

# Most Local Sales Taxes Show Slight Increase

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday sent checks totaling \$112.3 million in local sales tax payments to the 1,005 cities that levy the one-percent city tax.

Houston's check was the largest, \$18.6 million, bringing total payments this year to \$104.8 million, up five percent from last year. Locally, Blossom received \$1,598.58

for this period, for a 14.30 percent increase from last year's payment for the same period. Deport received \$1,704.95, comparable to \$1,918.54 for last year, showing a 17.73 percent

total gain in total payments for the year. Paris received \$258,186.00, a 7.81 percent increase from 1984. Bogata received \$2,291.22, a .53 per-

cent decrease from last year's payment of \$3,629.66. Clarksville received \$23,468.50, a 2.78 percent increase over 1984's payment. Talco received \$3,382.84 for their

period payment, a .02 percent increase over the 1984 payment of \$2,388.14. Mt. Pleasant received \$127,728.01 for their payment, a 8.46 percent increase from last year.

Let's see now, what was that other thing I needed to remember to put in this column?

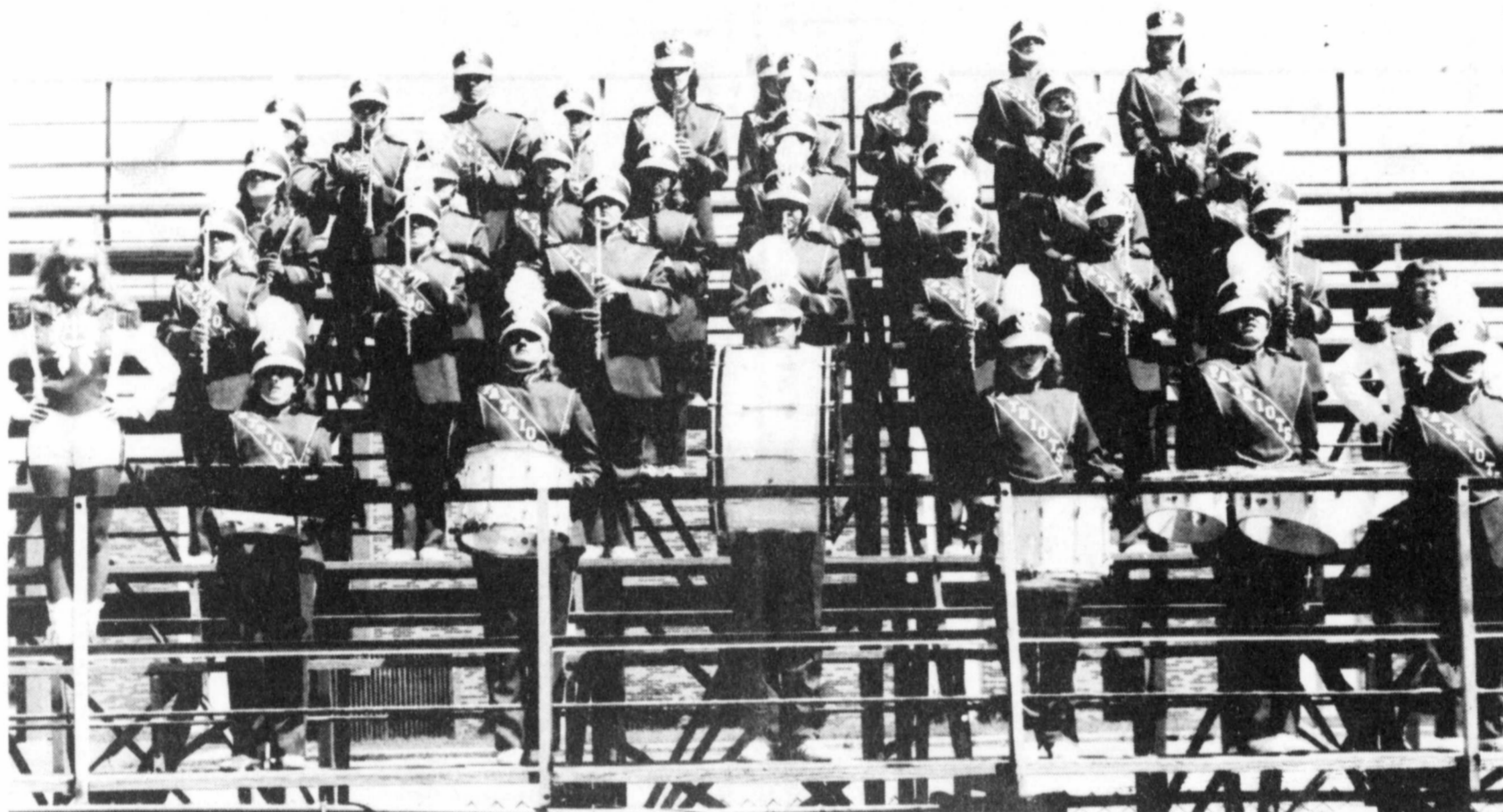

It's time something was done about dogs. In Deport. Immediately. As a long-time animal lover, with a large supply of dogs, cats and assorted other critters, it isn't easy to suggest termination as the solution to a problem, but a solution needs to be found.

The dog problem consists of a nucleus of three, with whatever canine supplement they pick up as they roam throughout the entire town. Their goal is killing anything smaller than they, and there are plenty of things smaller.

One Deport citizen reports that a favorite cat, let out for only a moment, ran to the door for help. The dogs cornered it on the steps, and when the owner appeared, they snapped and threatened to attack him! The cat's body was carried away, for leisurely mauling.

Yet another Deport resident lost their tiny white poodle because of this pack. The list of cats totals five known

deaths, and it is only a matter of time before some small child suffers injury.

If someone owns these dogs, keep them up or get rid of them, permanently!

The dogs are coming onto privately owned property, where pets have every right to be, in order to attack and kill them. They are dangerous. Something needs to be done.

## Blossom, Paris Men Die In Crash

Shane Wilson, age 18, and Archie Bray, age 30, died Monday night on 24th Street S.E. in Paris, after a two vehicle crash.

Austin Shane Wilson of Blossom was the driver of one of the pickup trucks involved in the accident. Two passengers, Wilson's brother Vernon, age 14, and a friend, Steve Lynch, 18, are listed in stable condition at St. Joseph's Hospital in Paris.

What was known about the accident Tuesday was that the pickup truck driven by Shane Wilson was reported speeding on Lamar Avenue. A Paris police unit apparently reported they were going to pursue the vehicle, and was notified that it was already being pursued by a highway patrol unit.

DPS Officer Bob Carico apparently started the chase at the Paris city limits on Highway 82 East.

According to reports, the chase continued down Lamar, to 19th Street S.E. where the vehicle turned south. After several more turns, Wilson was on 24th S.E. When the pickup truck hit

the railroad tracks near the football stadium, it went out of control, and it turned sideways. Bray's pickup was heading north and the Wilson vehicle crossed into the path of the Bray vehicle.

The two vehicles collided head on, knocking Bray's truck into the ditch, while Wilson's continued to the entrance of LaMesa Heights where it went into a ditch on the west side of the road.

The Wilson pickup caught fire, and the two passengers scrambled to safety. Patrolman Carico reports that he an unidentified bystander pulled Wilson free, and all three were taken to St. Joseph's Hospital, where Wilson later died. Bray was pronounced dead at the scene.

The crash is still under investigation.

Funeral services for Shane Wilson were held at 10 a.m. Thursday, August 22 at Fry and Gibbs Funeral Home Chapel with the Rev. Jerry Putnam of Wesley United Methodist

Church in Sulphur Springs officiating with burial in Meadowbrook Cemetery.

He was born June 22, 1967 in Paris, a son of James W. Wilson and Peggy Worthey Wilson. He was a 1985 honor graduate of Prairiland High School where he was a member of the track team and the Math Club. He was employed at Belk's Department Store in the men's department. He was a student at Paris Junior College and was a member of Blossom United Methodist Church.

Surviving as his parents; one brother, Vernon Jay Wilson of Blossom; one sister, Brandy Terrish Wilson of Blossom; his maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Worthey of Paris; his paternal grandmother, Mrs. Austin (Imogene) Wilson of Paris; his great-grandmother, Mrs. G.W. Worthey of Paris.

Services for Archie Bray were at 2 p.m. Thursday, August 22 at Fry and Gibbs Funeral Home Chapel.

## WW II Plane Crashes Near Pattonville

It was to have been the plane's last flight before a dignified finish in a North Dakota Air Museum. It was the last flight, but it ended far short of the destination.

Saturday morning an A-26 Invader, piloted by an experienced bush and ferry pilot, with the plane's owner in the other seat, ended its career in a plowed field west of Pattonville.

The plane, which had belonged to I.N. Burchinal's Flying Tigers Air Museum, had been sold to Shane Williams, representing Aero-Nostalgia.

The pilot was Paul Weston, an Alaskan bush pilot with thousands of hours of air-time logged.

The plane, the only type of aircraft ever used in World War II, Korea and Vietnam, was an attack bomber.

It had been sitting idle for the better part of four years, when the two began to put it in working order. They had flown the big bomber from Flying Tiger Air Field just west of Paris, to Cox Field. They were taking off from Cox Field on their way to Fargo, North Dakota, and had just cleared the pattern and were trying to gain altitude when the engine quit.

Weston feathered the right engine down, but said that the plane was still trying to roll over. When it became

apparent that they couldn't make it back to Cox Field, he picked out a grassy field. However, as he approached, a herd of cattle wandered out into his path. He made a decision not to hit the cows and aimed for a plowed field just beyond. Both cattle, and field, belonged to long-time Pattonville area resident, Harry Wilson.

Wilson, who was working some cattle at the time, saw the plane losing altitude, hit the ground, bounce, and catch a bois d'arc tree. The right wing was sheared off, and when the plane hit the ground, the engines broke free, landing thirty to fifty feet away from the plane.

The pilot credits the engines breaking free with probably being the reason for his and Williams' survival. Fuel and oil were sprayed all over the airplane, and fire danger would have been extreme otherwise.

When Harry Wilson arrived, the two were out of the broken-up wreckage. Wilson said that "I really expected to find two bodies in the mess". Instead they both received cuts and bruises, Williams requiring 35 stitches on the face, but no serious injuries.

The pilot was concerned that he had hit a cow. He hadn't.

Bits and pieces of sharp metal, bolts, screws and shards of cast metal, along with a fine mist of fuel and oil, covered a huge area of Weston's field after the aircraft came to rest from it's sideways slide across the dry dirt.

Pilot Weston commented that "I've been ferrying World War II type aircraft for years. Nothing like this has ever happened to me before. I just thank God we came out of this alive."

The softball tournament will be sponsored by the Blossom Warriors,

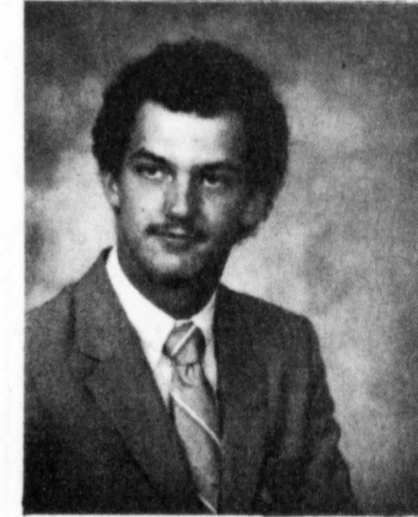
a ladies softball team coached by Shirley Jaynes. This will be held at the Girl's Softball Park.

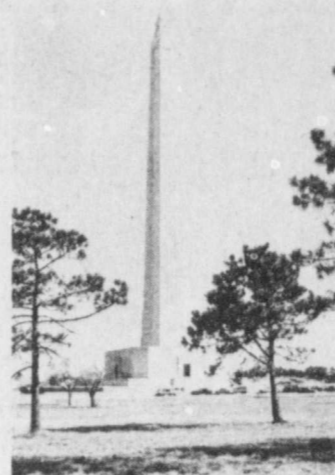

## Home Health Care Expanded

Beginning August 1, McCuiston Regional Medical Center expanded their Home Health Care Services into the Clarksville and Red River County area according to Carol Ward, Home Health Care Supervisor. Until that date, Beverly Enterprises had provided the home health care agency in Red River County.

McCuiston began providing home health care in January as a continuation of care for those persons that were dismissed from the hospital as well as any person confined to the home.

The first day services were provided to Red River County, nine patients were evaluated for care by McCuiston. Within the first ten days, the number of persons being served by the McCuiston service grew to twelve. Included in the services available are skilled nursing care by licensed nursing professionals, aide assistance, physical therapy, laboratory services, respiratory therapy, medical equipment and supplies, occupational therapy, medical social worker counseling, speech therapy, dietary consultation and additional services as needed and prescribed by the patients' physicians.

Mrs. Ward stressed persons in need of these services do not have to have a Paris physician in order to receive home health care. Several referrals have been made by the Clarksville area physicians.

Since the beginning of this expansion of McCuiston care, over 2,000 home visits have been made. Home Health is often misunderstood. A person does not have to be hospitalized to receive home health care. Although persons may be able to leave the hospital sooner by the utilization of this service.

A familiar face to Clarksville area residents, Mrs. Ward served as a staff nurse and director of the Clarksville Home Health Service and as a registered nurse in the Red River General Intensive Care Unit.

The 12-member McCuiston Home Health Care Staff can be reached at 214-737-1656. To further meet the needs of the people of McCuiston's service area, a member of the Home Health Staff is on call 24 hours and weekends to answer any questions and make visits as needed.

Home Health Care is covered by Medicare, Medicaid, Veteran's Administration, Champus, private insurance, private payment or insurance when ordered by a physician.

### Secrets of Salton Sea

A geologist at the University of California, Riverside will lead scientists in a \$6 million drilling venture to probe the secrets of one of the largest geothermal fields in the world—the hot brine and rock beneath Southern California's Salton Sea.

Members of the lower class are vulnerable to negative events regardless of the unemployment rate. And those in the upper class have fewer undesirable events whether the rate is up or down. In fact, they tend to prosper even more when times are bad.

Breasts cost more per pound because they are the meatiest parts, followed by thighs, drumsticks and wings. A whole broiler-fryer is 50 percent edible cooked meat. A 3-pound bird yields approximately 3 cups cooked edible meat.

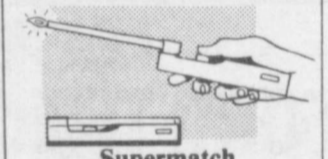

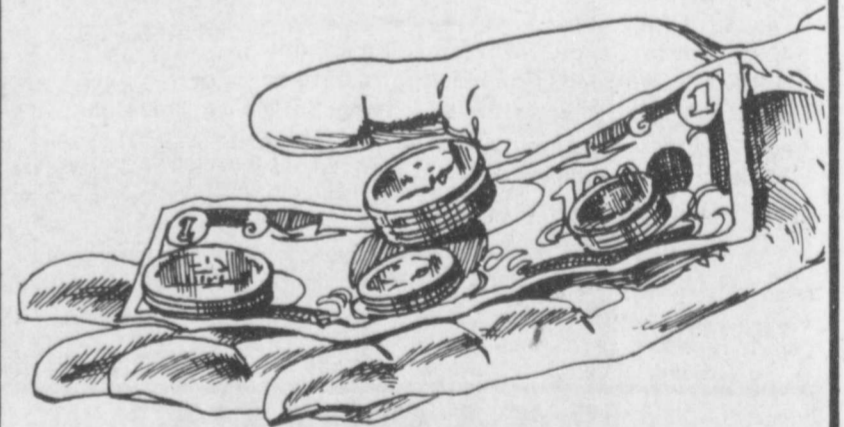
### Keeping Healthy

Bald Spots Sometimes Inherited

Between 10 and 50 percent of parents with a hair disorder called alopecia areata have children or grandchildren who also suffer from loss of scalp hair. An average of 25 percent is the estimate given by Andres J. Mitchell, MD of Henry Ford Hospital in Detroit, Mich. in an article in the November issue of the *Journal of the American Academy of Dermatology*.

Alopecia areata is characterized by round or oval patches of non-scarring hair loss, according to Dr. Mitchell and his colleague, Edward A. Krull, MD. Usually developing suddenly, alopecia areata may go away spontaneously, or progress to the loss of all scalp hair, and recurrences are frequent. Psychological stress and an inherited tendency to certain types of allergies may also play a role in the cause of this disorder, as well as immune system defects.

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
