As teachers slowly handed out the test sheets, graded, and with their ominous flashes of red ink glinting on the top of the page, the old sweaty palm, weak stomach feeling would

come tearing back. Then, the worst was over...for better or for worse, the grade was read, and we could, with the extreme optimisim of youth, move on to better

Kids probably don't change a whole lot...even if they pretend to more sophistication I'll bet that they still face exactly the same things that students have faced for generations.

#### **Humidity Could Cause Problem In Plants**

By Herb Brevard

Cloudy, humid weather could bring disease problems in ornamentals and vegetables, says Dr. George Philley, plant pathologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Some problems are still being experienced with damping off on some vegetable crops. The major cause of damping off is planting the crop before the soil warms adequately for that particular crop. Precautions to take include treating the seed with a fungicide before planting, rotating the crops

and planting on a raised seedbed. The last report, and usually the most expensive, is using a soil fungicide.

May beetles are very active across East Texas, according to Dr. James Robinson, extension entomologist. The beetles are the adult stage of the white grub which infests lawn and can cause considerable damage. The beetles feed at night and go into the ground in the day time. Heavy feeding by the beetles can cause

damage to the young growth. Dr. Sim A. Reeves, extension




