The first thing visible in the front yard at Sonny and Juanita Davis' house is a low down, 1934 Ford pickup. It isn't hard to spot, because it's painted the brightest, glossiest orange-red imaginable!
The vehicle looks like it had just rolled off an assembly line, and is Sonny's pride and joy.
The vehicle recently won the Nostalgia Award at the Lone Star

Street Rod Association meet at Fort Fisher in Waco. There were 480 cars in competition there, and Sonny's won because it was built in the old style of "hot" rods, with no power assists, fancy upholstery or any of the more modern traits.
Street rods, according to Sonny, aren't quite the same as the older "hot rods". Although they have big engines, they are strictly for show,

not for racing.
The Associations are very strict about no racing, wanting to keep a good image. The "new" style of street rods has cruise control, power brakes, spring seats and deep upholstery, and every accessory that a new car may have.
Sonny enjoys the old style, though, using hub caps instead of mag wheels, and bolted on racing seats.
He and his wife take the pickup to

various shows around the country, and she is as enthusiastic about the hobby as he is. They have reservations for the National meet in Wisconsin, and hope to attend.
Why build a street rod? Sonny says it's simply something he's always wanted to do.
He moved the '34 Ford with him wherever he and his family went for 20 years. Then, winter before last, he began work on the truck in earnest.

He used a 4-inch drop axle, a Chevy Vega drive gear, a 327 Chevy engine, and hour upon long hour of hard work and patience.
He did the work himself, with the help of his sons, Dicky and Jay, occasionally, and of course, an occasional morale boost from Juanita.
The little vehicle was featured in Rod Action Magazine in January of this year.
How fast will the street rod go? Son-

ny smiels and says easily "Oh, well, fifty-five is sufficient".
The Davis' next project will be a chopped off 1930 Model "A".
Sonny is in the drilling business. Juanita is a History teacher. If street rods seem an unusual hobby for them, they certainly don't think so. And after hearing their enthusiasm and pleasure, and looking at the delightful auto, it's easy to understand the pride they take in the little pickup!

Hargett And Chapman In Runoff

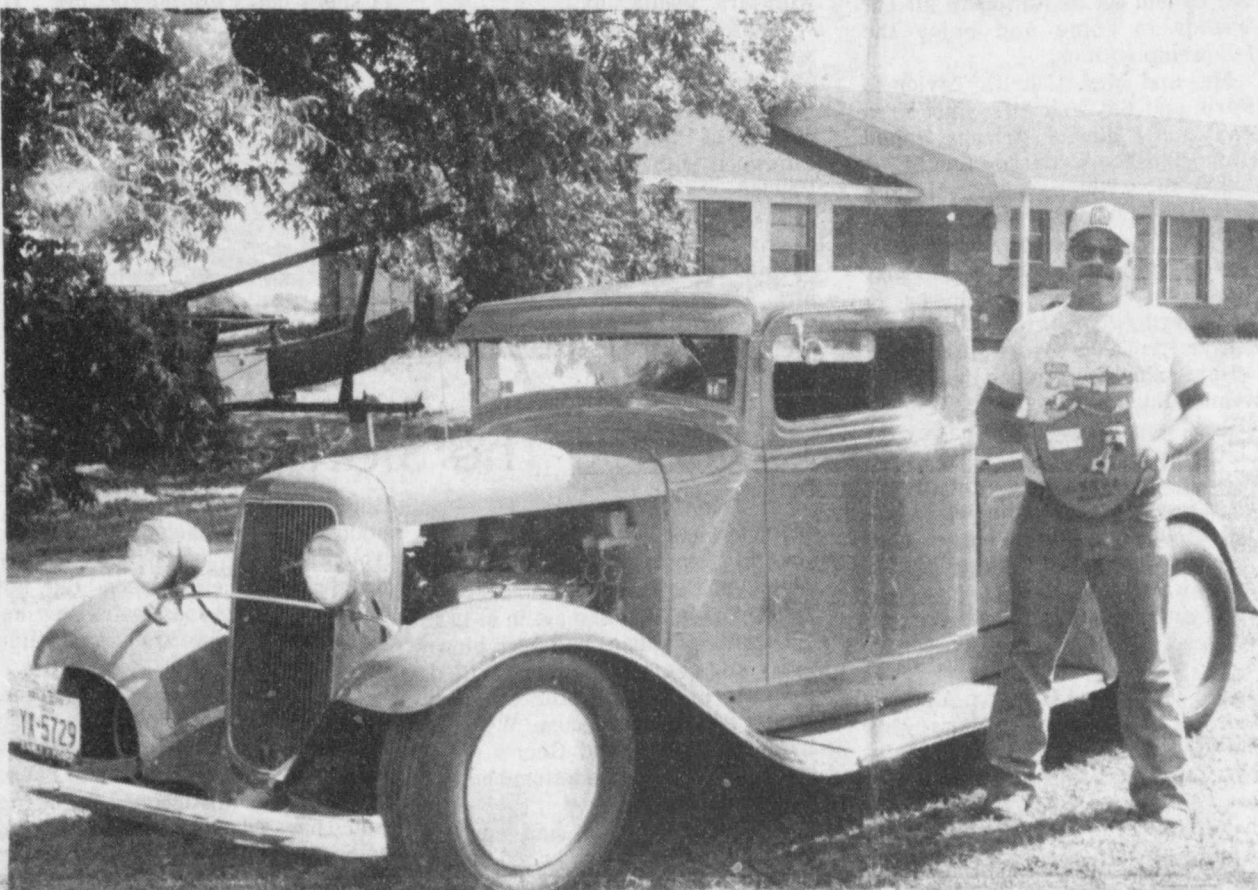

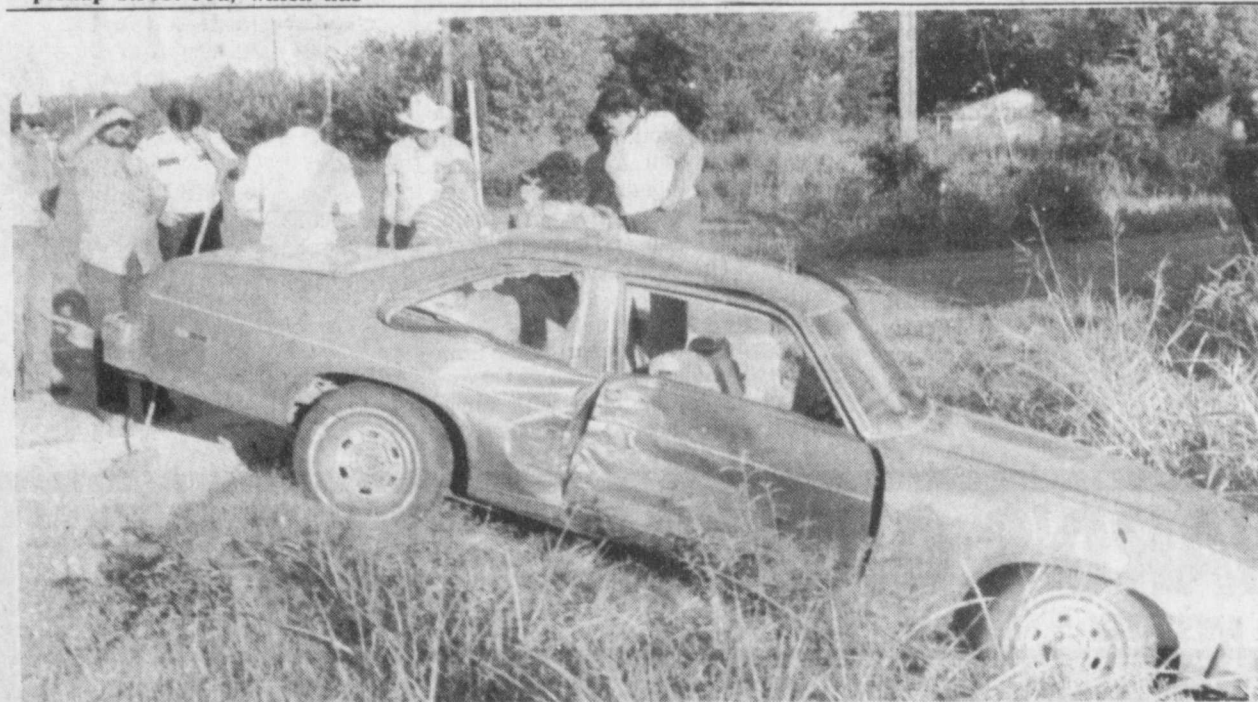

appeared in "Rod Action" Magazine, and recently won an award at the Lone Star Street

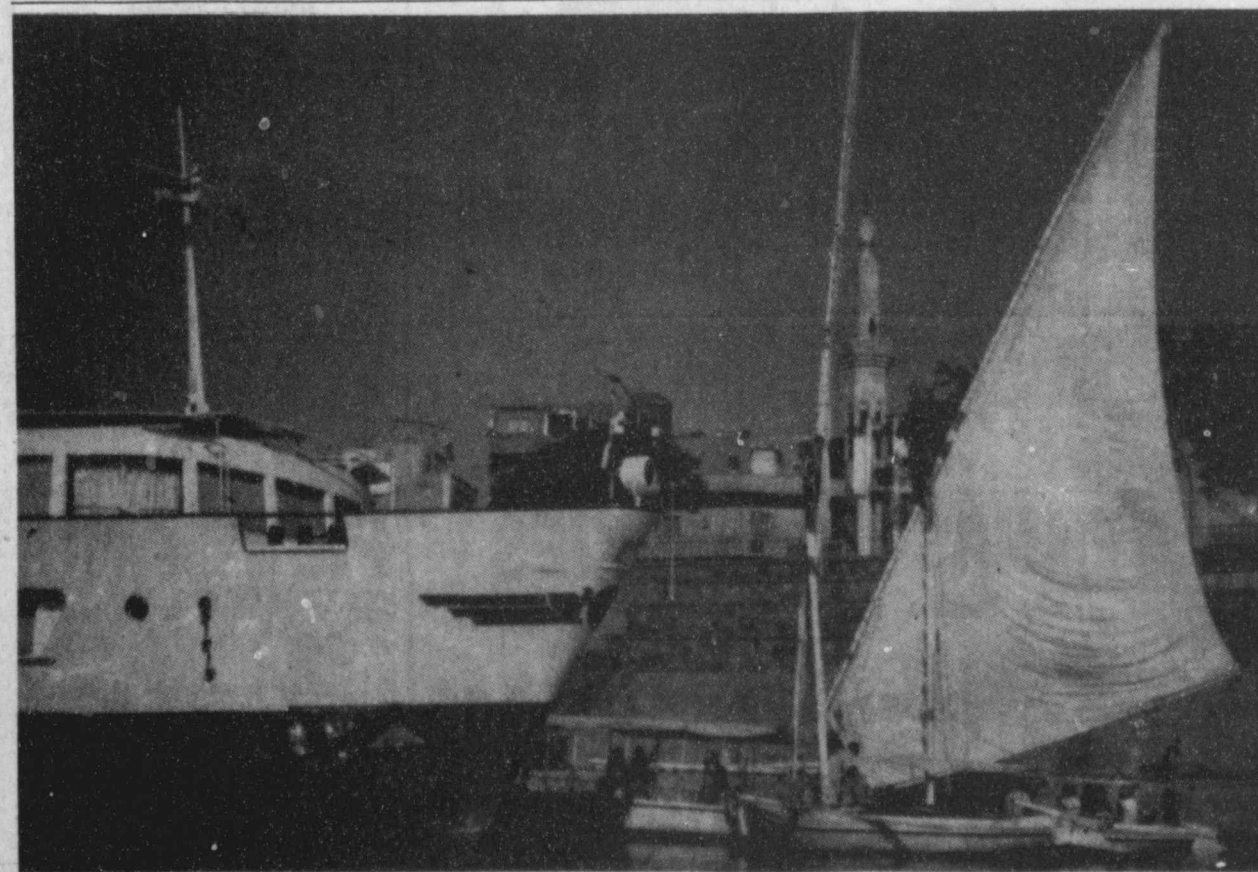

Estimates Of Traffic Deaths Released

The Texas Department of Public Safety estimates that as many as 17 people will die in traffic accidents in the state during the 30-hour July 4 holiday period.

"Though this year's estimate is lower than last year's death toll, the final figure could be even lower if Texans refrained from drinking and driving, stayed within the speed limit and buckled their safety belts," said Colonel Jim Adams, director of the DPS.

Last year, 20 persons died in crashes on Texas streets and highways during the July 4 holiday period. Three additional fatalities resulting from serious injuries during the period pushed the final toll to 23.

"This year's estimate of 17 deaths compared to the higher number of fatalities last year is in keeping with a downward trend in Texas traffic fatalities," said Adams.

In 1984, 48% of the fatalities reported during the July 4 period resulted from accidents in which speed or DWI was listed as a contributing factor.

The Department's Operation Motorcade, in which the number of fatalities will be reported at intervals through the period to remind Texas drivers of holiday driving dangers, begins at 6 p.m. Wednesday, July 3 and continues through midnight Thursday, July 4.

Deport Homecoming This Saturday

Everyone is urged to come out Saturday and enjoy the day, as well as participating in the class reunions of 1925, 41, 42 and 62, which are planned.

On Sunday, the Methodists will be celebrating their 100th anniversary, another reason to participate in a community event.

Narrow Streets And Fishing Dogs!

Esna, Egypt, a tiny city honeycombed with narrow alleys and twisting streets, topped by the ever-present minarets of the Islamic mosques.

We walked from our Nile cruiser down those narrow streets which merchants called and followed us, trying, as always, to strike a bargain on their goods.

As we walked down the tiny streets, children mounted on carts pulled by donkeys, would call out in Arabic for us to move over, and women peered from behind latticed shutters at what must seem strange and unseemly women, us.

At the temple of Esna, we descended steep stairs to the court yard, finding it filled with the ever-present Egyptian stray dogs.

These dogs don't look fat, but they aren't actually starving either. They scavenge for food and scraps, plus another neat little trick...they fish.

One can see the dogs out in the waters of the river, sitting on their haunches perfectly motionless. Their eyes are intently on the water, their tongues hanging out in anticipation.

Suddenly they dart their head down, coming up with a small, wriggling fish. A toss of the head and down the fish goes!

This is a fact, not a tale told to us, so believe it (some people look at me like I'm fibbing.)

One dear British lady always felt sorry for the dogs, so she would get up early in the morning and go to the boat's kitchen and get scraps from the maitre'd. Then, armed with those and often carrot sticks for the carriage horses, she would take her tours, stopping to do her part to make life for the animals a little better.

At Esna, we saw the gravel pits dug around the foundations of the temples to provide drainage so that the salt deposits and water build-up wouldn't continue eating at the ancient structures.

These deposits were unknown until the creation of the Aswan high dam...one of the problems it has caused along with its many benefits.

The interior of the temple has many rooms, and in some of them the walls are completely covered with hieroglyphics. These ancient writings are the formulas for incense, perfumes, wines, beers, embalming, a vast storehouse of knowledge that provides a look into ancient Egyptian life that few cultures can provide.

On our walk back through the town we had time to buy a few things, bartering in our by now experienced manner.

The galabias, in various colors, were a favorite item among the ladies. We all purchased the loose, flowing robes to wear both at home and while on the trip, finding the fine cotton and loose design perfect for the hot weather.

One small item had to be attended to, though. In an Egyptian's galabia, there is always a "thieves pocket" or magic pocket. On the other side there is a normal pocket, but the thieves pocket is merely a slit in the side seam. It will be on one side or the other, and is there not only to provide ventilation, but so that pickpockets take a chance on finding not a wallet, but the bare side of the robe's wearer! Obviously, pickpocketing is not a very flourishing industry in Egypt.

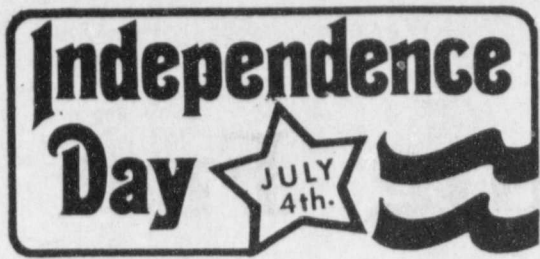
Every variety of good is available in the markets. Robes, shirts, sandals, flutes and musical instruments, vases and pottery, all for sale in tiny shops barely big enough for the proprietor and one or two customers.

The local laundrymen can be seen, sitting on the ground an dpropelling their huge flat irons back and forth over fabric with their feet!

We didn't see the snake charmer the day we were there, but were told that often he was to be found, sitting on a mat with his basketful of cobras, ready to make them dance for anyone willing to drop a few piastras in his bowl.

Esna provided yet another look into the daily lives of the common Egyptian, and remains as one of the favorite stops in my mind. But, of course, soon our boat set sail again down the Nile, unrolling the procession of farms and fields on both sides of the flowing river.

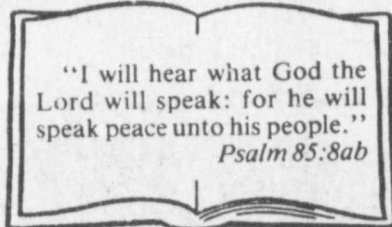
Ruben Archibald Dies At Age 76

Going To The Storm House

Back when we were kids, people around Deport were very jumpy about thunder storms. Tornadoes had hit Deport in 1907, and again in 1908. A number of houses had been blown away and one man had been killed. Because of all this, almost every family had a storm house. We were living on uncle Fred Geer's place south of town. We had a storm house, but it wasn't very good.

It was made of logs and was the home of toad frogs and grand daddy spiders. The Sam Hern family lived across the road and they had a good big dry storm house that was made of heavy oak lumber. They asked us to come over and share their cellar during storms.

The Joe Boots (Hinderson) family lived down the road a couple of hundred yards from us. They also had a storm house and were very storm shy. They went for cover almost every time it thundered. They always took a bucket of water with them. They used a chain and bucket to draw water. The well pulley always squeaked for lack of grease and the chain rattled in the night.

We didn't live in Deport at the time of the tornadoes and weren't as storm conscious as the ones with more storm experience. At night when the

thunder and lightning would announce the approach of a storm, we wouldn't get up as most of the other people in the neighborhood did, but when we heard Joe Boots draw his bucket of water, we knew it was time to get up and look at the weather.

The Herns had two daughters, Chrystal and Maurine, who were about our age, and we were always glad to go over to their storm house for an hour or two during a storm. We would hang a coal oil lantern from the ceiling and sit on benches around the walls. One of the men would sit at the entrance and hold the door shut while the storm passed over. After the storm and the rain stopped, we would all scramble out and back to our beds.

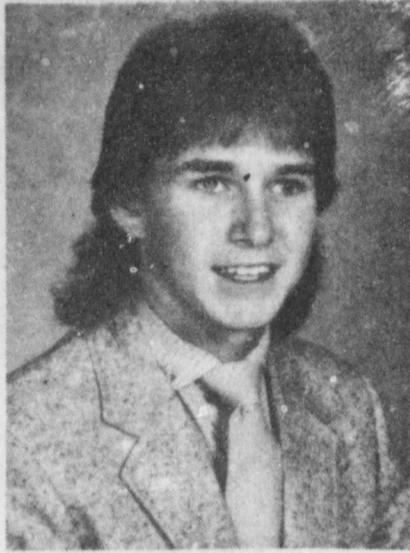

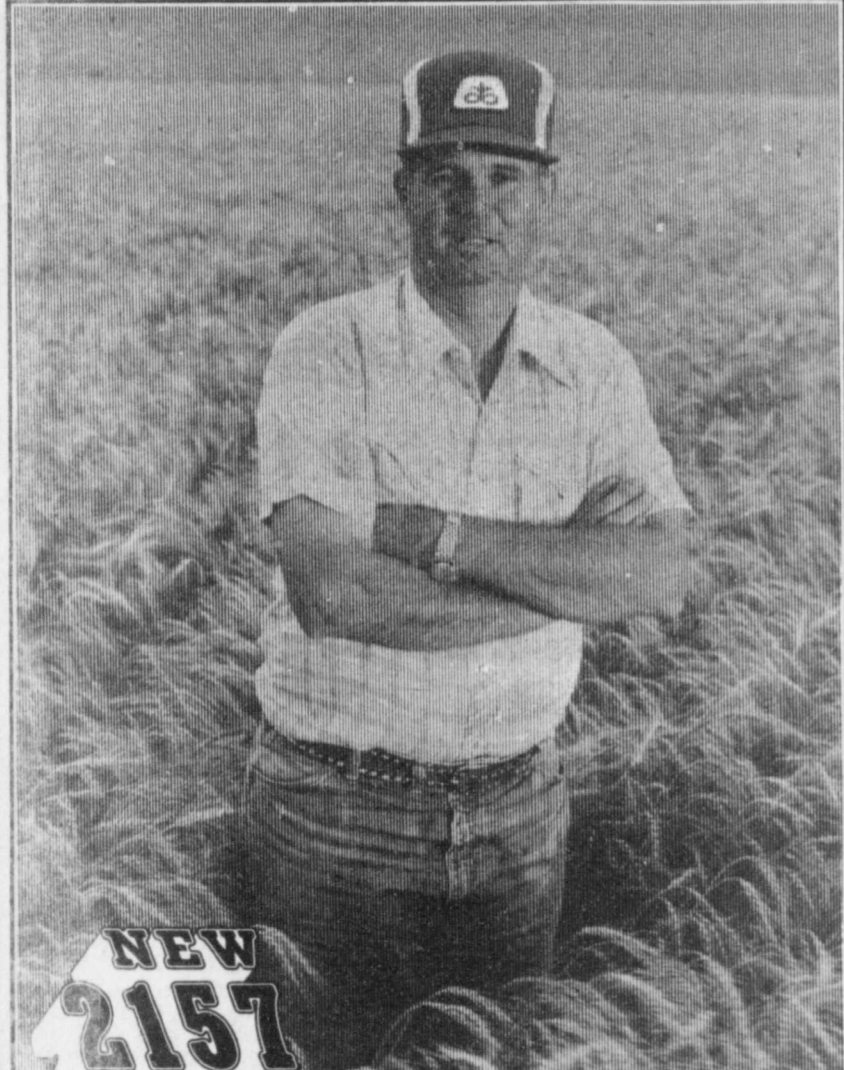
