A small group of teachers and myself, were discussing the state of the world the other day. In passing, I admired a gift hung upon the wall, a pain-staking, carefully created gift requiring hours of work.

One of the teachers described the struggles and problems that a student (with a learning disability) went through, and said "one day I hugged her. In a few days she brought this to me". She continued that she tried to get the girl to keep it, that too much effort had gone into the project, but nothing else would do than her acceptance of the gift.

It illustrated a point, and we continued with the stories as we could tell of how a moment of hugging, laying a hand on the arm, a pat on the back, had inspired gratitude and confidence in the recipient.

Why has our society reduced touching in sympathy, understanding and affection to close family or friends? The sterile handshake tells us nothing.

There certainly is nothing inherent in the gestures I am referring to. There is, definitely, a desire to help, to comfort, to relate to our fellow humankind.

On a trip last spring there was an elderly woman who found herself frightened, alone and homesick on a long trip into a strange, strange world. She was found in tears on the boat's deck, trembling all over. Never having seen her before, a hug and invitation to have an ice tea and talk it over reduced her to more tears... of relief and happiness. For the next two days our little group pattoed, hugged, talked and made sure she was included in activities. When we left her, a happier person couldn't be found.

It seems a very little thing to do. Notice when someone is telling something difficult for them. The person who takes a moment to lay a hand on their arm is usually the recipient of a thankful, heartfelt look. Yet, for some reason, many of us are reticent to do it.

Let's all loosen up just a bit. Let's get involved in other's unhappiness or distress just a little. Let's bring back the hug!

Ad Rates To Increase Slightly

Effective this issue, April 3, 1986, the advertising rates for the Deport Times, Bogata News, Talco Times and Blossom Times will undergo a slight increase of ten cents per column inch.

The papers have endeavored to keep their rates down, but a sixty percent increase in mailing rates, plus substantial increases in chemicals,

supplies and printing costs have made an increase necessary.

The papers have not had a rate increase since July, 1984.

Subscriptions will remain the same, as will the 15 cents per word classified ads and mini-ads. Display classifieds will undergo the same ten cent increase as regular lineage.

Child Drowns In Well

Mary Francis Hall, two-year old daughter of Huey Bruce Hall and Dorothy Kay Hall of Paris, drowned Thursday afternoon when she fell into an uncovered well at her grandparents home near Pattonville.

The toddler had been walking around in the back yard of William Aubrey, who lives five miles south of Pattonville. Apparently she was in the well several minutes before she was discovered to be missing, and desperate efforts to revive her failed.

Paris Emergency Medical Service paramedics also worked over the child, and rushed her to McCuistin Medical Center where she was pronounced dead by the emergency room doctors.

Funeral services were held Saturday in Fry and Gibbs Funeral Home Chapel with Ronnie Gene Aubrey officiating. Burial was in Evergreen Cemetery.

Patriots Begin District With Win

The Prairiland Patriots began district play Tuesday afternoon at home as they defeated the Pittsburg Pirates 10-0 in five innings.

Scott Scudder, as he did all pre-season, simply overpowered the Pittsburg batters in the first inning with blazing fastballs. Throwing only 11 pitches, Scudder struck out the side.

In the bottom of the inning, leadoff hitter Mike Connot drew a walk and then stole second base. Second baseman Joel Ballard then flew out to deep centerfield to move Connot to third base. After Scudder walked, John Dusenberry made another long out to the centerfielder. However, Connot tagged up and scored on Dusenberry's long out and the Patriots led 1-0. Heath Kennedy made the final out of the inning, lofting another fly ball to the sure-handed Pittsburg centerfielder.

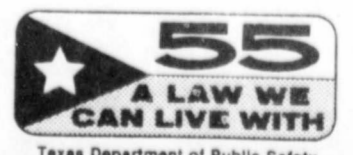
With neither team scoring in the second inning, and Scudder shutting down the Pirates in the top of the third inning, Prairiland staged another rally in the bottom of the third inning. First baseman Mike Blackburn led

off the inning for the Patriots with a walk. Then, Mike Connot, bunting for a base hit, forced out Blackburn as second as the Pirate pitcher was quick to pounce on the bunt. Ballard followed with a ground-out which moved Connot on around to second base. Pitcher Scott Scudder then helped himself out with a two-out single to centerfield driving in Connot to make the score 2-0. Catcher John Dusenberry continued the two-out rally with a double off of the right centerfield fence, which drove in Scudder to make the score 3-0. That was all that the Patriots could manage to score in the inning and Prairiland led at the end of three complete innings 3-0.

Neither team managed to score in the fourth inning and Scudder blanked the Pirates in the top of the fifth inning. However, with rain misting and a chance to end the game if they could come up with seven runs in the inning, the Patriot bats began to perk up. After five consecutive hits from Blackburn, Connot, Ballard, Scudder and Dusenberry, the Patriot lead was a comfortable one at 7-0. After a walk by Heath Kennedy, pinch hitter Jack

Kindle drove in pincen runner Richard Eatherly with a sharp single to make the score 8-0. Jeff Morrison, pinch hitting, drew a base on balls to load the bases for pinch hitter Craig Burns. On a passed ball by the catcher, Kennedy came in to score to make the score 9-0. Burns then was issued a base on balls to load the bases again. However, after a runner was thrown out at the plate and a strike out, it appeared that the game would progress to the sixth damp inning. Mike Connot, however, did everyone a favor by driving in Morrison for the tenth run of the inning to end the game.

Scott Scudder pitched a one hitter, while striking out nine and going 2 2 with a walk at the plate. Other leading hitters in the game for the Patriots were Connot and Dusenberry who each went 2 for 3. The next game for the Patriots will be an encounter with the Clarksville Tigers Friday evening at 5:30 at Clarksville.






