

Hall's Office Continuing To Serve District

The Washington and Texas congressional offices of the Honorable Sam B. Hall, Jr., who resigned from the House of Representatives to become a Federal Judge, are continuing to serve the people of the First District under the supervision of the

Clerk of the House of Representatives. The staff of Congressman Hall remains intact to handle casework, to help in handling business with the executive branch of the government and

to provide information on pending legislation. Benjamin J. Guthrie, Clerk of the House, said that the Washington and the district offices in Marshall, Texarkana and Paris will remain open on a daily basis for the immediate future

to handle congressional business. The office in Jacksonville is open on Fridays only. Under house rules, the Clerk manages the offices when a member dies or resigns. Guthrie said that three House vacancies occurred in the 99th congress.

Guthrie said that an administrator has been appointed to operate the Hall offices, he is Kenneth L. Black, who was administrative assistant to Congressman Hall. The staff members in the various Texas offices remain the same.

Hugh Jeffus President Of Community National Bank

Hugh L. Jeffus, Jr. has been named president of the Community National Bank of Detroit. He will take up his duties on June 10, and the new banking institution is expected to open sometime in July or August.

Jeffus, who has over 24 years of banking experience, says that "I feel honored to be selected as president of this bank...as its name implies, it intends to be a community bank, serving the area with a local level of friendly, personal service."

Jeffus is the third generation to serve as president of the First National Bank of Deport, his father, Hugh Jeffus, Sr., and grandfather, Tom T. Jeffus, serving before him.

Cemetery Striving For Improvement

Part of an epitaph found on many mossy tombstones in this area: "As I am now, so will you be."

So how would you like to lie under a ragged carpet of weeds and grass in a cemetery no longer used by the living?

Consider the Old Deport Cemetery south of town. Dating back to at least 1871, the grounds contain the graves of hundreds of Deport and area pioneers. They once lived where you live now. They helped pave the way and prepare a better place for you.

Yet, except for contributions from those who care, the early dead seem to have been forgotten. The contributions begun in 1971 by a newly-formed Deport Cemetery Association, are put to good use. But they barely keep ahead of the mower. Right now, the mower is gaining on the money. More donations are needed.

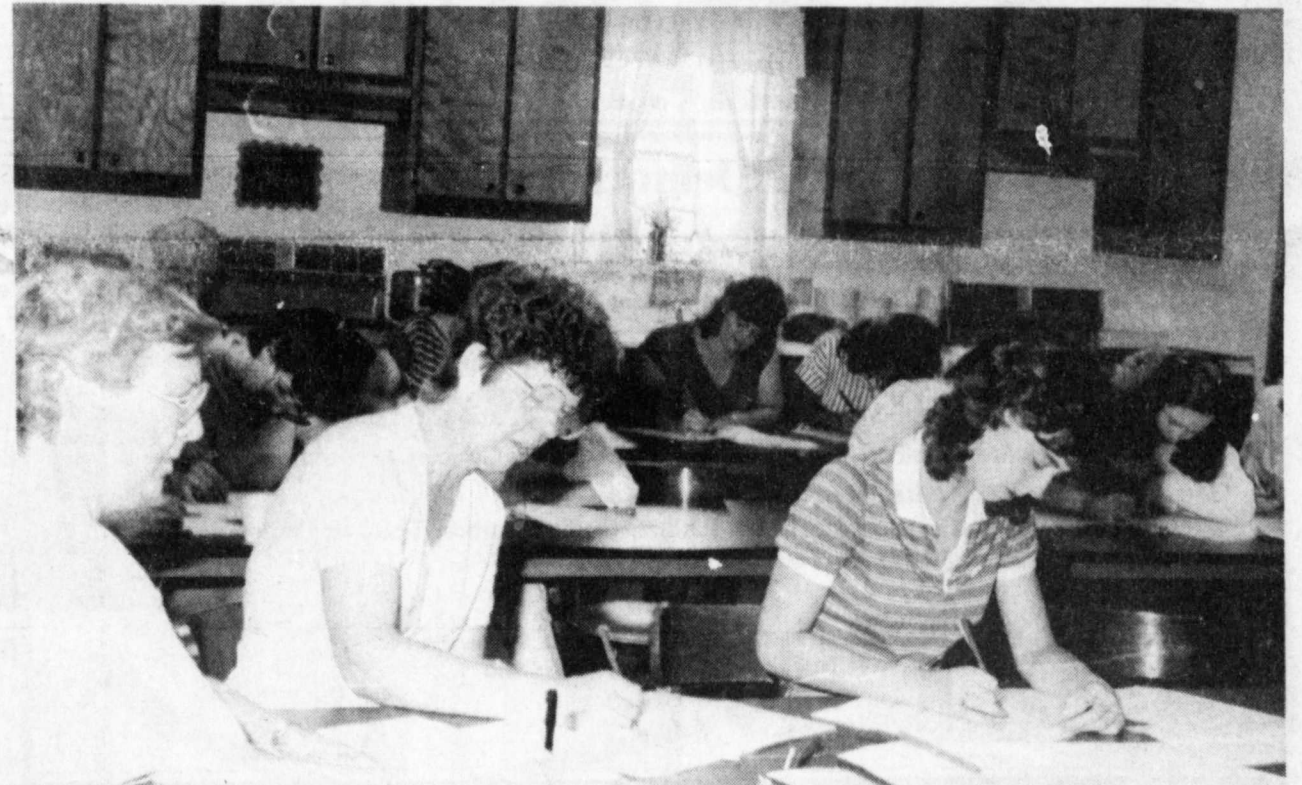
Ronnie Blount of Paris is the maintenance man now. He wears two hats, the proud headpiece of the Paris Fire Department and the straw hat of the mowing man. Blount does the mowing on his days off, and he does a first class job, actually does more than he is paid to do.

His newest addition is the use of a chemical to kill tall weeds and johnson grass along the fence in front of the cemetery. This takes money and time. So more money is needed.

Additionally, a new effort is being made to prevent standing water in a south section of the grounds. An engineer has traced the cause of the water to a roadside ditch in front of the cemetery. It is hoped that County Commissioner Jimmie Spars will clean and deepen this ditch far enough south to prevent further overflows, as soon as the ground permits.

It is also hoped that the commissioner and the city of Deport will help provide fill dirt to raise the ground in the low portion of the cemetery.

Egypt...A Land Of Past And Present All Life Depends On The Nile

By Nanalee Nichols The world is different from place to place. There are perhaps as great a difference as can be imagined between North East Texas and Egypt in the Middle East.

It has been a dream all my life to travel to Egypt and see the tombs and temples of the ancient Egyptians, a people who had an advanced civilization before the rest of us came out of our mud huts.

What I was not prepared for was the generosity and friendliness of the modern Egyptian (If the word modern can be applied). Nor was I prepared for the sight of people living and working in exactly the same manner that they lived and worked a thousand years ago.

Over the next few weeks I will try to catalog a few of these sights and sounds for you, and to report on a country and life that is vastly different from our own.

It all began when our good friends, Jayne and Dicky King, were visiting one evening.

Jayne and I tried to talk the boys in to going to Egypt...but they absolutely refused. They casually told us "If you want to go so bad, go without us."

When we booked our flight they were a little startled...I don't think they actually thought we would do it.

So we took the seventeen hour flight to Cairo, and looking down from the big jet realized that what had been ocean for so many thousands of miles had turned into desert.

There were miles and miles of sand, sculpted into waves, unbroken by any sign of life or road.

And then, shimmering in the distance like an emerald 'lay the green, fertile valley that is the Nile

river and the beautiful banks that line each side.

The Nile river is the longest in the world. It is, quite literally, the source of all life in Egypt. Without it there would be no country, no life, no people.

The Egyptians love their river, they have assigned it a prominent place in their past, and in their present.

Before our trip was over we loved it too. For it provided the precious water that causes the crops to grow, the palm trees to bear fruit, the fields to flourish.

Surprisingly, in a country fraught with sand storms and dirt, the river Nile is clean and clear.

In Egypt there are only about three days of rain each year! They depend not at all on these rains, but strictly on the irrigation water from the river.

It is strange to find out that they feel a little sorry for those of us without a dependable river to use...but have to rely on the whims of water from the sky!

Upon the surface of the river float silent Feluccas, sail boats with tall, triangular sail that are shown on the walls of tombs four thousand years old...virtually unchanged from that time.

All life huddles on the edge of the river, drawing sustenance from it. Cairo, a city of 14 million people, teems upon the banks of the Nile in a

noisy, sprawling celebration of the dependable water.

Later, as we sailed on a ship down the length of the river, we saw children swimming and bathing, adults washing, water buffalo lying in it's cool shallows.

Next week we will discuss the city itself, and the amazing traffic conditions!

No more regular meetings will be held through the summer. The Fulbright Homecoming will be Sunday, June 9.

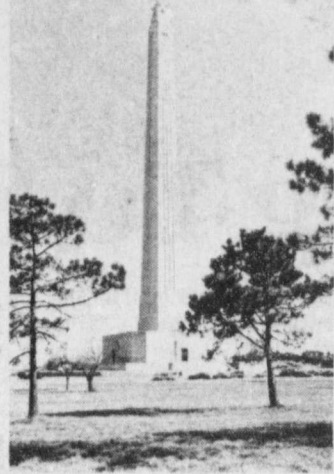
Flanagan Running For Congress

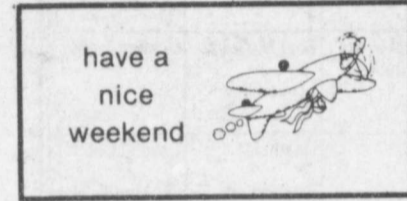

Mr. Turner said: "The chili is a dime and the bottle of catsup is two bits, you owe thirty-five cents." I only had the dime.

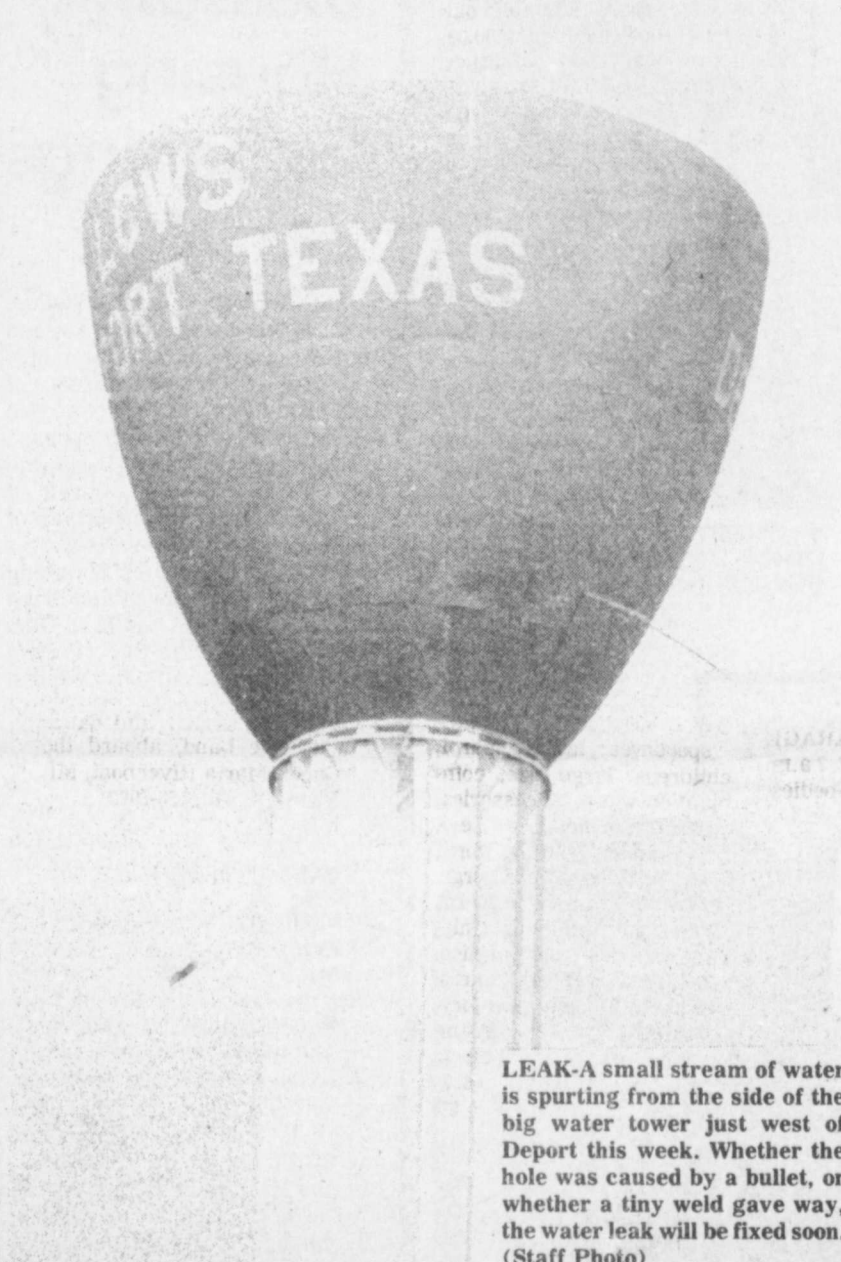

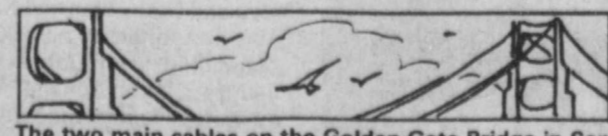

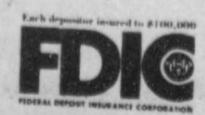
