Prairiland Baseball Team Clinches Title

The Prairiland Patriots clinched their District Title Tuesday afternoon, defeating Paul Pewitt 6-1 with their final district game, the outcome of which will not affect their title, against North Lamar later this week.

After a scoreless first inning, John Dusenberry got the Patriots on the board in the second inning with a home run over the leftfield fence. Jay Ingram then got another solid hit barely missing another homer, but settling for a double.

John David Loyd continued the barrage at the plate, hitting the second home run of the inning and making the score 3-0.

Robbie Connot then got on base the hard way by getting hit with a pitch! After an out, Mike Connot then reached first base on an error, putting Connots on first and second base. After Joel Ballard flew out, Scott Scudder drove in the final run of the inning by singling in Robbie Connot to make the score 4-0.

Neither team could squeeze in a run until the fourth inning when Paul Pewitt rallied with two outs. Pewitt managed to get back to back hits for the only time in the game and narrowed the lead to 4-1 before Heath Kennedy made the final out of the inning by throwing a runner out at first base.

In the top of the fifth inning, Joel Ballard was quick to bring the

Patriots back to a four point lead, hitting a solo home run over the center field fence to make the score 5-1 after five innings.

Ballard was a leading cause in the final inning when Prairiland scored their sixth and final run of the ballgame. Ballard led off with a single and was eventually singled in by winning pitcher Scott Scudder as Prairiland led 6-1 after 6 and a half innings.

After Scudder retired the Pewitt batters in the seventh inning without yielding a run Prairiland went on to win 6-1.

The Prairiland Patriots defeated DeKalb 13-1 Friday afternoon at Prairiland playing perhaps their best game of the season.

Although the DeKalb hurler appeared to have good pitches, the Patriots managed to hit hard drives one after the other. Leadoff man Joel Ballard started the rally with a walk, and as usual, stole second base. Scott Scudder then singled to centerfield to drive in Ballard for the first run of the game and then moved on over to second base when the centerfielder misplayed the ball. Heath Kennedy followed suit with a sharp line drive over the shortstop to put runners on the corners. John Dusenberry then walked to load the bases for Jay Ingram. Ingram took advantage of the scoring opportunity driving in both Scudder and Kennedy with a single up the middle. The DeKalb pitcher then seemed to settle down getting the first out of the inning with a strike out and then getting Robbie Connot to foul out on a great play by the catcher. The pitcher then got in a wild streak, hitting Chris Sparks with a pitch to load the bases. The pitcher then issued a walk to Mike Connot to drive in Dusenberry for the fourth run of the inning. Ballard, then up for the second time in the inning, singled in Ingram and Sparks for the final runs scored in the inning. After one inning, the Patriots led 6-0.

Scott Scudder, pitching in the second inning was scored upon for the only time in the game. DeKalb's lone run came on a two out double off the fence, scoring a runner who had reached on an infield single. From that period on, Scudder was virtually untouchable.

The Patriots in the second inning continued to pound the baseball but came up with only one run. After Dusenberry was hit by a pitch and then stole second base, Chris Sparks hit a single to drive in Dusenberry for the only run for the inning as Prairiland led 7-1.

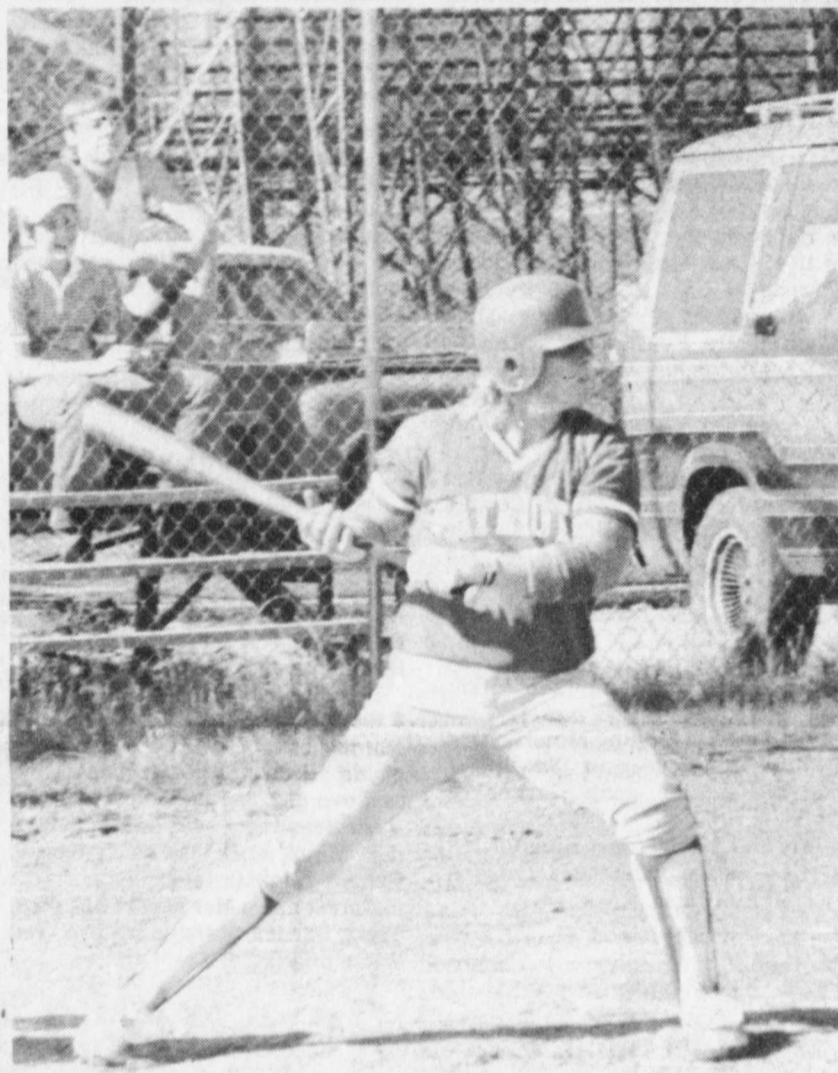
The top of the third inning was an impressive for both the pitcher Scudder and his catcher, Dusenberry. Scudder had struck out two in the inning and gave up a single. The runner then ill-advisedly tried to steal third base which was suicide with Dusenberry catching. Dusenberry nailed the runner at third and helped preserve Scudder's 7-1 lead.

Prairiland continued to roll offen-

sively in the bottom of the third inning, picking up five more runs in the process.

With one out, Scudder led off with a single and was plated on a triple by Heath Kennedy off the fence. Dusenberry then kept up his good eye

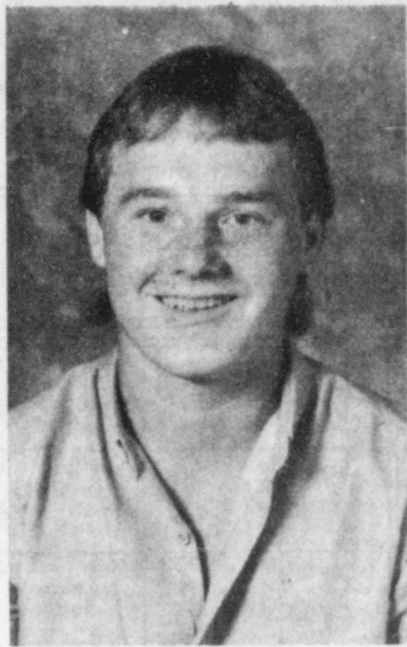
Kelli Garrison was maid of honor and Duane Jones was best man.

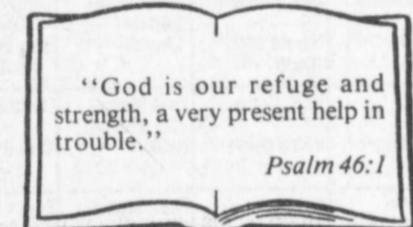
Miller-Whitaker Announce Engagement

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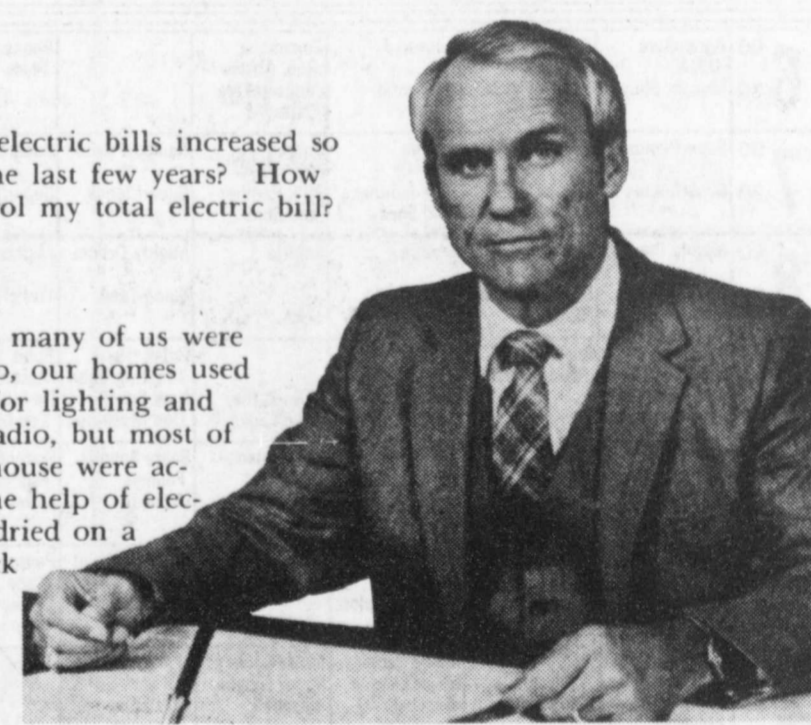

Prairiland Year Books

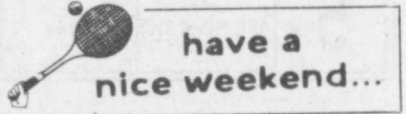
The 1985 Prairiland Yearbook, the "Patriot" is out, and once again it meets the high standards set in previous years.

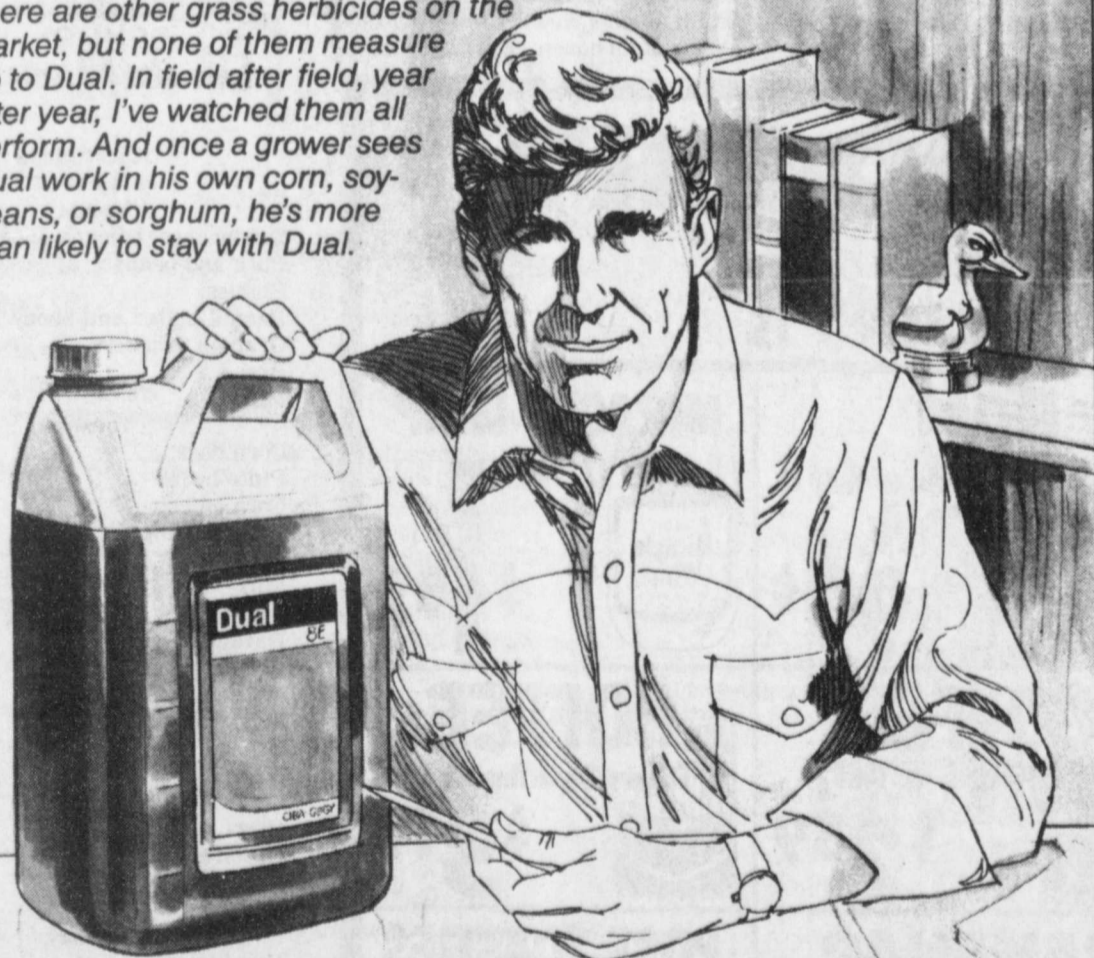

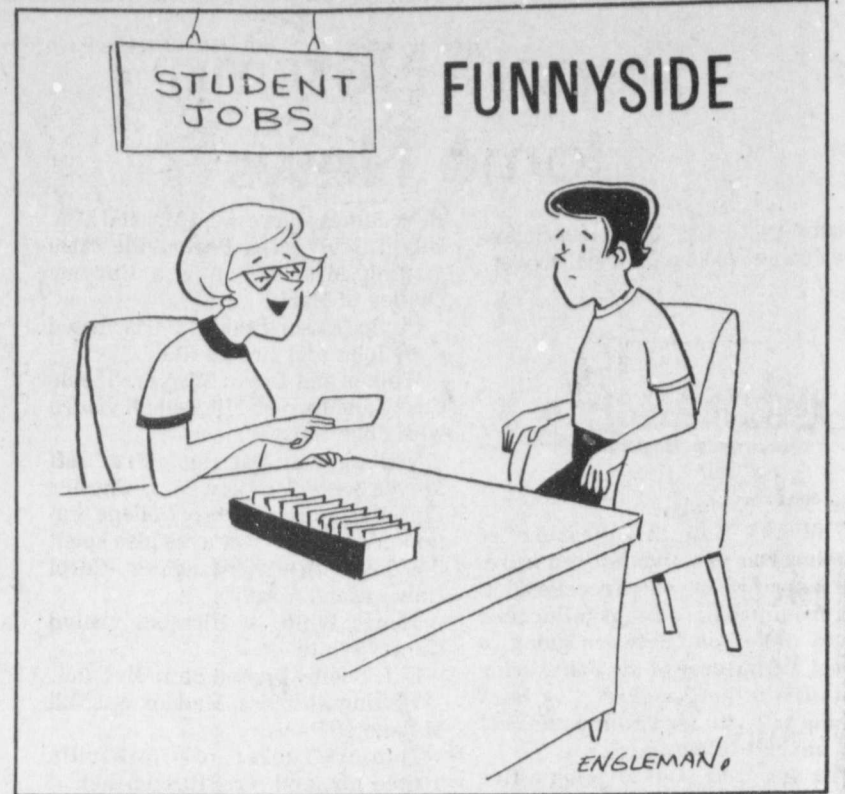

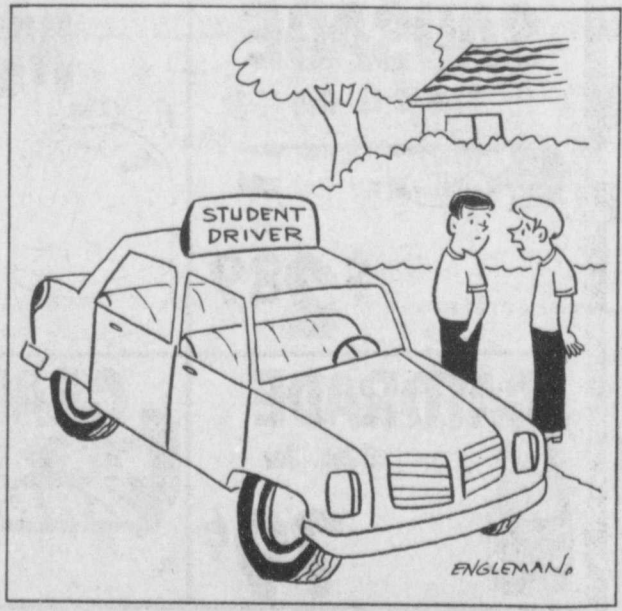

Humidity Could Cause Problem In Plants

By Herb Brevard

Cloudy, humid weather could bring disease problems in ornamentals and vegetables, says Dr. George Phillee, plant pathologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Some problems are still being experienced with damping off on some vegetable crops. The major cause of damping off is planting the crop before the soil warms adequately for that particular crop. Precautions to take include treating the seed with a fungicide before planting, rotating the crops and planting on a raised seedbed. The last report, and usually the most expensive, is using a soil fungicide.

May beetles are very active across East Texas, according to Dr. James Robinson, extension entomologist. The beetles are the adult stage of the white grub which infests lawn and can cause considerable damage. The beetles feed at night and go into the ground in the day time. Heavy feeding by the beetles can cause damage to the young growth.

Dr. Sim A. Reeves, extension agronomist, says that if arrowleaf clover is getting too tall, it can either be cut for hay or heavy grazing pasture will keep the growth under control. If the clover is too thick, it smother out the grasses. Plants must have sunlight to manufacture food. Drying the clover for hay may be a problem, but Reeves says that crimping the stems will help the clover dry quicker.

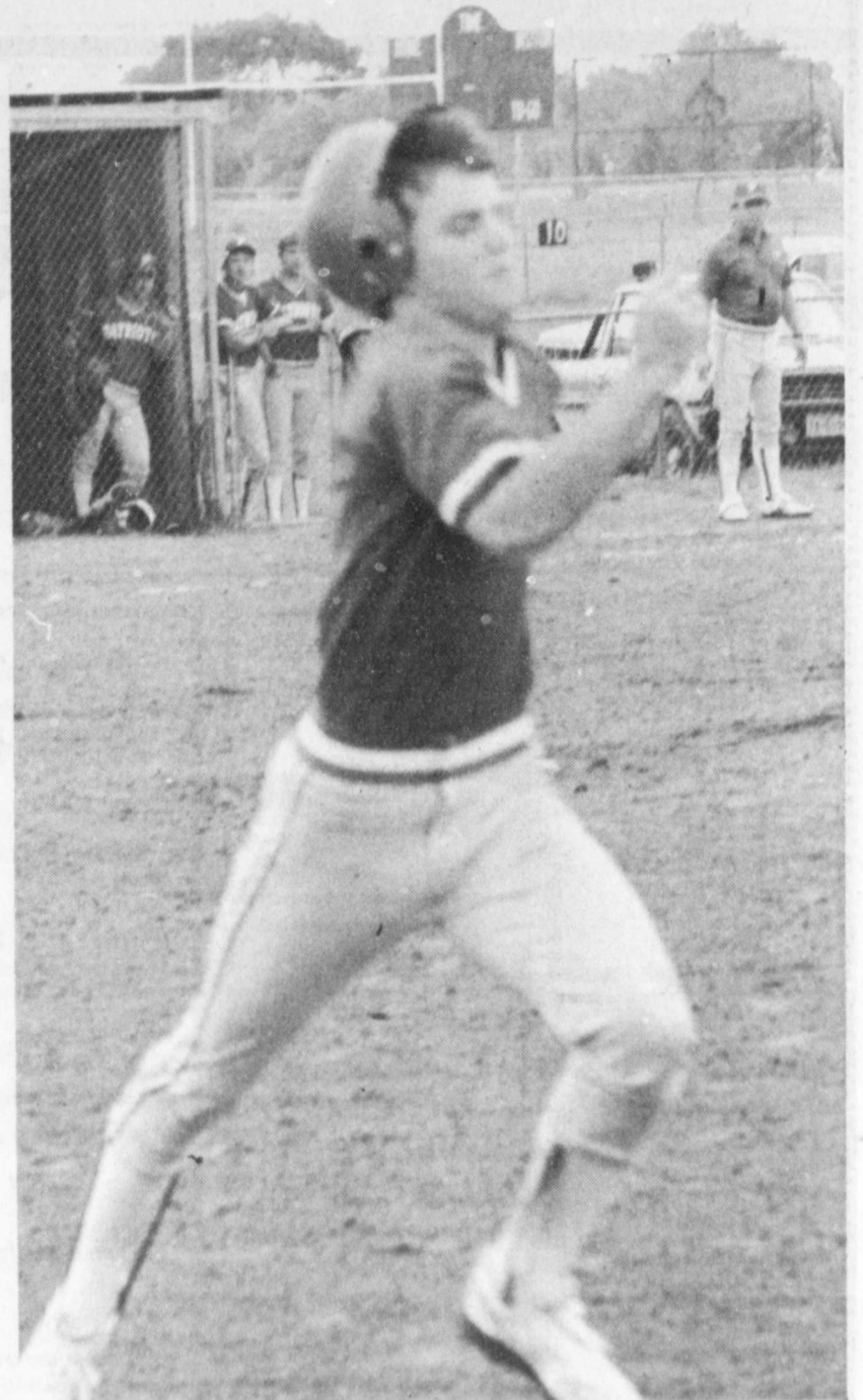
