

# Rodeo Time Is Here Once More

## Frontier Days, Queens Race, Rodeo Highlights Big Weekend

A giant rodeo parade will kick off rodeo activities in downtown Bogata on Thursday, June 27 at 5 p.m. at Kisser's Grocery. The rodeo, sponsored by the Bogata Rodeo Association, will begin at 8:30 nightly at the Bogata fairgrounds arena.

Advance tickets are available from the rodeo princess candidates. Ticket prices are \$3.00 advance, \$3.50 at the gate for adults; and \$2.50 for 12 and under, preschool are free.

Bonnie Eloise Williams, trick riding expert, will entertain the fans at each rodeo performance with superb trick riding exhibition along with a comical routine where she roman rides two miles over high jumps, dressed as Raggedy Ann.

The Arego Riders 4-H Horse Club will set pivots each night of the rodeo and ride in the parade. The club was formed four months ago of students in the Deport, Detroit, Bogata, Clarksville and Fulbright areas under the leadership of Sammy and Betty Woodall and Luke and Dee Crayton.

The Bogata Rodeo is a Dodge Series Rodeo and is sanctioned by the Cowboys Regional Rodeo Association.

Smith, AR.

Five time bareback riding champion Jim Martin of Canadian, TX has

entered the Bogata rodeo on the final performance.

The 1984 CRRA Rookie of the Year, Scot Mitchell of Lake Creek, TX has entered the bareback riding event on the opening night of the Bogata rodeo. Also entered on Thursday is David Worden of Cooper, TX, perennial finalist in the Cowboys Regional

Rodeo Association.

Local favorite Casey Jeffrey, first year saddle bronc rider, is entered in his hometown rodeo on Saturday night.

In the bull riding competition, the 1984 Bull Riding Champion of the CRRA, Steve Gann of Tulsa, OK has drawn up to compete in Friday

night's performance. The 1981 and 1983 Bull Riding Champion, Gary Hiner, now of Avery, TX, is scheduled to compete on Saturday.

Kirby Brumble of Coweta, OK who is leading the steer wrestlers in the Dodge Rodeo Series, has entered the Bogata rodeo on Saturday night, along with the 1984 Steer Wrestling

Champion, Eldon Day of Beggs, OK. Pete Belcher of Cuthand, TX, former all-around cowboy and many years a pickup man in rodeo, has entered the steer wrestling at Bogata on Saturday, also.

Perennial Cowgirls Barrel Racing Champion, Kelly Allred Ray of Lavaca, AR will compete at the

Bogata rodeo on Friday night.

With the calibre of contestants entered in this year's rodeo, all indications point to an outstanding, action packed rodeo performance every night.

# At Homecoming, Take A Look To Deport's Past

This history of Deport, written by Mrs. A.L. Stalls, and provided by Archie Westbrook, recounts some of the history of Deport's early years, up until the 1940's.

Homecoming time seemed the right time to bring it forth.

Some of the early history of Deport, the way my mother and father told me, and as I remember it:

The dates I have are in the family Bible. Sometime after the Civil War, my grandfather, John L. Thompson and his wife Rebecca Elizabeth, with their children Devolson and Mary Josephine moved to the Eperson farm three miles west of Clarksville from their home in Searcy, AR. Devolson was my father. Where they got the name I don't know, he was called Del. You wonder a lot of times why they named children what they did. I

wonder why they named me Emma Eunice Josephine.

Dee Thompson and Mattie Ann Grant were married September 3, 1874 at the residence of the bride's father, John W. Grant. Their house was five miles west of Clarksville on the old Clarksville-Fulbright road. John L. Thompson, my grandfather, bought the tract of land where Deport now is, about 300 acres. Their land was from the banks of Mustang Creek and west of Brushy Creek.

In 1873, Dee Thompson and J.A. Burr came here and cleared the land to build a cotton gin and grist mill. This lot was across the street from the E.O. Thompson place. The southwest corner of the lot was where Elizabeth Barnett's house is now. The peach and apple orchard was in this corner. The gin was about where the

American Legion Hall is or farther north. The lumber for the house and gin was hauled by wagons from Jefferson Texas. I don't know whether they had ox teams or four mule teams to the wagons. If mules, the driver of the team rode one of the mules instead of sitting on the wagon and driving.

The lumber was good without knot holes. The boxing plank was hand dressed, the doors handmade and wider than our doors today and heavier. Square nails were used to build the house. The windows had twelve panes of glass. We had three bedrooms, a kitchen and dining room with porches on the north and west and a stack chimney between two of the bedrooms. Dick Elder was the carpenter and they worked on the gin and the house at the same time. There was a large crew of men who worked with Mr. Elder. My mother, daughter of John and Mary Murray, cooked for the men in the small building with a large fireplace where they were building the house. The gin was a large frame building. The lower part had the engine and boiler, the drive shaft, the wheels and belt to run the machinery. Upstairs were the two gin stands and stalls where the cotton was stored before it was gined. The stands were like bins or hoppers. The ginner filled baskets of cotton from the stalls and poured the cotton into the gin stands. He would use his hand to scatter the cotton. After the cotton came out of the gin stand, the man at the press picked it up and put it in the press. The press box had a lever to press the bale. A mule was hitched to the end of the lever and walked round and round until the bale was pressed. About two or three bales of cotton could be gined in a day. Seed in those days were not worth anything. They were used for fuel in the furnace, hauled for fertilizer on the field and used to feed cattle, usually milk cows.

The first store was on the west side of Main Street. This was a long low building. Boxing plank was used for the building and stacked on the rafters. I don't remember too much about the stock of goods. They had nothing like our grocery stores today. About all a family had to buy was flour, sugar, salt, coffee and coal oil

or kerosene. The first store was owned by John Horne and later by Milt Terrell.

The first school I attended was in 1885. This was on the banks of the Mustang Creek south of where Russell Lawler's service station is. My first teacher was Professor Facon. My girlhood schoolmates were Maud and Mattie Hayes, now Mrs. Lewis Dickson and Mrs. Don Snell.

The first church was the Cumberland Presbyterian Church (1882). This was across the road from the school building, (1883). The front faced east. Two doors in the front and one in the back of the church. Two isles had short seats on either side and the longer seats in the center. One door was for the men and boys to come in, the other for the women and children. If you had a date, you would go in the door with the women and children.

Most of you know that Deport was named for my father, Dee Thompson. It was first called DeeVille. When they made application for a post office, they found there was another town named DeeVille in Texas, so they named this place Deport. I have heard some discussion about the pronunciation of the word. They thought it should be De Port. If they happened to be here when Mustang Creek was on a rampage they would think De Port was correct.

My grandfather believed in Prohibition. The lots he sold for business lots had in the deed that if intoxicating liquor was sold, the lot would revert to the heirs. I know of no lots that came back. I don't know about the sale of liquor.

My mother and father left us a christian heritage. One thing I remember as a child is sitting around the fireplace in the winter time with my father and mother reading a chapter from the Bible, then we would kneel for prayer.

Today, people have discussions about the meaning of certain scriptures. My father and mother accepted the Bible and that is what I have tried to do. When Sunday morning came, there were no arguments about who would go to church. All the family was there.

# Sleeping To The Sound Of Arabic Music

To go to sleep at night to the eery, almost wailing sound of an Arabic song, the shrill piping of the flute, and the noises made by a tiny stringed instrument can be a thrilling experience.

As we went to sleep each night on our boat, those sounds would drift to us from the shore, as the Egyptians celebrated Ramadan.

Ramadan is a religious fasting, it lasts for an entire month, and all Moslems observe it. During that month, they let no food, drink nor smoke pass their lips from sunrise until sunset.

In a country where the temperatures soar regularly into the 110's, and the sun blazes down, it is no easy thing not to be able to take so much as a drink of water.

Then, after sunset, they say their special prayers and take a light meal. About midnight, they tend to feast, hence the sounds of singing, dancing and general merry-making.

The only people excused from the fasting are those with health problems.

However, in Egypt, if one chooses not to fast, or is not Moslem, there is no penalty. We found out on the plane, from a Saudi Arabian, that in Saudi Arabia, if one does not observe the fast, he is put in jail to enforce it!

Daily we cruised a little distance down the Nile, seeing literally into the past. The scenes that slowly unfolded looked like scenes from Bible stories!

Water buffalo turned the wheels that pumped water from the river into the fields. Galabia dressed men hoed with huge, clumsy looking mattocks, and black dressed women carried water in clay jugs, gracefully balancing the heavy load.

Everywhere were the children, playing, working and laughing as we went by.

Camels grazed in the shrub, and water buffalo, cattle and donkeys were present in large number.

Adobe huts, roofed with palm thatch, dove cotes made like giant bee hives, row boats with peculiar oars gave truth to the entire story.

The only thing that changed the

face of things were the ever present electric lines, coming from the Aswan high dam generators.

The turbines have been replaced from the original Russian ones (which cracked and did not work) with ones from General Electric.

Some things are quite universal, though. Anchored at Dendera, a tiny village, we sat on the upper deck and looked across at the village, almost close enough to touch.

Down the dusty street came five teen-aged girls. They were dressed, not in the married woman's black, but in loose fitting slacks covered by long tunic tops. They had colorful scarves tied over their heads, and balanced empty water jugs upon them.

Several teen-aged boys were lounging in the doorway of a house. Im-

mediately upon seeing them, the girls walk slowed down. They swayed and giggled, stopped to talk, moved on a step or two...moved back to talk some more.

Flirting and giggling apparently are something that no culture is ever without!

Each morning and afternoon we all trekked for several hours around ruins and temples painted with blazing colors, more as if done last week than five thousand years ago. We listened to our guide, we drank in history as we had never heard it before. We loved it.

The Egyptians in ancient times did brain surgery. They had the first paper, known as papyrus, and on it they recorded multitudes of facts and figures.

They created absolutely gorgeous jewelry, wore make-up, had perfumes and skin cremes.

In short, they had a very advanced civilization. The facets of their culture have influenced most of history ever since.

And always, every night, we went back to sleep to the strange and beautiful sounds of Arabic songs, drifting across the waters to us.

## Oxygen Shortage Causing Problems In Pools

Shortage of oxygen in farm ponds is causing problems throughout East Texas, according to Billy Higginbotham, fisheries specialist. Fish gasping for air at the pond surface or finding dead fish are common signs that an oxygen depletion is occurring in the pond.

Many factors and combinations of factors contribute to an oxygen depletion. Normally, an oxygen depletion can be corrected if the pond owner knows what signs to look for and acts

quickly. Most oxygen depletion occur in warm weather between June and September. Warm water holds less oxygen than does cool water. Additionally, water levels in ponds are usually lower during the summer months. Fish are actively growing, particularly if they are being fed a commercial ration, during the summer months. As a result, the fish need more oxygen for the faster metabolic rate.

Higginbotham says that sunlight is needed for phytoplankton to produce oxygen through photosynthesis. Several cloudy days in succession limits photosynthesis and decreases oxygen production. If the cloud cover is accompanied by hot, still weather, conditions continue to worsen.

Exceeding the carrying capacity of the pond is one of the most critical factors in oxygen depletion. A total weight of fish in the pond should never exceed 1,000 pounds of fish per surface acre during the warm months. The size of the pond should be calculated at the lowest level during the summer.

Overfeeding or over fertilization can also greatly contribute to oxygen depletion. If the water develops a deep green or blue-green color during the hot months, excessive phytoplankton growth is probably the cause. Excess feeding of the fish can furnish an overabundance of nutrients to the phytoplankton, thus creating an oversupply.

If fish are observed gasping at the water surface during early morning hours or an unusual or rapid change in water color occurs, the oxygen supply in the water may be critical. Aeration of the pond water is the best method of relieving an oxygen depletion. To accomplish this, the water must be brought in contact with the air. Pulling water off near the surface and spraying it back over the pond will help increase the oxygen content. Outboard motors can help circulate the water by running in a fixed position. If a bottom drainpipe is present, low quality water from the bottom of the pond should be removed.

Good management is the key to preventing poor water quality conditions from developing in farm fish ponds. Unusual and unexpected situations can occur and must be dealt with on an individual basis.
