The Prairiland Ag Talent Team played a variety of songs, to the delight of old and young alike, and were followed by the Deport Children's Choir, who sang with enthusiasm a variety of children's religious songs.

After that, and a lot of visiting, hugging and exclaiming, various groups had a number of class reunions to attend.

The whole day was proclaimed a huge success, and plans for the next homecoming, five years from now, are already in the mill.

A great big "Thank You" is in order to all the former residents and students of Cunningham for making this homecoming one of the best we have had. There were 645 registered guests and many people came that did not register. It is estimated that the total number exceeds 700. Many people came especially for the program which seems to get better every year. Mrs. Rachel Rhinehart Cotta of Pismo Beach, CA received the prize for traveling the greatest number of

miles, a distance of 2,074. Mack Lynn of Hugo, OK was awarded the prize for being the oldest person present and Joshua Fry of Paris, son of Mr. and Mrs. Terry Fry and grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Allen of Blossom for being the youngest member present.

One hundred years of Christian worship in the Methodist tradition at the First United Methodist Church in Deport has been sealed in the archives of minds, hearts and memories of all who shared those years with a pledge to continue on and on into another century of worship.

More than 250 members, former members, descendants, relatives, friends and neighbors attended the day long festivities.

Abby Strickland, Ida Lou Read and Martha Glover were recognized for

their efforts and cooperation in sharing their talents at piano and organ. Their gifts were presented by Ty Merritt, Martha's grandson and Ken Red, grandson of Ida Lou.

Present for the special day was a descendant of one of the original church trustees in 1885, Mrs. Imogene Perry Kimble Lee and Overtor Perry. Her grandfather was J.A. Burris, who has been quoted as saying

"First we will build a hosue for the Lord, then next year we will add to our home."

Rev. Gary Lindley chose as his sermon topic "Treading where saints have trod." Appropriate and meaningful for all gathered to celebrate 100 years of ancestral heritage and personal experiences in Christian worship.

Following morning services, 208

plates of food were catered at the school cafeteria. Then all returned to the sanctuary for an informal program. The Deport Children's Community Choir, directed by Abby Strickland, assisted by Lynn Day and Dana Norman presented a program of music appropriate for the occasion and to the national celebration fo the 4th of July.

Among the distinguished guests

were Rev. Rex Carlton, a former pastor and Rev. John Poe Hensley, former pastor. Mrs. Fay Bryan, widow of Rev. Emory Bryan, district superintendent, Dr. Don Renshaw, county judge, Brady Fisher and guest speaker, Rev. Gary Lindley.

The pastor, Rev. Chief Warden, and the congregation ask all to hold on to the atmosphere that bound together those who shared this special day of celebration on July 7.

Take a part of the heritage, share it, build with it, record it for the bicentennial celebration. There are a small few that attended this celebration that could be prent for the bicentennial. 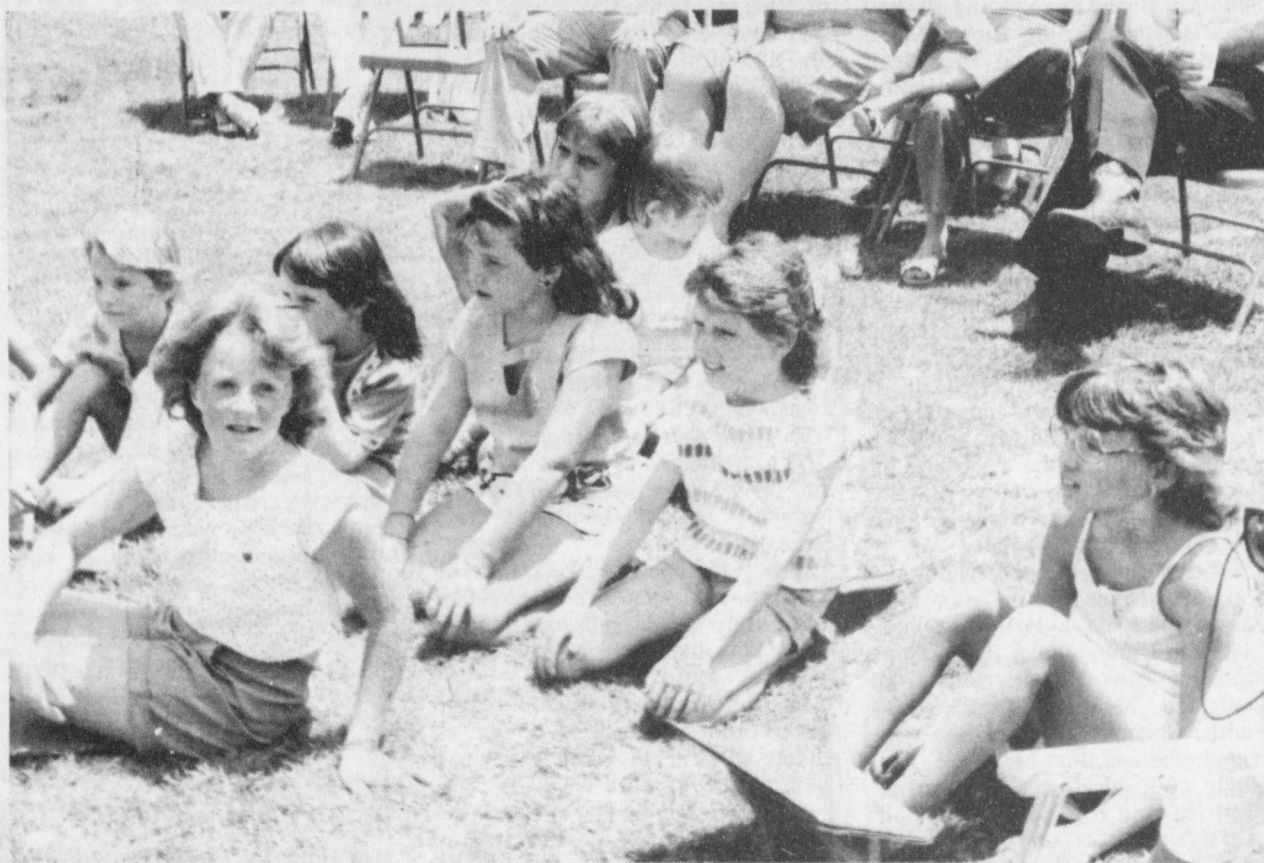

## Garden Problems Arising

Many insect and disease problems continue to occur in area gardens and home landscapes. Most of these are the problems that come our way each year, but that does not make them easier with which to cope.

Based on frequency of calls, our office has received the most on webworms in pecan and certain other trees as the number one problem. The first generation of this nuisance is about complete, however, we can look forward to at least one other generation this year. The worms are just about mature at this time.

A little later in the summer, a moth will emerge from the present worms; eggs will be deposited on leaves; small worms will emerge and the whole cycle continues.

Sevin insecticide will control the pest, but they must ingest some of the insecticide, which means that the web must be penetrated with the spray. It will do no good to apply the insecticide if there is not adequate pressure to penetrate the web.

The webs can be burned out with very little damage to the tree. Others have been successful by pruning the webs and then burning them. These two methods can be used quite successfully on young trees but older, taller trees present a challenge.

These webworms should not be confused with other types of worms on pecan trees. The only damage that these do is the webbing. They do not cause the tree to die, holes in the pecans or large areas of foliage to be eaten. Frankly, the unsightly appearance is the main objective.

The control of crayfish in home lawns is another big concern of local homeowners. The wet fall, winter and spring have been ideal for crayfish production and they are a real nuisance in the heavy soils of the county.

Applying a creosote solution to the burrow has been an affective practice of many. The thumb rule is to mix the creosote with water at the ratio of one part to 100 parts of water. You will need to pour at least a cup of the solution in each hole. The drier the soil, the more of the solution to apply.

Someone called the other day and reported that they had been told to use mothballs and then they went on to relate their experience having placed a mothball in each hole. Yes, you guessed it, the crayfish removed the mothballs from the holes. In fact, the person almost got hit with a flying mothball. Well, almost.

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## Light Shows And Distrust In Luxor

Still sailing with me? It's a slow time of year, so these articles fill in some space, and the response to them has been great.

After Aswan and Esna we spent one morning sitting on the upper deck of the boat at Dendera, a tiny village of probably a hundred people and watched life go on there.

I almost had to go to the cabin when the boat threw its plastic trash bag of garbage overboard, and the kids swarmed it and pulled it to shore...but stuck it out, and realized that it wasn't food they were after.

They fed scraps to the dogs, and kept empty plastic containers and the things that "rich" tourists think aren't work keeping became instant treasures to them.

The black-clad women took about their hard work with eyes cast down rather than looking up at us, but the children and men ignored us completely.

They cut clover for fodder, carrying donkey load after load from the fields to the village.

Tiny branches and twigs of firewood were carted in too, and after that work was done, the youngsters had a time to gallop around on the backs of the donkeys.

Then it was time to sail, and we went down the river to Luxor, one of the larger cities besides Cairo.

In Luxor we encountered the first, and only, sense of distrust among the people. The concierge of the boat explained that in Luxor they trust no one from "outside" because some years ago an unknown group bought up the land around Luxor at nearly nothing, then resold it only weeks later for a fortune because of the dam project.

That night we sat in the huge Karnak temple and watched and listened to the magnificent sound and light show there. The breeze blew, swallows, disturbed by the noise, flew overhead, and spotlights picked out ruins for miles in every direction.

In Luxor, too, Jayne had a boy ask her to change some bills for him (not an uncommon request). But when she pulled out her money, several men surrounded her, jabbering and pulled the roll of bills away from her. The boy had already started counting money out, so she snatched that money and her own roll back, and the two of us promptly got on the bus, which drove off, leaving the group shouting and waving after us.

Imagine our absolute astonishment when we found she had managed to retrieve not only her own money, but about five pounds of theirs! It was the only unpleasant incident of the entire trip, and ended with her having a little accidental revenge on them!

After a late night at the sound and light show, six o'clock seemed early, but a droopy eyed group was ready to go to what was really a highlight of the trip...the Valley of the Kings, Queens and Nobles.

Hot, dry and dusty, the climate has changed from the time of the pharaohs, when there were lush forests and green lawns there.

As we went deeper and deeper into various tombs, the paintings became richer, brighter, more intricate and beautiful.

The depredations of tomb robbers have long since taken away the solid gold ornaments, the jewels and

precious incense urns, but the huge marble tombs, and the glorious paintings remain intact, deep within burial chambers begun when a king took the throne, and worked on all his life.

High above, in the sun-filled sky, clouds of vultures circled, reminding one of the sacred vultures painted on the tombs.

The queens were buried with no less

beauty, and the nobles only slightly less.

It was indeed, the realization of a dream that has existed since childhood for me.

From there, we went once more on Air Egypt, again, having dry croissants thrown at us by stewardesses, and landed in the evening at Cairo, to finish up our sightseeing there.

Mike and Loretta Emmons are home after a week at Youth Camps.

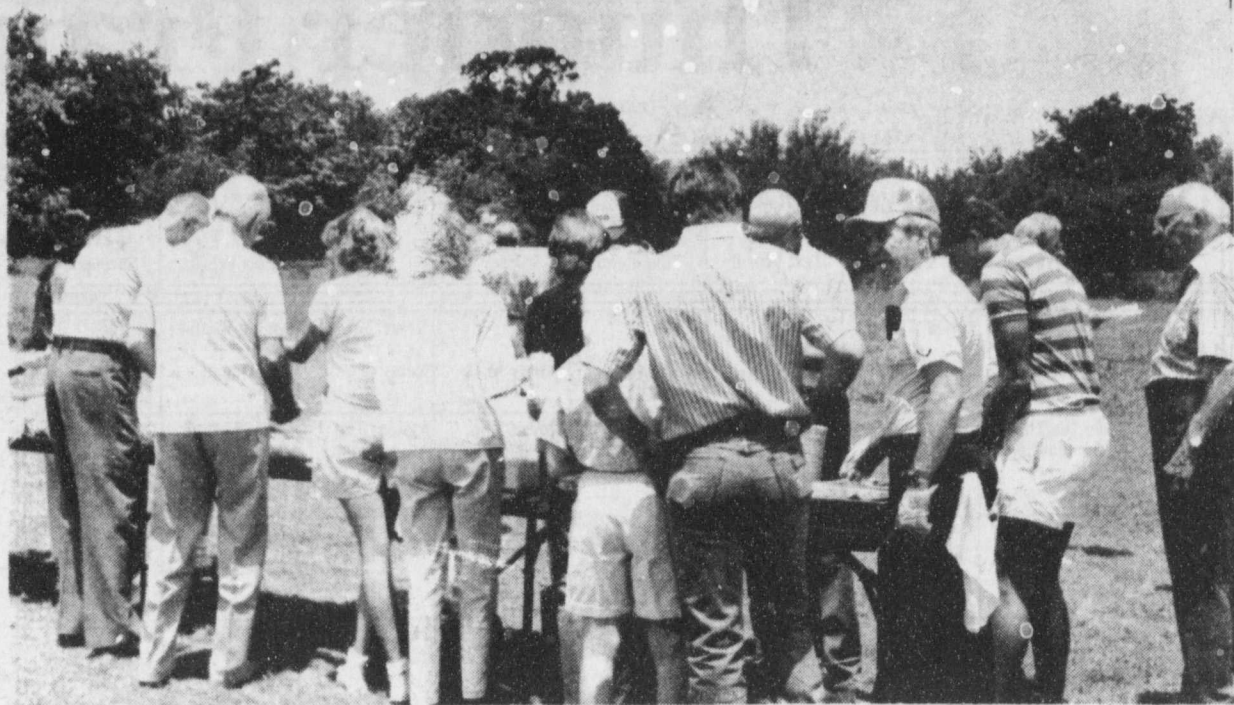

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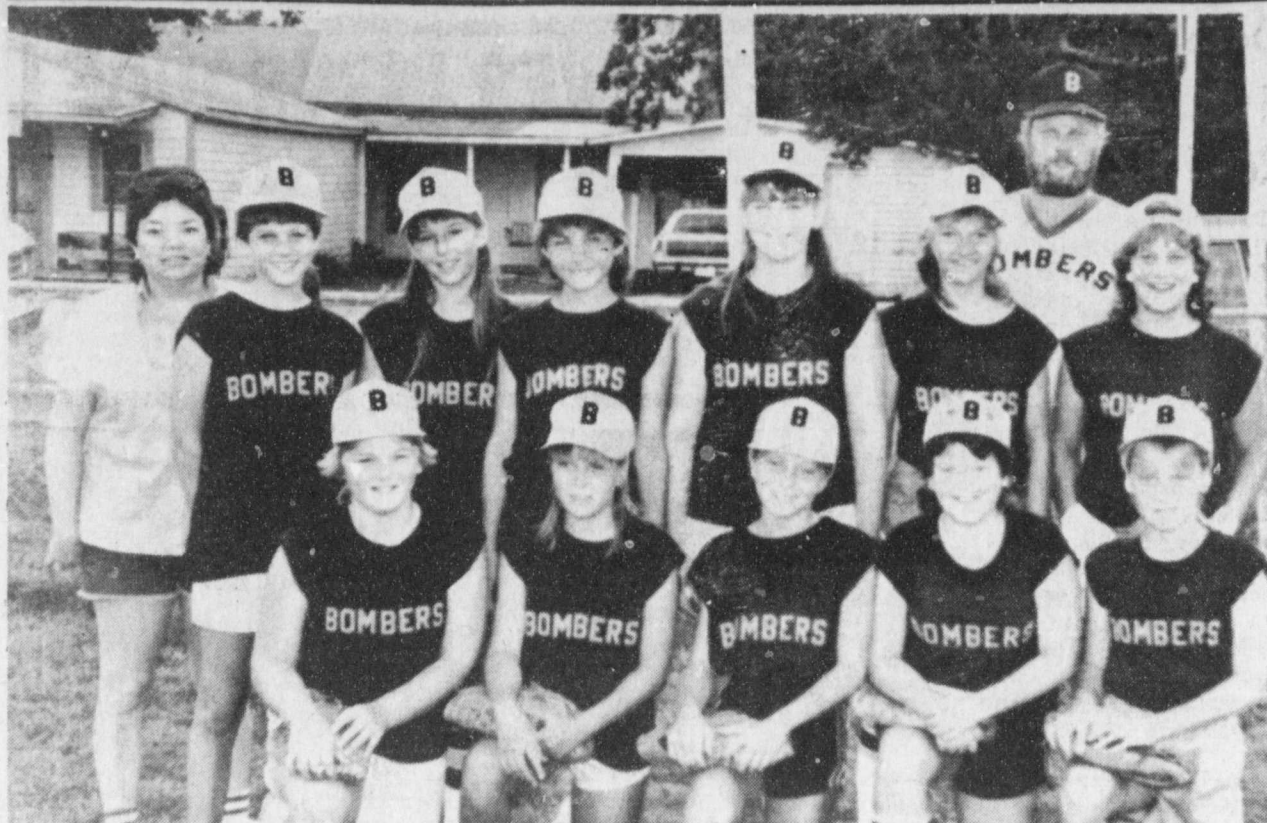

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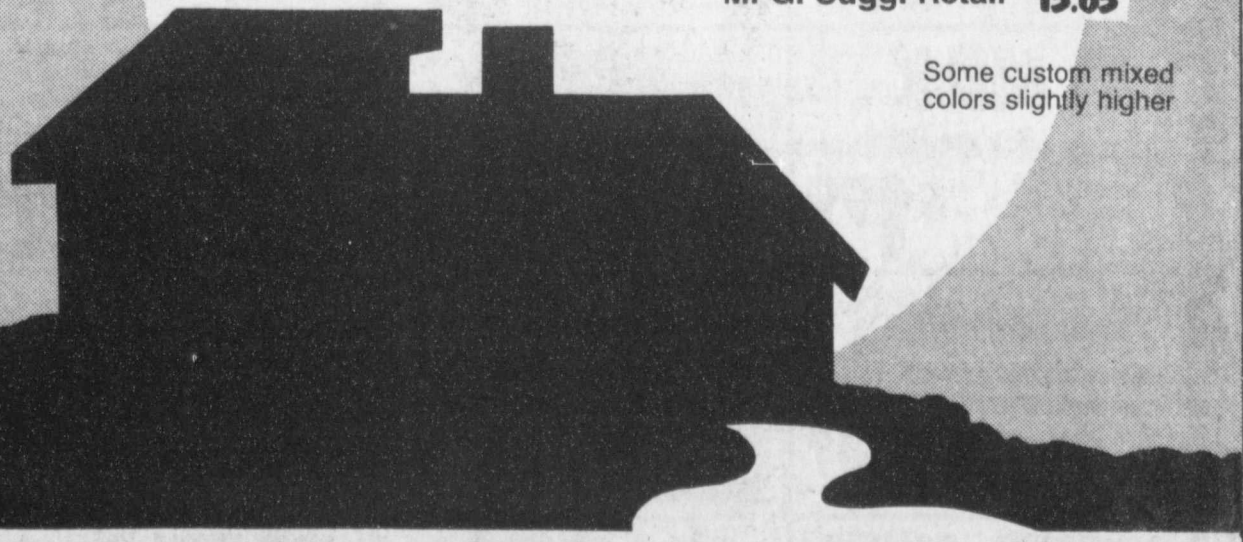

## Oxygen Shortage Causing Problems In Pools

Shortage of oxygen in farm ponds is causing problems throughout East Texas, according to Billy Higginbotham, fisheries specialist. Fish gasping for air at the pond surface or finding dead fish are common signs that an oxygen depletion is occurring in the pond.

Many factors and combinations of factors contribute to an oxygen depletion. Normally, an oxygen depletion can be corrected if the pond owner knows what signs to look for and acts quickly.

Most oxygen depletion occur in warm weather between June and September. Warm water holds less oxygen than does cool water. Additionally, water levels in ponds are usually lower during the summer months. Fish are actively growing, particularly if they are being fed a commercial ration, during the summer months. As a result, the fish need more oxygen for the faster metabolic rate.

Higginbotham says that sunlight is needed for phytoplankton to produce oxygen through photosynthesis. Several cloudy days in succession limits photosynthesis and decreases oxygen production. If the cloud cover is accompanied by hot, still weather, conditions continue to worsen.

Exceeding the carrying impact capacity of the pond is one of the most critical factors in oxygen depletion. A total weight of fish in the pond should never exceed 1,000 pounds of fish per surface acre during the warm months. The size of the pond should be calculated at the lowest level during the summer.

Overfeeding or over fertilization can also greatly contribute to oxygen depletion. If the water develops a deep green or blue-green color during the hot months, excessive phytoplankton growth is probably the cause. Excess feeding of the fish can furnish an overabundance of nutrients to the phytoplankton, thus creating an oversupply.

If fish are observed gasping at the water surface during early morning hours or an unusual or rapid change in water color occurs, the oxygen supply in the water may be critical. Aeration of the pond water is the best method of relieving an oxygen depletion. To accomplish this, the water must be brought in contact with the air. Pulling water off near the surface and spraying it back over the pond will help increase the oxygen content. Outboard motors can help circulate the water by running in a fixed position. If a bottom drainpipe is present, low quality water from the bottom of the pond should be removed.

Good management is the key to preventing poor water quality conditions from developing in farm fish ponds. Unusual and unexpected situations can occur and must be dealt with on an individual basis.
