Tornado And High Winds Lash Area

As tornado sirens wailed in Paris, Lamar and Red River County residents sought shelter from heavy storms and tornadoes Monday afternoon. After the storm had moved through, heavy damage and power outages were reported throughout the area.

Paris residents in certain areas were still without power Tuesday, after a large concrete tank was slammed across the road into a power sub-station, and a number of houses and businesses received damage from the twister as it then tore it's way towards Blossom and Red River County.

The funnel cloud set down again just north and northeast of Blossom. tearing up huge trees, moving trailers and destroying barns.

O.W. and Faye Mauldin of Rt. 1, Blossom had their home destroyed. The mobile home of Lisa and Dale

Hunold of the Red Oak Community was moved from it's place, and Bobby Rater's barn in Post Oak was torn down. Trees in front of Rater's Dairy were uprooted and a barn on the Homer Flatt Ranch was destroyed. This, and much more damage was reported throughout that section of the area.

The frightening cloud then moved into Red River County, slowly angeling northeast as it hit Woodland, ruin-

ing broiler houses, barns and ripping up trees. In Manchester, it destroyed a barn, put trees down on several houses, ripped much of the roof off a house belonging to Cindy Allen, and unroofed the Manchester Store and Cafe.

From there the storm apparently lifted, and most of the rest of the reports were apparently from straight wind damage.

Bogata, Talco and Cunningham areas, reports of high winds and heavy rain poured in.

Large trees were broken down, huge limbs pulled loose, and sheet iron from barns and outbuildings was

A barn just north of Deport was destroyed, the structure belonging to G.W. Dickson. Several other barns were also basically ruined.

Bogata and Talco apparently were
