


This brings about having to utilize tools such as ballpoint pens, rulers, silverware, whatever is handy. It is, obviously, a slight oversight in the engineering department!

WW II Plane Crashes **Near Pattonville** apparent that they couldn't make it

It was to have been the plane's last flight before a dignified finish in a North Dakota Air Museum. It was the last flight, but it ended far short of the destination.

Saturday morning an A-26 Invader, piloted by an experienced bush and ferry pilot, with the plane's owner in the other seat, ended it's career in a plowed field west of Pattonville.

The plane, which had belonged to I.N. Burchinal's Flying Tigers Air Museum, had been sold to Shane Williams, representing Aero-Nostalgia.

The pilot was Paul Weston, an Alaskan bush pilot with thousands of hours of air-time logged.

The plane, the only type of aircraft ever used in World War II, Korea and Vietnam, was an attack bomber.

It had been sitting idle for the better part of four years, when the two began to put it in working order. They had flown the big bomber from Flying Tiger Air Field just west of Paris. to Cox Field. They were taking off from Cox Field on their way to Fargo, North Dakota, and had just cleared the pattern and were trying to gain altitude when the engine quit.

Weston feathered the right engine down, but said that the plane was still



The pilot was concerned that he had hit a cow. He hadn't.

Bits and pieces of sharp metal, bolts, screws and shards of cast metal, along with a fine mist of fuel and oil, covered a huge area of Wilson's field after the aircraft came to rest from it's sideways slide across the dry dirt.

Pilot Weston commented that "I've been ferrying World War II type aircraft for years. Nothing like this has ever happened to me before. I just thank God we came out of this alive."







Keeping Healthy

Preventing Heart Attacks

Conclusive evidence that reducing elevated blood cholesterol with a cholesterol-lowering drug and diet can prevent heart attacks and death from heart disease was presented recently by the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute (NHLBI).

The study was the largest, longest and most closely monitored to date of cholesterol and its relationship to heart attacks. Directed and funded by the NHLBI at 12 U.S. medical centers, the Lipid Research Clinics Trial demonstrated that combining the cholesterol-lowering drug, cholestyramine (Ques-tran), with a moderately low-fat diet, reduced heart attacks by almost 20%.

The NHLBI scientists estimate that if Americans would reduce their blood cholesterol levels by 25%, this would eventually lead to a 50% reduction in the incidence of coronary heart disease.

The study participants were 3,806 men between the ages of 35 and 59, but the NHLBI believes that the re-sults are also applicable to both men and women of all ages.



Keeping Healthy

Bald Spots Sometimes Inherited

Between 10 and 50 percent of parents with a hair disorder called alopecia areata have children or grandchildren who also suffer from loss of scalp hair. An average of 25 percent is the estimate given by Andres J. Mitchell, MD of Henry Ford Hospital in Detroit, Mich. in an article in the November issue of the Journal of the American Academy of Dermatology.

Alopecia areata is characterized by round or oval patches of nonscarring hair loss, according to Dr. Mitchell and his colleague, Edward A. Krull, MD. Usually developing suddenly, alopecia areata may go away spontaneously, or progress to the loss of all scalp hair, and recurrances are frequent. Psychological stress and an inherited tendency to certain types of allergies may also play a role in the cause of this disorder, as well as immune system defects.
