin on May 28, the first day of classes.

PJC's second summer semester will begin on July 8 and continue through Aug. 13. Registration will be on July 1, 1 and 3.

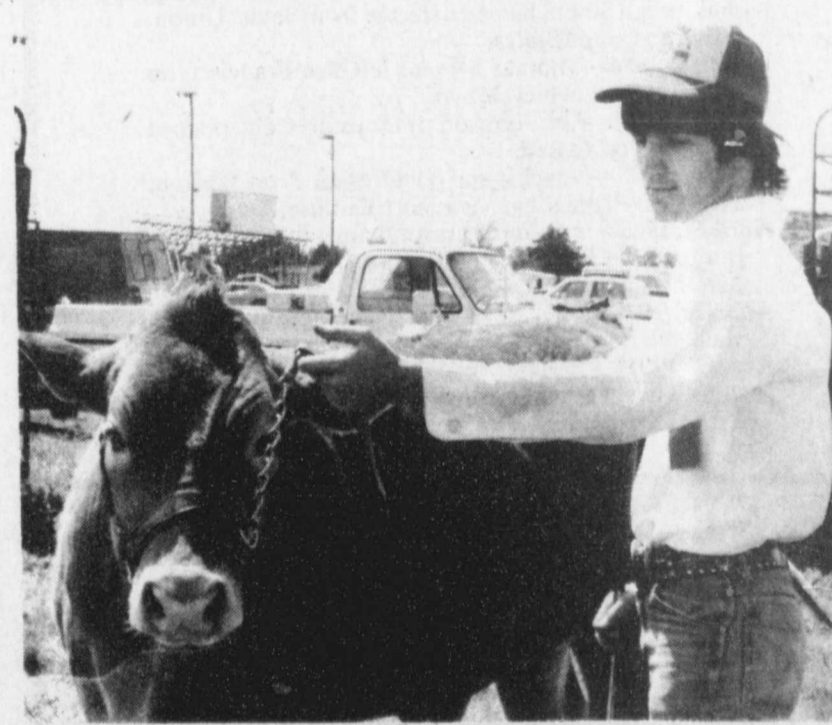

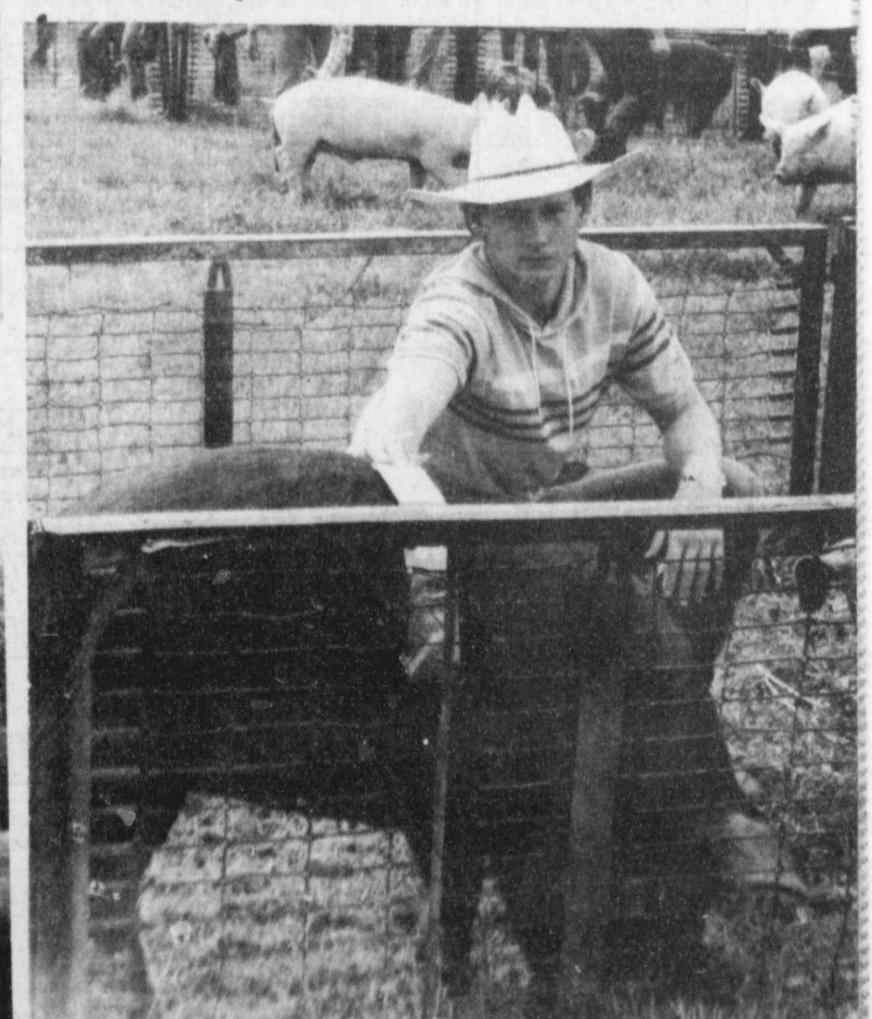

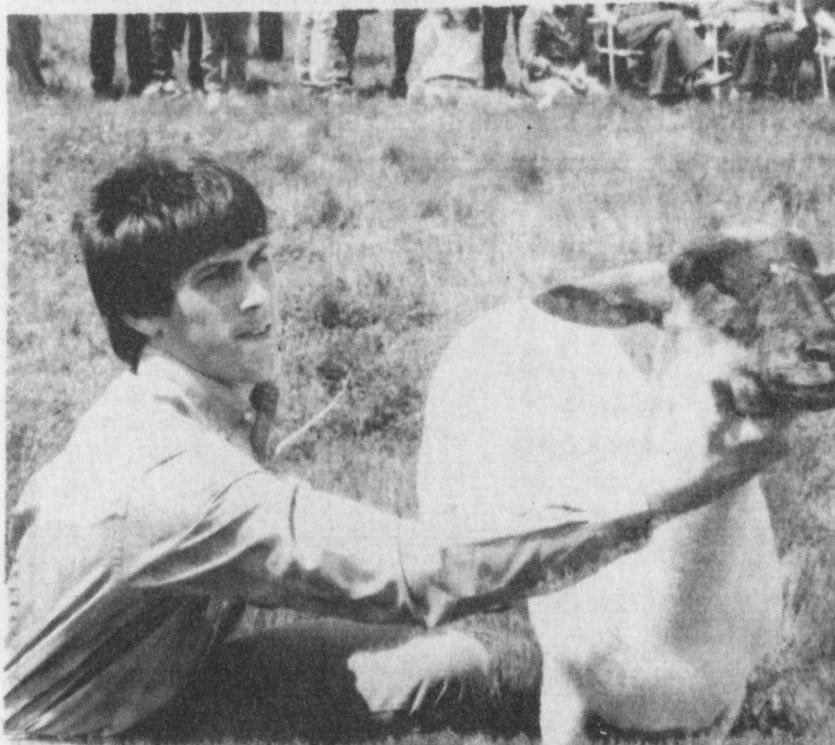

Bermuda Planting Time Is Near

By Michael J. Raney
Bermudagrass planting time is just around the corner. Landowners should consider the kind of bermudagrass they want to sprig and the condition of the seedbed. There are different bermudagrasses adapted to this area but the most widely used in early sprigging is coastal bermudagrass.

A proper seedbed should have been prepared in the fall of last year. If a seedbed has not been prepared then the landowner should prepare a clean, firm seedbed from 5 to 7 inches in depth prior to sprigging. Seedbeds prepared last fall may have to be disked lightly before sprigging.

Bermudagrass can be sprigged anytime after the first killing frost when the bermudagrass goes dormant through May 15. Bermudagrass sprigs should have healthy, uninjured, live stolons and rhizomes. They should also be free of excessive foreign matter. Bermudagrass is planted at the rate of 24 bu.-ac. in pasture planting and at the rate of 48 bu.-ac. when sprigging critical areas that have been shaped. After sprigging, the area should be rolled with some type of packer. Landowners should apply fertilizer according to a current soils test. Sprigging should not be done when ground is frozen, too wet, too dry, or in an otherwise non-tillable condition.

Wheat Situation Complicates

By Paul D. Payne
Disease and insect problems continue to increase in area wheat fields and wheat producers are encouraged to keep a close check on their fields for developing problems. The next three weeks will be critical for this year's crop, as timely decisions may be needed on disease control measures.

The number one topic of wheat farmers is the Hessian Fly. More is not known about this insect than is known at this present time. There are a couple of things that farmers can do this spring that will be of tremendous value to area producers this fall.

The first is location in the counties where there may be an Hessian Fly problem.

The second item that is needed is variety of wheat that is infested as you can tell this type of information will be important at planting time this fall. So far we have found it is Coker 916 and Coker 68-15.

The third item that we need to record is time of planting. This will help us to determine a planting time this fall for those areas hard hit by the Hessian Fly this year. The three fields with the flies were planted from September 15 to the first of October.

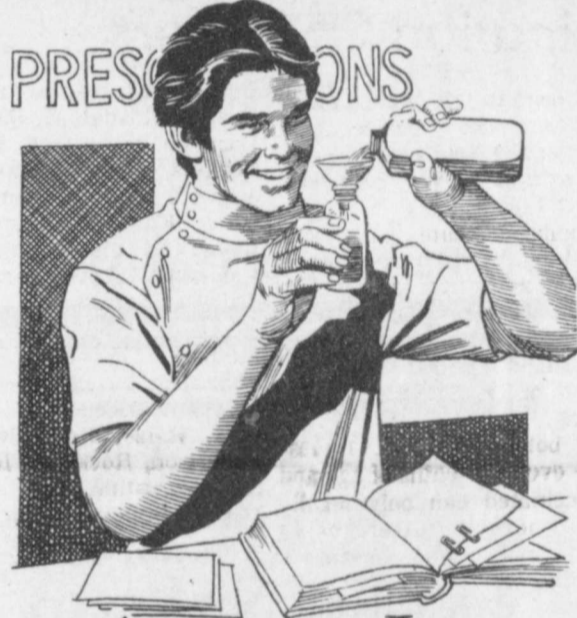

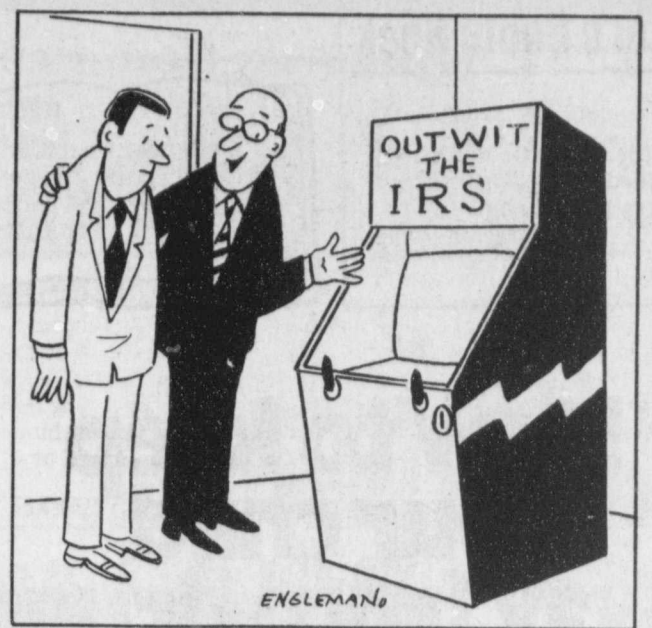

Brucellosis Laws Require Vaccination Of Heifers

Heifers born in 1984 in the Class C Area of Texas need to be vaccinated before they are a year old in order to comply with a Texas brucellosis vaccination regulation.

The regulation states that heifers born after Jan. 1 1984 between 4 and 12 months of age which are acquired and used for breeding, grazing, dairying or confinement in a nonquarantined feedlot must be vaccinated or be subject to these restrictions:

Heifers born after Jan. 1, 1984 which are over 12 months of age and are unvaccinated can only legally change ownership after being spayed; or moved to a livestock market and S branded prior to sale; or consigned direct to slaughter, quarantined feedlot or quarantined pasture.

State funds are available for vaccinations. Contact your area TEXAS Animal Health Commission office or your own veterinarian for details.

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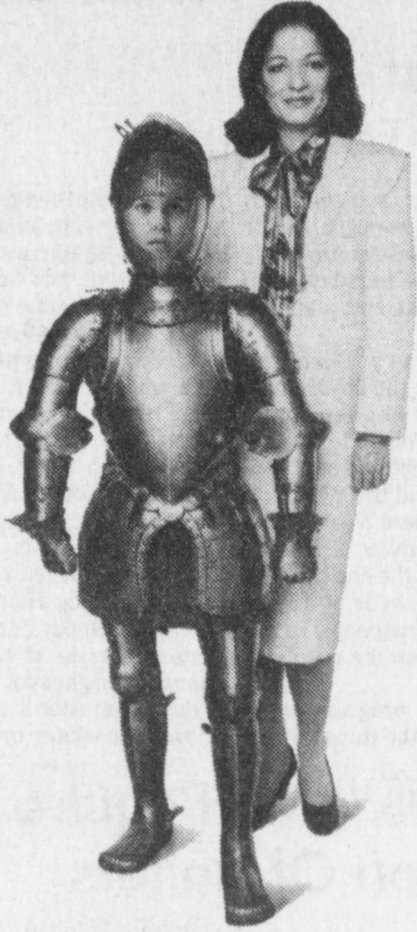

Weekly Agricultural Update

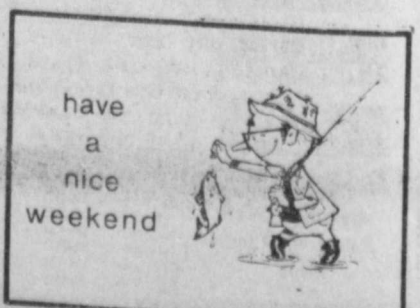

For maximum utilization, forages should be grazed close and excess forage harvested for hay, says Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

By confining animals to smaller areas and grazing forage down to two or three inches tall, the quality will be maintained throughout the growing season. The quality of grasses is highest when the grass is young and tender, therefore, heavier grazing during lush growing periods is to the advantage of the producer. Cross fences, either permanent or electric, are essential for this type utilization.

Excess small grain and clover can also be handled in the same manner. These forages make excellent hay if the weather cooperates and the forage can be properly cured.

Small grains make the highest quality hay when cut in the boot stage. If the small grain and clover are growing together, Reeves says to determine the cutting time by the maturity of the small grain.

By baling small grains that were sowed in bermudagrass, the bermuda will get off to a quicker start and produce additional forage earlier. Generally, small grains are ready for baling the latter part of April and early May.

Wheat Disease Situation Stable

The leaf rust situation in Lamar
County wheat was stable on Monday
afternoon when several fields were
checked. The rust spore count
remains low at the spore trap located

reached 130 spores per day on March

leaves. Cooler temperatures and
lower humidity are also conditions
that discourage rust development.

Farmers are encouraged to con-
tinue their check of fields. Dr.
George Phillely, Extension Plant
Pathologist, suggested a couple of
"Thumb Rules" to help one deter-
mine when to and not to apply
chemical. One should consider ap-
plying chemical if rust is found on 10
to 20 percent of the two leaves just
below the flag leaf. This is of course
if the yield potential is there. Also it
is doubtful that a chemical ap-
plication would be effective once the
grain reaches the flowering stage.
These are general rules only.

Should we have a rust problem,
obtaining a timely chemical ap-
plication could be a tricky situation.
We are speaking mainly of the
weather. Very few days of late hav

high wind. Waiting ones turn is also a
factor as everyone will want their
field sprayed first and on and on.
Just as sure as warmer
temperatures appear in spring,
algae appears on farm ponds. If
control measures are to be used,
they should be used as soon as
possible before temperatures rise
and the amount of algae in the pond
increases.

There are two chemicals that are
labeled for use on farm ponds,
Azoxiazine and Hydrothol 191. Follow
the recommended rate on the label.
The rate will be based on so much
per acre foot of water to treat.
Remember that one acre foot is one
surface acre, one foot deep. One will
need to determine the surface acres
and the average depth of water.

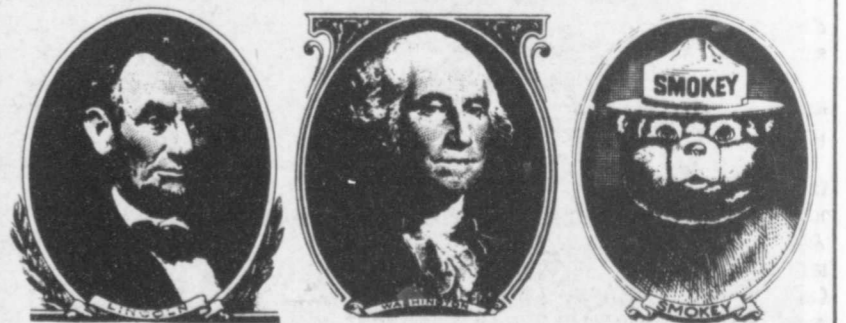
