

# Patriots Win One Game , Drop One

The Prairiland Patriots lost for only their second time in district play Friday afternoon as they lost a 6-3 decision to Mt. Vernon on the road.

Heath Kennedy, with two outs in the first inning, got the first hit of the game, rapping a double off the right field fence. Catcher John Dusenberry then got another opposite field hit, stroking a single by second base to drive in the first run of the game. Prairiland could not score another run in the inning, but they led 1-0 after the first inning of play.

After Mike Blackburn held Mt. Vernon scoreless in the bottom of the first inning, Prairiland again got rolling offensively in the second inning. John David Loyd led off with a walk and then stole second base. Loyd then ad-

vanced on over the third base when the Mt. Vernon pitcher balked while pitching to Robbie Connot. Connot then drove in Loyd for the second run of the game with a sharp single to centerfield. Connot then used his speed to swipe both second and third base before being singled in by Joel Ballard for the third run of the game. Ballard's run batted in was the final score of the inning and Prairiland led 3-0 after two innings.

After Prairiland failed to score in the third inning, pitcher Mike Blackburn began to experience control problems in the bottom of the third. With a couple of hits and a few bases on balls, the Tigers managed to even up the score at 3-3 after three innings.

The Patriots failed to score in the

fourth inning or any other inning of the ballgame. Mt. Vernon finally took the lead after the fourth inning at 5-3 and were never seriously challenged. The Tigers picked up one more run in the sixth inning and went on to win.

The momentum of the game seemed to swing over to the Mt. Vernon side when they scored their first run of the game. On the Mt. Vernon score, John Dusenberry, the Patriot catcher seemingly tagged out the eventual run at the plate. The Patriots never seemed to get going again after the controversy on the call at the plate.

In a make-up game Wednesday, April 24, in Clarksville, the Prairiland Patriots continued their winning streak as they won the game 7-1 at the new Clarksville stadium.

With one out in the first inning,

Scott Scudder walked and then stole second base. The steal seemed automatic because of Coach Bill Scudder's non-hesitation to give his runners the green light and because of Prairiland's outstanding success on the basepaths. Scudder then was promptly plated by catcher John Dusenberry to give Prairiland a 1-0 lead.

Prairiland was unable to ring up another tally in the inning so Prairiland led by one after an inning of play.

With one out in the second inning, Prairiland again managed to stage a rally. Robbie Connot started the rally with a hard lick down the third base line for a double and then stole third base when Chris Sparks walked. After another out, Joel Ballard

continued his hot hitting with a triple to the right field fence to drive in both Connot and Sparks. Prairiland failed to score again in the inning and led 3-0 after two innings of play.

After making an outstanding play on shortstop to retire Clarksville in the second inning, Heath Kennedy banged a double to right field. Kennedy was then advanced over to third base when John Dusenberry grounded out. Prairiland was then given a break when Kennedy came in to score as a result of the centerfielder dropping Jay Ingram's fly ball to end the scoring in the third inning with Prairiland leading 4-0.

After Clarksville managed to squeak across a single run in the third inning, the Patriot team was fired up to widen their lead in the fourth inning. Chris Sparks led off the inning

with a slow infield roller but used his speed to beat it out for a single. Sparks then stole second base, putting himself in scoring position when Mike Connot doubled to give Prairiland a 5-1 lead. Joel Ballard then walked on four pitches and along with Mike Connot, advanced up a base on steals. Connot was then able to score when Heath Kennedy hit a sacrifice fly giving Prairiland a 6-1 lead.

Joel Ballard advanced to third on a steal on the following pitch and came in to score when the catcher threw the ball out in left field. Ballard's run gave Prairiland a 7-1 lead and neither team was able to score thereafter as Prairiland went on to win 7-1.

Scott Scudder was again impressive on the mound pitching a three hitter while racking up nine strike-outs

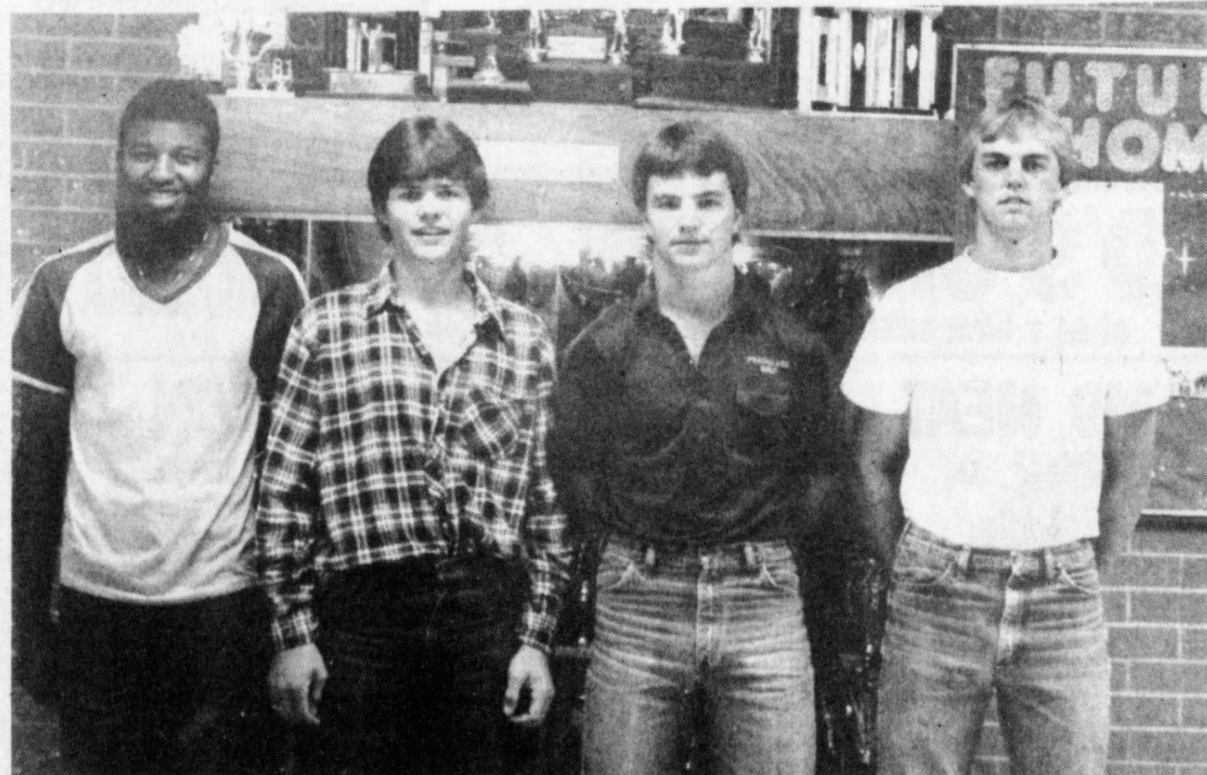

Only those selected by a secondary school instructor, counselor or other qualified sponsor are accepted. These scholars are also eligible for other awards given by NSEC.

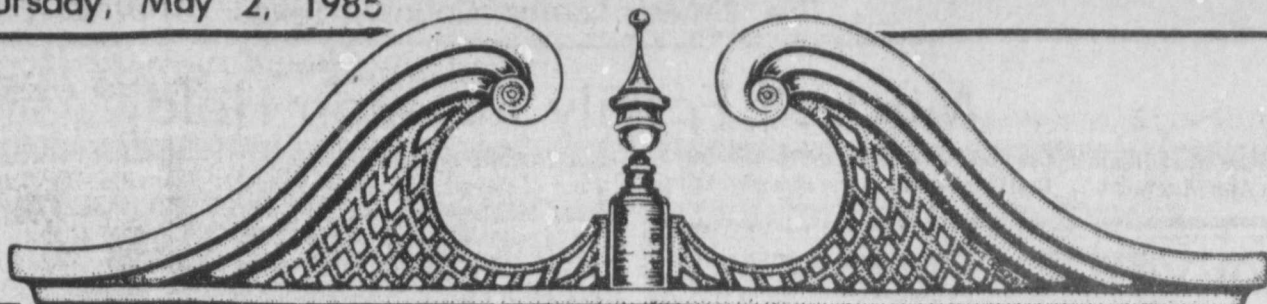

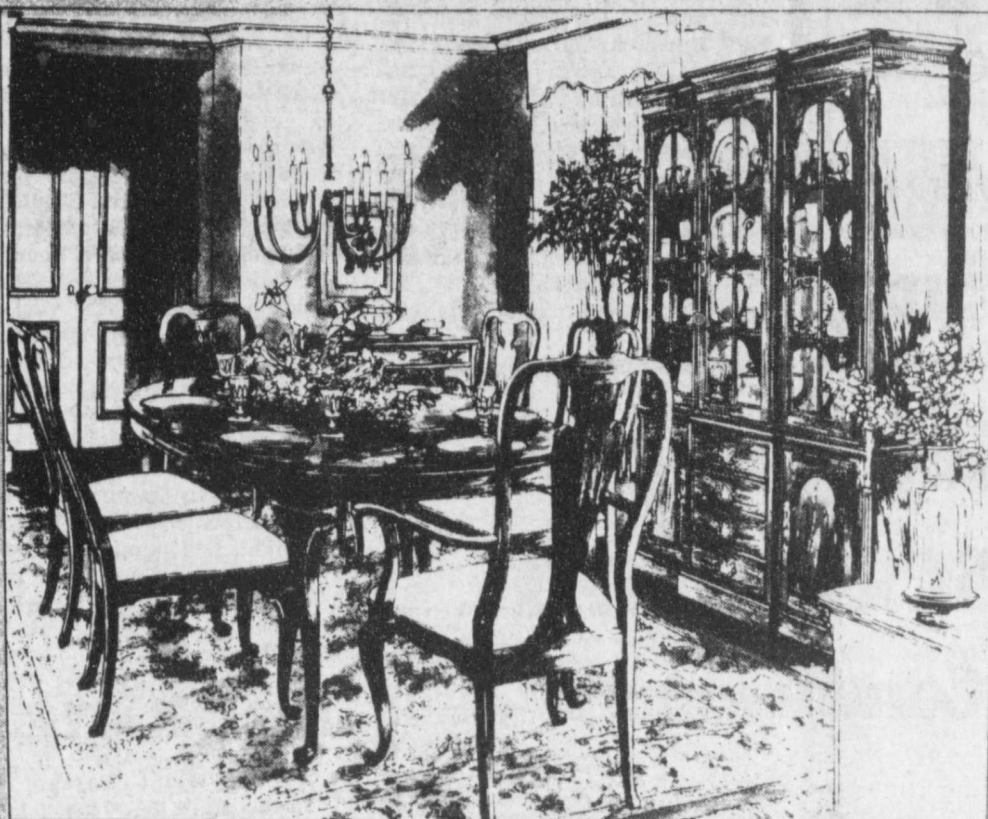

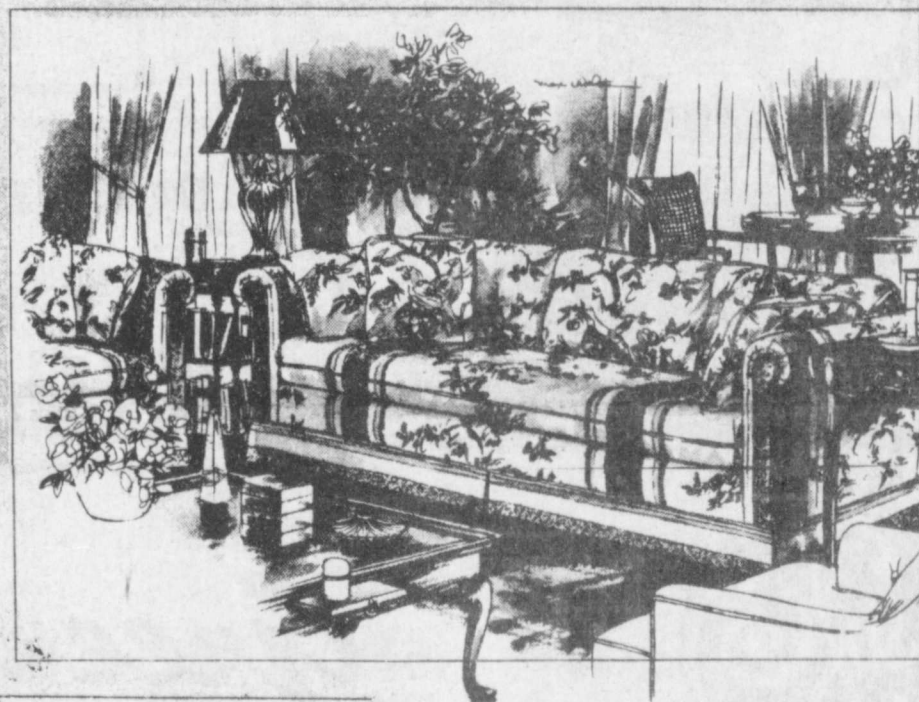

In the 1920's many negro farmers and farm laborers lived in and around Deport. These people were always ready to celebrate Saturday night. Many of these celebrations were dances. To make the dancing a little more lively, and noisy, some home brew was necessary. This was a time of prohibition and home made alcoholic beverages were unlawful, but there was always a local brewer who would take the risk and make a crock of beer for a party and at the same time make a small amount of money for himself.

prairie east of Deport vacant. The negroes selected the empty house for their party one Saturday night. Since the place hadn't been occupied for some time, blood weeds had grown up six or seven feet high around and in the barn yard. That was an excellent place for the brewer to hide his brew crock.

That night, Clay Guest and I decided to go out to the dance and see if we could find the beer. We knew that it should be in the weed patch. It was black dark and no moon.

While the dancers in the house were shimmying and gyrating to Jim

Kidd's guitar and George Kilgore's fiddle, we were down on our hands and knees in the weeds crawling around like a couple of coons fishing for crawfish, feeling for the crock jar of brew. Suddenly we began to realize that there was someone in the weed patch besides us.

Then a big flashlight came on, and there we were, in the spotlight with Pluto Roberts, the constable, looking down on us. He was also looking for the beer, but instead found us.

Since we didn't have any contraband in our possession, he gave us a lecture and sent us home.

### Control Weeds For Good Fishing

If you have a pond with a weed prob-  
lem, spring is a good time to control  
the weeds with herbicides. If you wait  
until summer, treatment could help  
cause oxygen depletion and fish die  
off.  
Oxygen depletion can occur during  
spring months, but the risk is great-  
ly reduced.  
The major factors contributing to  
oxygen depletion are amount of  
aquatic vegetation, water  
temperature, pondage of fish and  
weather conditions. In most years the  
amount of aquatic vegetation is less  
and water temperatures are cooler in  
the spring, which reduces the risk of  
fish die off after treatment. If this  
spring is unusually warm and  
weather conditions within two weeks  
of treatment include several  
windless, cloudy days, an oxygen  
depletion may occur.  
Personnel at the USDA Soil Conser-  
vation Service and county extension  
offices can provide information about

approved herbicides for aquatic use.  
They will apprise you of precautions  
when using aquatic herbicides and  
assist in locating chemicals.  
The most important first step is to  
treat your pond as soon as possible to  
avoid an oxygen depletion and fish die  
off.
