## Prairiland Boys Win District Title

The district champion Prairiland Patriots ended district play Tuesday night in Clarksville as they defeated the Tigers 60-36. The win improved Prairiland's record to 13-1 in district.

Scott Scudder led the Patriots with 18 points and Joel Ballard chipped in 12. The last time that both Prairiland teams had won district was in 1976. Saturday at 2 p.m., the Patriots will try to fine tune their game in a practice game with Avery at Prairiland.

Friday night at Prairiland, the Prairiland Patriots lost to the Pittsburg Pirates 51-49 for their first loss of the year in district play.

In the first quarter, the game belonged to Prairiland. Although Pittsburg had a distinctive edge in size, Prairiland got by on crisp passes. Scott Scudder scored the final basket of the quarter and Prairiland led 11-10.

Prairiland also outplayed Pittsburg in the second quarter. Prairiland got

seven points in the quarter from Scott Scudder and Craig Burns and Mike Connot controlled the boards. Heath Kennedy made the final basket of the quarter and Prairiland led at the half 27-25.

The third quarter turned out to be a disaster for the Patriots. Unlike earlier in the game, Pittsburg began to exploit Prairiland's lack of height. By blocking shots and scoring inside, the Pirates could not be contained. Prairiland scored an anemic five

points in the quarter and trailed at the end of three, 35-32.

In the final quarter, trying to play catch up, the Patriots only seemed to be sinking lower and lower. Although Prairiland was given several opportunities, they missed easy inside shots and several free throws. Although Prairiland came back in the quarter from seven points behind, a Craig Burns final basket could only cut the lead to the final score.

Scott Scudder led the Patriots in scoring with 18 points and Joel Ballard followed with nine. Luckily for the Patriots, prior to the game, Prairiland had already clinched the district championship.

In the boys Junior Varsity game, Stephen Johnson scored 14 points and David Jackson scored 12 as Prairiland defeated the Junior Varsity Pirates 52-49.

## Prairiland Girls Capture District

The Lady Patriots will play this Thursday at Mt. Pleasant High School Gym for bi-district honors. They will take on Hooks at 6:30 p.m. with the Hughes Springs-Paul Pewitt game to follow.

Monday night in Mt. Pleasant, the Prairiland Lady Patriots defeated Paul Pewitt 41-39 in dramatic fashion to win the district championship.

Prairiland played perhaps it's most tense quarter of the year in the first quarter. With everyone on the team tight, Prairiland failed to put the ball in the basket with regularity. Although Prairiland got in the bonus in the first five minutes of the game, the Patriots seemed to be able to do no right. Prairiland got four points in the quarter and trailed 8-4.

In the second quarter, the Prairiland lack of aggression continued. Although Prairiland trailed throughout the quarter, the Patriots still showed a hesitancy to shoot the ball. If not for tremendous rebounding and defense in the quarter, the

Patriots would have trailed by much more than 22-11 at the half.

Prairiland began to loosen up in the third quarter with the aid of a feisty full court press. Prairiland seemed to come alive, especially when Jana Pomroy sank two long shots and a free shot. Although it does not show up in the box score, Pomroy's jumpers made the Pewitt defenders quit clogging up the lane. With the lane a little less cluttered, Deana Watson and Kristi Bankhead each got free inside to combine for eight points and tie the game up at 30-30 with :33 seconds remaining in the third quarter. However, Paul Pewitt made the final basket of the quarter and led 32-30.

Although Prairiland did not score in the final period until nearly five minutes had elapsed, a Pomroy set shot had Prairiland within four at 36-32. Then, with 2:05 left in the game, Klarissa Keys banked in an inside shot and the led was cut to 37-34. After a missed Paul Pewitt shot, the dynamic Deana Watson was fouled

with 1:46 left in the game. As usual for Watson, she came through and sank both ends of a 1 and 1 freeshot situation and Prairiland was within one at 37-36. After a Paul Pewitt basket, the Pewitt players left Pomroy alone outside.

Pomroy calmly sank another set shot and the Pewitt lead was at 39-38 with 1:17 left in the game. Then, with the crowd on its feet, Prairiland ran a fast break with :27 seconds left in the game which saw Pomroy hit a tough left-handed layup and give Prairiland a 40-39 lead. Twelve seconds later, Prairiland regained the ball and Paul Pewitt was forced to foul Deana Watson. Watson sank one from the charity stripe and Prairiland led 41-39. Although Paul Pewitt managed to get a final shot off, the ball went awry and Deana Watson rebounded the ball as the final buzzer blew, ringing the news of a 41-39 Patriot victory.

Jana Pomroy led the Patriots in scoring with 13 points and Deana Watson followed with 10. Patriot Coach Rick Johnson commented after the

game, "We got embarrassed by Delmar-West Lamar early in the year and haven't let that happen again. WE just had to hustle to win."

Friday night in Mt. Pleasant, the Prairiland Lady Patriots defeated Pittsburg 49-40 in a game to decide the winner of the second half of district play.

In the first quarter of play, Deana Watson was everywhere on the court. Watson stole the ball repeatedly and scored the first six Patriot points. With Pittsburg being so much taller than Prairiland, the Patriots could ill-afford to give up second shots. Fortunately, Klarissa Keys and Kristi Bankhead blocked out superbly and well enough for the Patriots to lead 10-8 at the end of the first quarter.

The Patriots again played admirably in the second quarter. Prairiland played such a balanced quarter that all five starters for the Patriots racked up points. With every Patriot diving after loose balls and playing good defense, the Patriots led at the half 23-17.

In the third quarter, Prairiland fell apart for three minutes which gave Pittsburg time to take the lead at 28-25. Luckily, Watson made an inside shot and Jana Pomroy an outside shot and Prairiland was once again leading 29-28. From that point onward, Prairiland never trailed in the game. Watson ended the quarter with a free shot and Prairiland led 32-30.

In the final quarter, every single touch between the players seemed to be called a foul. Although the Patriots weren't setting the world on fire with their charity tosses, they still made 9 of them in the quarter. On the other hand, Pittsburg was cold everywhere in the quarter. With a chance to cut the Patriot lead to two in the final two minutes of the game, a Pittsburg player missed an easy break away layup. Prairiland then took advantage and rolled up the score, Jenissa Baker made the final shot of the game with a fade away jumper and Prairiland had the win 49-40.

Deana Watson scored 19 points to lead the Patriots and Jenissa Baker and Klarissa Keys followed with 13 and 19 points respectively.

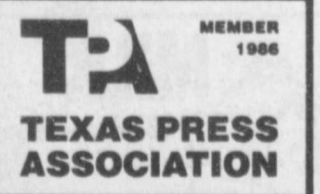

Fisher's activities for the elderly include service on the Area Agency on Aging and the Lamar County Human Resources Council, where he actively promoted the establishment of a senior citizens' site in Roxton.

He has also been involved in disaster programs. He is on the American Red Cross Board, which he served five years as president. He was on the Emberson Tornado Finance Committee and was very active in the recovery effort. He incorporated the Interfaith Disaster Services, Inc., which he served as an officer and management team member following the Paris tornado.

Fisher has also been involved in the health-related field. He is on the McCuiston Hospital Board and the Regional Health Planning Advisory Committee. He is on the American Cancer Society Board, which he has served as president, business campaign chair, and service chair. He

was March of Dimes campaign co-chair for three years and served on the MOD State Cabinet. He has been business campaign chair for Cystic Fibrosis.

He has worked with programs for the mentally ill and mentally retarded, serving on the Association for Retarded Citizens Living Center Board, the Paris Regional Habilitation Center Board and the Paris Outreach Clinic Board, which he chairs.

Fisher is also involved in economic development efforts. He is a member of the Ark-Tex Regional Development Company, Inc. Board, Northeast Texas Economic Development District, Paris Downtown Development Association, Main Street Committee, and Resource Conservation and Development.

In the area of transportation, he works with the Chamber of Commerce Highway Committee, the Highway 82 Association, the Highway 19/24 Association, the East Texas Gulf Highway Association and the Red River Stabilization Ad Hoc Committee.

Fisher is a member of the Chamber of Commerce Board, Paris Ambassadors, Rural Urban Planning Committee, Greater Paris Development Foundation, Inc., Paris Founders Lions Club and Paris Jaycees, which he has served as secretary and chaplain. He has been active in United Way fund raising efforts, chairing the government employees division for three years and the county employees division three years. He has worked on Salvation Army bell-ringing efforts.

He is also involved with the Ark-Tex Council of Governments, serving on the Executive Committee, Criminal Justice Advisory Committee and Regional Review Committee.

He is a member of the Paris Junior College Ex-Students and Friends Association, of which he is vice-president, and Texas Exes, which he has served as president and secretary-treasurer.

Fisher is a member of the Temporary Emergency Relief Program Board, which he chairs Council of Community Services, which he has served as vice-president. Farm Bureau, National Rifle Association, Fair Association Board, Historical Commission, Historical Society, Community Concert and has been involved with one production of Community Theater. He has been a delegate to eleven Democratic State Conventions.

He is also a member of the American, Texas, Northeast Texas and Lamar County Bar Associations.

Fisher is active in regional and state county officials' activities. He has served as president, secretary-treasurer, and first vice-president of the North and East Texas County Judges' and Commissioners' Association and has served on the Texas Association of Counties Board.

Among the highlights of the county judge's office in the past seven years include the disposition of 6,000 misdemeanor criminal cases, making the Lamar County Court the most active constitutional county court in northeast Texas, with a corresponding in-

crease in average fines from \$9,000/month up to \$19,000/month, more than a 100% increase. Other activities include reform of mental health commitment procedures, major increases in financial support for volunteer fire departments and for abused and neglected children, and consistent support of senior citizens' programs, including establishment of a central kitchen facility.

Other accomplishments in county government include the establishment and use of a County Industrial Development Bond program as a vehicle for industrial financing at reduced interest rates to expand and maintain job opportunities, state certification of the county jail by the Texas Commission on Jail Standards and release of the county from federal court order, expansion of competitive bidding, and providing land for construction of Family Haven shelter for battered wives.

During Fisher's tenure, Lamar County has enjoyed unusual success in obtaining state and federal grants. Of all the cities and counties in the ATCOG region, only Lamar County and Bowie County have received funding each of the past four years under the Community Development Block Grant program. Under this program, Lamar County has received a total of over \$1,100,000 for road and bridge projects, which provided long-term solutions for numerous roads in Roxton, Pattonville, Arthur City, northwest Lamar County, Blossom, Brookston, Deport, Lamar Point, Powderly, Petty, Cunningham and Reno. Additional roads have been designated for construction this year in Blossom, Deport, Chicota and Petty.

Fisher has also been involved in submitting successful applications for Criminal Justice Division funding. Projects gaining approval include \$50,000 for jail renovation and \$28,000 for establishment of a county crime prevention officer. In a coordinated effort with all Lamar County school districts, \$22,000 was obtained for establishment of an alternate school for disruptive youth. Family Haven shelter for battered wives received \$9,000 for provision of counseling services.

Fisher was named to Outstanding Young Men of America in 1980, 1982, and 1984, Business and Professional Women's Boss of the Year for 1980-81, and Paris Jaycees' Outstanding Young Public Servant for 1981-82.

Cecil Everett, former school administrator at North Lamar, Central and Delmar schools and former president of the Lamar County School Board, will serve as Fisher's campaign treasurer.

### 4-H News On Enrollment

Time is slipping away from folks that plan to enter a project in the Junior Show and are not 4-H members. As you recall, the 4-H leaders and Parents Association passed a rule back in January which states that to be eligible for the April Junior Show, a 4-H'er must have been enrolled in 4-H prior to March 1, 1986.

If you know someone that plans to show and has not joined, please try to get them on the ball.

If you are not sure whether or not you are enrolled since September 1, you had better check. This rule will be enforced.

The Honey Grove Junior Show will be Saturday, March 8 at the Fannin Peanut Company in Honey Grove. Entries are due before February 26 and the rules say there will be no late entries.

I will send entries on Feb 25th so do not be late getting them to me. They will have classes for dairy females, breeding beef cattle, market lambs and market steers.

Steers and lambs will be weighed from 8 a.m. to 10 a.m. and judging of all animals will begin at 10 a.m.

Entry fees are \$4. per head and you need to have your money ready when you come to enter. Make your checks

payable to Honey Grove Junior Show. You can bring your entries to me starting Tuesday, February 11 because we will not be in the office on the 10th.

The 4-H'ers that ordered broilers through the office should plan to pick up your birds Monday, February 17 at Prairiland High School Ag Department. Remember to take your money to pay for the chicks \$.35 per bird.

Plan housing facilities now and allow at least two square feet for each chick if at all possible. Make sure you have a heat light in the house but make sure chicks can get away from the heat if they need to. Give them plenty of fresh water and a good starting ration.

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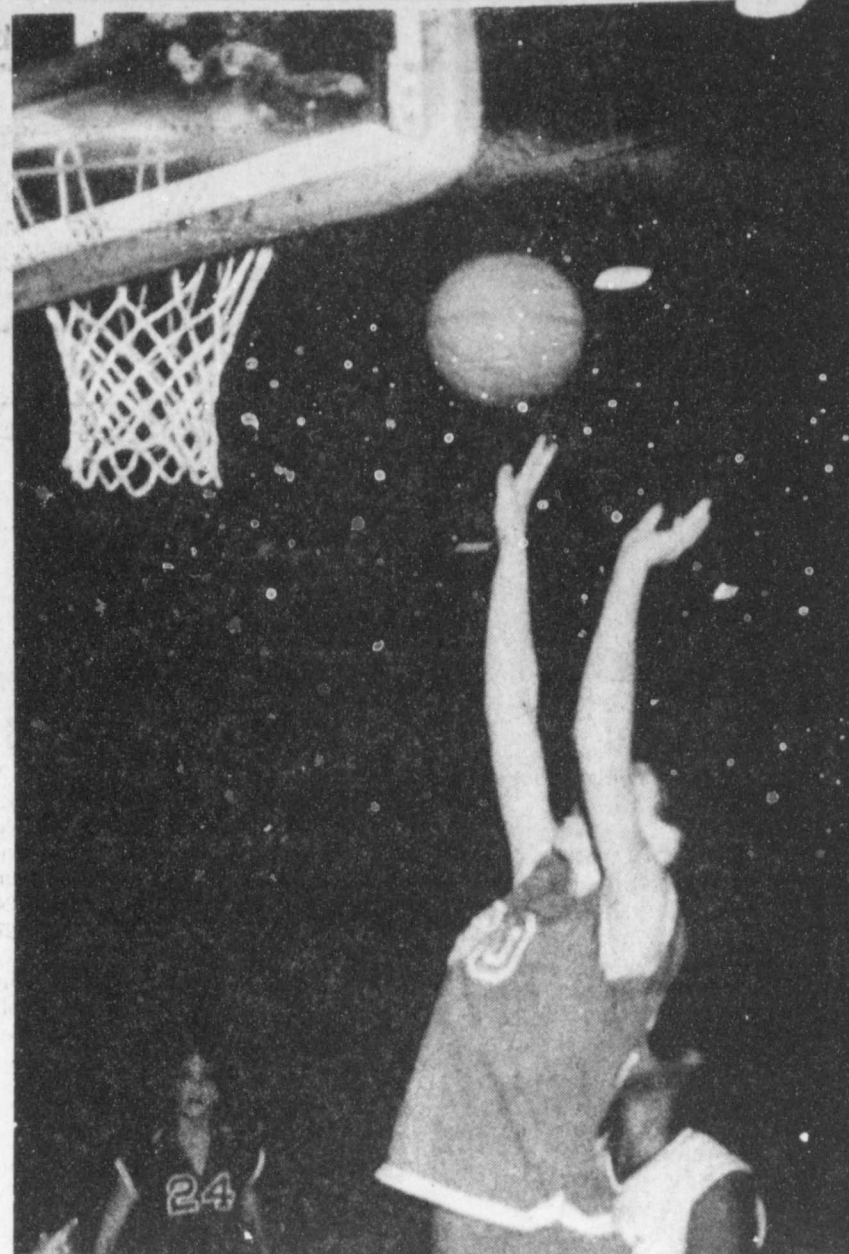
