

Prairiland High To Get New Cafeteria

The construction of a new cafeteria at Prairiland High School will begin probably within the next thirty days, according to Superintendent Leslie Taylor.

The construction bid has been given to Wright Construction, and the new building will cost \$109,446.40.

It will be located between the main building and the home economics

building, providing easy access from all directions. It should be completed by November of this year. The current cafeteria, located within the main building, will be remodeled, using local carpenters, to provide more classroom space, necessary to meet state requirements.

Progress is being made in the reconstruction of the Deport

Kindergarten building, and other repairs to the Deport campus.

Permission to remodel and air condition the elementary building in Blossom was given, at a cost of \$25,700.00.

Work on that project will begin immediately.

Bids will be let to build a science lab at Blossom, since the present one is

located in the basement, and stands in water much of the time.

The board also hired two teachers, Anna Beth Allen, who will teach fifth grade at Deport and Donett Lyon.

On June 24, the board will begin interviewing girls coaches for the next year.

Ronnie Baker has moved to the assistant boys coach position, and

Fran Patterson wants to continue as assistant girls coach.

The resignations of Shelia Pierce, Blossom kindergarten teacher, and Dave Clark were accepted.

Mrs. Pierce and her husband have moved to Dallas, and Mr. Clark simply stated that he wanted to change his profession.

Interviews for a band director will be held soon.

The vocational budget was approved, and the committee to determine the career ladder for the 1985-86 school year was also given the okay.

Cheryl Justice is the 18 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Justice of Paris. She enjoys working



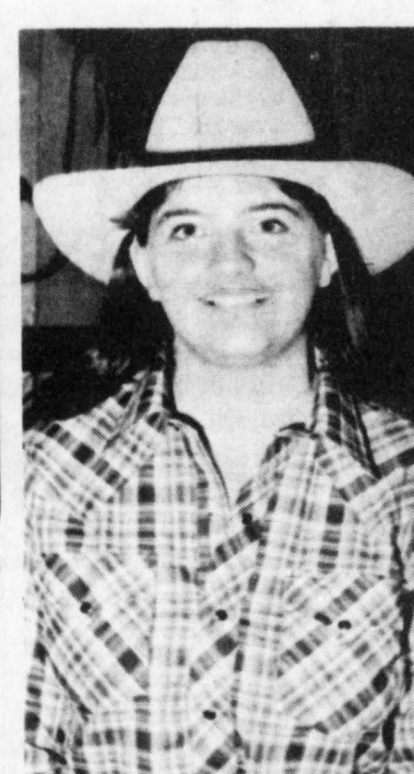

Down The Nile, A Strange Land

The sun wasn't quite up the morning we left Cairo airport for Aswan. That meant that it was around 4 a.m., and for us, it seemed way to early. The four hour flight showed little out the window but the desert sands, and the ever present, ever beautiful river.

Aswan airport had one concrete runway, and a terminal with no air conditioning. When the baggage was unloaded from the plane, we went out with the rest of the crowd and dragged our suitcases from the pile on the cart.

Our guide met us, and we under went another harrowing taxi ride into the city of Aswan.

We found that it would be about five hours before the boat we were to cruise the Nile on docked, so, needing to kill some time, our guide took us for a boat ride up the Nile and onto an island.

A boy met us there, and we hiked back into the hills and mountains for a long, long way in order to look at hieroglyphs carved into the tumbled rock faces. They were strangely beautiful, and a climb to the very top of one mountain rewarded hot and thirsty climbers with a view of the entire world for miles and miles around.

Then we hiked back down to the hot, deep sands, and visited the boy's village.

It was there that the astonishing poverty, and dignity of the common Egyptian really came home to us.

We visited in the home of the sheriff, one of the richer people in the village.

He was rich by reason of having two ancient refrigerators sitting in the main room of his home.

Clean enough, there was no furniture in the entire house except for an ancient table, one old bed frame, and some stuffed sacks of cotton for sitting on.

Workshop On Collecting Local History

With a mini-grant from the Texas Committee for the Humanities, a state program for the National Endowment for the Humanities, Paris Junior College will sponsor a workshop Friday, June 28 on "Caring for Your Community's Past: Collecting and Preserving Local History." The workshop will be open to the public free of charge, said Daisy Harvill, director of the Aikin Regional Archives at PJC.
Dr. David J. Murrain, director of the Southwest Collection of Texas Tech University in Lubbock, will present the workshop from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. that day in the Alford Center. Reservations should be made by calling Ms. Harvill at 784-9411, by June 26.

In the workshop, Dr. Murrain will outline the many types of historical papers that a collector may save to preserve the history of a particular family, town or region, and suggest ways in which collectors may organize, care for and preserve their collections.
For the past 13 years, Dr. Murrain has been actively involved in the development and administration of a major local and regional historical collection. He is associate director of libraries for Special Collections and is an historian and has written or edited three books and more than 20 journal and newspaper articles related to the history of the American Southwest.

The workshop on collecting and preserving local history is part of PJC project, "Caring for the Past of the Red River Valley," cosponsored by the Sesquicentennial Committee of Paris. Other project activities include an oral history workshop scheduled on September 14.

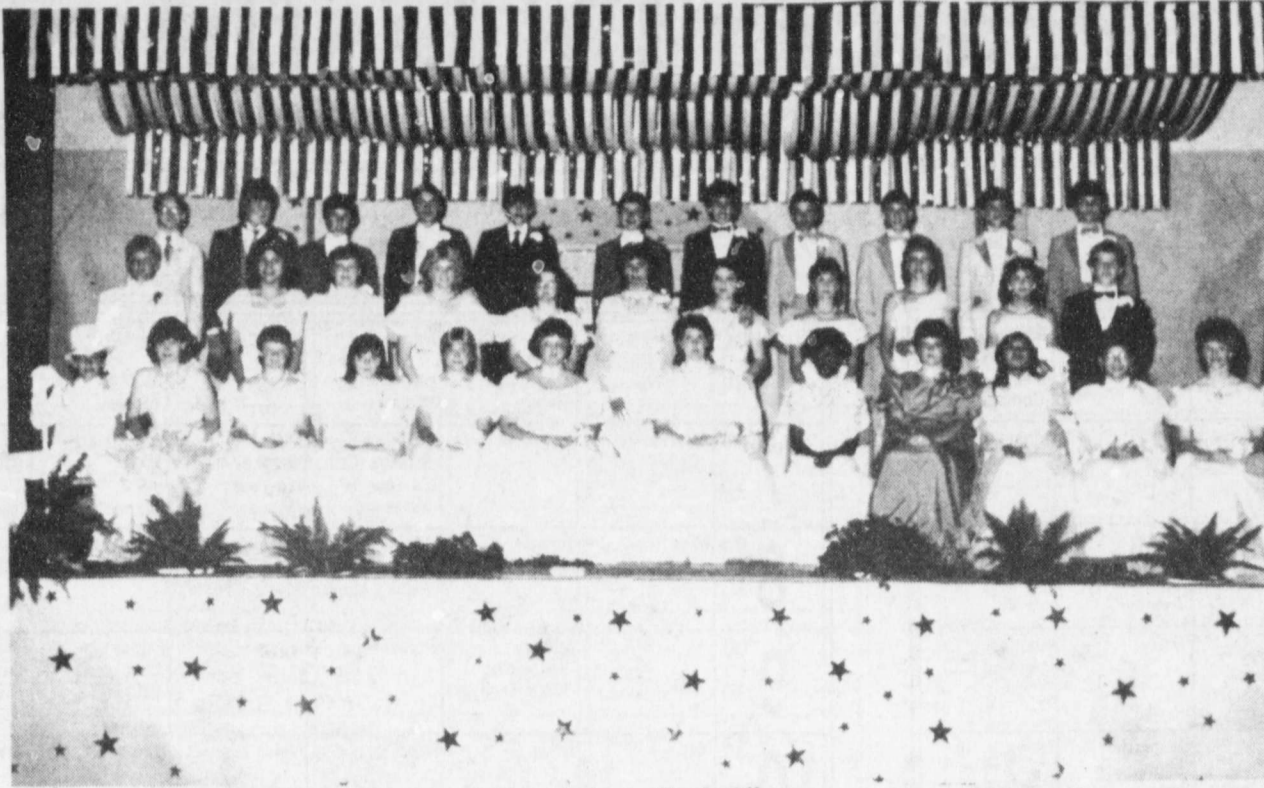

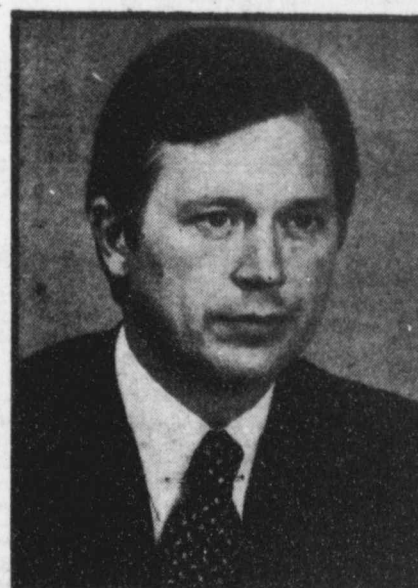

Emergency Farm Loans Accepted At FaHa Until June 24

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by the severe freeze which occurred December 18 through December 31, 1983 are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration office in Paris, FmHA county supervisor Harold Gatlin said

today. Lamar County is one of 10 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the freeze.

Gatlin said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses, or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000 whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders the interest rate on the first \$100,000 borrowed is five percent; interest rate is 8 percent on the balance borrowed over that amount. For farmers who

can obtain commercial credit but who choose to borrow from FmHA, the interest rate is 13.75.

As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan. Farmers participating in the PIK or federal crop insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until June 24, 1985, but farmers would apply as soon as possible.

The FmHA office in Paris is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Weather Forecast Now Available

Paris residents may now hear a new, accurate and up to date weather forecast for the Paris area by simply calling 784-2511.

The new weather forecast is an addition to the current time weather temperature information sponsored by McCuiston Regional Medical Center. The forecast offers callers a more detailed weather forecast than previously before, with daily high and low temperatures. This information is available to callers 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

According to Arthur W. Hastings, Executive Director of McCuiston, the center chose to enhance its present

service to include additional information as a result of the tremendous popularity of the service.

The service currently receives over 3,400 calls per day from the Paris community. The service announces the current time, temperature, present and future forecast and the forecasted high and low temperature for the day.

The weather forecast is updated a minimum of twice daily or as often as necessary when severe weather conditions exist. Callers are further instructed to tune to local television and radio weather stations when severe weather conditions are present.

Weekly Agricultural Update

Even though it is late, the weather is warm and calves should have been worked previously, it is essential that calves receive protection from clostridial disease.

According to Dr. Randall Grooms, this protection should include blackleg, malignant edema and Black's disease as a bare minimum.

Ideally, the vaccine should be given when the calves are around two months of age for best protection. If

calves are more than two months old and have not received the vaccination, they are highly susceptible to sudden death from these diseases.

Vaccination of calves is essential each year because these diseases are spore formers which remain in the soil for up to 50 years.

If the heifer calves are at least four months but not more than 12 months of age, this would also be an excellent time to get the local veterinarian to vaccinate for brucellosis.

magazine, graced the walls. The women, notified by an instant village grapevine, soon appeared to present their babies. Sensing that Jayne was the one crazy about youngsters, they soon had surrounded her, showing her their dar eyed, long lashed children.

She spoke no Arabic, they no English, but the common bond of mothers leveled the barriers quickly, and they were all nodding, smiling and cooing within minutes. We were served scalding hot tea, with about a half inch of grounds in the bottom, in tall glasses. We put thoughts of germs behind us

and drank and smiled and nodded that it was good. Our courage didn't quite extend to refills, though. The children had no toys, in fact, we never saw a toy the entire time we were in Egypt. They have no shoes, little education, and their biggest occupation is playing in the river. They tend to swim like little fish, and bend over to drink out of the water much as puppies do, not using hands at all. Yet they are happy children, laughing and smiling. As our ship cruised the waters, they ran to the edge of the river waving

and shouting happily, "Hallo, Hallo" often the only words of English they knew. Upon our return to Aswan we sat in an office store front, watching crowds driving donkeys by, and talking with the two agents in the office. Upon finding out that I was in the newspaper business the gentlemen asked if I worked for the government newspaper. I answered no. They then looked at me strangely and asked "radical paper?" No, I replied, just small weekly papers. They had a lot of trouble understanding that I could write what I wanted, express any opinion I pleased, and owned the building individually. In Egypt the press is totally controlled by the government. On the street huge clay jugs of water rested in metal frames, to provide a cool drink for passer bys. Horse drawn carriages trotted by, decorated with brass and colorful tassels. Finally, the Osiris, our ship, docked, and we transferred our bags to it, and promptly took a trip by felucca, the ancient sail boats that have plied the Nile from the beginning of recorded history. We toured Kitchener Islands, lush with an incredible variety of foliage, plants and blooms, and Elephantine island, so named because of the huge rocks bearing resemblance to the pacyderm. Then we saw the Aga Khan's mausoleum, high on a barren hillside. That night, having been up since 2 the previous morning, we slept well, and prepared for a busy day of touring ruins and ancient temples for the next five days.
