

Wing Rodeo Flies High In "Dallas" Episode

During the week of July 29 through August 2, a part of the Wing Rodeo Company of Bogata, TX was doing something a little bit different from their average day, they were helping film a television episode for "Dallas" to be seen during the new fall season. A truckload of bulls and horses left Bogata on Monday, July 28, and were transported to South Fork Ranch in

Dallas where they were housed in portable pens, which had been set up for the special filming.

During the week's activities at South Fork, Wing Rodeo Company's bulls and horses were ridden by several "doubles", who were riding for the show character of Ray Krebs, portrayed by Steve Kanaly, the ranch-hand turned new found

member of the infamous Ewing family. Riding bulls in the episode will be Richard McCallum of Grand Saline, TX and riding bareback horses was Steve Hall of Bonham, TX. Rodeo judges who were shown in the episode include Kent Hall of Bonham, TX.

Barrel racing was also a part of the episode, where doubles rode for Priscilla Presley, who portrays Jen-

na Wade in the serial. When the double for Ms. Presley completed her ride, Ms. Presley then rode the horse herself around the barrels. It was reported that she did a very good job in handling her mount.

All cast members including Larry Hagman, who plays the evil and overbearing "J.R." were on location during the filming.

Bull riding, bareback riding, steer wrestling and girls barrel racing were included in the activities for the episode, which will be aired November 15.

The Wing Rodeo Company has previously been involved in movie making and stock has been featured in films such as "Urban Cowboy" starring John Travolta, along with

"Stir Crazy" starring Gene Wilder and Richard Pryor. "Dallas" was the first television appearance for the Wing Rodeo Company.

The filming lasted four days for this particular segment of the episode, and everyone reported that it was a hard day's work everyday, but very exciting, and yes, they would all do it again.

At the post office the other day I took a moment to look around during the morning mail rush. And, I discovered that there are as many rituals at the post office as there are in church!

There is also an almost palpable feeling of anticipation as customer after customer proceeds to his box and digs out the daily accumulation of postal deliveries.

The majority of people aren't able to leave the lobby without looking through their mail!

They stand, often with one hand still lingering on the key in the lock of the box, sorting through the various circulars, magazines and bills.

There is a system to this sorting, too. Bills, usually accompanied by a resigned sigh, are consigned to one slot between the fingers.

Advertising or sale papers are relegated to another.

Magazines are tucked under one arm. Personal letters, the highlight of mail call, are looked at immediately.

Some people seem to heighten their anticipation by holding an envelope to the light before tearing it open.

There are those, of course, who are more organized. They go across the lobby and open their mail on the available table, carefully sorting through, discarding "junk" mail in the trash, and often reading their letters on the spot.

Still others manage to actually restrain their curiosity until they make it all the way to their automobile. Then they settle in for some serious mail sorting. Again, bills in one pile, discards or "to be read at leisure" in another, and personal letters to be opened and read on the spot.

Mail is a little like a daily Christmas. It is a routine, and a ritual...but one that instead of being the same, promises a touch of excitement daily.

There is the ever-present possibility of something new and exciting coming through the U.S. Postal Service, the contact with those who live far away, and, of course, we all might get a million dollars in the mail. I haven't given up hope for mine, yet, anyway!!

Old Deport Cemetery Needs Mowing Funds

Prolonged rains early this summer kept the regular maintenance man out of the Old Deport Cemetery south of town for several weeks.

As a consequence, dallisgrass and other grasses got out of hand. This condition, coupled with many headstones hidden by the grass, caused two other maintenance men to start and stop mowing, according to Ed Bryson, president of the Deport Cemetery Association.

Right now, the situation is at rest and will remain so unless some "hero" shows up and does the work with heavier equipment, Bryson says, adding that the grounds may have to be left for Jack Frost, as was done long ago before the regular mowings started in late 1971.

Lamar County Commissioner Jimmie Sparks has cleaned and deepened the ditch at the front of the cemetery, and Deport Mayor Charles Foster has promised surplus soil to help fill a low place in the ground on the south side.

Prairiland Hires New Teachers

The Prairiland CISD School Board hired a number of teachers in their Monday night meeting.

Sharon Ramsey was hired for a first grade teacher at Deport, and Kristy Parsons will fill in for Lisa Drenon, who is on six month maternity leave.

Randy Clarkson resigned his post as science teacher at Blossom to teach in the Detroit school system, and Randy Jordan was hired to replace him as science teacher and to do some coaching.

Bill Mosley was hired to fill the vacancy in the English and Spanish departments at Prairiland High

School. The vacancy was created by L.C. Stout's promotion to principal at Blossom Elementary school.

Two aides were also hired for the coming school year, Lynn Day who will work at Deport, and Mrs. Dan Harris, who will be assigned where there is a need.

The board also accepted the resignation of Donald Crawford from the school board, and the vacancy will probably be filled by appointment at the next meeting.

They will be taking bids for the sale of a 1977 GMC school bus, and approved the purchase of two new buses. The new buses should be ready in eight to

nine months.

Miles Construction Company was the bidder for the construction of the new science lab which will be built at the Blossom campus. The science lab is necessary to meet state requirements.

The board approved the placing of the secretaries at the three campuses on eleven month contracts, and approved a bid from Mrs. Baird's Bread for the school lunchrooms.

In other business, they heard and approved the minutes, and financial reports.

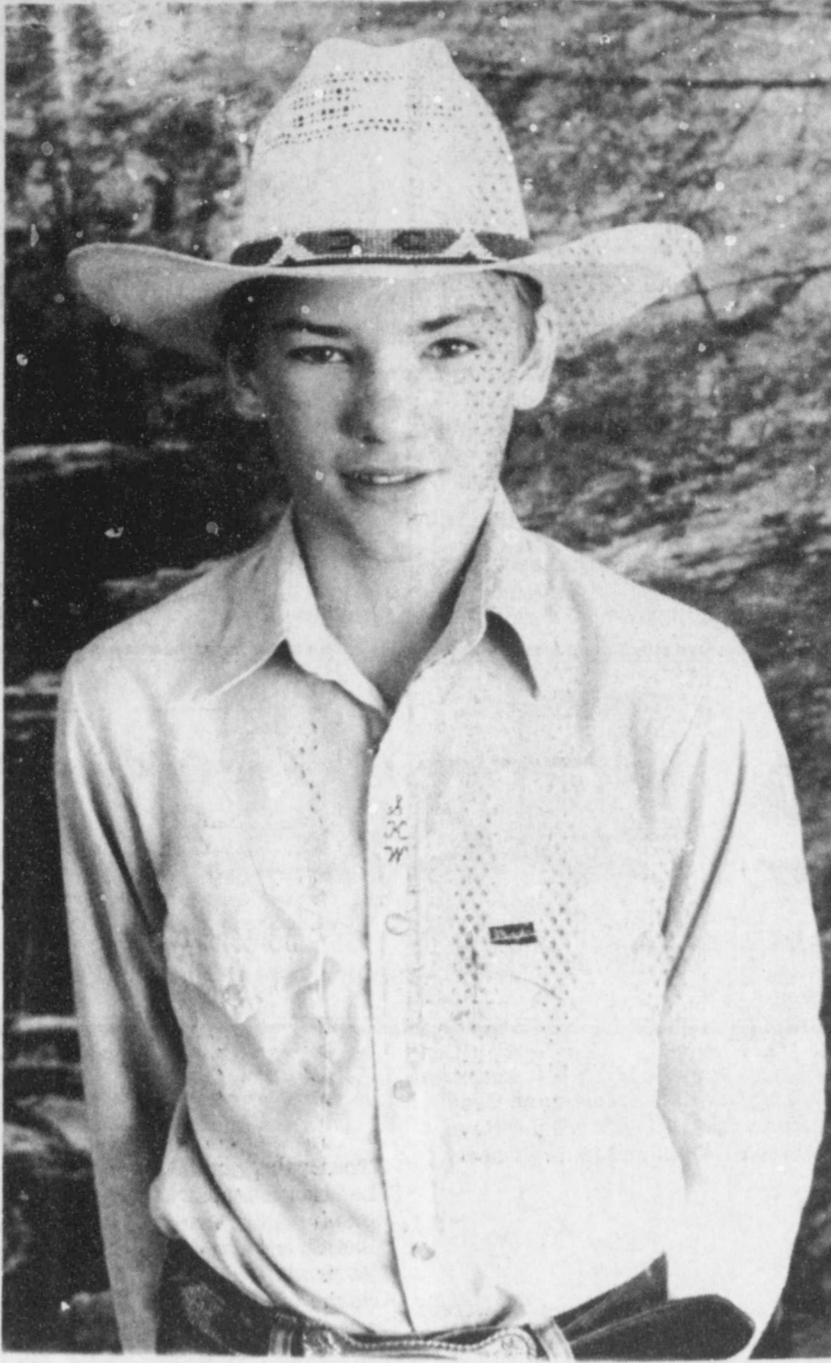

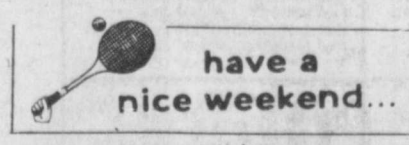

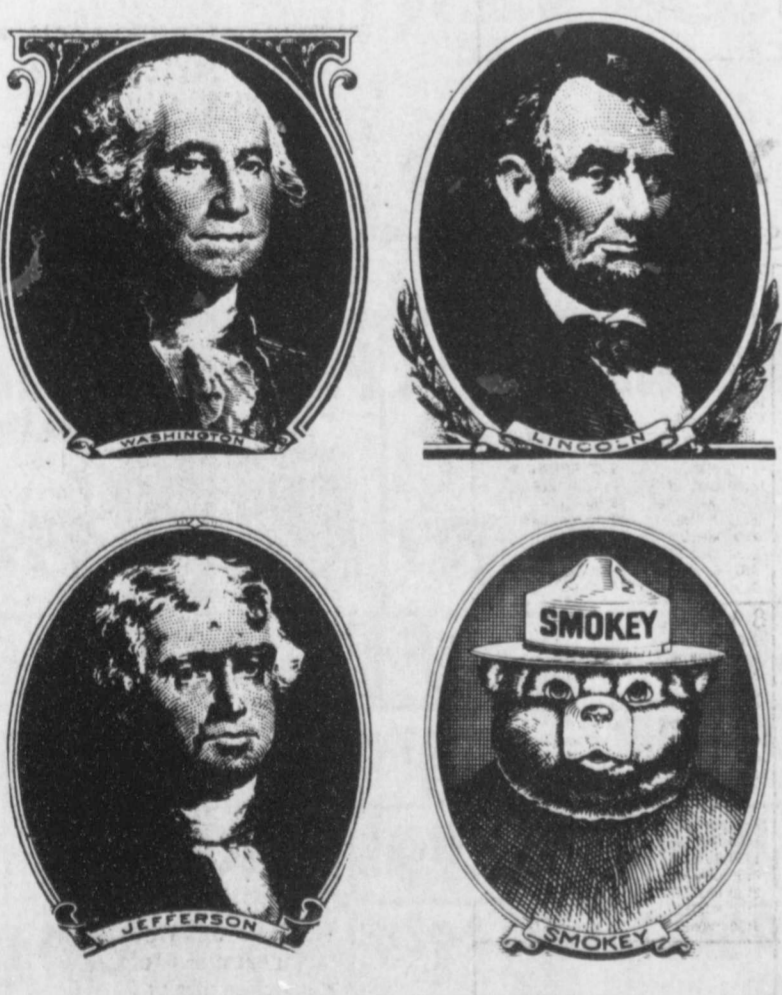

The association wishes to thank each one who had a part in making the bake sale at Wal-Mart and the garage sale at First Assembly of God a wonderful success.

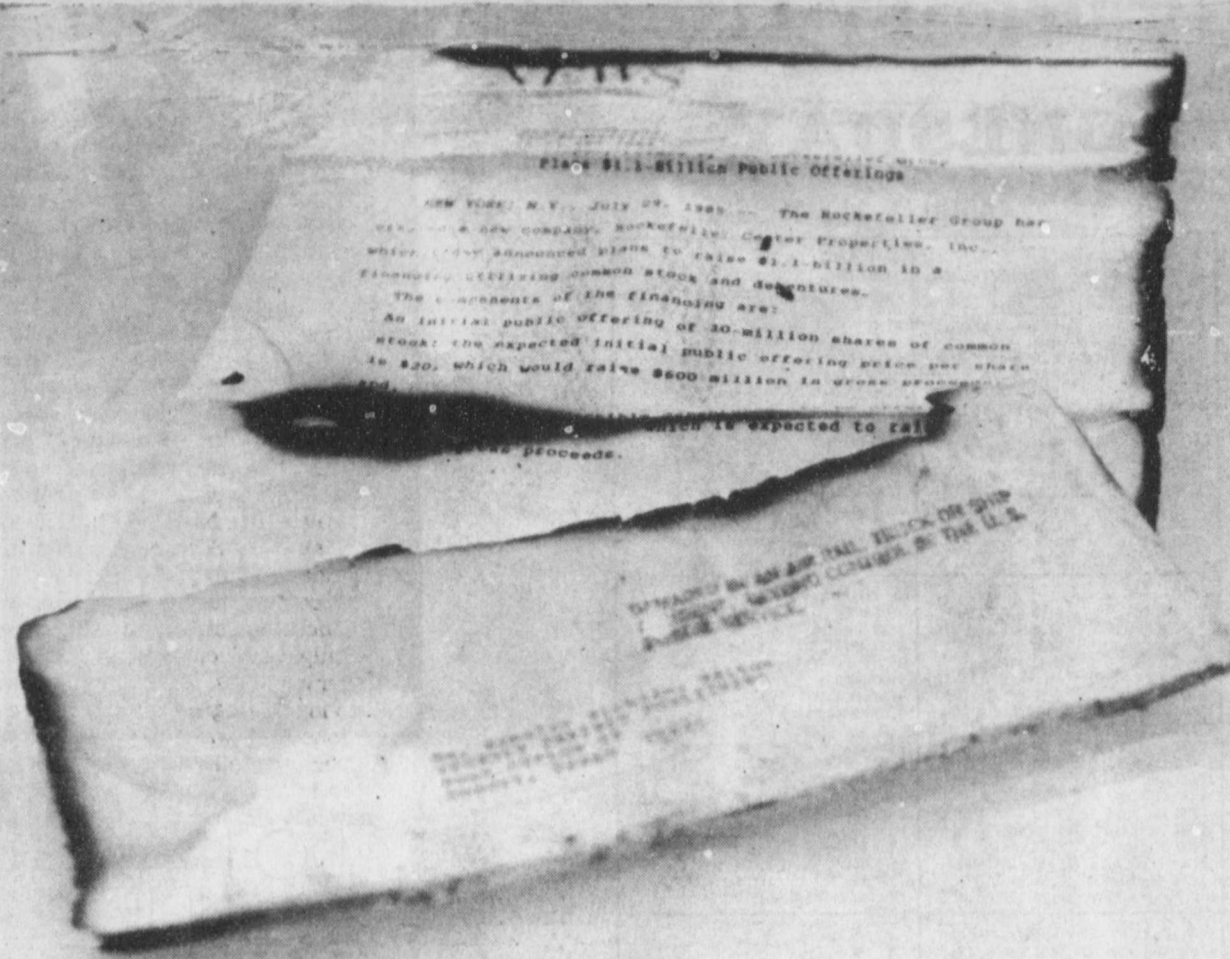

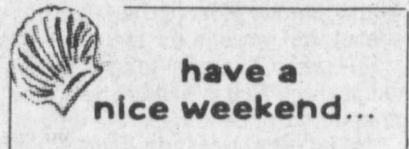


PJC To Offer Defensive Driving Course

Again this fall, Paris Junior College will offer defensive driving, the National Safety Council's driver improvement courses, said June Jones, director of community services. The college began teaching DDC in the early 1970's and has offered the course each year as one of its continuing education programs. Defensive driving, which includes eight hours of classroom instruction, usually is offered by PJC on the first Saturday of each month from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and on the first four Monday nights of the month from 7 to 9 p.m., Mrs. Jones explained. In September, however, the Monday night classes will start on Sept. 9 since the first Monday is Labor Day. According to the National Safety Council, the defensive driving course is taught in every state and about 20 other countries. It is designed to teach driving strategies for preventing collisions and ways of lessening the severity of collisions which do occur. In its 21st year, the course has a new look and feel, but the same basic

lifesaving principles remain. The presentation, films, student workbooks and other course materials have just undergone a major revision. The revised course emphasizes student activities and interaction with the instructor and other students. A detailed section of the new handbook includes basic information about child safety seats, now required by Texas law. Every fifth student who takes the course is evaluated, and of those who return the evaluation, about 98 percent said that the course improved their driving. In Texas, persons who take an approved driver improvement course are granted a 10 percent discount on the liability portion of their automobile insurance premiums from carrier regulated by the State Board of Insurance. The discount is good for three years, Mrs. Jones explained, but it may be granted again

when the course is repeated. Traffic citations may be dismissed at the direction of judges upon the offender's satisfactory completion of an approved driver improvement course. PJC's defensive driving course instructor is Henry Davis, transportation supervisor of the North Lamar Independent School District. The classes include lecture, film, workbook completion and discussions. No actual driving takes place in the course. Classes scheduled for fall for Saturdays, September 7, October 5, November 2 and December 7 and Mondays, September 9, 16, 23 and 30; October 7, 14, 21 and 28; and November 4, 11, 18 and 25. The fee is \$20 and pre-registration is requested. More information may be obtained by calling Mrs. Jones at 214-784-9445 or 784-9447.

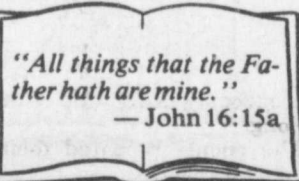

Weekly Agricultural Update

By Herb Brevard
Recent rains have renewed growth of forages in many sections of East Texas. According to Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., agronomist, it may be necessary to concentrate grazing in areas where clover will be reseeding. One of the important factors in getting a good stand of clover is to have the grass short and Reeves says the shorter the better. By grazing these areas, other pastures are allowed to grow more forage. If rains continue, this forage can be cut for hay or utilized as standing dry forage. Additionally, these areas can be grazed while clover and ryegrass is coming up in the short-grazed pastures. Reeves says that a fall application of potassium and phosphorus will certainly benefit winter forages. Any nutrients that are not used by the winter forages will be beneficial to forages next spring and summer. The best time to apply the potassium and phosphorus is August and early September. Late summer and fall applications of fertilizer on bottom pastures is necessary since these pastures tend to stay wet during the winter and spring. Once the heavier rainfalls begin, it is impossible to get equipment into some of these areas to apply fertilizer.

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Chapman's Office Now Open

The congressional office of Congressman-elect Jim Chapman, D-Sulphur Springs, opened officially on Monday, August 5 at 10 a.m. following Saturday's special election in the First Congressional District.

First District local offices opened for the congressman-elect at the same time in Marshall, Paris, Jacksonville and Texarkana.

Chapman will remain

congressman-elect until he is sworn in with an official ceremony in the House of Representatives. However, since Congress is in recess for the month of August, Chapman cannot be sworn in until Sept 4, according to Deputy House Clerk W. Raymond Colley.

Colley said the swearing-in ceremony, "likely" will be held that day when Congress returns, although

he said arrangements will have to be made between Colley and the leadership of the House.

A spokesman for House Speaker Thomas P. "Tip" O'Neill, D-Mass., also said Chapman would probably be sworn in soon after the House is back in session in September. She could not confirm that it would be Sept. 4.

Colley said a new congressman cannot be sworn in from a special election until the clerk's office receives a certificate from the Texas secretary of state's office giving the official election returns. He said there should be "no real problem" getting the certificate by the time the house is back in session.

The transition to the new office holder seemed to go quickly Monday, with the secretary answering the phone, "Office of Congressman-elect Jim Chapman."

Ken Black, former top aide to former Rep. Sam Hall, D-Marshall, said the staff of the office in Washington and the district offices would be working as usual for the district. He said the staff in the office would include most of the same personnel that worked for Hall.

He said Chapman talked to the clerk of the House Monday morning to get clearance to open the offices. "So he (Chapman) really is in control" of the congressional offices, said Black.

The office for Hall closed officially when Hall was sworn in as U.S. district judge for the eastern district of Texas on May 28. The office then was controlled by Black, who was appointed as administrator for the office of the First Congressional District by the clerk's office. Black subsequently has become top aide to Rep. Floyd Spence, D-S.C.

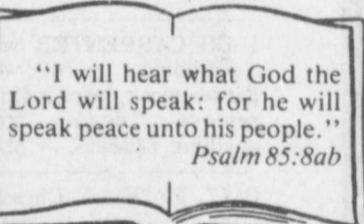
