Recent research conducted on behalf of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation indicated an estimated half billion pieces of trash along Texas roadsides in late August.

Four different studies were commissioned by DHT in advance of a major effort to reduce roadside litter which cost taxpayers a whopping \$20 million last year

The Institute for Applied Research, headquartered in Sacramento, California, performed a visible litter count in key locations throughout the

state. The Institute, who ha sperformed more than 40 studies on litter throughout the United States, is considered the premiere firm in the nation on litter research. This study indicated that roadside trash is approaching an estimated half billion

Their other findings included:

Fifty-three percent of highway litter is caused by deliberate acts, while 47 percent invovles loss of truck loads that were unsecured or uncovered, as well as miscellaneous items blowing

Texas Litter Costs Texans Big Money

Sixty-one percent of roadside litter can be found in urban areas. The remaining 39 percent lies on rural freeways and roads.

Litter from automobiles accounts for 30 percent of all roadside litter. Pickup trucks are the source of a dispropportionate amount of roadside

litter, amounting to 27 percent. However, pickups represented only 11 percent of all vehicles observed. Stake, flatbed, dump trucks and trailers account for 21 percent of

roadside litter in Texas. Other vehicles contributed the

As to who litters, "habitual" litterers in Texas were defined in a separate study by the Institute as primarily males, between the ages of 10 and 44. The largest category was young men, between the ages of 18 and 34. The study indicated that 71.4 percent of all deliberate littering is done by males, with females representing only 28.7 percent.

Decision Analysts, Inc., of Arlington performed two studies to probe why Texans litter and their awareness of litter as a statewide problem.

As to why Texans litter; convenience is the primary reason.


Most Texans interviewed do not approve of littering, but 43 percent admitted to littering from time to time. Less than 21 percent were able to correctly estimate the tax dollars required to clean up Texas roadways.

"The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation will use the research statistics to implement a three-pronged program aimed at significantly reducing lit-

ter," said J. Don Clark, director of the Highway Department's Information Services Section.

This war against trash will include an aggressive, targeted media campaign directed at habitual litterers, a state-wide community-by-community clean-up and beautification program and incentives for increased law enforcement.

The \$20 million spent by the State last year on litter collection does not include tax dollars spent by city and county governments on local clean up

Farm Homesteads Protected From Foreclosure By Certain Creditors

Texas is the only state with homestead laws that protect rural homesteads from foreclosure by general creditors. But the protection is limited by the type of debt owed and to a specific quantity of land.

A rural homestead of no more than 200 acres is protected from foreclosure from debts other than those for the actual purchase of the property, taxes and permanent improvements.

The homestead provisions of Texas law will not protect the home from attachment, execution and forced sale for the payment of debts arising from all or part of the purchase money for the homestead, property taxes, or mechanic's liens for work and material used in constructing improvements on the homestead.

The occupant-owner of the homestead cannot increase the 'burden" or amount of the outstanding loan on the homestead. The owner may refinance the homestead property when interest rates become more favorable, but the outstanding balance of the note can be increased only if the extra money covers the cost of improvements, property taxes or refinancing costs.

The protection extends throughout the lives of both spouses and to the minor children and unmarried children remaining with the family of the deceased while they continue to use and occupy the property. Single adults living together, however, cannot claim homestead rights.

These rights also insure that one

spouse cannot sell the homestead without the other's consent. Therefore, both spouses must sign a deed to convey the homestead regardless of whether it is separate or community property.

As a general rule, once a homestead is established it continues until another is acquired. To switch a homestead rquires a physical change of residence accompanied by an intent for the new residence to become the new homestead.

During the farm crisis, homesteads will be protected from general creditors under Texas laws. However, the protection is not available from the creditor loaning the money to purchase the homestead property. For answers to questions about homestead laws, contact a financial institution or an attorney.



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

What To Do With Turkey Leftovers

By Mary Lou Williamson

Now that Thanksgiving is over, we must consider whatever to do with the left over turkey. Some families enjoy leftover turkey from Thanksgiving. In fact, some like the leftovers better than the holiday meal itself!!

The key to using leftovers effectively is to plan ahead when packaging. If your family prefers turkey sandwiches and creamed turkey dishes, you can freeze the leftovers in slices and small pieces. If possible, cover the slices and pieces with broth or gravy to prevent contact with air. This technique lengthens storage life. Package in air tight, meal-sized packages or containers and freeze quickly. Label package or container with number of servings, cooking instructions and the expiration ro shelf life of the product.

Frozen turkey does not improve with age, and it does not retain good eating quality for as long as some other meats. If you are going to freeze turkey, remember this storage guide; one month for slices or pieces, six months for slices or pieces covered with broth or gravy and six months for turkey casserole dishes.

Tasty casseroles can be prepared by combining cubed turkey with vegetables, sauce, seasonings, cooked spaghetti, macaroni, noodles or converted rice. Regular rice and potatoes become mushy after

Prepare the turkey casserole, cool it quickly and place it in a meal-sized freezing container. Cover tightly with moisture-vapor resistant wrap and

freeze immediately. By planning for leftovers, you can spread the enjoyment of turkey over a longer period of time and save food preparation time later during the busy holiday season.



Soybean Demonstration Results Announced

By Paul D. Payne

IMS 4982 was the top yielding variety in the county soybean variety demonstration planted on the Kessell Farm near Blossom. This group IV maturing variety averaged 32 bushels per acre. Following close behind were Asgrow 3420 and Ring ARound 450 at 30 bushels each.

Other results were Ring Around 452-29 bushels; Ring Around 480-28 bushels; Hartz 5252-212 bushels; Ring Around 481-20 bushels; Asgrow 3966-20 bushels; and Hartz 5370-15 bushels.

The two Asgrow varieties are group III varieties and were ready for harvest approximately six weeks before the plot was harvested. Severe shattering was noted in these two which reduced the final yield. One should take this into account when studying the results. Both varieties have good seed holding qualities, but cannot stand a prolonged harvest

The demonstration was planted on May 8 and harvested Novemb This planting date was late for the group III and IV maturing varieties. The late maturing ones made adequate stalk but did not set beans during the August day spell.

Based on these results, those in other counties and similar production resutls by other county producers need to stay with the grou III and IV varieties in order to obtain the more consistent yields. Even though these varieties do not have the 60 bushel potential they will produce in the 30 bushel range if planted early enough.

Work **Planned To Protect Roads**

While Texas' roadways are suffering under the winter's storms, highway department engineers are already planning work that will help protect road surfaces next winter.

The State Highway and Public Transportation Commission approved a \$2.3 million seal coat contract for nearly 60 miles of roadway in five northeast Texas counties. The contract was awarded to Duininck Brothers and Gilchrist Company and is funded through the highway department's safety and betterment program, which received a boost recently when highway funding was increased.

Seal coat preventative maintenance programs provide a protective layer of asphalt over the highway's surface, according to Billy Rogers, a highway department design engineer. The procedure helps prevent the formation of potholes. which occur when the ground under a highway surface freezes and expands.

More than 15 miels of highway in Lamar County, eight miles in Hopkins County, 11 miles in Franklin County, approximately three miles in Fannin County and nearly 20 miles in Red River County will be included in the project. Several miles of US 271, US 82 and Texas 37 are the primary roadways to be coated.

Roy Tomblin, an engineering technician with the Paris highway district, said the roadways were among the more heavily traveled arteries in the area. A number of peonle commute to major firms in Paris along those highways, he said. Tomblin said the project will be completed between April and July of 1986.
